MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE DECEMBER 9, 1929

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, December 9, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of November 18 were read and approved.

The following recommendations of the Committee on Duplication of Courses were approved:

- ✓ Journalism 9. Newspaper Administration Three hours a week, 3 credits. Prerequisites: Journ. 1a, b; 2a or 2b and 7.
- ✓ Journalism 108. History of Journalism. Open to seniors only. 3 hours a week. Three credits. Prerequisites 1a, 1b, 2a or 2b.
- ✓ Journalism 101. Supervision of High School Publications. Given in summer session only. Two credits. No Journalism prerequisite required.
- ✓ Political Science 163a, b. Political Geography. Not open to freshmen. Two hours of recitation and two hours of Laboratory. Three credits per semester. No prerequisites.
- ✓ Political Science 159a. The Development and Expansion of the American Constitution. Three hours a week; three credits.
- ✓ Political Science 159b. A continuation of 159a. Three hours a week; three credits. Prerequisites P. S. 159a.
- ✓ Sociology 115. Social Control. Three hours a week. Three credits. Prerequisites Sociology 1a, b.

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↓ Physical Education 27. The School Program of Physical Education and Athletics. Three hours a week. - Three credits.

↓ Anatomy and Physiology 116a and 116b. Seminar in Anatomy and Physiology. Two hours a week. One credit each semester. Prerequisite; General Physiology (A & P 1a, 1b or the equivalent)

↓ Geology 10a and 10b. Geology of Kentucky. Three credits per semester. Expansion of Geology 10, for use at present in extension work.

↓ Geology 118a. Field Work in Regional Geology. Two weeks in the field. Two credits. Prerequisite Geology, 15a, b; 16a, b.

↓ Geology 118b. Same as above but covering a different part of the same general area, to be given in alternate years with 118a. (Geol. 118a, b. are to be given in the two weeks prior to the opening of the summer session).

The following courses in the English Department were changed from two to three credits; three hours a week (New numbers to be given) Prerequisites English 1a, 1b, 3a, 3b.)

↓ English 123a, b. American Literature. Three hours a week. Three credits per semester. (To replace English 114a, b, American Literature. Two hours a week, two credits per semester.)

↓ English 124. The Renaissance. Three hours a week. Three credits. (To replace English 142, The Renaissance. Two hours per week. Two credits.)

↓ English 125. Pronunciation of Modern English. Three hours a week. Three credits. (To replace English 120, Pronunciation of Modern English. Two hours per week; two credits).

↓ English 128. Browning. Three hours a week. Three credits. (To replace English 105, Browning. Two hours per week; two credits).

↓ Drop: Education 39, Teaching of Arithmetic, History and Geography in the Primary Grades, and to offer in its stead Elementary Education 44, Teaching of the Social Sciences in the Primary Grades. The reasons for this change are:
(1) primary arithmetic is now in another course, Education 42, and
(2) there is material enough in the social sciences for a separate course in this subject.

↓ Raise: Education 36, The Teaching of Reading in the Elementary School, to Education 43 and offer three credits instead of two Prerequisite, Education 1 or its equivalent.

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- ↓ Education 43, The Teaching of Literature to Children, to Education 145, and offer three credits instead of two. Prerequisite Education 1 or its equivalent.
- ↓ Education 126, The Junior High School to Education 226. Prerequisite, college degree and twelve semester hours in education.
- ↓ Education 150 The Senior High School, to Education 250. Prerequisite, college degree and 12 semester hours in education.
- ↓ Education 120, Great Educators and Their Work to Education 219. Prerequisite, college degree and 12 hours in education.

Add the following new courses:

- ↓ Education 133, Directed Teaching in the Elementary Grades. 5 credits. Prerequisite, 15 semester hours in education, including Education 136.
- ↓ Commercial Education 158. Methods of Teaching Commercial Subjects in the Secondary School. 3 credits. Prerequisite, 6 hours of education and training in bookkeeping, shorthand and typewriting.
- ↓ Commercial Education 159. The Commercial Curriculum in the Secondary School. 3 credits. Prerequisite, experience in teaching commercial subjects or senior standing.
- ↓ Educational Administration 103. The Elementary School. Three credits. Prerequisite: 9 semester hours in Education or two years as elementary principal.
- ↓ Educational Administration 210. Special Problems in School Administration. 3 credits. Prerequisite: 9 semester hours in Education.
- ↓ Home Economics Education 261. Home Economics Supervision. Three credits. Prerequisite, 12 semester hours of education, including Education 160 and 162 or equivalent training, and permission of the head of the department.
- Home Economics 164, Methods of Teaching Child Care. 3 credits, was referred to the Committee for a conference with the heads of Home Economics and Home Economics Education. *J*

The Committee on Duplication of Courses was requested to define what is meant by prerequisites, as stated in the resolution of October 14, 1929: "A motion was carried that requests for new advanced courses should include a statement of the prerequisites."

The question was raised by President McVey as to whether other dates than December and June should be fixed for the granting of

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degrees. After some discussion the question was referred to the Council, with a request that they make a recommendation to the University Senate regarding the dates on which degrees should be conferred.

President McVey was requested to appoint a committee to study the question of final examinations and bring a report of their findings to the University Senate.
