30. *Haggin Hall*—Newest men's dormitory, houses 575 students.

31. *Health Building (Administration Annex)*—Houses additional administrative offices.

32. *Highway Materials Research Laboratory*—Jointly operated by Department of Civil Engineering and State Department of Highways.

33. *Holmes Hall*—Residence hall for women, houses approximately 300 students and contains formal reception room, recreation room, and sun deck.

34. *Home Economics Building*—Offices, laboratories, and classrooms of School of Home Economics. Rees doll collection on first floor contains more than 400 dolls in period and foreign costumes.

35. *Insectary and Conservatory*—Offices and laboratories used by Department of Entomology of Experiment Station and connects with greenhouses used by this department.

36. *Jewell Hall*—Residence hall for freshman women, houses approximately 110 students.

37. *Journalism Building*—School of Journalism, Kernel Press, The Kentucky Kernel, The Kentuckian, central office of the Kentucky Press Association, University Printing Plant, complete photographic facilities.

38. *Kaule Hall*—Offices, classrooms, and laboratories of Department of Chemistry.

39. *Keeneland Hall*—Residence hall for upperclass women, houses 310 students and contains formal reception room, recreational lounge, snack bar, and sun deck.

40. *Kinkaid Hall*—Residence hall for men, housing approximately 100 students. Being used as women's dormitory 1962-63.

41. *Law Building (Lafferty Hall)*—Offices, classrooms, and library of College of Law and offices of Kentucky Law Journal.

42. *Library (Margaret I. King)*—Central library, contains reading rooms, stacks, and special rooms. Also houses Department of Library Science and University and Educational Archives. The University Libraries, which comprise the central library and all departmental, divisional, and collegiate collections, located in other buildings on the campus, contain 1,000,000 volumes. These libraries receive regularly more than 5,000 titles of periodicals and are a depository for U.S. Government publications.

43. *Marshall Place*—Home of the President of the University. Oldest building on campus (constructed 1871). Famous poem, "In Kentucky," was written here by Judge James H. Mulligan.

44. *McVey Hall*—Offices of Dean of College of Arts and Sciences and offices and classrooms of departments of English, Mathematics and Astronomy, Radio, Television and Films, and Social Work; Campus Bookstore, University Post Office, the offices

of University Press, broadcasting studios of station WBKY, and the Computing Center.

45. *Meats Laboratory*—Modern freezer lockers, facilities for slaughtering and curing meats, and retail sales room.

46. *Medical Center*—Contains instructional, laboratory and administrative areas for Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, and Dentistry, and Medical Library, University Hospital, Outpatient Service, University Health Service, Rehabilitation Service, Department of Psychology offices, and University Personnel Office.

47. *Memorial Center Heating Plant*—This coal-burning plant provides heat for University's Medical Center.

48. *Memorial Coliseum*—Erected by State of Kentucky as memorial to Kentucky men and women who died in World War II. Has facilities for Physical Education, including swimming pool, complete housing for Department of Intercollegiate Athletics, and will seat from 12,000 to 15,000 for basketball games, concerts, and lectures. Contains names of Kentucky World War II dead, by counties, on permanent display.

49. *Memorial Hall*—University Auditorium, seats about 1,100 and is equipped with pipe organ and carillon bells.

50. *Miller Hall*—Offices, classrooms, and laboratories of Departments of Geology and Modern Foreign Languages, Geology Library, and the Stenographic Bureau.

51. *Mineral Industries Building*—Offices of State Department of Mines and Minerals, Kentucky Geological Survey, and State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers.

52. *Mining Laboratory*—Chemical laboratory designed for analytical investigations of coals and ores, and laboratory for chemical engineering and mining engineering.

53. *Museum of Anthropology*—Exhibits and study collections of Museum of Anthropology. Originally the main library, given to the University by Andrew Carnegie. Houses office of President Emeritus and offices of Department of Philosophy.

54. *Observatory*—Maintained by Department of Mathematics and Astronomy. Houses 8-inch telescope and several other astronomical instruments.

55. *Patterson Hall*—Residence hall for women, housing approximately 125 students.

56. *Pence Hall*—Library, offices, classrooms, and laboratories of Department of Physics, office of Dean of Graduate School.

57. *Pharmacy Building*—College of Pharmacy.

58. *Physics-Chemistry Building*—Classrooms, laboratories, research facilities for departments of Physics and Chemistry as of February, 1963.

59. *Psychology Annex*—Used by Psychology Department for offices, classrooms, Speech Center, and Audiology Clinic.

60. *Service Building*—Offices and shops of Division of Maintenance and Operations, Di-

vision of Purchases, central store room of the University, and shipping and receiving facilities. Third floor is used as Library Annex and temporary museum.

61. *Social Sciences Building*—Classrooms and offices for Departments of Sociology, Political Science, Geography, and Anthropology, and School of Diplomacy and International Commerce.

62. *Small Animal Laboratory*—Used as experimental laboratory in agriculture.

63. *Sorority Row*—Includes Delta Zeta, Alpha Xi Delta, Kappa Delta, Alpha Gamma Delta, Zeta Tau Alpha, and Kappa Alpha Theta sorority houses. Adjacent to these houses, on Rose Street, are the Chi Omega, Delta Delta Delta, and Alpha Delta Pi sorority houses. Kappa Kappa Gamma has its house on Maxwell, Delta Gamma on Harrison, and Pi Beta Phi on Maxwell Street.

64. *Stock Judging Pavilion*—Classroom space for work in animal science, poultry science, and entomology.

65. *Stall Field*—Football field and McLean Stadium, seating 37,500 persons.

66. *Student Union Building*—As well as its nominal use contains center for student activities, lounges, ballroom, cafeteria, grill, recreation rooms, assembly rooms, offices for the Director, Program Director, Alumni Association, Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A.

67. *Tobacco Research Laboratory*—Laboratories and greenhouses used by College of Agriculture and Home Economics for research in culture, curing, and diseases of tobacco.

68. *White Hall*—Office, classroom, and laboratory space for College of Commerce.

69. *Wildcat*—Houses campus grill and bowling lanes.

Other major buildings include:

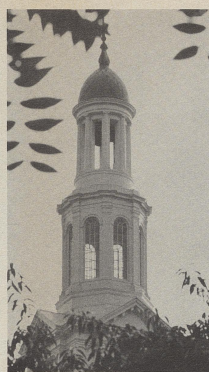
Athletics Building (shown on top right side of map)—Near Coopertown area. The building contains shower, equipment, and trainers rooms, laundry, locker rooms, handball courts, and a lecture room.

Kentucky Life Museum—Housed in historic mansion at Waveland, south farm of Experiment Station, museum contains items of early Kentucky life and large number of Civil War relics. The museum is located on Higbee Mill Road, just off Nicholasville Road, about three miles south of Lexington.

Reynolds Building—Houses Department of Architecture, Film Library, and Kentucky Municipal League. Located at 672 South Broadway, near Scott Street.

Shawneetown—University housing project near south end of old Experiment Station farm, consists of 186 apartments in six buildings, for faculty and married students.

A number of other permanent buildings not shown on the map include three cooperative houses for women students, dairy center, farm service building, greenhouses, barns, storage buildings, and Rural Sociology, Home Economics Extension buildings, and Foreign Student Center.



THE CAMPUS OF THE UNIVERSITY

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY is a small city in itself. It has its own post office, bookstore, radio station, newspaper, printing plant, theater, police force, cafeterias, grill, and hospital. The University community, including students, faculty and staff members, and their families, has a population of about 15,000.

There are 76 major buildings on the 706-acre main campus at Lexington. The University also owns and operates over 7,500 acres of farm land in several sections of the state and owns a 14,800-acre forest reserve in Eastern Kentucky.

Five centers, each offering two years of college work, are operated by the University. These are the Northern Center at Covington, the Ashland Center, the Northwest Center at Henderson, the Southeast Center at Cumberland, and the Fort Knox Center. New centers are planned at Elizabethtown, Prestonsburg, Hazard-Blackey, Somerset and Hopkinsville.

Locations of campus buildings are shown on the accompanying map. Following is a list of the major buildings, with brief enumerations of the departments and divisions they house. Numbers below correspond to numbers of buildings on the map.

1. *Administration Building*—President, Executive Vice President, Vice President (Business Administration), Dean of Men, Dean

of Women, Dean of Admissions and Registrar, Department of Public Relations, Director of Counseling (including veterans' affairs), Director of Testing, Kentucky Research Foundation, Placement Service, Office of Machine Statistics and Office of Institutional Studies.

2. *Aeronautical Research Laboratory*—Laboratory of Engineering Experiment Station, used for research in aero-space technology.

3. *Agricultural Engineering Building*—Houses classrooms, offices, and laboratories of Agricultural Engineering, and modern farm machinery.

4. *Agriculture Building*—Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and classroom and laboratory space for departments of Agricultural Entomology, Agronomy, Agricultural Economics, and Horticulture.

5. *Alumni Gymnasium*—Men's Section of Physical Education, a playing floor, a corrective gymnasium, classrooms, and lockers and showers. Houses majority of physical education activities and intramurals for men.

6. *Animal Pathology Building*—Department of Animal Pathology.

7. *Animal Pathology Hospital*—Animal hospital of Department of Animal Pathology.

8. *Barker Hall*—Offices, classrooms, and storerooms of Military and Aerospace Sci-

ence Departments, rifle range, women's gymnasium, and Section of Physical Education for Women.

9. *Biological Sciences Building*—Ancient Languages and Literatures, Botany, Microbiology, Zoology, Biological Sciences Library, and Zoology Museum.

10. *Bowman Hall*—Residence hall for men, providing recreational space and lobby for men's residence hall group. Houses 139 students. Being used as women's dormitory 1962-63.

11. *Boyd Hall*—Residence hall for women, houses 132 students.

12. *Bradley Hall*—Residence hall for men, housing 156 students. Being used as women's dormitory 1962-63.

13. *Breckinridge Hall*—Residence hall for men, housing 169 students. Being used as women's dormitory 1962-63.

14. *Central Heating Plant*—Steam boilers which supply heat to all buildings on main campus and number of other University buildings.

15. *Coal Research Laboratory*—Pilot plant for low temperature production from coal of motor fuels, lubricants, and high grade, smokeless, solid fuels; base materials from which explosives, plastics, and synthetic rubber may be manufactured. Oil shales and other carbonaceous materials may also be processed in this plant. Operated by De-

16. Cooperstown—330 University apartments for married students and their families. Buildings are named for Kentucky authors.

17. Dairy Products Building—Animal Science, Creamery License, Dairy Science, and Poultry Science, herd book room, incubation laboratory, and laboratories for dairy manufacturing.

18. Donovan Hall—Residence hall for men. Houses 355 students, cafeteria seating 400, and several private dining rooms.

19. Dormitory-Dining Unit for Women—Blazer Hall—Houses approximately 185 women, provides dining facilities for women's residence halls.

20. Education Building—University School, office of Dean of College of Education, Bureau of School Service, and classrooms for college courses in education.

21. Engineering Annex—Additional drafting rooms and laboratories for College of Engineering. Located on Scott Street.

22. Engineering Quadrangle—Houses Dean of the College of Engineering, Engineering Library, and Departments of Mechanical, Electrical, Civil, Chemical, Engineering Mechanics, and Mining and Metallurgical Engineering.

23. Euclid Avenue Classroom Building—Some of Aerospace facilities and classrooms for Department of Physical Education and College of Commerce.

24. Experiment Station, Agricultural (Scott Hall)—Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, Director of Experiment Station, and Director of Agricultural Extension; associate directors; Department of Public Information (Agricultural) and Educational Aids; offices, laboratories, and research facilities for Agronomy, Chemistry, Entomology and Botany, Agricultural Economics, Feed and Fertilizer, and Seed Control, and Agricultural Extension. Rural Sociology is in the Experiment Station Annex.

25. Faculty Club—Formerly Patterson Home, now occupied by University Faculty Club.

26. Fine Arts Building—Art, Music, Dramatics, and Speech, air-conditioned Guignol Theatre seating approximately 425 persons, and University Art Gallery.

27. Food Storage Building—Warehouse space for University food service units, facilities for processing meats and fresh vegetables—storage of frozen foods, and K-Lair, dormitory grill.

28. Fraternity Row—Includes Lambda Chi Alpha, Phi Sigma Kappa, Pi Kappa Alpha, Kappa Sigma, Sigma Chi and Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity houses, Kitten Lodge (freshman football players), and Wildcat Manor (varsity football players). Other fraternities have houses in or near campus area.

29. Frazee Hall—Extended Programs, De-

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
