## UK Senate to debate governor's appointment

The University Senate will vote today on a resolution calling for Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's resignation from the UK Board of Trustees.

Members of the Senate Council drafted the resolution Friday, said Senate Chairman Marcus McEllistrem.

"That resolution or a modified form of it is likely to pass almost unanimously," McEllistrem said. However, he said there are two sides regarding whether Wilkinson should be asked to step down, and McEllistrem could not guarantee if that would be included in the finalized resolution.

The senate meets today at 3 p.m. in the nursing building auditorium. UK President Charles Wehington also is scheduled to address the senate.

Wilkinson, whose term as governor ends at midnight, appointed himself last week to a six-year term on the UK board, replacing former Gov. A.B. "Happy" Chandler, who died in June.

The trustees meet tomorrow at 9 a.m. on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

McEllistrem said the controversy resulting from the appointment "does neither Gov. Wilkinson or the University any good." The self-appointment was an abuse of public policy, he added.

"The principle reason from my point of view is that it has the flavor of an abuse of the policy established by Gov. (Wendell) Ford in 1972."

In 1972, Ford and the legislature passed a law removing the sitting governor as chairman of the UK board. The intent of the move was to de-politicize the University.

"We think that it is important for higher education to stay out of politics and, conversely, that politics stay out of higher education," McEllistrem said.

McEllistrem said he fears Wilkinson will use the seat as a "bully pulpit" to run for governor in 1995. "We don't think the University

## Judge hears legal arguments on case

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Franklin Circuit Court Special Judge Reed Rhorer is expected to announce today whether he will grant a temporary injunction preventing Gov. Wallace Wilkinson from serving on UK's Board of Trustees.

Rhorer's decision could spark a daylong legal battle ending at the state Supreme Court.

Kentucky Attorney General Fred Cowan filed a suit Thursday challenging Wilkinson's self-appointment to the board, which meets tomorrow. Cowan asked for a non-appealable restraining order, but on Friday decided instead to ask for an appealable temporary injunction.

On Friday the two sides presented their cases — occasionally producing barbs between Cowan and Louisville attorney Charles Cassis, Wilkinson's attorney.

Cowan argued that Wilkinson's appointment violated public policy. But Cassis said the court's should not make public policy. "Public policy is a legislative power," he said.

Cowan argued for the injunction on the grounds that the trustees will consider budget cut tomorrow. He said Wilkinson could inflict irreparable harm given that the budget "is in essence the

## UK hosts conference on lithic technology

When 13 flint knappers and 510 pounds of obsidian stone met at UK last week, the result was both educational and bloody.

The flint knappers — people who bash rocks together to create stone tools — came to UK from all over the country to participate in a workshop and conference on lithic, or stone, technology.

They spent part of last week using rocks and deer and moose antlers to fashion stone tools. The process can be hazardous.

"Cutting yourself is just one of the hazards of the trade," said Terry Ozburn, a flint knapper from Washington who was wearing four bandages on his hands.

"The cutting tools that we produce are extremely sharp. They were used to slice through hide and to cut up animal carcasses," he said.

Despite the bloodshed, conference participants said the workshop was worth the cost.

Susan Duncan, 24, a UK anthropology graduate student and one of the participants in the flint knapping, said the workshop will

help her understand more about artifacts and stone tools she finds during field work.

"I want to get this hands-on experience and learn how projectile points and other stone tools were made so when I go to a site where there is evidence of manufacture I'll have some idea of what I'm looking at," said Duncan, who also sported four bandages.

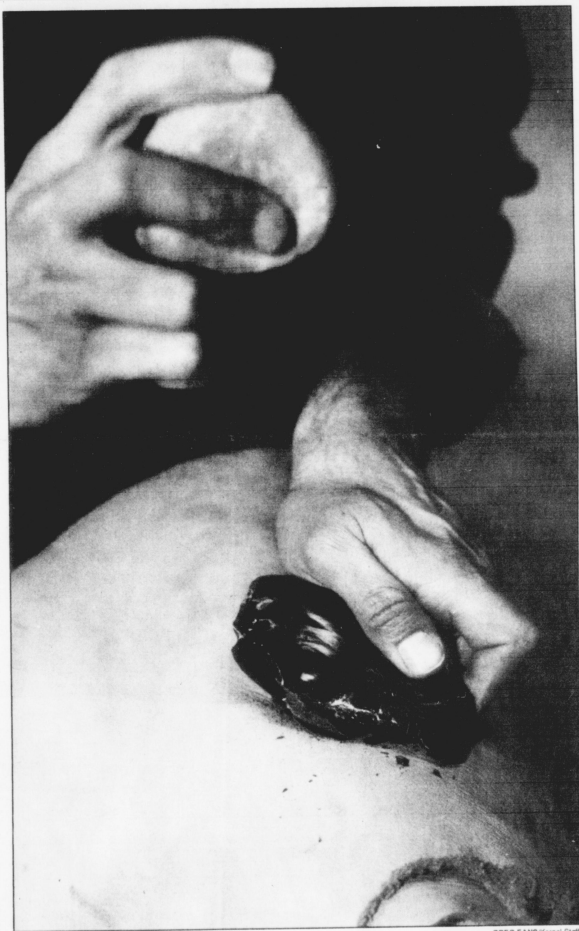
The "evidence" Duncan refers to is called debitage or debris and the analysis of it was the focal point of the workshop and conference. The flakes and chips found at prehistoric sites can be analyzed by archaeologists to tell what kind of tools were made.

Tom Dillehay, a UK archaeologist who spoke at the conference, said the study of stone tool technology reveals aspects of human behavior.

"It reflects on economics and resources and how people used them. It lets us look at how humans occupied a site," he said.

Teresa Tune, an archaeologist from the state Office of Mining and one of about 50 people who attended the conference, praised

## Students fed up with false alarms at Kirwan

Jason Miller was busy writing an essay for his English class on the 23rd floor of Kirwan Tower when he heard a familiar sound Monday night.

For the second time in two days, and the 23rd since the semester began, Miller and other Kirwan Tower residents had to evacuate the building because of a false fire alarm.

"I'm getting really sick of them," said Miller, a business freshman. "It gets old real fast."

Last week in the Kirwan Tower lobby, resident adviser Garret Wallace conducted a meeting to explain the unusual amount of fire alarms.

Out of the now 23 alarms, only two have been planned, Wallace said at the Tuesday night meeting. The majority of the rest have been false alarms, he added.

Apparently, people have been pulling the fire alarm switches but Wallace said he does not know why.

"I can't answer (as to) why anyone would want to pull a fire alarm," he said.

Despite the large number of false alarms, Wallace warned against treating the alarm lightly.

"You have to treat every fire drill like it's a real fire," he told students. "If you hide in your rooms, the only way you'll go home is in a bag."

To highlight the seriousness of the drills, the meeting started with a video of a real fire at a college residence hall. Within one minute, the temperature in a dorm room reached 300 degrees. After three minutes, the room was engulfed in flames.

Wallace said officials at Kirwan Tower are taking steps to avoid false alarms; and he has proposed glass plates be installed on top of every fire alarm switch. The glass would have to be lifted to trigger the alarm.

Also, a \$1,000 cash reward is being offered to anyone who catches

## Portrait of past UK president dedicated in Kirwan Tower

The lobby of Kirwan Tower was transformed into a lavish banquet hall yesterday for the unveiling and placement of a photo portrait in honor of Albert D. Kirwan, a former UK president.

New carpet was laid in the lobby, photos of the University were placed on the walls, and banquet tables were adorned with poinsettias

to create atmosphere for the unveiling ceremony.

An added touch to the ceremony was the presence of Frank Dickey, also a former UK president, who spoke about about his relationship with Kirwan.

"He was an individual who loved students and was very much devoted to this university and as a consequence it seems to me it's most appropriate that his portrait be here in Kirwan Tower because he did serve

this University for a number of years," Dickey said.

Dickey said Kirwan served the University in a number of capacities, not only as an administrator.

"He served as a coach, professor, as Dean, as President and served with great distinction in all those capacities."

Kirwan Tower, a residence hall that is home to about 640 students, was dedicated to Kirwan in 1968. Kirwan was appointed interim UK

president that year to fill the vacant seat of former president John W. Oswald, who resigned.

Kirwan also served as a UK football coach, Dean of Men, Dean of the Graduate School and as a history teacher.

Betty Kirwan, wife of the late Albert Kirwan, said yesterday's reception was "absolutely beautiful."

She also said her husband would be "very pleased" with the portrait that is now displayed in his honor

and with the condition of the residence hall.

Her only disappointment in the condition of the building was "that students had written on some of the walls," she said.

Shortly after arriving at the ceremony, Mrs. Kirwan requested to visit the top floor of the building to view the campus.

James Kuder, Vice Chancellor of student affairs, said he was also very excited to see the portrait

placed in the lobby.

The placement of the photo "reminds all of us when you hear the name of a building you sometimes don't put names with the person or happening together," he said.

"I think all of us need to be reminded that a lot of great people — both men and women on this campus — have played a major role in what we are today. Dr. Kirwan is

## Wildcats win 76-74 as IU's last '3' falls short

### Mashburn scores 21, leads UK to third victory

INDIANAPOLIS — About 20 rows into the lower deck of the Indianapolis Hoosier Dome, a UK student lofted a homemade sign that told the story of UK's 76-74 victory over Indiana Saturday.

The sign, alluding to a commercial for the Rally's fast-food chain, simply said, "Cha-Ching!"

UK took notice and lit up the scoreboard from three-point land. Following the lead of senior forward Deron Feldhaus, UK scored nearly half of its points from farther than 19 feet, 9 inches.

Feldhaus was 5-8 in three-point field goals in his best performance of the 1991-92 season. He played 35 minutes and scored 19 points.

"The last couple years, I've played up here I've shot the ball pretty well," Feldhaus said. "You get a lot of threes up during practice and stuff. It's something we work on every day."

UK converted a season-high 11 of 23 three-point field goals, eight in the first half. By contrast, the Hoosiers were 0-5 from behind the stripe.

UK coach Rick Pitino attributed his team's success from the three-point line to a strong performance inside by sophomore Jamal Mashburn. The 6-foot-8 forward offered UK's long shooters an alternative to taking a poor shot.

"One thing we emphasized at the end of last year was a good three vs. a bad three," Pitino said. "This three-point system that we have will get really good when we get one or two more top people or (Andre) Riddick and (Aminu) Timberlake get stronger. Now they are understanding, if the three is there, they take it. If not, they go inside."

And when UK went inside, it were getting the ball to the Cats' only great post man, Mashburn. Mashburn, who was on the floor for 38 minutes, was a force inside throughout the game. He scored 21 points, 14 inside the paint. On four occasions, he turned the inside jumper into his own type of three-point play by drawing fouls.

With Mashburn underneath, Pitino's outside shooters had a better selection of shots all day.

"We're not relying just on three-pointers anymore," Travis Ford said. "Instead, we're going inside or kicking it back out. It's just our total offense has been a lot better motion-wise."

While the three-point shooting kept the Cats ahead, Pitino pointed to UK's performance on defense as the key to the game. He said UK's defense played its most intelligent game in three seasons.

This strategy had been to deny Indiana the three. And the Cats did.

In addition to not scoring a three-point, the Hoosiers were unusually cold from the floor. IU converted

only 39 percent of its total shots. "This is a team that every year has the best shot selection in the country," Pitino said.

"... We really concentrated the whole game on not giving Indiana the three. We felt if we could do that, even if we did foul, and we could make our threes, we had a chance to win."

The pinnacle of the UK defensive performance came in the final 20 seconds of the game. IU gained possession on the jump ball, trailing by two, and IU coach Bobby Knight called a timeout.

Pitino countered with another timeout to set his strategy.

Senior Sean Woods, playing in front of his mother and father in his hometown, scored 12 points and had the most difficult assignment on defense in that last 20 seconds.

"I had guard Damon Bailey," Woods said.

Bailey had scored only five points in the game to that point but was one of the men Pitino had thought Knight would look to.

"I just couldn't let him drive," Woods said.

UK's defense denied Bailey and Calbert Cheaney, who scored 16 points in the game, anything on IU's final possession. Neither could find the lane to drive to the basket nor could find the open shot on the perimeter.

With time running out, Greg Graham was forced to take the shot that Cheaney or Bailey was expected to take. Graham's three-point jumper looked good all the way, and the crowd in the Dome was quieter than it had been for three hours.

"I thought it was going in," Mashburn said. "But as soon as it bounced out, I saw Richie (Farmer) grab it."

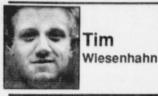
Farmer, leaping surprisingly high, grabbed the rebound and stumbled. Pitino and the UK bench left no time for doubt by flooding the court and creating a scene that had CBS producers shedding tears of joy and the camera crew madly chasing Pitino and his team from the court.

UK had looked to put the game away at several points in the game and led by as many as 10 points late in the second half. But IU did not lie down, fighting to tie the game at 53 with 11:52 remaining.

The Cats then put together a 14-5 run over the next four minutes, and the game was in their own hands.

The Hoosiers countered with a run of their own down the stretch to scare UK. With UK leading 72-62 and just over three minutes remaining, IU outscored UK 12-4 to pull within 76-74.

The game clock showed 49.7 seconds, and UK tried to run the time off the clock, but a bad pass in the paint led to a scramble for the ball. The tangled led to the jump ball and IU got possession with :20 left, setting up the last shot.

#### Climate controlled

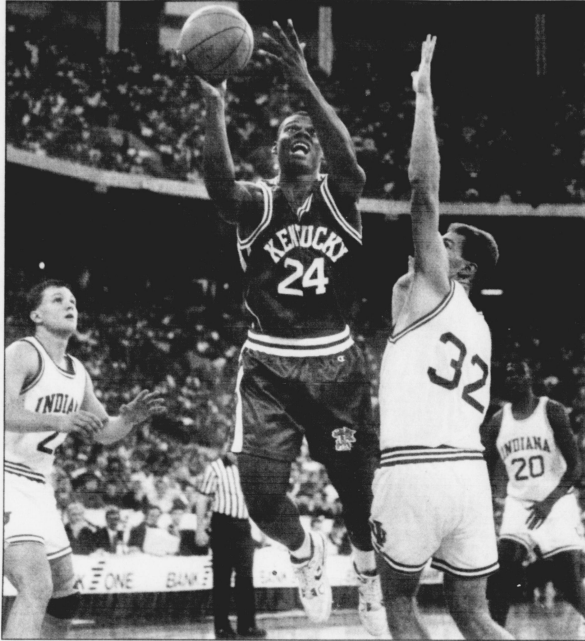

## Marksman Feldhaus shoots true at Indy

INDIANAPOLIS — For the first 51 seconds of the second half Saturday, UK withdrew its deadliest marksman from the battle against Indiana in the Hoosier Dome, rendering him inoperative on a row of vinyl-covered folding chairs. The maneuver must have been an oversight by the UK high command.

The marksman, a 6-foot-7, 210-pound sixth man tagged Deron Feldhaus, reigned fear on the Hoosiers.

During 17 minutes of the first half, Feldhaus hit 3-7 two-point targets. He hit targets from three-point range with 60 percent accuracy. He retrieved two rebounds and tallied nine points.

And with a pair of seconds remaining before the halftime armistice arrived, Feldhaus launched a 21-foot shot that reached his rimmed orange target and gave UK a 44-38 lead.

"I was feeling good," Feldhaus said.

After his nearly minute-long absence, Feldhaus was re-deployed.

He took only 18 seconds to strike.

Placing the ball on his hip, Feldhaus leaned forward and eyed the IU defense. He lunged right, dribbled and launched a six-foot jump shot from the base line. The shot was good and gave UK a 47-40 lead. Marksman Feldhaus was still a smoking gun.

"Deron Feldhaus is on fire," said an impressed sports writer.

For the next 20 minutes, Feldhaus attacked the Hoosiers like an avenger. He stole a pass, grabbed three rebounds and fired five on-target three-point bombs. His effort was reckless and fiery. An effort so honorable that it garnered the highest praise from his critics and his superiors.

"Deron Feldhaus is a heck of a ball player," said still another member of the media.

"Deron Feldhaus is one of the most valuable players on this basketball team," UK coach Rick Pitino said after UK's victory.

Feldhaus logged 35 minutes of play, in which he scored 19 points and retrieved three rebounds. All in the line of duty for UK's senior reserve forward.

"You have these days when it just feels good," he said, "and I felt like everyone of them (his shots) was going in. You wish you would have more days like that."

On most days, however, players like Feldhaus and his teammates Richie Farmer and John Pelphey are regarded as no better than average. Mere mortals. Feldhaus does not even start.

Contrast them with players as decorated as IU's Calbert Cheaney, who scored 16 points; and Eric Anderson, who had 18 points and 8 rebounds; and the Kentucky-trained players are relegated to grunts. Even the UK high command would confer.

"Players like Feldhaus and John Pelphey have reached their zenith," Pitino said.

But Saturday, after 40 minutes of basketball under the canvas heavens of the Hoosier Dome, Feldhaus had rocketed the Cats to an 87-74 victory and ended IU coach Bobby Knight's five-year reign over UK.

For certain, an objective UK coaching staff had not over looked. "I just had a feeling," Feldhaus said.

## UK Cool Cats defeat Dayton in weekend series to go 13-1

Jason Smithwick broke across the ice Friday night alone and slapped a shot at the Dayton goal. The puck nailed one pipe and then crossed and nailed another pipe.

It looked like a normal goal. The entire UK team began celebrating.

But the referee had other ideas. No goal.

A few minutes later, Smithwick, still smarting from the call, was grabbed from behind. Then he stepped on a Dayton player's head.

"I got frustrated and kicked a guy in the head," Smithwick said. "It was stupid. Really stupid."

No real big deal. Hockey is often like that. Such violence is expected on certain occasions. Smithwick — the second best offensive player on the team — was kicked out of the game and was disqualified from play in Saturday's series ender.

Roy Henry got kicked out as well — for fighting. Jeff Cooper injured his wrist. Doug Oppelt was out with

a sore back. And Don Kindrachuk was out with an injured knee.

So the No. 2-ranked Cool Cats (13-1) were outmanned against the fifth-ranked Dayton Flyers (7-5). Yet, behind the play of some key reserves and one ace veteran, the Cool Cats went on to beat Dayton 7-2 Friday night, and again Saturday night, 5-4.

"They did a great job," Smithwick said of the reserves. "They really played well together. Especially Paul Cerabona. He was great."

Cerabona had his best series as a Cat as he scored a goal in Friday night's game and then two more crucial scores in Saturday's nail-biter.

"We didn't have too many people playing," defender Kris Kocan said. "So we had to go to our reserves and we were fortunate that they come through."

Barry Holzer came through. Rich Rudachuk came through. Mike Wolf came through. They did not score a lot (Wolf and Holzer scored one apiece in Friday night's

clash), but they skated hard and helped maintain a constant offensive flow for the Cats.

"They kept their presence and generally helped us out in the game," Kocan said.

But it was the old steady, Chad Cooper, who led the Cats again with a hat trick in Saturday's contest. And these victories were of crucial importance for the Cats, who simply love beating Northern teams.

"Especially with the new rankings, we cannot afford to lose to a Northern team. If we lose to, say, Georgia, (the Division II club officials) don't know what to think," Smithwick said.

"But when we beat Dayton, they say, 'Whoa, they must be pretty good.'"

The Cool Cats will be off for Christmas break and will not hit the ice again until Jan. 17 when they take on another Northern team, Purdue.

"Looking forward to it," Smithwick said of the vacation.

## Volleyball team defeats Notre Dame, wins NIVC

When the volleyball season began, the Wildcats hoped — like every other team — to conclude the season with a post-season championship.

Saturday night their wish came true. Sort of.

UK swiped a 3-2 victory from Notre Dame in the finals of the National Invitational Volleyball Championship.

While the NIVC is not as prestigious as the NCAA's post-season bash, UK coach Kathy DeBoer said the Dayton, Ohio tournament was the right four-letter word for the young team.

"This was, for our team, a much better experience," she said. "We're not quite ready yet to play at that level."

If the Wildcats had made the NCAA's, DeBoer said their first-round opponent probably would have been fifth-ranked LSU.

Had that been the case, DeBoer said UK's second season would have been "very brief and brutal."

"I think we would've got beaten up pretty good," she said.

Rather than a one-loss-and-out appearance in the NCAA tournament, Kentucky got to bring home a trophy.

UK mopped up such volleyball powerhouse as Cornell, host Wright State, and Cal State - Northridge by 3-0 scores on the way to the Saturday night finals.

Freshman Krista Robinson was named to the all-tournament team and notched 21 kills in the final match, including the winning shot — although she did not know it at the time.

"I just rolled it over their blockers," she said sheepishly.

Robinson's roll shot — described as a volleyball version of baseball's change-up, arched over the Irish front line and dropped in front of the back line for a 15-13 victory.

"I didn't know it was for the last point," she said. Her teammates were more enlightening. After the ball hit the floor, Robinson said, "everybody just started jumping on me."

heart and soul of the machinery that makes a University work."

Cassiss challenged Cowan's argument, saying it lacked legal basis.

"I was stunned to hear nothing but a political speech," Cassiss said. "... Not one time did he cite a statute or constitutional provision."

"I resent that," Cowan countered.

Cassiss said Cowan presented "only an apprehension of irreparable harm," which is not enough to qualify for an injunction.

Cassiss said the state statute creating the UK board does not preclude the governor from serving.

"There is no limitation in that statute that prevents the governor from being a member," Cassiss said.

However, Cowan said that was the legislature's intention when in 1972 it passed a law removing the sitting governor as chairman of the UK board.

Cowan said common law should prevail because no specific case or statute addresses the issue.

Common law is a body of law formed from court decisions rather than through laws explicitly passed by a legislative body.

To support his common law argument, Cowan presented court cases from other states in which the governor is barred from naming himself to any position that is appointed by the state's chief executive.

Cassiss objected to Cowan's presentation of other cases, but the court permitted their admittance.

"These are not applicable. You can cite them," Cassiss then said.

Cassiss said that common law cannot be applied to public officials and that, in fact, the statute creating the UK board addressed the issue of a governor appointing himself.

Cassiss said this prevents the usage of common law. "In this case the legislature enacted a statutory scheme," he said.

"We have someone who has done what the law allows him to do," Cassiss said.

Cowan presented cases which, at

local levels, prevented the appointing authority from appointing itself. "The governor is not exempt from that," he said. "The governor is not above the law."

But Cassiss said those cases are not applicable to the governor.

After today, Gov.-elect Brereton Jones will be involved in the suit. Cowan's suit against Wilkinson in effect sues the office of the governor or in addition to Wilkinson as an individual.

Cowan said Jones can decide to continue the case, drop out or pursue some other option, as it pertains to the office of the governor.

The case against Wilkinson would continue, if Attorney General-elect Chris Gorman chooses.

If tomorrow's legal wrangling results in a day-long court battle, it would not be the first time a UK Board of Trustees session would be effected by a court decision on the eve of the meeting.

During the recent NCAA investigation of UK's basketball program, the Board of Trustees was scheduled to meet behind closed doors on a Saturday to discuss UK's response to the NCAA allegations.

The state's major newspapers filed suit on Thursday before the meeting, saying the meeting should be open.

The case went from Fayette Circuit Court on Friday to the state Court of Appeals later in the day, and finally to the state Supreme Court, which ruled in the wee hours of Saturday morning to allow the board to meet in closed session.

should get involved in that sort of process."

He also questioned Wilkinson's announced intention to reform higher education.

"But then he should have appointed himself to the Council on Higher Education," McEllistrem said.

The state Council on Higher Education sets policies and authorizes programs for the eight state universities. The actions of the UK board affect UK only.

"His comments about reform do not reflect the kind of insight into the University that is necessary to reform it," McEllistrem said.

Wilkinson's initial statements criticized the number of faculty who "only" do research.

"There's nothing wrong with research or publishing, but we can no longer afford for a substantial percentage of our full-time, tenured faculty to be involved only in research and publishing," Wilkinson said.

"And that's simply not true," McEllistrem said. The only faculty like that are funded externally, and not by state money, he said. "To reform something, you've got to understand it."

The proposed resolution also will "strongly endorse total reform of the process" by which appointments are made to the governing boards at state universities.

Gov.-elect Brereton Jones and State Rep. Ernesto Scorsone (D-Lexington) have proposed reforms that would create a committee which would recommend three candidates from which the governor could select an appointee.

The resolution also reaffirms the University's missions — teaching research and service, McEllistrem said. "These missions are intertwined.... Research is something that involves the students and faculty working together."

The Student Government Association Senate passed a similar resolution Wednesday calling for Wilkinson to resign from the board.

McEllistrem said that Wethington's speech will be about the bud-

get cuts that go before the Board of Trustees tomorrow. Because budget cuts require talking about University-wide priorities, "he may include some remarks about this issue."

A group of students have banded together to protest Wilkinson's action. A newly formed campus group, University of Kentucky Students Against Wally, will protest at the trustees meeting tomorrow. The protest will begin at 8:30 a.m. at the

Student Center and proceed to the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower, where the group will present SGA President Scott Crosbie with petitions calling for Wilkinson to resign.

In a press release Friday, group spokeswoman Elizabeth Gilliam said if Wilkinson does not resign or is not stripped of his seat, a boycott of classes will commence on Jan. 15.

## Wilkinson protest 9 a.m. tomorrow at trustees meeting

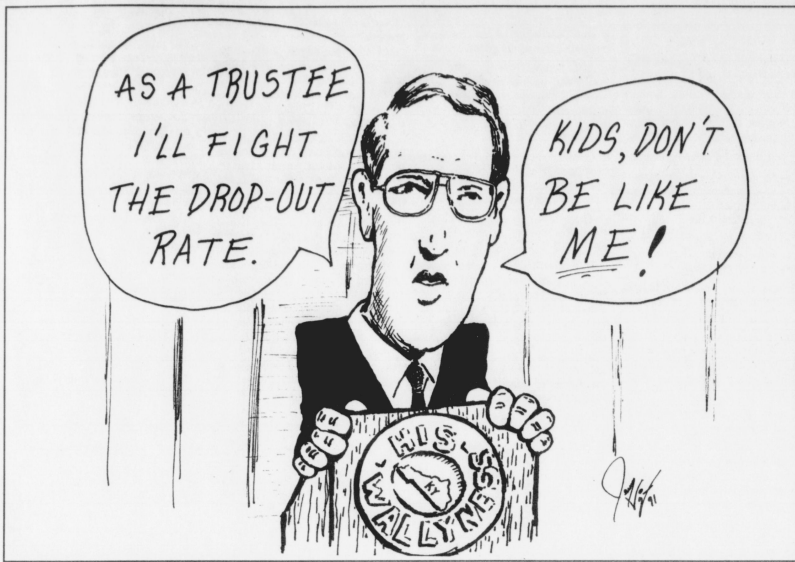
Unless an injunction is granted today preventing Gov. Wallace Wilkinson from taking his seat on the Board of Trustees, he could well be voting on UK policy as soon as this week.

This means Wilkinson would be at tomorrow's 9 a.m. Board of Trustees meeting. Students, faculty, staff, alumni and anyone else concerned about Kentucky higher education should attend the meeting to show Wilkinson that he is neither wanted nor welcome on our Board of Trustees.

Also, continue to call SGA at 257-3191 and encourage student senators to attend the meeting.

Members of the UK community also should attend today's University Senate meeting, during which a resolution will be presented calling for Wilkinson's resignation from the UK Board of Trustees. The meeting is at 3 p.m. in the auditorium of the nursing building.

Continue calling the Governor's Office at (502) 254-2611. Wilkinson, who doesn't officially leave the governor's office until tomorrow, will still be there today. Voice your displeasure of the governor's action.



We cannot stress how important it is that everyone show up at tomorrow's board meeting. We realize it is early in the morning. Everyone is busy with tests and papers, and finals are rapidly approaching. But the future of your University is at stake.

We ask, however, that anyone who attends the meeting be quiet and well-behaved. Protesters who disrupt the flow of the meeting will be removed and will defeat the entire purpose of being present.

Get up early tomorrow, grab a Kernel and proceed to the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower. Obey law officials. If the meeting room is full, don't leave. Remain in the lobby outside the board room. A crowd that exceeds room capacity will send a strong message that the board cannot ignore.

Remember—actions speak louder than words.

The wait is over. Chief of Staff John Sununu is finally gone from the Bush administration after incessant rumors that his head was on the block.

gated this little "scene", many students — including me — shared the angry sentiments these people were conveying. But we were too cold to move at the time.

Students were so upset and unruly that UK Police decided to show up and hang out in the Kirwan Tower lobby to protect resident advisers (and watch out for the students' safety).

Imagine that!

Because of the high number of false alarms, the University has decided to place glass covers over fire alarm switches. I am told the new system will only set off an alarm on the floor where the alarm is pulled. The rest of the building would be alerted after confirmation of the fire.

This project is "in the ordering stages," said Director of Residence Life Bob Clay. Officials are hoping to get these covers installed by the beginning of next semester, or as soon as they can be shipped to the University.

Because UK officials believe the

false alarms are the result of mischievous students, cash rewards are being offered to anyone who helps catch those responsible for the false alarms.

But will it be enough?  
The number of fire drills in other residence halls does not even come close to the colossal number radiating from Kirwan Tower.

Both Kirwan Tower residents and staff are to blame for this problem.

As a resident of Kirwan Tower, I know how long it takes for a fire drill. I've experienced more than I can count. The minimum amount of time for a false alarm is 25 minutes. The average amount of time is one

hour.

A plan needs to be drawn up in which people from each floor meet in a certain place in front of the building to speed up the task of getting students back in the building.

Student advisors would be quick to criticize this, saying students will not cooperate with the plan. But RAs need to exercise some authority and be responsible for the residents on their floors. Students would be more inclined to cooperate with an organized plan, rather than with an RA who makes idiotic demands of Kirwan residents.

(Those of you who live in Kirwan know about these ridiculous

demands, such as when RAs require residents to stand behind garbage cans before they can re-enter the building.)

Students need to be more responsible and report the criminals who pull the alarms. The hall director and RAs need to work together to devise a more efficient plan that will help alleviate problems.

This is not an easy task, but it will help to make life — or for some, Hell — in Kirwan Tower much more pleasant.

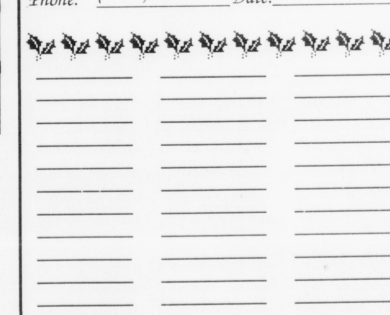

# Woman infected by dentist dies of AIDS

FORT PIERCE, Fla. — Kimberly Bergalis, who contracted AIDS from her dentist and became the focus of a national crusade for mandatory testing of health professionals, died yesterday at home surrounded by her family. She was 23.

Her plight stirred a bitter battle over whether mandatory testing and AIDS disclosure among doctors, nurses and dentists would improve patient safety.

"The world has lost a great deal, but the world will never ever forget how brave and how caring and how determined that lady was," said Barbara Webb, a retired English teacher who also was infected by dentist David Acer, who died last year.

Bergalis' lawyer, Robert Montgomery, said her father phoned shortly after 3 a.m. and said, "Kimberly is not going to suffer any more."

Bergalis shocked the nation in September 1990 when she came forward to say she was "patient A," the first known U.S. case of a patient who contracted AIDS during a medical procedure.

"Her courageous spirit and her determination to help others avoid her own fate touched Florida and the nation," Gov. Lawton Chiles said yesterday.

Bergalis was born Jan. 19, 1968, in Tamaqua, Pa., and moved to Florida with her family in 1978.

She was studious in high school, a member of the Math League, Spanish Club and National Honor Society, with little time left for a social life.

She graduated with a business degree from the University of Florida and was pursuing post-graduate study in actuary science when she got sick in late 1989.

Doctors initially rejected the idea of infection by the dentist, but in January, the U.S. Centers for Dis-

ease Control determined that her particular strain of HIV almost identically matched Acer's.

"This girl went through a tremendous amount of public indignity. She could have sat home and just quietly died," her father, George Bergalis, Fort Pierce's finance director, said in an earlier interview.

"We'd all be sitting back, fat and happy and saying 'as long as I don't do drugs, am careful with my sex life and don't have transfusions, I'm safe.' We'd all be very naive."

The Bergalis family was at home yesterday in Fort Pierce, a coastal town 100 miles north of Miami, and asked not to be disturbed.

The CDC ended doubts for many when it found Webb and three others were infected while Acer worked on their teeth in his dental office in Stuart.

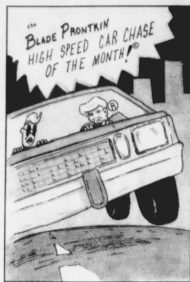
It has not been determined exactly how the virus traveled from his body to at least five of his patients.

Though visibly in pain, Bergalis went before television cameras in October to argue for mandatory testing of health care workers and patients before invasive procedures, a position opposed by AIDS activists, the American Medical Association and the American Dental Association.

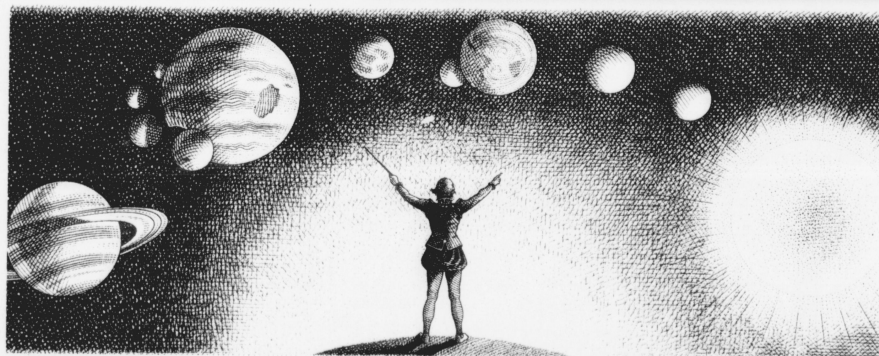
