

Minutes of the University Faculty
December 11, 1950

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall, Monday, December 11, at 4:00 p.m. President Donovan presided.

Members absent were: W. R. Allen, L. A. Bradford*, Betty J. Eilertsen, W. P. Garrigus, Jerry Jones, P. E. Karraker, A. J. Olney, Irwin T. Sanders*, A. E. Slesser, Earl P. Slone, D. E. South, and Lawrence S. Thompson*.

The minutes of November 13 were approved as read.

Dean Kirwan presented for the Committee on Student Organizations a recommendation to approve the organization of the University of Kentucky Amateur Radio Club. The University Faculty approved the request.

Dean White presented for the College of Arts and Sciences the following recommended new courses and course changes, which were approved by the Faculty.

1. New Courses:

Anatomy and Physiology 205 Advanced Neurophysiology (3)

This course includes electrical analysis of nerve fibres and synapse, present-day theories of nerve impulse, spinal and higher reflexes, metabolism of the nervous system and theories of central nervous function from the cybernetic viewpoint. Two lectures and one two-hour laboratory period per week. Prerequisites: A & P 107 and 109, or consent of the instructor.

Anthropology 118 Cultures of the Southwestern United States (3)

Development from the earliest times to the present of the sedentary and nomadic peoples. Emphasis on prehistoric Puebloan, Mogollon and Hohokam peoples.

Anthropology 180 Anthropology: Man and His Works (3)

An intensive survey course, covering all the areas of anthropology: - physical anthropology (man's nature), archaeology (man's earliest history) and social anthropology (man's learned behavior, the types of his society, and his cultural processes.)

Philosophy 110. The Making of the Modern Mind (3)

A study of the intellectual background of the modern age. Renaissance humanism, 17th and 18th century rationalism, 19th century romanticism and idealism are some of the major tendencies to be stressed.

Philosophy 190 Problems of Philosophy (3)

This course is for students who have had little or no formal training in philosophy but who desire to study the basic presuppositions underlying religion, education, art, morality and government.

Physical Education 72 Intermediate Football (3)

Designed for football players and physical education majors who wish to become coaches. The fundamentals of all positions and playing strategy are covered. One hour lecture and four hours laboratory. Prerequisite: P.E. 42 or consent of instructor.

Psychology 205 a,b or Sociology 205 a,b Seminar in Social Psychology (3)

Each semester some topic in the field of social psychology, such as attitudes and beliefs, structure and function of social groups, social determinants of behavior, leadership, and morale, will be studied intensively.

Romance Languages 150 The Teaching of Romance Languages (3)

A course for teachers and prospective teachers of French or Spanish, with the objective of providing a more vital approach to the teaching of these languages.

II. Courses to be dropped:

Romance Languages 10c Spanish Conversation and Composition (3)

III. Changes in course credits:

Library Science 133b Reference and Bibliography. Change from 2 to 3 credits.

Library Science 229 Advanced Cataloging and Classification. Change from 4 to 3 credits.

In the absence of Dean Slone, Dean White also presented recommendations from the College of Pharmacy as follows:


