MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE NOVEMBER 12, 1928

The University Senate met in Room 303 of White Hall Monday November 12, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of October 8 were approved as read.

The Committee on Duplication of Courses presented the following recommendations which were approved:

- ✓ Education 202. City School Administration - 3 hours
- ✓ Education 205. Problems of College Teaching - .2 hours
- ✓ Education 301a-b Research Problems in Educational Administration.
3 credits each semester
- ✓ Education 302 - Special Problems in Educational Finance - 3 credits.
- ✓ Education 304 - Special Problems in School Supervision - 3 credits.
- ✓ Education 307 - Special Problems in High School Administration -
3 credits.
- ✓ Education 308 - Special Problems in the Administration of the
Elementary School. 3 credits.
- ✓ Education 309 - Special Problems in Rural School Administration.
3 credits.
- ✓ Education 321a. - Special Problems in Higher Education - 3 hours.
- ✓ Education 321b - Special Problems in Higher Education - 3 hours.
- ✓ Drop Education 101, "School Buildings and Equipment" and
Education 201a,b, "Educational Administration"
- ✓ Change the number of "State and County School Administration"
from Education 113 to Education 213.

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- ✓ Commerce 136 - Problems in Sales Management - 3 credits.
- ✓ Commerce 137 - Problems in Management - 3 credits.
- ✓ Commerce 138 - Investigation of Business Problems - 3 credits.

The College of Commerce was authorized to eliminate Course 115, "Contemporary Economic Thought" as a requirement from the General-Business Curriculum; to drop as a requirement Practical Business Problem, given without credit. It was further authorized that a choice between Courses 137 and 138 be given the student as a requirement of the General-Business Curriculum.

The following plan, recommended by the College of Arts and Sciences, was adopted:

1. The College of Arts and Sciences will designate the following courses as liberal arts courses not subject to the rule limiting work in other colleges of the University to thirty credits;

- Economic History of Europe
- Economic History of the United States
- Principles of Economics
- Economic Geography
- Business Organization
- Statistical Method
- Labor Problems
- Labor Legislation
- Transportation
- Economics of Public Utilities
- Contemporary Economic Thought
- Organization of Economic Groups
- Business Cycles
- Public Finance
- Federal and State Taxation
- Money and Banking
- International Economic Policies
- History of Economic Thought

2. The College of Commerce will require the first two years of the commerce course as a prerequisite to the following advanced courses: all advanced accounting courses, Salesmanship, Principles of Retailing, Sales Management, Business Law, Problems in Marketing, Credits and Collection, Insurance, and Investigation of Business Problems.

3. The list of courses designated as liberal arts courses will be included in the Arts and Sciences catalog announcements and in the schedule of recitations for Arts and Sciences under the title of "Economics" instead of "Commerce" and will be so designated on the student's classification card.

The above arrangement is the result of conferences between the representatives of the College of Commerce and the College of Arts and Sciences and is intended to make more easily available for students in the College of Arts and Sciences a large number of courses that are generally recognized as liberal arts courses. It also provides protection for the College of Commerce by requiring completion of the first two years of the Commerce course as a pre-

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prerequisite to advanced courses."

A committee, consisting of Messrs. Horlacher, Bedford and Bureau, was appointed to arrange a program for the University Assembly. Announcement of the date of the meeting is to be made later.
