

Comm. College of Kentucky Oct 2 1903.

The faculty assembled in the president's office at 4 P.M. those present being the president, Profs. White, Miller, Patterson, Kasie, Roach, Pryor, Anderson, Matthews, Miller, Brooks, Mackenzie Norwood &raig.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and after a slight correction were approved.

Miss Kinkead, lecturer upon English literature, was by invitation present to express her objections to the time proposed by the faculty at its last meeting, for the delivery of her lectures.

As an alternative to the schedule objected to by Miss Kinkead, Pres. Patterson proposed the plan of shortening the college hours five minutes each, upon one day in the week, and omitting the usual chapel exercises, thus leaving available for Miss Kinkead's lectures of the period from 12.10 to 1 P.M.

This plan being acceptable to Miss Kinkead it was, upon motion of Prof. Miller, seconded by Prof.raig, ordered adopted.

Admission to
Harvard Law
School.

The secretary, appointed to correspond with the Harvard Law School relative to the admission of our graduates to that institution reported a letter from the secretary of said Law School to the effect

I would say that the course of study at your college has been passed upon by our Committee on Admission, and they are not at present prepared to admit the graduates of your college to Regular Standing. Holders of your degrees will be admitted to the School as Special Students, without examination, upon presenting diplomas or certificates of graduation. Special Students have all the same privileges as Regular Students, but must make an average of at least 70% on the work of three years, in order to be entitled to our degree.

I am sending under separate cover a copy of our latest Announcement. After examination of the same, should any further questions suggest themselves, I shall be pleased to hear from you again.

The committee appointed to consider the best methods of carrying out the orders of the Board of Trustees, relative to laboratory fees, reported, through its chairman, C. W. Mathews, that it was the sense of the committee that every student not a Co. appointee should be charged a fee of \$2.50 per term for each laboratory in which he takes work.

Upon motion the report was read and adopted. The committee upon accredited schools, instructed to consider the relation of the work of the Normal Dept. to the entrance requirements of the college, reported as follows: -
