- Psychology 5 -- Advertising and Selling; 3 hrs., 3 crs; second semester
- Psychology 107 - Psychological Interpretation, 3 hrs; 3 crs.
- Psychology 108a and 108b - Human Measurements; 2 hrs ; 2 crs.; each semester.
- Psychology 109a and 109b - Diagnosis of Development; 1 hr., discussion 3 hrs. clinical practice; 2 crs. each semester.
- Psychology 110 - Experiment Method; 1 hr. discussion; 2 - 2hr. lab. periods; 3 crs.
- Psychology 203a and 203b - Problems in Psychology; 3 hrs. time per week for each hour of credit; 2 crs.
- Botany 12 - Advanced Morphology, 1 hr. lecture; 1 hr. recitation; 4 hr. lab. 4 crs. second semester.
- Botany 10a -10b - Morphology of Fungi, 1 hr. lecture; 1 hr. recitation 4 hrs. lab. 4 crs. each semester.
- Botany 111 - Classification of Parasitic Fungi, 2 hrs. laboratory; 1st semester.

That the following changes be made:

- Botany 102 - Advanced Mycology be changed to Botany 101a and 101b - Mycology.
- Botany 105 - Systematic Botany, changed to Botany 105 - Local Flora.

MINUTES OF THE SENATE JANUARY 16, 1922

The Senate met in the Little Theater Monday, January 16, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of December 12 and Council minutes of December 9 and January 6 were read and approved.

The Senate approved the recommendation of the Council that the publication of the catalog be postponed until next summer, for the following reasons: First, on account of its being a legislative year it would be impossible to get it printed before June, and second, by issuing the catalog in the summer we may include new courses and the names of new instructors, or announcements of any changes in the University program.

Upon recommendation of Dean Jewell, the Senate granted permission for the organization of a social fraternity, Sigma Beta Upsilon, which intends to petition Pi Beta Phi.

The following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

"That students transferring from another university or college or course to the regular A.B. or B.S. courses of the College of Arts and Sciences shall be allowed not more than 15 credits per semester of transferred work, exclusive of gymnasium and drill, unless the student's grades are such as to permit extra work in this college. In this case extra credit may be allowed by the Registrar on recommendation of the Dean."

New and revised courses in the Department of Vocational Teacher Training:

- Course 191 -- Community Analyses and Applications, 2 crs.
 Course 103 -- Observation and Practice Teaching in High School Agriculture, 3 crs. Substituted for 27.
 Course 102 -- Vocational Agricultural Teaching in High Schools, 4 crs. Substituted for 28.
 Course 104 -- Teaching Practice in Vocational Agriculture, 2 crs.
 Course 105 -- Special Problems in Vocational Agriculture, 2 crs.
 Courses 101, 106, 133, 134, 131, 34, 135 which have already been approved by the Senate on condition of their approval by the Arts and Science faculty, were adopted -- with the reservation that none of them shall count toward an advanced degree.

In the Department of Mathematics:

- Mathematics 109 -- Theory of Functions of a Complex Variable, 3 crs. (This is a renewal of an old course that had been discontinued).

In the Department of Geology:

- Geology 101 and 102 -- Paleontology -- changed to Geology 101a and 101b. Same credits as before.

In the Department of Bacteriology:

- Bacteriology 2a and 2b, --Elementary Microbiology -- 4 crs. per sem.

The following regulations for the government of the Men's dormitory were adopted:

I. The Senate of the University has deemed it wise to permit the students residing in the dormitory to organize for the purpose of controlling and directing their actions and to secure government of the dormitory that will be a credit to themselves and to the University.

II. All students residing in the dormitory are members of the Dormitory Association.

III. This association shall be governed by a council of eight persons selected by the President of the University from a list of

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sixteen nominated by the members of the Association.

IV. The term of office of the council shall be one year, dating from the beginning of the second semester. Vacancies shall be filled in the same way as provided in section 3 for appointment.

V. The duties of the council and the members of the council shall be to enforce the regulations and rules governing residents in dormitory and to be responsible for the general conduct of the residents.

VI. The council shall elect its own president and secretary.

VII. Standing rules governing residents in the dormitory are as follows:

1. Students occupying rooms in the dormitory will be expected to occupy them for a semester. Drawings for rooms will be made in June of each year for students in the University and in September for freshmen.

2. A deposit of \$2.50 per semester will be required of all residents in the dormitory. This deposit must be paid before the student occupies a room. If no changes are made against the deposit the amount will be refunded.

3. Residents in dormitory shall furnish their own bedding and towels. The linen on beds must be changed weekly.

4. The building must be kept in good order and will be subject once a week to inspection by the commandant of the University.

5. Quiet hours shall be in effect from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. and from 7:30 p.m. to 11:00 a.m. on all days except from Saturday 11:00 a.m. to Sunday 7:30 p.m. and on holidays and preceding evenings. All noise must cease on open evenings.

6. The following shall be out of order during quiet hours: Playing of musical instruments, whistling, running through the halls, loud talking in the rooms or in the halls, (scuffling, wrestling or unnecessary noise of any kind.)

7. Residents, unless properly attired, shall wear their bathrobes and slippers when passing through the halls.

8. Introduction of fire arms, liquor and gambling is prohibited in the dormitory.

9. It is expected that all students shall conduct themselves with due regard for the comfort and convenience and general welfare of all residents of the dormitory.
