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Stephenson Commended

Veterans' News Coverage

Commenting on the current SGA-Kernel controversy, the POSTwarrior, a house organ published weekly by the Veterans club, says that the inadequacy of The Kernel's coverage of veterans affairs was one of the first and principal reasons that the POSTwarrior was established.

The Kernel admits that there was a need

for a special publication devoted to veterans interests. Perhaps The Kernel coverage was inadequate, according to Veterans club standards.

The POSTwarrior, which is doing an excellent job, contains a minimum of four pages per issue. For The Kernel to give the same coverage to Club activities, it would have to run a minimum of two pages per issue of nothing but veterans' information. Veteran news would then take up from one fourth to one half of The Kernel. That would leave two to six pages for Kernel coverage of faculty news, convocations, sports, and the activities of almost one hundred other student organizations, besides Gaiagnol and various musical programs on the campus.

Yet, apparently, the Veterans club believes that is what The Kernel should have done.

The Kernel does not agree. It believes that the majority of student veterans on campus want to be students first, veterans second. So that is The Kernel policy respecting the Veterans club. When the Club does something newsworthy, it is printed. But every activity of the Veterans club is not news, and is not of interest to the whole student body.

A weekly newspaper on a campus of some 6,000 students could not possibly cover every event of every organization. It must select those events which it believes the student body, as students, is most interested in, and ignore those things which it has no room to print. In this selectivity, The Kernel editors are certainly not infallible. After all, they are only human, (notwithstanding some statements to the contrary heard recently) and weigh and judge events according to their own "news sense."
