THE PLATFORM

With this issue of The Kernel, the platform of the student paper resumes after an absence of several months from the editorial page. At the time it was dropped from the columns of this paper, it had become so well known and so synonymous with the editorial policy of The Kernel that the editors felt it no longer necessary to print it. At this time, however, it has become necessary to add to the policies contained in the platform, so it reappears in this issue. Observing students and members of the faculty will note that a new plank has been added to the platform. That new plank, hewed from the virgin timber of students' rights as indicated by The Kernel slogan on the press maintaining the rights of those who are attending the university, concerns the repeal of the new attendance rule established a short time ago by zealous officials at Kentucky. Since that rule was announced, scores of students representing every one of the four classes and those taking graduate work have visited the editorial offices of The Kernel, asking that the paper assist in pointing out to officials the manifest injustice of the new ruling. Many letters for the student point of view column now are on file awaiting publication. The tide of sentiment against the new rule is rising swiftly over student obedience to those who admittedly hold the hammer. In other columns of today's paper, that sentiment is being expressed because The Kernel is a student paper and so long as it does not feel the iron hand of suppression, it is going to continue to be a student paper. It is both wise and convenient at this time to

point out that there is no conflict between the various planks of the platform, as might appear at first blush. Laws and by-laws should be observed, but the particular stress in The Kernel is directed against violation of the prohibition laws by members of the student body. It may be said that letting scholarship and special of the attendance rule do not agree, but it is well to remember that education cannot be measured by any mathematical standard such as the number of times a particular student attends a particular class. There are professors at a student is credited with four absences over a period of four and one-half months. Professors of similar mental vigor oftentimes cause one-third of a final grade to be determined by the number of absences. Others will not accept an excuse under any condition of servitude, preferring to prove to the world that higher education is really an autocracy. It is with a feeling of compassion for Alma Mater that they in fact cannot be designated as few. Their reaction to the new rule of attendance has been that of joy, because under it they find their medium of that drying the last inch of tape a crimum.

So it is that The Kernel voices the opinion of students in this matter of repeal of the attendance rule. It is altogether fitting and proper that it do so, for it is a paper that has won national recognition as an exponent of the free press under the protection of which students gather in pursuit of academic life, liberty, and happiness.

CAN YOU WRITE?

By the Editor: Just as we were wondering what to do about this business of no student letters for The Kernel point of view column, along comes the university senate, or whoever did it, with a new set of attendance rules for the dear students to read and, perforce, to observe. 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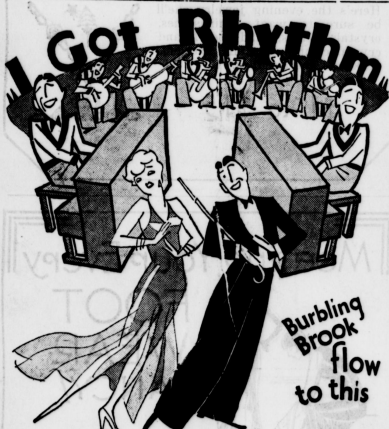

Are Absence Rules Fair? Read This

Have not been granted will be found in other columns of today's paper. Why is an absence more excusable at holiday time than at other periods of the semester?

Sec. 7: A student with an unexcused absence on the day immediately preceding or following a vacation or holiday shall have a penalty of three hours (and three quality points) added to his requirements for graduation, with the exception of the College of Law, where the penalty shall be two quality points. (Note: A second semester senior necessarily must attend school an extra semester, providing he or she cannot obtain an excuse for absence preceding or following a holiday.)

Sec. 8: A student must make a SATISFACTORY explanation to the instructor for any absence before he shall be permitted to make up the work missed. Absences due to officially authorized trips, such as those of athletic teams, musical, oratorical and dramatic organizations, and university classes, shall be considered as having been satisfactorily explained to the instructor. This section sets up no general standard for explanations, but leaves the matter to the discretion of the professor as to the work missed.)

Sec. 9: The instructor shall report to the registrar at the end of the semester the number of (excused and unexcused) absences for each student. The registrar shall call for special reports of absences on days before and after a holiday. All absences are to be reported on the student's credit card and shall be considered a part of his permanent record. (Note: It seems unfair to place on the card the absences without any of the reasons for said absences.)

Sec. 10: Juniors and seniors whose standing on the work of the previous semester is 24 (credit points), shall be extended the same privileges relative to absences and graduate students. Students who wish to obtain this privilege must apply to the registrar. (Note: This section of the new ruling is being held in abeyance until the second semester of the current school year, while the other provisions went into effect at the time of passage.)

Section 1: No report of absences shall be required but each instructor may record and report absences of graduate student as he sees fit.
