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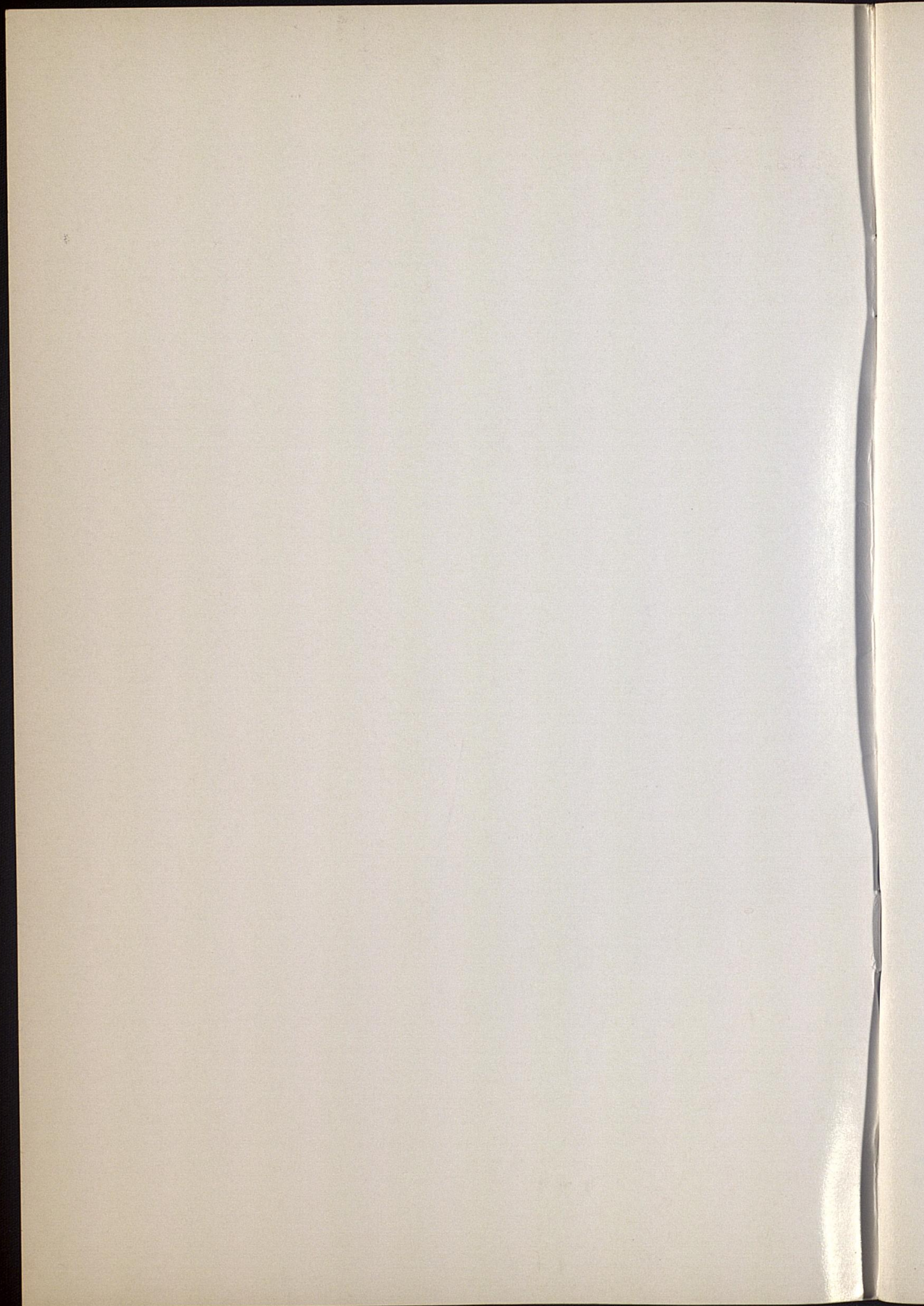

COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

- 001-099 – No credit and/or non-degree courses
- 100-199 – Open to freshmen; gives undergraduate credit only
- 200-299 – Prerequisite sophomore classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 300-399 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 400-499 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit for non-majors
- 500-599 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit
- 600-799 – Open only to graduate students

1. Freshmen may be admitted to courses numbered between 200 and 499, and sophomores to courses numbered between 300 and 499, upon approval of the instructor and the dean of the student's college. Such approval shall be limited to students who have demonstrated superior ability or preparation.

2. Seniors with superior ability or preparation may be admitted to courses numbered between 600 and 799 upon approval by the instructor, the dean of the student's college and the dean of the graduate school.

Curricula

The University of Kentucky, a land-grant institution, will offer eight weeks of regular summer session work and post-session courses. Courses will be offered in seven colleges—Arts and Sciences, Agriculture and Home Economics, Engineering, Law, Education, Commerce, and Medicine—and in the Graduate School.

Over and above its program of liberal education, the University Summer Session provides numerous opportunities for persons to prepare for specific occupations. The opportunities are in a number of fields such as: Journalism, Medical Technology, Pre-Medicine, Pre-Dentistry, Pre-Pharmacy, Pre-Nursing, Music, Library Science, Public Service, Art, Geography, Geology, Microbiology, Psychology, Radio, Television, Films, Social Work, Sociology; Agriculture in its various phases, Pre-Forestry, Pre-Veterinary, Home Economics; Engineering—Agricultural, Architectural, Chemical, Civil, Communications, Electrical, Mechanical, Metallurgical and Mining; Law; Elementary and High School Teaching, Educational Supervision and Administration; General Business, Banking and Finance, Personnel Management, Marketing, Accounting, Business Management, Economics, Industrial Administration, and Secretarial Work.

Credit Hours

Nine semester hours are considered the normal load for undergraduates. For graduate students, the normal load is six hours; the maximum is nine. Graduate students who earn six or more graduate credits and who remain in residence throughout the Summer Session are assigned nine weeks of residence. University students may be confident of acceptance of credits at full value by other colleges and universities. Moreover, U.K. credits always meet the tests for employment, whether by government agencies, by corporations, or by private companies, regardless of the field. This is a very important consideration. In certain categories of employment, students and graduates of land-grant universities have a distinct advantage over other students and graduates.

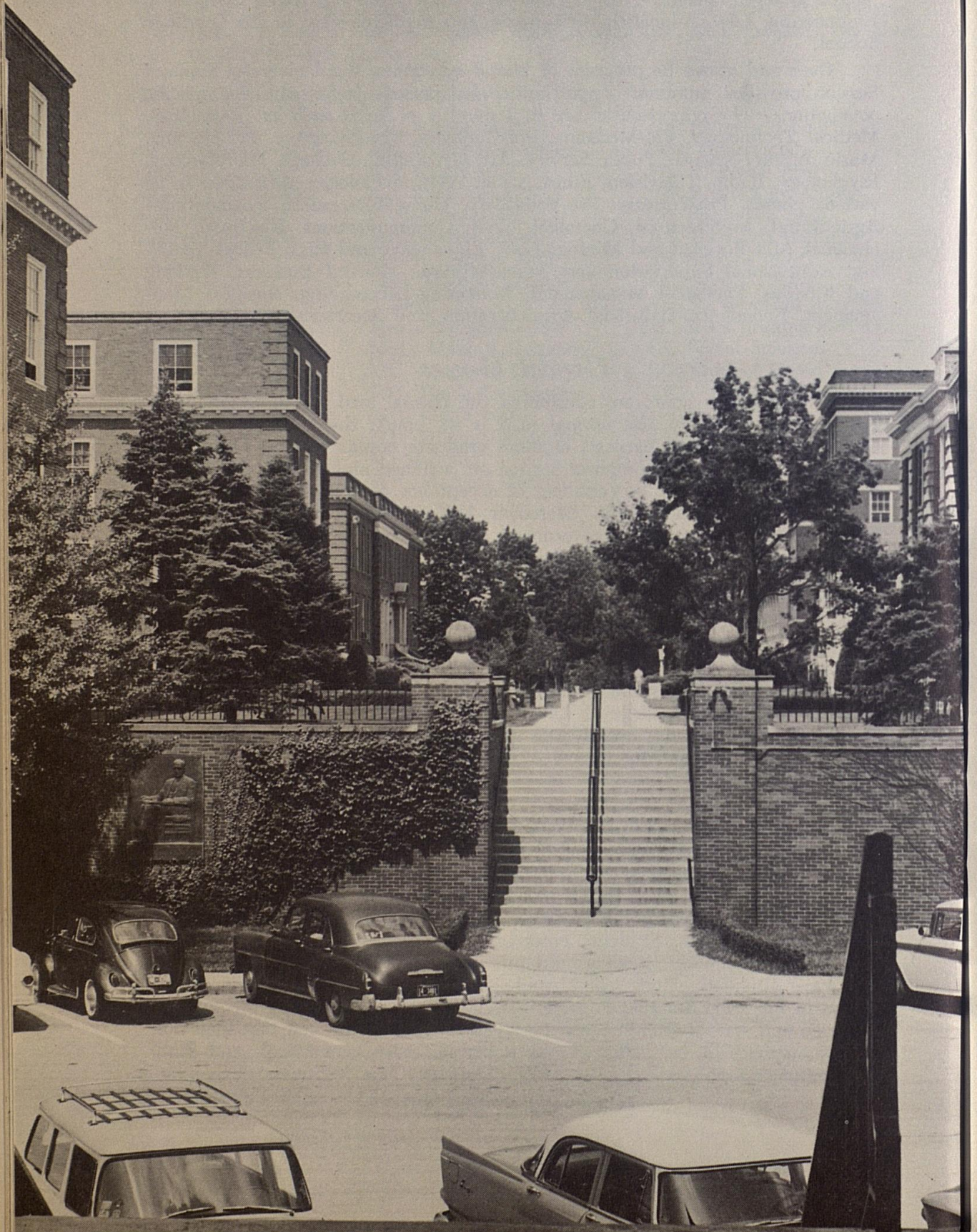
Fees

For the Summer Session, the full-time fee for all Kentucky students, except those enrolled in the College of Law, will be \$57.50, and for students in the Law College \$60.50. For out-of-state students, in all colleges except Law, the fee will be \$127.50, and for Law \$132.50. These fees are payable at the time of registration.

Admission

Applicants for admission should write to the Office of the University Dean of Admissions and Registrar for application, stating whether they wish admission to the freshman class, to advanced standing, or to the Graduate School. Applications and transcripts of credits should be filed 30 days in advance with the Registrar's Office. Students entering with advanced standing and those entering the Graduate School should present transcripts from each institution they have attended. High school graduates are invited to start their college careers in the 1964 Summer Session. Special courses are planned for entering freshmen and special attention will be given to them to the end that their collegiate careers will be richer, more profitable, more economical, and more meaningful.

OUTLINE OF REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

LOWER DIVISION

General Requirements:

English, first and second semesters, freshman year, 6 credits.

General Hygiene, 1 semester.

Physical Education, freshman year, 2 credits.

Group Requirements:

1. *Foreign Languages* (Arabic, French, German, Greek, Hebrew, Italian, Latin, Japanese, Russian, Spanish). Required: Twelve semester hours in one language, the first nine of which may be waived.
2. *The Humanities*. To satisfy the lower division requirements in the Humanities, students in the College of Arts and Sciences must earn four credits in literature and philosophy (Humanities 200, 201 or 202) and two credits in art or music (Humanities 203 or 204). These courses should be taken during the sophomore year, and two courses from 200, 201 or 202 may not be taken simultaneously.
3. *The Social Studies*. The student is permitted to choose two of the following courses to satisfy the group requirements in the social studies: History 104, 105, 108, 109; Political Science 151; Anthropology 121, 153; Sociology 151, 153, 154; Geography 153, 154; Economics 251, 252.
4. *The Biological Sciences*. Students may satisfy the biological group requirements by completing a minimum of six semester credits from the following courses: Anthropology 100; Microbiology 100, 102, 200; Botany 101 or 125, 103; Psychology 100; Zoology 100.
Note.—Six credits of the courses that satisfy the biological and physical sciences requirements must be in courses that have laboratory.
5. *The Physical Sciences*. Students will be permitted to take work in either one or two departments in order to satisfy the physical science requirement. Six or more credits can be taken from the following courses: Astronomy 191, 192; Chemistry 102, 104, 110, 112; Geology 100, 104, 105; 110 with 104; 112, 113 with 100 or 104, 105; 214; Mathematics 111, 112, 113; Physics 151, 152, 211, 213, 231, 232 (with 241, 242). See note under Biological Sciences.

Note.—A student must have attained a standing of 2.0 in order to be promoted to the next higher classification.

UPPER DIVISION REQUIREMENTS

Specific requirements are given under each department. *Plan cards* outlining the upper division work and signed by the student's advisor should be on file in the dean's office at the beginning of the junior year.

Requirements for a Major: Ant 100, 121, 153 (Geo 153 or Soc 153 are equivalents to Ant 153). Required: A minimum of 24 credits of advanced work, including Ant 582 repeated once, and at least one course in each subdivision of Anthropology, namely in Archaeology, Ethnology, and Physical Anthropology. Comprehensive examination in senior year.

UPPER DIVISION REQUIREMENTS

Requirements in the Field of Concentration: 40 credits in advanced work in the field of literature, philosophy, and the arts, including the major work.

Requirements for a Major in Art: Prerequisites: Art 100, 101, 110, 130, 200, 201, 210, and 236 or 237. Required: A minimum of 26 credits of advanced work in Art, including courses 500, 509, 12 credits in studio courses, 9 credits in the history and the theory of art; and a comprehensive examination in the senior year.

Requirements for a Major in Art Education: Prerequisites: Art 100, 101, 110, 130, 200, 201, 210. Required: 12 credits in advanced studio areas, including Art 236 or 237, 242, 310, 330, 336, plus 8 additional hours to be selected from two of the three studio areas; 9 credits in public school art, including Art 170, 171, 172, 173, 577 or 575; 6 credits in history and theory of art, preferably Art 562 and 564; 1 credit in the Senior Seminar, Art 509; and 21 credits in Education, including 101 or 301, 202 or acceptable substitutes, 340 or 344, and 342 (Practice Teaching).

Chemistry (CHE)

UPPER DIVISION REQUIREMENTS

Classification of juniors or seniors as majors in chemistry is restricted to students having a standing of 2.0 or higher in all chemistry courses.

Juniors and seniors may major in chemistry either with a field of concentration in the physical sciences or in a combination of biological and physical sciences. Students who might want to become professional chemists are advised to have their field of concentration in the physical sciences. Students who expect to enter medical school, obtain an advanced degree in a biological science, teach in a high school, or use chemistry only as a part of their liberal education may

want their field of concentration to be a combination of physical and biological sciences.

Requirements in a Physical Science Field of Concentration (B.S. degree): Forty credits of advanced work in the physical sciences including the major work. For specific requirements see the prescribed Curriculum Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science with a Major in Chemistry in the General Catalogue of the University.

Requirements in the Combined Physical-Biological Science Field of Concentration (A.B. degree): Forty credits in courses above the freshman level in the combined fields of physical and biological sciences including the major field. Six hours of education may be included. Students who transfer into this field after completing the sophomore year must have a standing of 2.5 or higher. Prerequisites: Chemistry 110, 112; Mathematics 113. Required: Chemistry 226 or 220, 430, 432, 444 or 440, 442, 441, 443, 572; Physics 211, 213 or 231, 232, 241, 242 and sufficient courses in the biological and physical sciences to make 40 credits.

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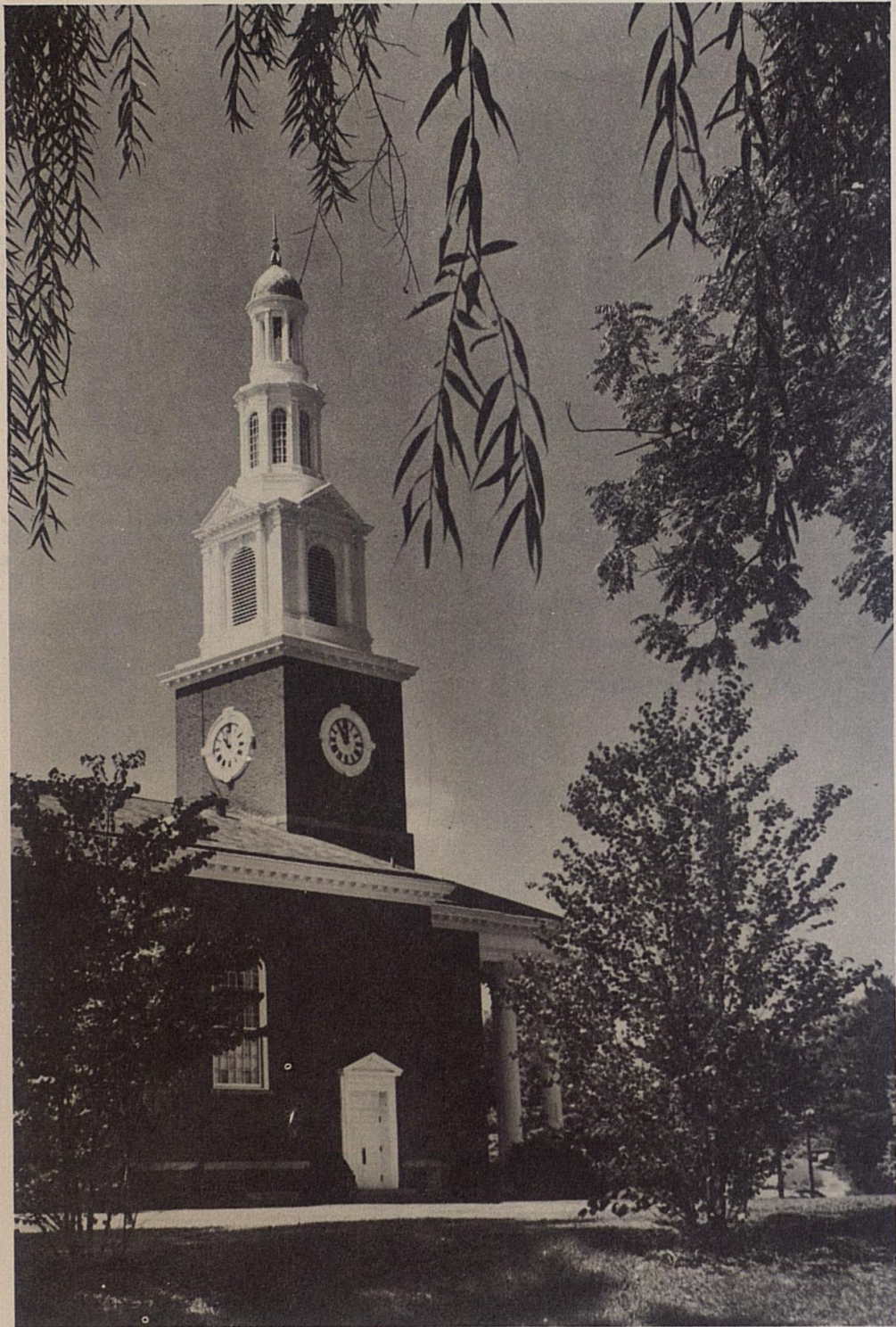

Living Accommodations

Room applications for single men should be made to the Director of Men's Housing, Office of the Dean of Men. The rental for a dormitory room per individual is \$70 for the summer session. Costs of housing during short courses depend on the number of nights in residence.

Women's applications should be made to the Office of the Dean of Women. Double rooms for eight weeks are \$70-\$80 per individual. Single rooms are \$85-\$95. Persons attending short sessions should make a room reservation in the Office of the Dean of Men or Office of the Dean of Women. Rates for double rooms are charged in proportion to the length of time in residence at \$2 a day for 13 days or less and \$14 per week for periods of 14-28 days. For the same periods of time, single rooms are \$2.50 per day or \$16 per week. For periods of 5-8 weeks the rate is \$9 per week for a double and \$11 per week for a single.

Efficiency and one-bedroom family housing units are available in Coopers-town at \$69 and \$82 per month and in Shawneetown at \$73 and \$86 per month, furnished. Applications for family accommodations should be made as early as possible to the Office of the Dean of Men.

Two cafeterias and two grills will be in operation during the Summer Session.

Cultural and Recreational Resources

The University of Kentucky is located in Lexington, the center of the Bluegrass region, a country of scenic beauty and historic interest.

Many of the famous horse farms, some containing more than a thousand acres, are in this rich region. During the Summer Session, tours are conducted to many of these estates, among which are Elmendorf, Walnut Hall, Calumet, Castleton, and Dixiana. Coldstream Farm is now the main Experiment Station Farm of the University. In addition, points of historic interest, including Ashland (home of Henry Clay), General John Hunt Morgan's residence, the home of Mary Todd (wife of Abraham Lincoln), and the Keeneland Race Track, may be visited.

During the session, nationally known speakers, lecturers, workshop directors, and specialists in many fields will visit the campus. One feature of the session will be the summer Youth Music Institute. The Student Center, the Memorial Coliseum, and the Fine Arts Building will be open for student use. Social and physical education programs have been arranged.

Statement of Courses

Courses numbered 100 to 399, inclusive, may be taken only for undergraduate credit. Courses numbered 400 to 599, inclusive, may be taken for credit by juniors, seniors, and graduate students, provided that a course so numbered may carry credit only with the approval of the student's graduate committee. Courses numbered 600 or above are open only to graduate students.

ACADEMIC PROBATION, DROPPING FOR LOW SCHOLARSHIP, READMISSION

Effective For All Students

Undergraduate Colleges:

The following students shall be placed on academic probation:

1. The student who, during either of his first two semesters, fails to attain a grade point average of 2.0;
2. The student who, at the end of his third semester or any subsequent semester or term, fails to have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0;
3. The student who is readmitted after being dropped from the University for academic reasons.

A student on academic probation shall be removed from probation at the end of a semester or term if he has achieved a grade point average of 2.0 and has a cumulative grade point average of 2.0.

A student who, during his first semester, demonstrates that he cannot or will not do satisfactory work may be dropped upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which he has been registered.

The following students shall be dropped from the University:

1. The student who, after his first two semesters, has failed to achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for at least one of the semesters;
2. The student who, after his first three semesters, has failed to achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for at least two of the semesters;
3. The student on academic probation because of a low cumulative grade point average who fails to attain a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 after one semester on probation.

A student who has been dropped shall normally be readmitted only after two semesters have passed and after he has presented evidence to indicate that he can and will do satisfactory work if readmitted. He shall, however, have the right to appeal for waiving the two semester requirement on the grounds of exceptional hardship.

If a student is readmitted he shall be required to achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for the first semester after readmission, and he shall further be required to bring his cumulative grade point average up to 2.0 by the end of the second semester after readmission, or be dropped from the University.

Professional Colleges:

Pharmacy.

Definition: Pharmacy standing is the overall grade point average for all professional and non-professional work accomplished subsequent to admission to the Professional Curriculum.

1. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 2.0 at the end of any semester shall be dropped from the University or placed on academic probation.
2. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 1.5 at the end of any semester shall have his record reviewed by the College of Pharmacy faculty and may be dropped from the University without a preliminary probationary semester.

3. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, fails to have achieved a semester standing of 2.0 at the end of this semester shall be dropped from the University.
4. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, achieves a 2.0 standing for that semester but fails to bring his pharmacy standing up to 2.0 will be continued on probation or be dropped from the University.
5. Any student who, at the end of his second consecutive probationary semester, fails to have achieved a 2.0 pharmacy standing shall be dropped from the University.
6. A student who has been dropped for academic deficiency may be re-admitted on probation according to University regulations except that his academic requirements will be those outlined in items 3, 4, and 5 above.
7. Any student who, regardless of pharmacy standing, fails to have achieved a 2.0 standing for 2 consecutive semesters may be placed on probation.

Law. Any student who fails to make a numerical average of 60 during a semester will have his academic record evaluated by the Law Faculty and may be dropped from the University or placed on probation as the facts warrant. A student on probation who fails to make a numerical average of 60 in the probationary semester will be dropped from the University unless there are extenuating circumstances acceptable to the Law Faculty. A student who fails to make the following cumulative numerical average shall be dropped from the University unless he has made a numerical average of 60 for the semester just completed.

55 at the end of the one semester of Law
 58 at the end of two semesters of Law
 59 at the end of three semesters of Law
 60 at the end of four semesters of Law

A student who has been dropped from the College will not be recommended by the Dean for readmission to the College of Law until he has remained out of the College for a semester and a Summer Session and has received favorable consideration by the Law Faculty of a written petition stating good reasons why he can do satisfactory academic work.

All Undergraduate and Professional Colleges:

The dean of each college shall submit to the Office of the Registrar a complete list of students placed upon academic probation or dropped from the University within two weeks after the dean has received the grade reports from the Registrar at the close of the semester or term.

A student who is on academic probation may not be employed by any department or college of the University. This shall not prevent any department or college from establishing higher standards for student employment.

A student who is on academic probation shall not be allowed:

1. To serve as an officer or committee member in any campus organization;
2. To participate in any University extra-curricular activity or in the activity of any University organization if the participation involves the expenditure of an appreciable amount of time.

At any time the dean of a college in which a student is enrolled may declare the student ineligible because of failure in current class work; at any time the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men may declare a student ineligible

whose participation in an activity is judged to be detrimental to the student, the organization, or the University.

Students shall be removed from probation only on the basis of residence work at the University of Kentucky. Usually part-time work shall not be considered unless the student has been placed on probation because of unsatisfactory performance as a part-time student.

Readmission of a student who has been dropped from the University shall be upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which the student is to be registered. However, the student shall have the right to appeal for a review of his case by the Committee on Academic Progress of the University

A student who has been dropped a second time shall not be readmitted to the University.

Each student shall be presented with a copy of the rules that deal with probation, dropping for low scholarship and readmission. He shall be responsible for being familiar with these rules and with their relationship to his situation.

The probation rules shall be effective for all students.
