MINUTES OF THE SENATE OCTOBER 17, 1921

The Senate met in the Little Theater Monday, October 17, President McVey presiding. Quorum present.

The minutes of June 11 and 13 were read and approved.

The Senate elected Messrs. F. E. Tuttle and George Roberts Senate Representatives in the Council for the year 1921-22.

President McVey read a request that all research work be placed under the supervision of the Smithsonian Institute. Dean Cooper, Doctor Funkhouser and Doctor Pryor were appointed a committee to investigate the proposition and report their findings to the University Senate.

The following resolutions were presented to the Senate and approved:

"Resolved, That the Senate of the University of Kentucky, composed of the complete instructional staff of the various colleges and the Experiment Station, endorse the two amendments to the Constitution of Kentucky, to be voted on at the coming November election, to wit:

"Amendment Number 1. That the words 'the Superintendent of Public Instruction' be omitted in Sections 91, 93 and 95.

"Amendment Number 2. That Section 186 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"All funds accruing to the school fund shall be used for the maintenance of the public schools of the State, and for no other purpose and the General Assembly shall by law prescribe the manner of the distribution and use of the public school fund for public school purposes. Provided, however, that not more than ten per cent of said public school fund shall be distributed other than upon a per capita basis."

"Under the Constitution the State Superintendent of Public Instruction must be elected at the same time and in the same way that the Governor is elected and he is ineligible for re-election. If the Constitutional amendment is passed the Legislature will prescribe the manner of his election and his tenure of office.

"All the school funds coming from the State are now, under the Constitution, required to be distributed to each county per capita. If the second amendment is passed ten per cent of this fund may be

used to equalize educational opportunities in the poorer counties by stimulating local support through state aid."

The following courses were recommended by Dean Boyd and approved:

Romance Languages

- ↳ 104a,b - Spanish Composition, Novel and Drama - 3 credits
- ↳ 102a,b - French Composition, History of French Literature, Classics, 3 credits.

Economics and Sociology

- ↳ 163 - "Methods of Social Case Work" - for senior and graduate students - prerequisite, courses in Family Welfare and Community Organization. 3 credits.

Geology

- ↳ 1a,b - Physiography - 2 hrs. lec. 2 hrs. lab. 3 credits - changed to b. 3 hrs. lec. per week, three credits. hours lecture, Monday, Wednesday.
- ↳ 13a,b - Physiography Laboratory - for major geology students 2 hrs., 1 cr. This to be given with Physiography 1a,b, the total credit for the lecture and laboratory to be 4 hours.

MINUTES OF THE SENATE MONDAY NOVEMBER 14, 1921.

The Senate met in the Little Theater Monday, November 14, at 3:45, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of October 17 and Council minutes of October 21, 28, November 4, 7 and 8 were read and approved.

The Committee appointed by President McVey to investigate the proposition that all research work be placed under the supervision of the Smithsonian Institute, asked for further time, which was granted.

The following recommendation from the College of Arts and Sciences was approved:

↳ Math. 10 -- Mathematics of Finance

3 credits - For students in business courses. Life insurance, securities, depreciation, sinking fund methods, building and loan associations, theory of probability, etc.

It was recommended that seniors who complete their work the first
