Dr. J. W. Patterson, Centennial Coordinator, gave a brief progress report on Centennial preparations. He stated that while many institutions had used the 100th anniversary as a time for drawing together the past, the Centennial Committee did not feel it would be profitable to focus excessively on the past. This particular time, which is characterized by rapid growth, should be a time to redefine objectives and underscore faith in liberal education and scholarship, and the celebration should make a contribution to that end. He stated that on the basis of these premises there were three objectives which it was hoped the celebration would achieve:

1. afford a stimulus to our students and faculty for reaffirmance of their interest in and contributions to the world of knowledge,
2. serve as a means of accentuating the position of the University within the national academic community, and
3. provide an opportunity to carry on a mutually profitable interchange of ideas between the University and citizens of the state.

As a means to this end, he stated that the Centennial Committee has recommended a series of activities which, hopefully, would bring the faculty and students in direct contact with some of the world's most eminent scholars, namely:

A centennial professorship subcommittee, Dr. Jacob Adler, Chairman, who reported they planned to secure at least four scholars from the Sciences and bring them to the campus as visiting professors. One will be an academic man of great eminence in his field but hardly known to the general public, and one will be well-known to the general public such as an eminent writer, banker, or composer; one will be eminent in a non-academic area but hardly known to the general public, and the other will be well-known to the general public.

A conferences subcommittee, Dr. William S. Ward, Chairman, who reported that five conferences had been projected which are in the arts, humanities, social, biological, and physical sciences. Each conference will be built around a theme and a great deal of use will be made of these conferences to attract people from within the state and many sections of the country to participate in what might evolve as two to five-day conferences. The speakers and the conferences will be designed to attract national attention.

A publications subcommittee, Mr. Bruce Denbo, Chairman, who reported that the theme for the Centennial will be taken from the parabola in front of the

Medical Center; that this theme will take science as its base and very subtly work it into the UK initials with a background of stars symbolizing "This is the Pathway to the Stars." The entire theme will be related to the University, its past and its future, in a very distinctive way. He stated that papers presented by distinguished visiting professors that are worthy of publication will be published, as well as a pictorial history of the University, a scholarly history of the University, publications emerging from conferences, a series of bulletins on major colleges and areas, and a history of the University from about 1911.

A ceremonial activities subcommittee, Professor Willburt Ham, Chairman, who reported that ceremonial activities will be held on Founders Day and at the time of Commencement; that the Founders Day ceremony will be held in Memorial Coliseum at which delegates from other institutions, learned societies, and our own faculty, staff, and students will participate; that academic garb will be worn and that it is hoped that a group of centennial awards will be struck to be presented to distinguished alumni of the University; that at the Commencement ceremony the theme will be centered around the traditional ceremony with special emphasis on the centennial theme. He stated that it is also hoped that two additional events can be arranged for the purpose of bringing as many alumni as possible in contact with the celebration, namely: a testimonial dinner celebrating the publication of the new book on the University, and a special alumni luncheon or dinner, or both, celebrating the Centennial. He stated that in addition, plans are being made for at least two major ceremonial events to be held at each of the community colleges.

On behalf of the Faculty, Chairman Weaver thanked Dr. Patterson and the subcommittee chairmen for the excellent report.

A welcome was extended to the community college directors who were present in the meeting.

President Oswald expressed deep appreciation for the good work that Dr. Patterson and his committee had been doing in coordinating the Centennial celebration. Dr. Oswald made a few comments on the biennial budget which the Governor had presented to the Legislature. He stated that he felt the budget as presented would enable the University to meet the increased loads and demands on it and make significant progress in certain areas. In the area of instruction it would enable the University to recruit sufficient faculty over the next two-year period to improve slightly our student-faculty ratio and to go on a ten-months basis for all faculty with the exceptions of Medicine and Agriculture; to have a separate, self-supporting fund for the Summer Session; to establish a TIAA retirement system for the academic staff; and to make significant increases, selectively, in the area of faculty salaries.

The Faculty adjourned at 4:45 p.m.
