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Attorneys to study other bans

Circuit Judge VanMeter postpones smoking ban decision, tells lawyers for both sides to research precedents

Enforcement of a city-wide smoking ban will continue to be postponed. Lawyers for the city and the Lexington-Fayette County Food and Beverage Association expected a ruling on a challenge against the ban when they met at the Circuit Courthouse Friday.

Instead, Fayette Circuit Court Judge Larry VanMeter asked attorneys for both sides to read up on several precedent-setting court cases. The lawyers must write briefs and respond to the opposing sides' briefs within 15 days, VanMeter said Friday. The court opines the attorneys will examine involve private rights

against private health.

Attorneys were also told to look at precedents covering laws such as the fluoridation of drinking water and sewer hook-ups.

"Those cases have never been addressed, and I think they should be," VanMeter said.

Last month, VanMeter denied a motion to temporarily halt the ban because he said he did not agree with the Association that the law was written too vaguely or pre-empted by state law.

The Court of Appeals overturned his decision on Oct. 6 and issued a halt of the ban until VanMeter could rule on the merits of the case.

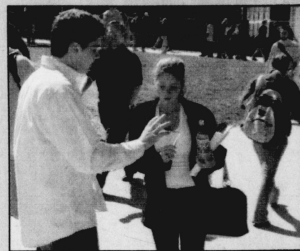
The ban, which was scheduled to begin Sept. 29, would prohibit smoking in nearly all public buildings in Lexington.

VanMeter said he may not call for any more verbal arguments.

"Do we really need to have another hearing?" he asked.

Freshman Senate claim dismissed

1,705 freshmen voted in the election a week ago; the four winners will represent freshmen in SG

After more than a week of waiting, winners of the Student Government Freshman Senate race held Oct. 2 and 3 can celebrate.

The results, postponed by an election violation claim thrown out Tuesday, are now official.

With 1,705 freshmen hitting the polls, four of the 11 candidates emerged as winners.

Andrea Hennig won with 246 votes, Katie Houghtlin with 242, Jay Hardin with 240 and Kyle Burns with 204. Freshman Senate members serve as voting members of the SG Senate.

The dismissed claim accused six candidates, including the four winners, of hanging their signs on prohibited surfaces.

Candidate Kate Obenour, who filed the claim, said the other candidates did not limit their campaigns to what she considered "campaign-friendly surfaces." This violation, she said, included hanging posters on the construction fence and wooden ramp around the Administration building.

Ben Hayden, the elections board investigator, ruled that no violation had been committed.

"Posting campaign signs is perfectly legit on campus property except specified areas that are defined in the constitution," he wrote in his decision.

The constitution, which gives specific guidelines for campaigning, does not prohibit signs placed on construction fences or ramps.

Obenour, who received 85 votes, said she is satisfied with the ruling and will not appeal the decision.

"I did not file the claim to bump people," she said. "I was not being spiteful. I just thought that if something illegal had been done, it should be reported."

She said she was unaware of the election results at the time she filed the claim.

Houghtlin said that while she's a little disappointed her appointment was postponed, she understands that claims are a part of the Senate race.

"I just wish that the person who made the claim had read the rules in the constitution," she said. "Then we would not have had to deal with this."

Hennig said she never doubted that the elections board would rule in her favor.

"I did everything by the rules and so did my running mates, and everyone running for that matter," she said.

The claim ignored the work students had put into the election, Hennig said.

"We all worked together and had no intention of doing anything wrong," Hennig said. "It was a fair game."

The four winning candidates will be sworn in at the Oct. 22 full Senate meeting.

The winners said they were glad to be moving on.

"I'm thrilled that the ruling was in our favor," Houghtlin said. "Now we can start getting things done."

BOYD BACKS UP J-LO

Regardless of whether there is a quarterback controversy brewing, Shane Boyd and Jared Lorenzen still have each other's backs.

After Lorenzen fumbled twice in the first quarter of Saturday's game, Boyd came in and sparked what had been a stagnant offense. Boyd rushed for two touchdowns, threw for another and caught a Lorenzen touchdown pass in UK's 35-14 win over the Ohio Bobcats in front of 61,107 fans at Commonwealth Stadium.

While the Boyd show was on the sidelines with UK's defense dominating Ohio's wishbone offense, Boyd and Lorenzen played catch. When Boyd came off the field, Lorenzen was the first to greet him.

And when Lorenzen returned to the game, Boyd returned the favor.

"We've got each other's backs," Boyd said. "We swapped out a little bit. He hit a wall and I came in and

backed him and he came back in and did a good job."

Under pressure from Ohio linebacker Pete Brately, Lorenzen fumbled the ball on UK's second possession and linebacker Tyler Russ recovered at the UK 7-yard line. Fullback Brad Young plowed for a 7-yard touchdown on the next play to give Ohio a 7-0 lead.

On UK's next drive, Lorenzen fumbled an underhand pitch on Ohio's 26-yard line.

"I made up my mind to substitute Shane at some point at the end of the first quarter and give him a series or two anyway," said UK head coach Rich Brooks. "But after the second fumble, I talked to Jared and told him I wanted him to come over to the sideline and settle down."

While Lorenzen settled down on the sideline, UK's offense settled under Boyd.

After Andrew Hopewell partially blocked an Ohio (2-5, 1-2 Mid-American Conference) punt, Boyd eluded Bobcat defenders on a 27-yard drive.

On third-and-five from the Ohio 8-yard line, Boyd dashed right and faked Bobcat safety Rob Stover as he ran in for the game-tying score.

UK's defense shut down the Bobcats for the rest of the half. UK allowed 66 yards on 26 plays to the rush-happy Bobcats.

Facing an unusual offense, UK defensive coordinator Mike Archer was pleasantly surprised with how his defense responded.

"I didn't get much sleep this week worrying about the option," Archer said. "This game really scared me. I hadn't coached against a wishbone team in 10 years."

But UK's defense gave Ohio a scare in the second half.

UK defensive end Trey Mielsch's blind-side sack of Ohio quarterback Austen Everson resulted in a fumble recovered by defensive end Jeremy Caudill. And on UK's next play, Boyd ran untouched 13 yards to the end zone behind massive blocks by left guard Jason Rollins.

"The sack and the fumble at the beginning of the second half were very important," Archer said. "I thought it set the tempo."

The Cats (3-4, 0-3 Southeastern Conference) had fun after that.

With 9:55 left in the third quarter, Boyd connected with wide receiver Tommy Cook on a flea-flicker. Boyd handed the ball to running back Arliss Beach, who then pitched back to Boyd, who lobbed a 42-yard touchdown pass to Cook.

The play was actually designed for wide receiver Derek Abney, but Abney twisted his back on a 23-yard punt return. Cook told Abney: "Thanks for giving it to me."

Then, in the fourth quarter, Lorenzen returned to the fun.

Lorenzen added two touchdowns passes in the quarter. With 10:07 left, he hit a striking Boyd down the middle of the field for a 31-yard score. Leading 28-14, Lorenzen nailed Abney for a

Lawyer John Walters with the Lexington-Fayette Food and Beverage Association said in an amended complaint that the law has significant implications that people may not understand.

He said the ordinance requires establishments to

purpose, he said. It is not a ploy, it's valid," Walters said.

Still, Walters said he feels VanMeter's views on the arguments are already known and that the group will appeal any ruling not in its favor.

Lawyer Phil Scott, arguing on behalf of the city, said there was no basis for the complaint and that he anticipates a ruling in the city's favor.

"Public health is an issue that trumps private rights," he said.

Scott said the lengthy court process won't stop the ban from passing.

"Judge VanMeter has clearly not changed his opinion on the underlying issues here," Scott said. "By the end of the year, hopefully we will have the smoking ban in effect forever."

Cool Cats end winless streak against MTSU

A late two-goal lead wasn't enough for the Cool Cats Friday as they allowed Middle Tennessee State to squirm back into the game and salvage a 5-5 tie.

Ahead 5-3 late in the contest, UK (5-4) after a win over MTSU Saturday in Murfreesboro, Tenn.) surrendered two goals to Blue Raiders forward Jonathan Dig in the final 8:18, robbing themselves of their first win in five games.

In a season full of disappointing outcomes, Friday's game proved to be the most heart-breaking.

"We definitely needed to win this game," forward Joe Obermeier said. "It seems like every game this year we've come close and haven't

gotten the breaks. We had to take advantage this time and just didn't get it done."

Halfway through the game, the Cool Cats didn't look like they would ever have a late lead to squander.

Although UK kept the puck in the offensive zone for much of the game, the Blue Raiders (3-3-1) jumped out to a 3-1 advantage early by utilizing the middle of the ice and harassing Cool Cats goalie Justin Clark with countless odd man rushes. MTSU scored four of its five goals off breakaway opportunities.

UK forwards Lee Napier and Mark Marfise would eventually pull the Cool Cats even with two late second period tallies that came 11 seconds apart. The goals tied the score at three and left the Lexington Ice Center crowd un-

characteristically subdued for the rest of the night.

UK seemed to have the game in hand when Obermeier scored two goals early in the third period to give the Cool Cats a 5-3 lead. But UK penalties led to easy opportunities that allowed MTSU a second chance.

After playing shorthanded for 38 seconds through the first two periods, the Cool Cats committed four minor penalties in the final period. One of those infractions led to the Blue Raiders' game-tying goal.

Forward Alex Poulos said carelessness penalties were to blame for the third period breakdown, a common theme for the Cool Cats this season.

"Basically what it comes down to is penalties again," Poulos said. "There is no excuse for penalties in the

third period, especially with a 5-3 lead. I had a selfish one myself."

Despite the early easy chances for the Blue Raiders, UK head coach Mike Sosnowski said his squad wasn't focused too much on the offensive end of the ice.

"I don't think it was that we were concentrating with offense too much as it was that we didn't concentrate on defense enough," he said.

Even though he saw the game's outcome as a letdown, Sosnowski said his team's play was a positive they could carry into the future.

"We outskated them, we outshot them and we outplayed them," he said. "We just gave away four breakaway goals. That's what it came down to."

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Cats lose to Arkansas in four-game match

Volleyball team loses early game momentum, allow Razorbacks to continue perfect SEC season

The UK volleyball team lost a tough match to the Arkansas Razorbacks on Sunday afternoon at Memorial Coliseum 3-1. The loss dropped the Cats to 11-9 overall and 3-5 in the Southeastern Conference. Arkansas improved to 9-0 in the SEC and 16-4 overall.

Both teams came out strong in game one and exchanged points. Neither team could get a lead of more than two points in the early part of the game. Arkansas ended up winning the game 30-27.

Game two started much the same as game one, with both teams exchanging points in the early stages. The Cats were able to take a 17-14 lead in the middle of the match thanks to a kill from sophomore Danielle Wallace. The Cats kept that lead and won game two 30-23 to even the match at one game apiece.

The Cats entered the locker room with much confidence after their game-two win, said junior outside hitter Sarah Spinner.

"When we went back into the locker room, we were really pumped," said Spinner, who led UK with 19 kills. "We wanted to carry the momentum into the third and fourth game, but it didn't happen."

Kentucky hung tough with the Razorbacks in the early stages of game three, tying the game at eight. Arkansas began to pull away however, and won the game 30-16. Head coach Jona Braden said the Cats didn't respond properly during the game.

"Arkansas ran a quicker offense in the third game and we didn't make many adjustments," she said.

The Cats struggled at the start of game four, falling behind by seven points early. Kentucky's deficit was still seven when they began to make a comeback. After trailing 19-12, the Cats scored three consecutive points to cut the Arkansas lead to 19-15.

Arkansas would extend the lead to six at 22-16 before the Cats made another comeback, tying the game at 23 after a kill by freshman Melissa Popp. The game would be tied at 24, 25 and 26 before the Hogs would pull away to win game four 30-27 and win the match three games to one.

Braden said her team has the talent to compete with anyone in the league but needs to learn to value every point.

"We have the personnel to get it done," Braden said. "Right now, we need to understand that every point is a critical point."

The Cats will continue SEC play next weekend as they take on the Florida Gators on Friday in Gainesville, Fla., and the Georgia Bulldogs on Sunday in Athens, Ga.

Men's soccer beats MAC foe 1-0

The UK men's soccer team defeated defending Mid-American Conference tournament champion and pre-season favorite Akron 1-0 Sunday at the UK Soccer Complex.

After beating Western Michigan on Friday, the Cats got their second win in a three-game conference home stand.

Freshman forward Riley O'Neill scored his fifth goal of the season and what proved to be the game-winner in the 11th minute on a header from five yards out that rolled just across the goal line before two Akron defenders could clear the ball.

The Cats outshot the Akron Zips 6-1 in the first half and 11-4 for the game. The UK defense held the Zips to only

one shot for the first 80 minutes of play before surrendering three more in the final 10 minutes. Sophomore goalkeeper Andy Gruenebaum notched his second consecutive shutout and his fifth of the season.

"Once we got our goal in the second half we just sat back a little deeper," said UK head coach Ian Collins. "(Thomas) Senecal, (Chris) Austin and (Brandon) Stewart were exceptional. Our goalkeeper didn't have too much work to do today. Akron is a very dangerous team and our defense held."

UK remains undefeated in the conference at 3-0 after handing Akron its first conference loss in six tries. The Cats now find themselves in the lead for the race for the MAC regular season crown with only three conference games remaining.

Collins stressed the importance of the win and of keeping the team humble.

"This game has decided the regular season championship the last five or six years," Collins said. "But my job will be to bring us crashing back down to earth, especially with three conference games left."

The Cats will finish out their MAC home stand Friday night at 7:30 as they battle the Buffalo Bulls on Senior Night at the UK Soccer Complex.

"It's going to be sad to see this group of guys go," said Collins. "I hope we can send them out the right way. Being a part of three championships in their careers here, they are part of the life and soul of this program."

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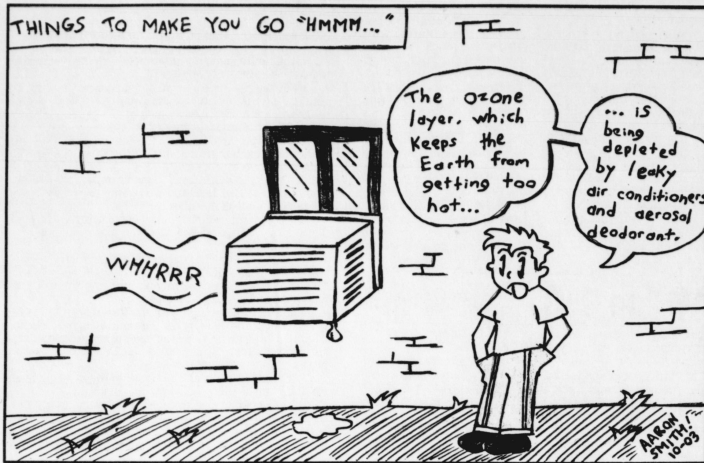

Classroom improvements should include accessibility

For many students in UK classes, few interruptions are unwelcome, even in classes that are enjoyable and stimulating. Students are generally grateful for an occasional reprieve from the intellectual routine.

Unless it comes in the form of the drilling, pounding and creepy scraping noises from a room 10 feet away that are characteristic of classroom renovations.

But while retooling classrooms may have this unpleasant side effect, these projects should improve the quality of students' learning experiences at UK.

UK completed 16 renovation projects last year, including multiple-classroom efforts and a recent makeover of a room in the College of Law's U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell Center for Distance Learning. UK budgeted \$1 million for more improvements this year, the Kernel reported on Oct. 14.

Few campus construction projects underway right now have the potential for more impact on a greater number of students and their education on this campus.

In these renovations, attention should be fo-

cused on classroom necessities over the more superfluous changes. This means optimizing accessibility for disabled persons to buildings and rooms — before putting fancy audio-visual equipment in every room.

Many campus situations are still not up to par in the area of accessibility, said Melody Carswell, a UK psychology professor who is blind and often helps disabled students.

"The older buildings have more problems, especially related to access to the classrooms rather than access within," she said.

She said that at least one building on campus has only one wheelchair-accessible entrance, and it's often blocked by delivery vehicles.

Problems exist inside classrooms as well, she said. Fixed seating layouts can make it difficult for students to move closer to an instructor, for example.

Making "smart" classrooms by adding fancy equipment could still greatly enhance the experience for every student when the equipment is used wisely. But basic classroom accessibility should be UK's first priority as the renovations get underway.

MONDAY

In one of two recent cases of local police officers being charged with sexual abuse, a Fayette District Court grand jury will hear the case against Lexington Police Officer Kevin Johnson Cannon.

Lexington Police arrested Cannon Sept. 10 and charged him with one count of first-degree sexual abuse. He is accused of sexually abusing a 29-year-old female UK athlete on July 3, according to a police report. The incident reportedly occurred the same night that Cannon, 33, arrested the woman on an alcohol intoxication charge.

Hugh Donovan Turner, a UK Police officer, has been charged with three counts of first-degree sexual abuse. A Fayette District Court grand jury will hear his case as well.

TUESDAY

More than 800 people have signed up for a chance at a day's seat in the capital murder trial of one of the Washington, D.C.-area snipers, the Associated Press reported.

John Allen Muhammad's trial began Tuesday in Virginia Beach, Va. Unlike the infamous California murder trial of O.J. Simpson, Muhammad's trial is not being broadcast, per the judge's orders. The only way to observe the proceedings is to be in court.

Most of the nearly 50 seats in the courtroom are reserved for reporters, security attorneys and relatives of alleged sniper victims. But five seats for the public remain to be assigned in weekly random drawings, with each winner being allowed in the courtroom for one day. With testimony expected to take four to five weeks, that means about 125 people will get seats.

People may continue to enter the lottery throughout the trial by filling out a form on the city's Web site or by calling the city.

WEDNESDAY

A proposed beer keg registration policy on Monday cleared its first hurdle toward becoming a city ordinance.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council's Services Committee voted 6-1 in favor of moving the ordinance to this Tuesday's full council meeting for a presentation. Proponents of the issue will ask council members to vote to put it on their docket.

The proposed keg policy requires that beer kegs be labeled with a numerical identification code, which would be traceable to the purchaser of the keg. Purchasers would fill out registration forms, and vendors would have to turn those over to the county within 30 days of the sale.

THURSDAY

Former Gov. Edward Thompson "Ned" Breathitt died late Tuesday evening after a lifetime of academic, civic and political achievements, the Kernel reported on Thursday.

Breathitt, 78, was taken to UK Hospital Oct. 10 after collapsing while making a speech at Lexington Community College's Volunteer Appreciation Dinner, held at E.S. Good Barn. He slipped into a coma after suffering a ventricular fibrillation, which is an abnormal heart rhythm, said his cardiologist, Dr. John Gurley.

Also an alumnus of UK, Breathitt served as governor from 1963 to 1967. As governor, he was known for fighting on various fronts, including conservation, strip-mining regulations and equal rights. He was also a member of the UK Board of Trustees several times, most recently from 1992 to 1999.

FRIDAY

Vandals defaced three homecoming-related window paintings at area businesses and damaged one parade float during last week's homecoming festivities.

The most significant damage occurred at the Fish Tank Bar & Grill, at Woodland and Euclid avenues. A painting there by the Delta Delta Delta sorority had been nearly scraped off with an ice scraper, said Lindsay Creilly, homecoming director.

A nearby resident captured the incident on camera around 3 a.m., said Angel Lee, president of Student Activities Board, which oversees homecoming events.
