DR. OTIS. A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky



The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the ten years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

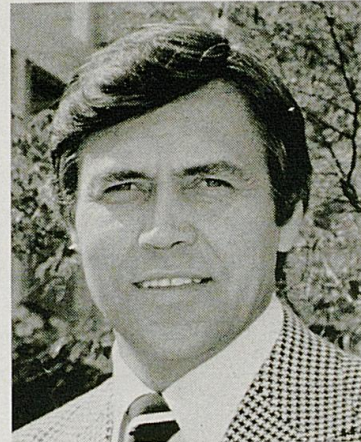
The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN

Athletics Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

The most recent physical improvements include a new baseball grandstand behind home plate, new lockers in the football dressing rooms and construction of a new equipment shed for track, all at Shively Sports Center.



On the institutional side of the ledger, the University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of next year and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985, along with renewal of the UK Relays during the past spring.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

A few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics under Hagan include;

- Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful players' lounge at Shively Sports Center.
- New carpeting in the stadium football offices.
- New food service equipment in the press box at Commonwealth Stadium.
- New basketball offices in Memorial Coliseum for both the men and women.
- Re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a complete revamping of the track facilities at Shively Sports Center.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new

pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

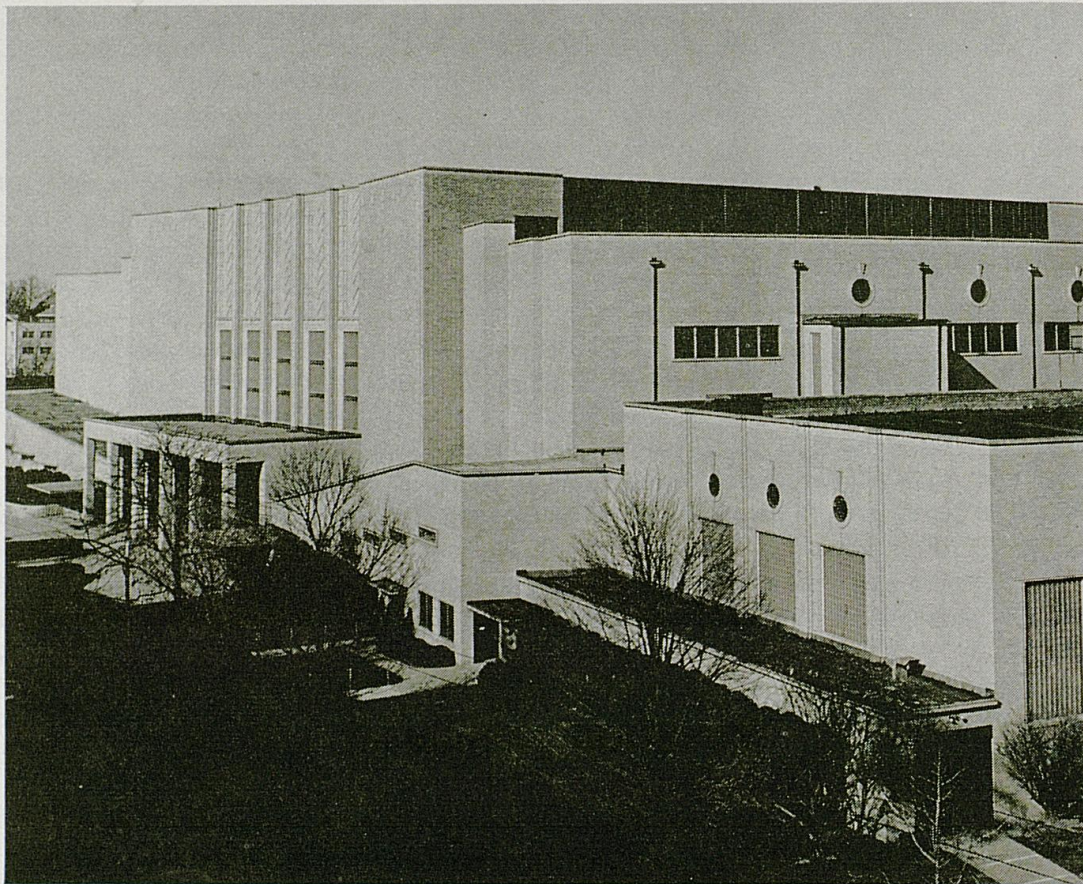
He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chaparrals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington.



MEMORIAL COLISEUM

Memorial Coliseum, former home of the Kentucky Wildcats, has been the home of the Lady Kats since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976.

In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as conventions.

1981-82 LADY KATS OUTLOOK

Nine players return from the most successful Lady Kats basketball team to date, making the outlook an optimistic one as Kentucky enters its first year of NCAA competition. Gone are four-year starters Liz Lukschu, a 6-4 center, and 5-11 forward Maria Donhoff, but returning is a veteran squad led by All-American Valerie Still.

The Lady Kats were ranked ninth nationally by Street and Smith's annual Basketball Yearbook, but second-year Coach Terry Hall warns that her team must first prove itself against a schedule that includes six of the magazine's top 12 teams.

"We have some talented young athletes," she says, "but we face our biggest challenge because of our improved schedule."

Kentucky must face that challenge with its smallest lineup in five years. Still, a 6-1 junior who earned All-America honors at forward last year, will be used at center this season and will be UK's tallest starter. An exceptional leaper, Still led Kentucky in scoring (20.9) and rebounding (10.9) last year. Occasionally Still will move to forward and 6-2 sophomore Jody Runge will play center. Runge averaged 4.2 points and 2.3 rebounds as a freshman.

Starting at forward will be 5-10 senior Tayna Fogle and 5-10 sophomore Lisa Collins, who was used primarily as a guard last year. Collins, who may again see some action at guard, averaged six points and 2.3 rebounds as a freshman. Fogle, the squad's lone senior, averaged 7.5 points and 3.6 rebounds as the "sixth person" last year.

Helping out at both the center and forward positions will be freshman Grace Odrick, a big 6-footer from Camden, NJ. Odrick averaged 27 points and 10 rebounds at Camden High School and at 175 pounds, her size and strength will be a big plus on the Lady Kats' small squad.

Co-captains Patty Jo Hedges and Lori Edgington, both juniors, will be starting at the guard spots. Hedges and 5-7 junior Lea Wise have started for two seasons at UK, but Edgington has fully recovered from a knee injury suffered her freshman season and has looked a shade better than Wise in preseason practices.

Hedges, 5-7, is UK's all-time assists leader, averaging 5.8 last season. She also averaged 9.1 points and 3.5 rebounds. Edgington, 5-8, contributed 4.9 points and 2.3 rebounds as a reserve. Wise, who was slowed by a severe case of tonsillitis during Kentucky's seven-game tour of Japan in August, averaged 7.4 points and 3.3 assists and is coming on strong to challenge the starters. Also helping at the guard spot will be Donna Martin, a 5-7 sophomore walk-on who was very impressive in Japan, and 5-9 freshman Diane Stephens of Louisville.

Coach Hall is concerned about the team's lack of height, but points out that several things can be done to compensate for it. "Small teams have been known to win if they position themselves properly and go after the loose balls," she says. "We will have better speed and quickness, and playing a press and running a good, fast offense will be essential. However, playing with intensity will determine our success."

An improvement of the team's outside shooting will also be important, Hall says. "We need good outside shooting from Lori and Lea and we'll once again rely on Patty Jo to control our offense. We're hoping our guards can open up an inside game for Valerie."

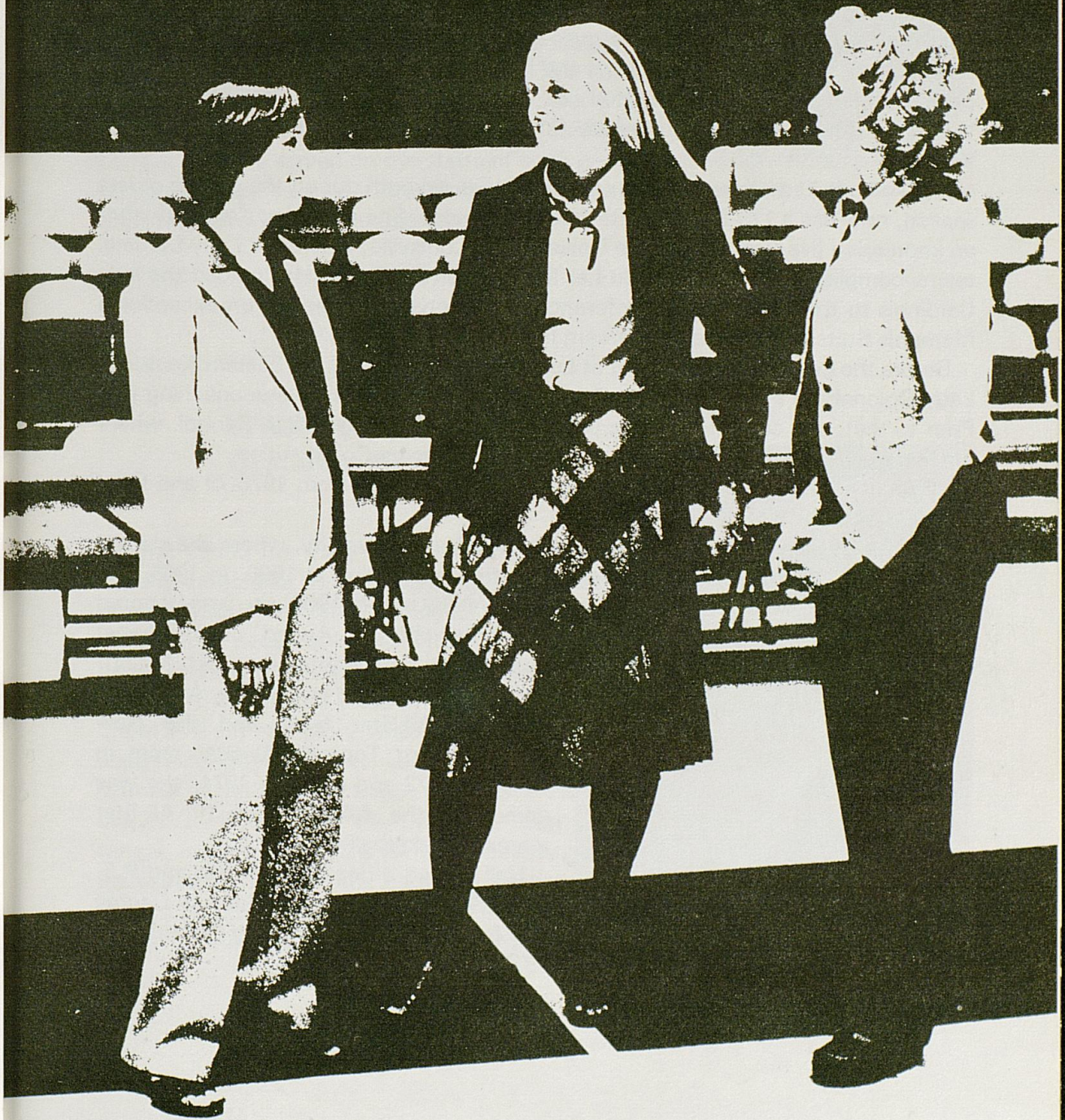
Still was chosen to Street and Smith's preseason All-American team, and UK's coach feels that is only right. "Valerie plays an all-around game," she said. "You have to score, rebound, play defense and hustle to be an All-American, and I think she does all that."

The Lady Kats finished last season with a 25-6 record and a No. 11 national ranking as they advanced to the second round of the AIAW National tournament before falling to Maryland, 83-82. This year, however, they move into the powerful Southeastern Conference, and the schedule is much tougher than ever before.

Among the national powers on UK's schedule are Tennessee, Old Dominion, UCLA, South Carolina, Georgia, and North Carolina State in the Lady Kats' second game of the season in the Detroit Classic.

"Getting off to a fast—and by that I mean good—start will be very important to us this season," Hall said.

THE STAFF



TERRY HALL **Head Basketball Coach**

In her first year at Kentucky, Terry Hall's Lady Kats compiled a 25-6 record, finished the season ranked 11th nationally, and were only two steps away from the Final Four when their season ended in a playoff game at Maryland. The season was immediately acclaimed as the finest ever in the successful Lady Kat basketball program and for her accomplishments, Hall was lauded as Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year.



Hall, whose Lady Kats were ranked as high as seventh during the course of last season, now has a 118-66 collegiate coaching record. She arrived at Kentucky after an impressive five-year stay at the University of Louisville, where her Lady Cardinal teams compiled a 79-53 record. In her final season at U of L, Hall guided the lady Cardinals to their first Metro Conference championship, defeating an exceptional Memphis State team in the tournament finals.

Before the coaching assignment at Louisville, Hall directed the Eastern Kentucky Lady Colonels to a 14-6 record and a KWIC title in her first college coaching job. Prior to that, she coached for five years at Louisville's Butler High School, where her teams posted a 69-33 record, including two Jefferson County titles.

While at U of L, Hall also served as head tennis coach from 1976-79 and head softball coach in 1979-80.

A native of Salem, IN, Hall attended Indiana State University, where she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball before graduating in 1966. In 1965, she received the "I" Woman Award from the university and in 1966, she was honored with the Hillman Award as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU. In softball, she was named to the New Albany Invitational All-Star team and the New Albany Metro Tourney All-Star team in 1970. In 1972 and again in 1974, she was named to the AAU Region IV All-Star teams in basketball.



Hall earned a degree in Health and P.E. from ISU, and received a Master's Degree in P.E. from Eastern Kentucky University in 1974.

DOROTHY JEAN BERRY
Assistant Coach

"Dottie" Berry came to Kentucky as an assistant in 1980 from College Park High School in Georgia, where she was serving as head basketball coach. A native of Atlanta, Berry graduated from Russell High School in East Point, GA, before attending Georgia Southern College,, where she earned a Bachelor of Science in 1974. In 1976, she earned a Master of Education from Georgia State University. Berry has extensive experience working summer basketball camps, and has served on the staffs of such widely-recognized camps as B/C Invitation Camps, Atlanta Superstars Basketball Camp and Hubie Brown's Basketball Camp.



LYNN NORENBURG
Graduate Assistant

Lynn joined the Lady Kats staff in August after earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physical Education at William and Mary College. She started four consecutive seasons in basketball, and also competed in track and intramural softball. An excellent student, Lynn earned Academic All-American honors at William and Mary while earning a 3.97 grade point average over four years. She was also a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society. A native of St. Petersburg, FL, Lynn has spent several summers working basketball camps, including the B/C All-Stars Basketball Camp, the Manatee Junior College Basketball Camp, and the Lady Kat Basketball Camp. As a player at William and Mary, Lynn is ranked No. 1 on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,504 career points. She averaged 18.3 points over four seasons with a 56.2 field goal percentage.



MIMI PORTER Trainer

A native of Lexington, Mimi graduated from Lafayette High School and received her B.A. degree in health and physical education from UK in 1971 and a Master's Degree in 1975. She served as women's head athletic trainer for three years prior to the 1978 merger of the men's and women's programs and is now an assistant athletics trainer assigned primarily to women. Mimi also is a member of the Kentucky Athletic Trainers Advisory Board.



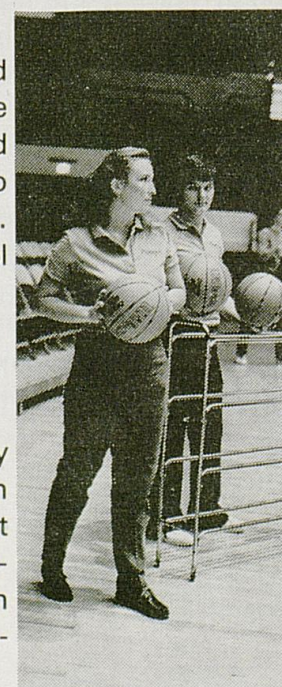
JOAN FRY Secretary

GARY LOYD Manager

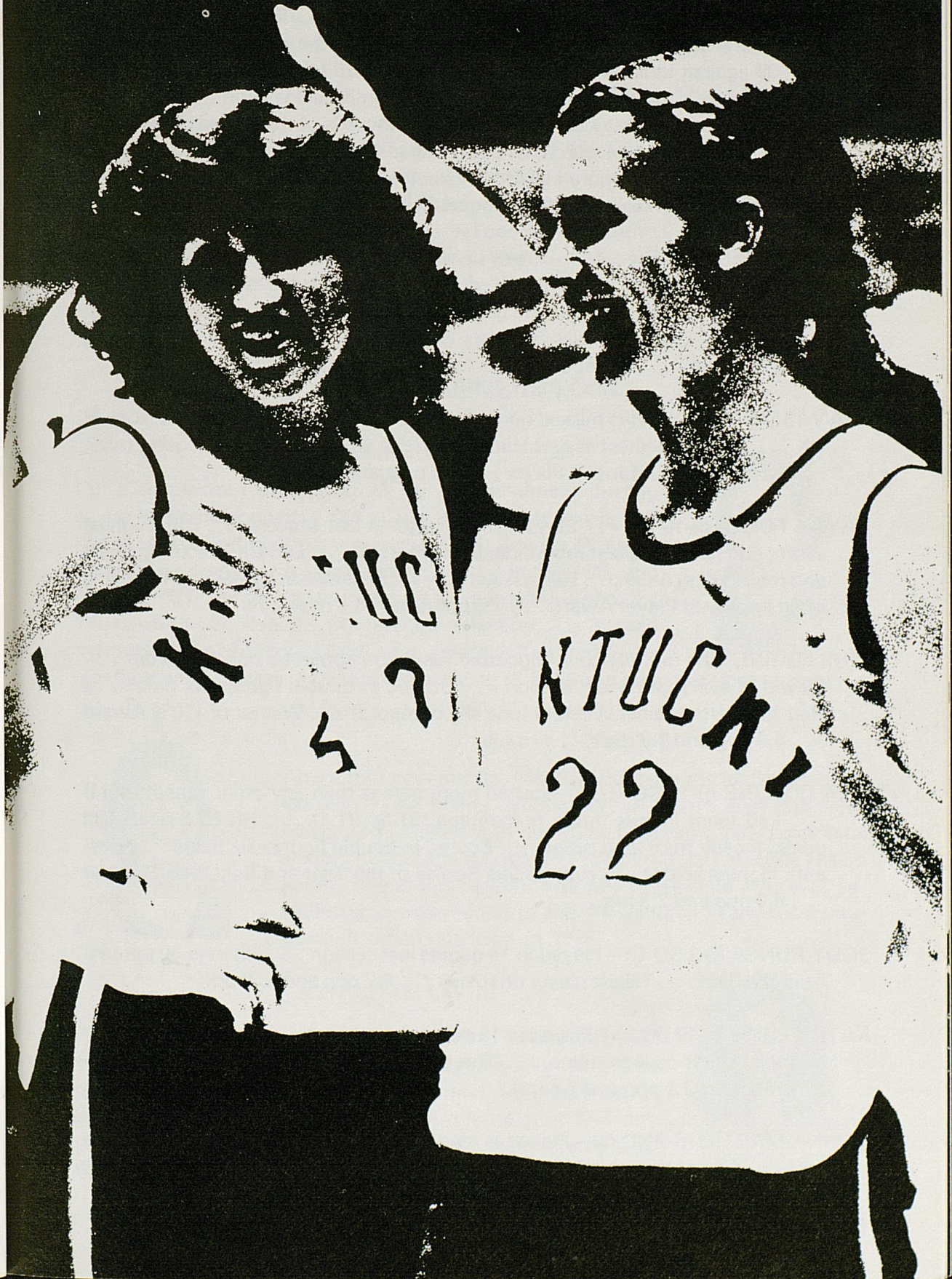

Also a four year-starter, Maria is fourth on the all-time scoring list with 1,187 points. Known as the team's best defensive player and credited with doing the important things that fans seldom notice, the rugged 5-11 forward from Louisville will be sorely missed this season. She was a two-time All-KWIC selection and was named to the All-National Women's Invitational Tournament team in 1978.



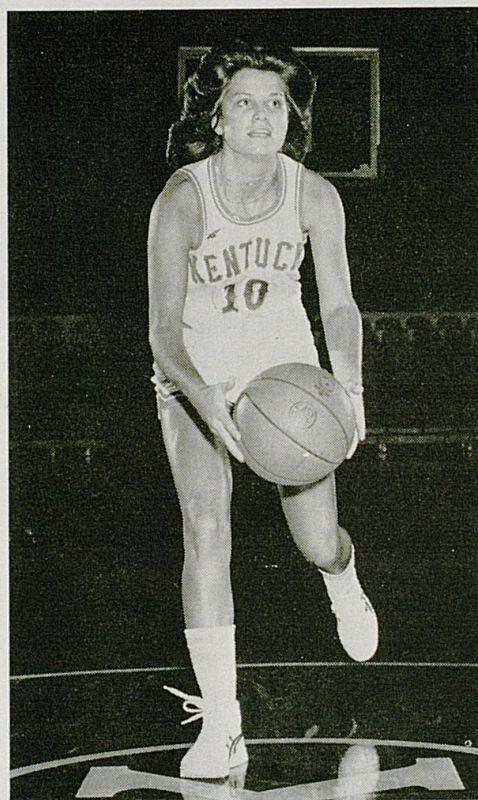
LYNNETTE LEWIS

She also holds the record for most consecutive free throws made with 19. She averaged six points a game while ranking eighth in playing time.



Lisa was used equally at guard and forward last season, but will likely see more time at the forward spot this year, as the Lady Kats lost two starters off the front line while adding a backcourt player to the roster. Lisa scored in double figures six times last season, including a season-high 19 points against South Carolina in the Region II tournament at Old Dominion. A three-time All-State player and Kentucky's "Miss Basketball" in 1980, Lisa was honored as Lady Kats' Rookie of the Year and received the Best Free Throw Shooter award in 1981.

A three-time All-State player, Jody led Waukon to a 69-12 record and accumulated 2,296 points. Her father, Dennis, played basketball for the University of Iowa.

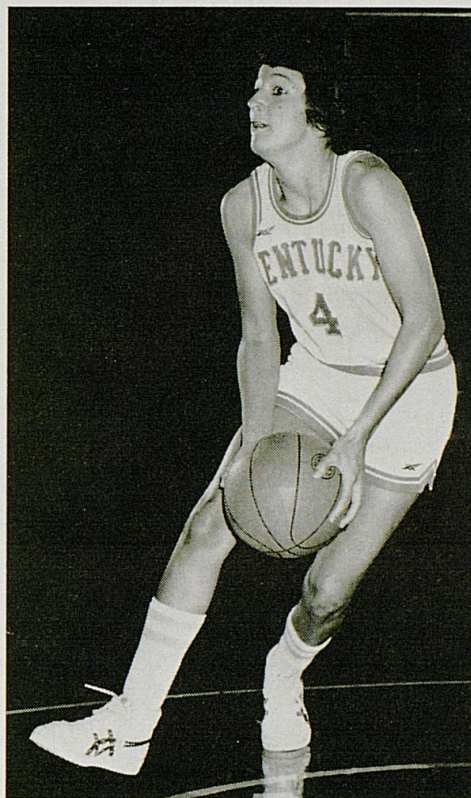

It took only one season for Valerie to earn accolades as the best player in Lady Kat basketball history. And it's no wonder. Consistently ranked among the nation's top scorers during her first two seasons at UK, Valerie keeps rewriting the record books. A first-team Street and Smith All-American and third team Kodak All-American, Valerie broke her own record of most points in a game when she fired in 39 last season at Indiana. She grabbed a record 26 rebounds in a game against highly-regarded Rutgers during her freshman season. Other records she holds are most field goals made in a game (16) and a season (260). Although her scoring average slipped from 22.1 to 20.9 last year, Valerie's field goal percentage rose from 55.3 to



58.1, good enough to place her 18th nationally in that category at season's end. She also holds Southeastern Conference Tournament records for most points in a game (37), most field goals made in a game (14), most rebounds in a game (17) and in a tournament (44), and is tied for most steals in a game (6) and most free throws made in a tournament (16). She has made the SEC All-Tournament team for two consecutive seasons.

While leading Kentucky in minutes played last season, Valerie also led the team in blocked shots (53) and was second in steals with 64. She led the Lady Kats in scoring 20 times and rebounding 24 times in 31 games.

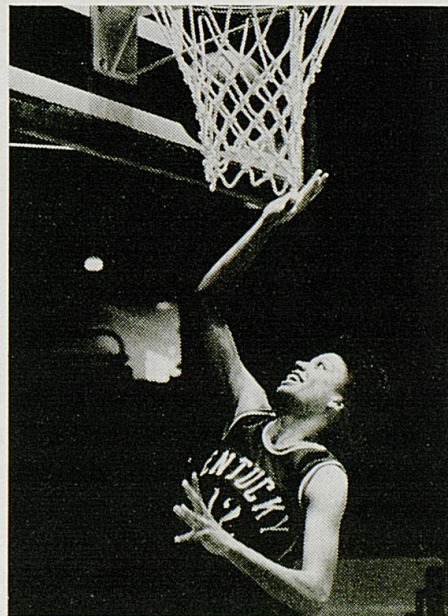
This season Valerie will likely be used as the starting center, replacing the graduated 6-foot-4 Liz Lukschu. A versatile athlete with great leaping ability, quickness, speed and finesse, Valerie will be the tallest player in Kentucky's lineup. 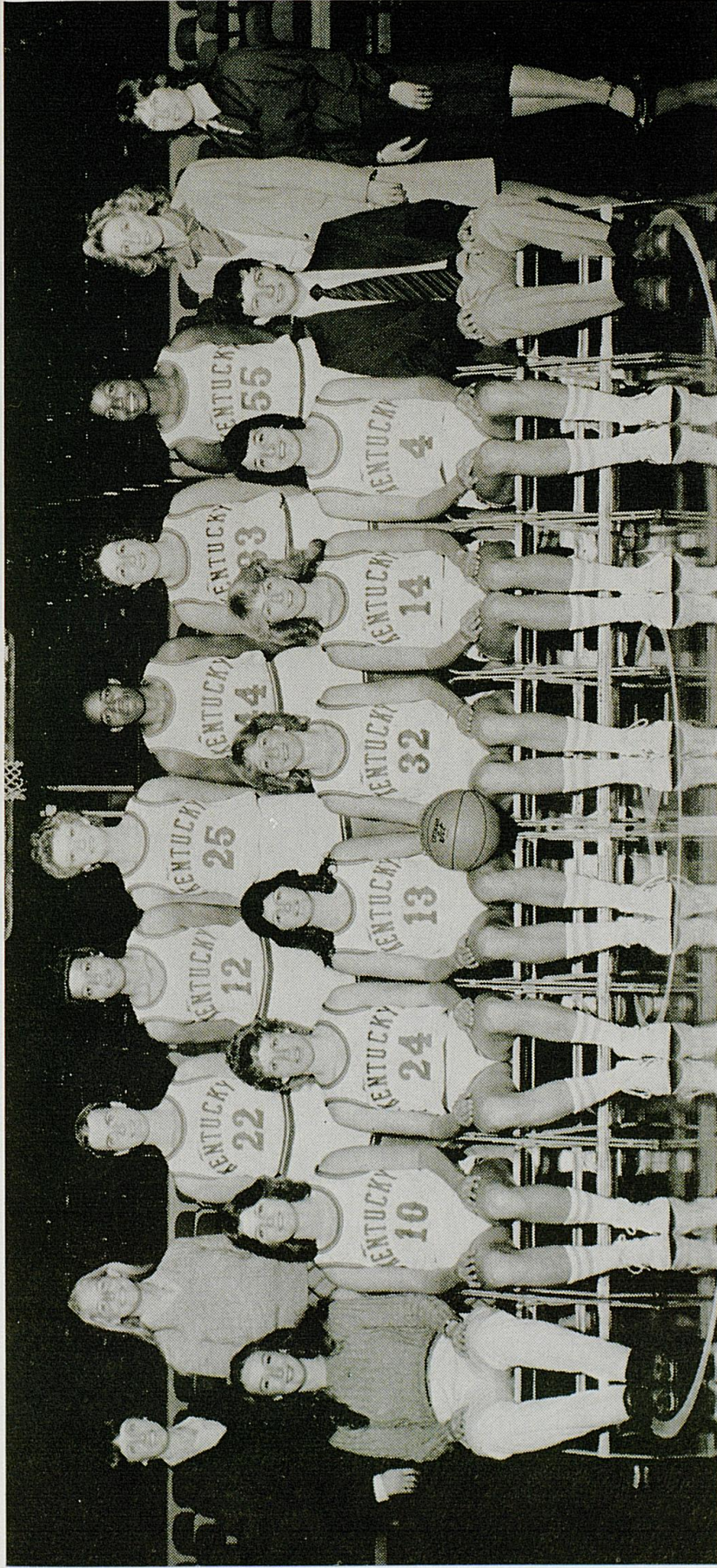

COACH HALL ON WISE: "Lea is a good outside shooter and a good defensive player. She plays both ends of the floor. She works really hard at her game."

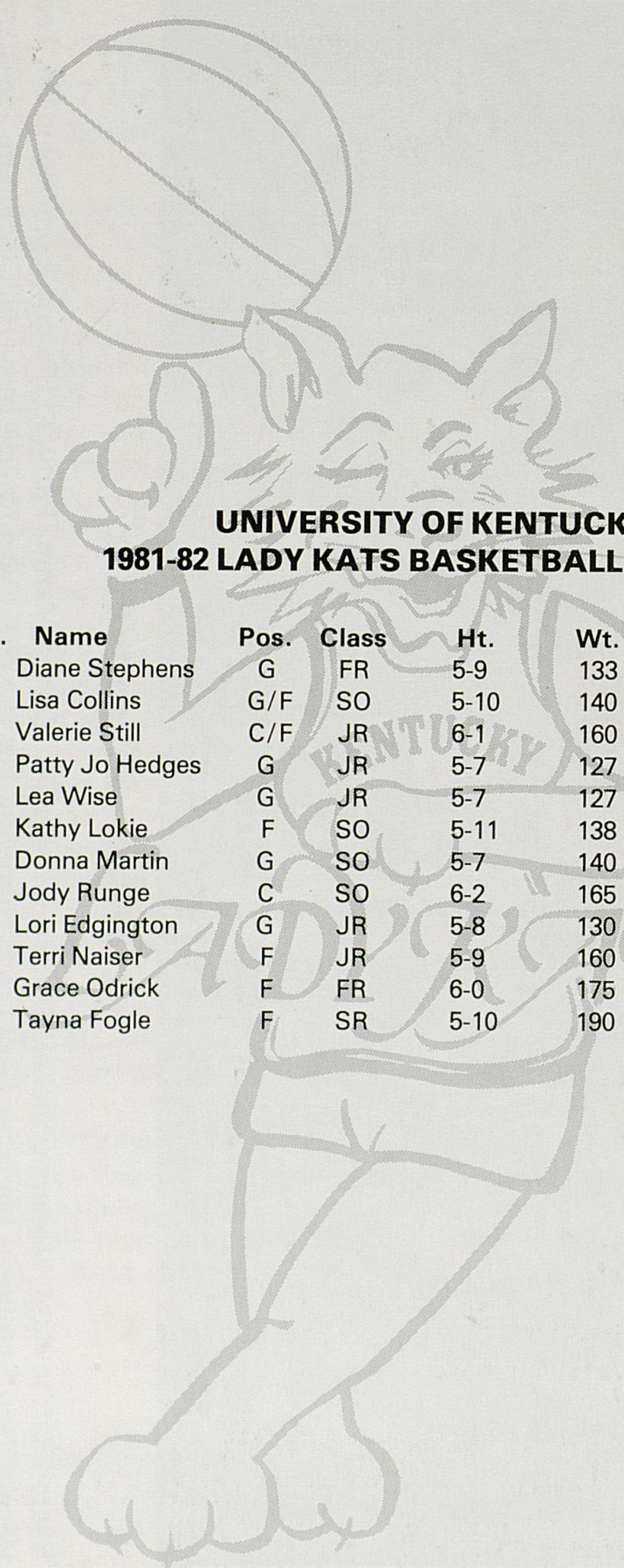

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.

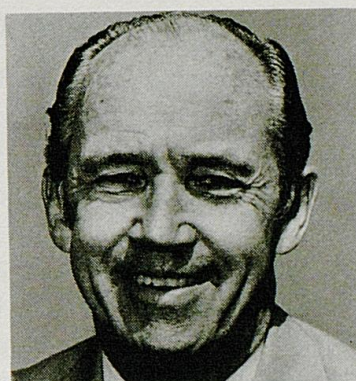

Ham is a son of Mrs. Albert B. Ham and the late Mr. Ham of Edwardsburg, Michigan.

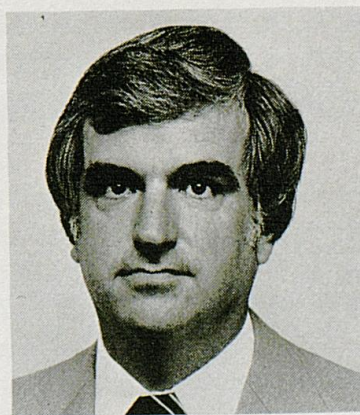


LARRY IVY

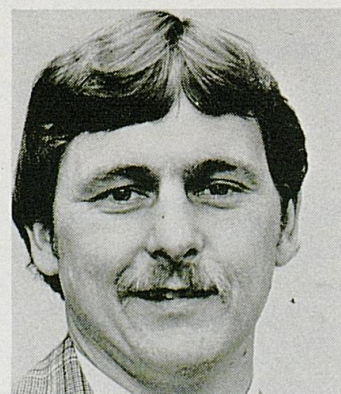
DR. MARION E. McKENNA

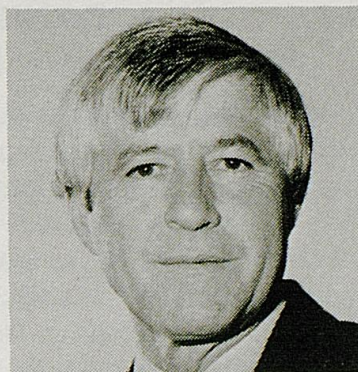


BOB BRADLEY

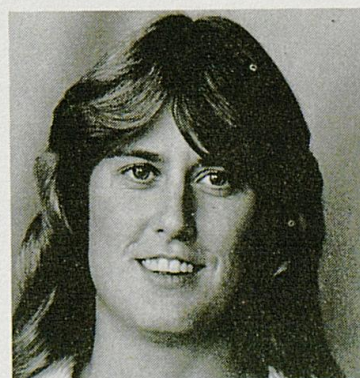


RUSSELL RICE

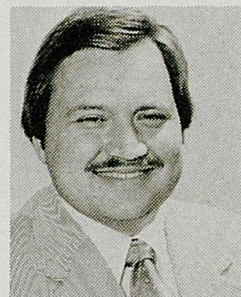
RENA KOIER

THE JAPAN TOUR

A Season to Remember

When we lost to Maryland in the second round of the AIAW National tournament last March, we looked forward to a long rest before we would once again begin preparation for another season. And another season came much sooner than anyone had anticipated. Just as the girls had finished drying the tears shed for a season that ended too soon, Athletics Director Cliff Hagan announced that the Lady Kats would return to Lexington in July—to prepare for a seven-game tour of Japan in August. Those seven games would be played against the Japan National Women's Team. Suddenly, the disappointment of not reaching the Final Four was replaced by the excitement of a new adventure—a season that everyone would remember.

When the girls reassembled in July, they were enrolled in a University class designed to prepare them for the experience. And they were also practicing twice a day in preparation for the trip. Twelve players—including incoming freshman Diane Stephens and graduating senior Liz Lukschu—were making the trip, along with six staff members.

Little was known about the opponent. They were quick, we were told,



and they played with unbelievable intensity. But how tall were they? Could they shoot? After a 24-hour trip, including an 11-hour flight over the Pacific, the answers came quickly and rudely. They matched us in height, they shot equally well, and they were quicker and played with more intensity than we were ready for. The first game was a nightmare—Japan led by as many as 15 points before winning 72-59. The second game they led by as many as 20 before prevailing 78-60. The girls were demoralized. The Japanese were playing a very physical game, and bodies were as bruised as egos. Lea Wise, Kentucky's play-making guard, was out with tonsillitis and might have to be hospitalized. Everyone wanted to go home.

Then determination and pride took over. The Lady Kats won the next game, 75-73. And although we lost the next game, we had led by three late in the game. The next loss was by only two points. Then came a one-point Kentucky win before a three-point heart-breaking loss in the series finale. Our record was a disappointing 2-5, but the lessons learned had made it worthwhile. And knowing we had lost to a great team made it more bearable. The Jap-

anese girls averaged 24 years in age. They had been playing together for almost five years. They were the best their country had to offer, and they were playing in their homeland. We felt no disgrace.

And we had learned many things off

the court. We could now speak enough Japanese to get by. We could sit Japanese-style and eat with chopsticks. We had seen the awesome beauty of Mt. Fuji and the emperor's palace in Tokyo. We had been introduced to another world, and we were enriched by it.
