Dear Sir:-

I am sorry that I was out this afternoon when you called to see me in regard to the house #06 Webster St., West Newton. I believe you wrote me a letter about this some time ago and I find that I replied to it on July 2nd. In case you are not familiar with the place I will give you a few details.
