## Anti Child Labor Creed

I.

We believe in the right of every child to health and education.

II.

We believe that child labor interferes with that right.

III.

We believe that child labor is in itself cruel and wasteful; that it is mentally, morally and physically injurious to the child; and that it is a distinct menace to the nation.

IV.

We believe that no child under fourteen should work in a factory, workshop, mercantile house, store, office, hotel or apartment house, in any place of public amusement, or should be employed in making, preparing or distributing articles of sale or commerce at home or in any place in the nature of a factory, workshop or mercantile establishment.

V.

We believe that no child between fourteen and sixteen should be permitted to work under the conditions specified unless the child can read fluently and write legibly simple sentences in the English language.

VI.

We believe that no child under sixteen should be employed between the hours of seven p. m. and seven a. m. or longer than eight hours in any twenty-four hours, or longer than forty-eight hours a week.

VII.

We believe that no child under sixteen should be employed in occupations dangerous to life, limb, health or morals.

VIII.

We believe in the establishment of a permanent Children's Bureau to be conducted by the National Government, for the purpose of investigating and reporting upon general conditions directly involving the welfare of children, especially all matters connected with child labor.

IX.

We believe that uniform laws against child labor should be enacted without delay in every state, territory and colonial possession of the United States.

## CHILD LABOR A NATIONAL EVIL.

There are to-day in this country nearly three million children under fifteen years of age unwillingly toiling in mills, factories, mines and sweat shops under conditions that, could you behold them, would shock you beyond expression.

Many of them will die unheard; but if of those who survive many become criminals, who is to blame? Can we ask these victims of law to respect that which has robbed them of their birthright—of their childhood? Who can answer if the child slave, grown into a thief, shall say, "I steal only property; you have stolen my very life!"

It is bitter truth that conditions of child labor in this country are as bad to-day as they were in England when Elizabeth Barrett Browning's immortal poem, "The Cry of the Children," awoke the slumbering conscience of a nation.

Is anything being done about this in America? Yes, much good work: The National Child Labor Committee has enlisted many able workers, and has secured the passage of some excellent laws. But what do laws amount to without public sentiment back of them? You represent public sentiment. You, the readers of the WOMAN'S HOME COMPANION, some three million individuals. Many of you are makers of laws; all of you can help enforce them.

It is not enough to attack the manufacturers; the conditions are more to blame than they, and for the conditions you yourselves are to blame. Only public sentiment can change them.

The Child Slavery problem is **Not Sectional, but National.**

The WOMAN'S HOME COMPANION is devoting its power and influence to checking this evil.

We shall tell the simple truth without fear or prejudice, exaggeration or sensationalism. And when we have told you of child slavery as it exists in the United States to-day, we shall call upon you so to act that it shall exist no more.

We URGE the help of every man and woman, of every periodical, of every influence that can aid the work. We welcome whoever will by voice or pen attack the common foe, or will lend hand or purse.

We ask two things of you. First, sign and send to the Anti-Child Slavery League the coupons on the opposite side of this paper, then pledge yourself to do all in your power to take just one boy or girl out of the workshop and put him or her in school. The law will help you—just how to proceed in such cases we will explain in the WOMAN'S HOME COMPANION from month to month.

There can be no greater sanction for such a crusade than the words of Him who forbade that little children should be kept from Him, and who declared that even the giving of a cup of cold water to one of these little ones was a deed to be blessed.

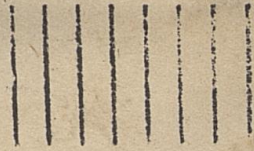
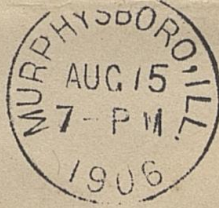
