

State University of Kentucky,

March 6, 1909.

The Faculty assembled at the usual hour in the President's room at the Gymnasium Building, those present being Pres. Patterson, Professor White, Patterson, Pryor, Mathews, Wilson, Tuttle, Rowe, Frankel, Corbusier, Maxson, Mrs. Stout, Profs. Noe and Jones.

The minutes of the last two meetings were read and approved. Dr. Tuttle called attention to the Course in Chemistry, as outlined upon page 64 of the University catalog, and moved its adoption as a recognized course of the College of Arts and Science. The motion was seconded by Prof. Rowe. It was explained by Dr. Tuttle that this matter had been presented at the meeting of the committee upon "Courses of Study", but that no action had been taken by this committee, and for that reason he presented it to the general Faculty. Dr. Pryor moved as a substitute that the matter be referred back to the committee upon Courses of Study. This motion was seconded by Prof. Wilson, and after further discussion by Profs. Tuttle, Pryor, Mathews, and President Patterson, the substitute motion was carried.

Prof. White called attention to certain entertainments for athletics which had been arranged for afternoon hours at a time interfering with class work, and suggested that these should be regulated so as not to interfere with the work of instruction. Prof. Wilson explained that the committee upon Athletics had given attention to this matter and believed that troubles of this sort would not arise in the future since all athletic sports would be arranged to come after 3:30 P.M.

Prof. Frankel made inquiry in regard to the examinations for the close of the second term. Reference was made to the minutes of the Faculty for March 27, 1908 in which the report of the committee to consider this matter was adopted as follows:-

"The committee recommends that no change be made in the present three-term arrangement, but that the setting apart of a week ~~exclusively for~~ ~~for~~ examinations at the close of the winter term as heretofore the custom, be discontinued, and that no examinations be given during this week except such as can be given by any department during its own class periods or at such other times as will not interfere with the class work of other departments."

Pres. Patterson called attention to the notices that had been sent out during the past week relative to the delay in assembling for drill at 3:30. Dr. Maxson in this connection urged the importance of the installation of a program clock which would enable all departments to run upon a uniform time, and thus better secure prompt dismissal. Pres. Patterson stated ~~in this connection~~ that, owing to the fact that the funds of the University which are due from the State Department at Frankfort had not been received, the Executive Committee had agreed that no further financial obligations should be incurred, except in cases of the utmost urgency, until the financial situation of the University had been relieved.

Following this the President again called attention to the small attendance upon chapel exercises, and urged upon the members of the Faculty an active cooperation in securing attendance of students and in attending regularly themselves.

After further informal discussion of methods of securing a larger and more regular attendance upon chapel exercises, the meeting upon motion adjourned.
