A student who has been dropped from the College will not be recommended by the Dean for readmission to the College of Law until he has received favorable consideration by the law faculty of a written petition stating good reasons why he can do satisfactory academic work.

Acting Chairman Adams then recognized Professor Flickinger who recommended that the above proposal in the College of Law's probation and drop rules be approved by the Senate and that this change be applicable to all students who enter the College of Law on or after the beginning of the fall semester 1971 but that the present academic requirements as stated in the present Rules continue to be applicable to all students in the College of Law until they have graduated.

The Senate approved the proposed change in the academic requirements as it relates to probation and drop for the College of Law.

The Senate voted to adjourn and adjourned at 4:42 p.m.

The minutes of the regular meeting of April 12, 1971 were accepted as circulated.

Chairman Rovin reminded the Senators of the informal reception at Spindletop Hall from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., Monday, May 3, 1971 to be given by the President and the Board of Trustees in honor of the University Senate; that the final meeting of the University Senate for the 1970-71 academic year will be held on Monday, May 10, 1971 at 3:00 p.m. in the Court Room of the Law Building; and that Professor Paul Oberst of the College of Law has been elected for a three-year term as the non-voting faculty member to the Board of Trustees to become effective July 1, 1971.

On behalf of the College of Engineering, Dr. Earl L. Steele, new Chairman of the Department of Electrical Engineering, effective July 1, 1971, presented a Resolution on the death of Dr. H. Alex Romanowitz and directed that the Resolution be made a part of these minutes and that copies be sent to the family of Dr. Romanowitz. The University Senate stood for a moment of silence in respect to Dr. Romanowitz and in acceptance of the Resolution.

Dr. H. Alex Romanowitz, Professor of Electrical Engineering, University of Kentucky, died March 17th, 1971, just a few months prior to the date of his planned retirement. He succumbed, after a short illness, to a rare infection of the nervous system.

True to profession and personality, Dr. Romanowitz spent even the last days of his life making plans to improve some of the hospital equipment which was inefficient and difficult for the staff to operate.

Born in Covington, Kentucky, January 8, 1901, he received his B.S. and M.S. in E.E. from the University of Cincinnati, and his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He was appointed a Fellow of the AIEE for distinguished work in his field, and was particularly active in the American Society for Engineering Education, serving on accreditation teams and as Chairman of Engineering Technology Accreditation Committee for the Southeastern Region. He was also active in many other professional organizations.

Alex Romanowitz was married to Miss Mildred Foster on September 18, 1926. They have two children, Byron and Lois Jean, and five grandchildren. Byron is a prominent local architect. Lois Jean, now Mrs. White, is living near Detroit, Michigan.

3144 Minutes of Special Meeting of University Senate, April 27, 1971 Coming to the University in 1942 as an assistant professor, Dr. Romanowitz advanced to the rank of Professor and became Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering in 1952. He remained in this position until he reached the mandatory retirement age for administration positions at which time he again assumed a teaching role as Professor of Electrical Engineering. The years of his service to the University saw the explosive expansion of electrical engineering into new areas of communication, control, computers and solid state devices. The department grew under his guidance from a staff of half a dozen to one of twice that number. Among many talents, his exceptional ability in the area of writing and editing lent meaningful support not only to students, but faculty colleagues as well. A number of textbooks were written by him, notable among them, Fundamentals of Semiconductor and Tube Electronics. He had finished a new book, Circuit Analysis, just prior to his death. These texts are widely used by Universities in this country. Every student and staff member in the E.E. Department during the years of Dr. Romanowitz's tenure there was reminded of a higher potential in his life by the "Weekly Saying" that Dr. "R" faithfully posted. Some examples are, "Informed Citizens are the Guardian and Spirit of Democracy," "No Man is Free Who is Not Master of Himself," "Place a High Value on Yourself and Then Prove You Are Worth It," "A Journey of a Thousand Miles Begins With a Single Step," "When God Allows a Burden to Be Put Upon You, He Will Put His Own Arm Underneath You to Help." Although Dr. Romanowitz is listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Engineering, and American Men of Science, and has been greatly admired as a scientist and professor, his warm human qualities of love of family, faithfulness to his church, openheartedness to students, and undaunted wit, will live in the hearts of those who knew him and whose lives were touched by his. The candidates for degrees at the May 8, 1971 Commencement, as circulated to the faculty under date of April 12, 1971, were accepted by the Senate for presentation to the Board of Trustees with the provision that the proposed candidates fulfill the requirements for the degree for which each has applied. in

Minutes of Special Meeting of University Senate, April 27, 1971 Professor Staley Adams, Secretary of the University Senate Council, presented a recommendation that the codification of the Tripartite Report into the Rules of the University Senate, as circulated to the faculty under date of April 14, 1971, be approved with the following minor corrections: At the top of page 3, end of first paragraph, insert the following additional sentence: They will not be counted as part of the quota for the academic unit that they have represented nor of the maximum membership of the Senate after the expiration of their elected memberships. At the bottom of page 5, the last sentence in footnote 1. (e) insert the following underlined phrase in that sentence: . . . Also it is thought that selection by the students from their own group would be better than selection by the entire Senate in which the majority of votes would be those of faculty members with little basis for voting other than on college lines. The recommendation was seconded. Professor Adams was again recognized and presented the following amendment to the codification. A copy of this proposed amendment had been made available to the Senators as they entered the meeting. Professor Adams stated that this was an amendment offered by him, personally. On page 4 of the codification, Section C. Councils of the Senate, 1., replace that paragraph with the following: The elected membership of the University Senate Council shall be composed of nine (9) faculty members elected by the faculty of the University Senate during the fall semester of the academic year in groups of three to take office January 1 for terms of three years, and one student member elected by and from the newly elected student members of the Senate during the second semester to take office July 1 for terms of one year. In addition, the two faculty Trustees and the student Trustee shall serve as voting members of the Senate Council, if not already elected members of the Senate Council. The following is Professor Adams' stated rationale for presenting this amendment: "This would allow a maximum of 13, and a minimum of 11 to comprise this body. It would give everyone on the Senate Council voting privileges and make them voting members of the Senate if not already an

elected member. The faculty-student ratio on the Council would be between 5.5 to 1 to 6.5 to 1 compared with about 9 to 1 for the entire Senate. In addition, the student and faculty members of the Board should be the most knowledgeable members of the academic community. The voting privileges would remove the stigma created by the non-voting status."

The amendment was seconded by Dr. Olshewsky.

Mr. Scott Wendelsdorf, President of Student Government, stated that he would prefer to see the original codification as submitted by the Senate Council retained as he felt it more important to have three students' voices than two students with votes in the Senate Council.

Following his statement Dr. Olshewsky withdrew his second to the amendment by Professor Adams. Another Senator then seconded Professor Adams' amendment.

Following further discussion, the Senate vetoed Dr. Adams' amendment to the codification.

Motion was then made and seconded to retain the <u>bracketed</u> sentence and delete the <u>underscored</u> sentence on page 1, Roman I, section B. subhead 1. a. <u>Elected Membership</u> (1) midway in the paragraph of the circulated codification, which reads "/ The chairmanship of a department shall not disqualify its holder./ An <u>administrative title</u> below that of dean shall not automatically make the holder ineligible."

The Senate defeated this motion.

Mr. Howell Hopson presented a motion to amend Section C, 1. b. Student Membership, on page 6 of the codification circulation to add the following sentence to the end of the first paragraph:

Students eligible for membership in the Senate but not currently members may be made eligible for election to the Council by a nominating petition signed by fifteen (15) members of the Senate and filed with the President of Student Government five days prior to the election.

Mr. Hopson stated that the purpose of this amendment was to make the rules regarding eligibility of student membership consistent with the rules regarding the eligibility of faculty membership. He stated that the petition mechanism was particularly valuable for the election of the student members of the Council because of the limited number of student Senators and because of the disproportionate representation of the students.

On behalf of the Council, the Chairman of the Senate spoke to this rule in the University Senate Rules. He stated that this Rule was conceived a number of years ago and had never been invoked; that no Councilor had ever been elected who was not a member of the Senate; that the Senate Council had discussed this rule and it was their feeling that it was archaic and they planned to present a recommendation to the Senate to eliminate the rule in the fall; further, it was the feeling of the Council that the Councilors should be elected from the body that the Council represents; that, in fact, the Council constitutes the executive

3188 Minutes of Special Meeting of University Senate, April 27, 1971 body of the Senate and as such, ought to be represented by members of the Senate.

Professor Adams presented a substitute motion that the rule in the University Senate Rules which states". . Persons eligible for membership in the Senate but not currently members may be made eligible for election to the Council by a nominating petition signed by fifteen (15) members of the Senate and filed with the secretary prior to October 1. . . ." be removed.

Mr. Hopson refused to accept this substitute motion to his motion.

The Senate then defeated Mr. Hopson's amendment to the codification.

Professor Adams presented an amendment to the original motion to delete the following sentence from Section C. paragraph 1, subparagraph (a), page 6, of The Rules of the University Senate:

Persons eligible for membership in the Senate but not currently members may be made eligible for election to the Council by a nominating petition signed by fifteen (15) members of the Senate and filed with the secretary prior to October 1.

The Senate approved this amendment.

The Senators then approved the codification of the Tripartite Report, as amended, for inclusion in the <u>Rules of the University Senate</u>. The codification, as amended, as it will appear in the <u>Rules of the University Senate</u>, reads as follows:

I. THE UNIVERSITY SENATE

A. Authority

The Rules of the University Senate describe the composition of the Senate and procedures for the conduct of its functions as authorized by the Board of Trustees in the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky, Section IV, THE UNIVERSITY SENATE (University System), May 5, 1970, and as amended subsequent to that date. It further describes academic policies for the University and procedures for their implementation. These rules may be amended by the University Senate.

B. <u>Composition and Functions of the Senate</u> 1. Composition -- As specified in the Governing

Regulations, Section IV, the University Senate is composed of elected and ex officio members.

a. Elected Membership

(1) Faculty -- The elected faculty membership shall consist of and represent proportionately the members of the full-time teaching and/or research faculty with the rank of assistant professor or higher in the various colleges and the University Libraries, so that the total elected membership shall not exceed 160.

An administrative title below that of dean shall not automatically make the holder ineligible.

(a) Eligibility -- At the time of the election to the Senate, the chief administrative officer of each specified academic unit shall be responsible for submitting a list of eligible faculty to the secretary of the Senate for certification and determination of the number to be elected. The Rules Committee shall be responsible for certification of eligibility. Eligibility shall be determined as of the time of conduction of the election.

(b) Election -- The faculty of the academic units represented in the Senate shall determine whether their representatives shall be elected at large or apportioned among their sub-units. The elections shall be conducted during the second semester by the secretary of the Senate with those elected assuming office at the September meeting of the Senate. The nomination and election of representatives shall be by letter ballot. Twice as many members of the faculty as there are places to be filled, plus ties for the last position, shall be nominated and, their willingness to serve having been ascertained, shall be voted on for membership in the Senate.

(c) Terms; Vacancies -- As specified in the Governing Regulations, each elected faculty member shall serve for a term of three years and shall be eligible for re-election for a second consecutive term, but ineligible for further re-election until one year has elapsed. If a member of the Senate should at any time during his term become ineligible to serve (e.g. by reason of assuming an administrative title of dean or above, resignation, official leave which precludes attendance, or failure to attend Senate meetings), a vacancy shall be declared by the administrative head of the group represented, and that member of the eligible faculty who at the last election received the next highest number of votes shall serve for the duration of the elected member's ineligibility. The secretary of the Senate shall maintain attendance records and shall notify the administrative head of a unit when a representative of that unit has been absent without explanation from three meetings of the Senate during any one academic year.

Members of the Senate Council shall be voting members of the Senate until the end of their terms. They will not be counted as part of the quota for the academic unit that they have represented nor of the maximum membership of

(2) Student -- The elected student membership shall consist of and represent the members of the full-time student body in the various colleges of the University System and the Student Body President. Each college, and the Graduate School, shall be allotted one student representative. Students with no declared major shall be represented through the College of Arts and Sciences. (a) Eligibility -- Each elected student member shall be a junior, senior, graduate or professional student at the time office is assumed, and shall not be on either academic or disciplinary probation. (b) Election -- The election shall be conducted during the second semester by the Student Government under procedures approved by the Senate Council. (c) Terms; Vacancies -- As specified in the Governing Regulations, each elected student member shall serve for a term of one year and shall be eligible for re-election as long as he remains a full-time undergraduate, graduate, or professional student in the University System. If a student member should at any time become ineligible to serve (e.g. by relinquishing his position as a full-time student in the college which he represents, being placed on academic or disciplinary probation, or violating the Senate attendance regulations), the administrative head of the college represented shall declare a vacancy and designate the eligible member from that student body who at the last election received the next highest vote to serve for the duration of the elected student's ineligibility. The secretary of the Senate shall maintain attendance records and shall notify the administrative head of the college represented when the representative of that college has been absent without explanation from three meetings of the Senate during the academic year. Ex Officio Membership (1) Voting -- The ex officio voting membership shall include the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for the Medical Center, Vice President-Community College System, Dean of the Graduate School and Coordinator of Research, Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Deans of the Colleges and the Director of Libraries. (2) Non-Voting -- The ex officio non-voting membership shall include the President, all other Vice Presidents, Dean of Admissions and Registrar, Dean of University Extension, Dean of Students, Professor of Military Science, Professor of Aerospace Science the faculty members of the Board of Trustees and the Academic Ombudsman and the chairmen of the several

standing University Senate Committees including Senate advisory committees, if not already elected members of the Senate. Other ex officio members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. Ex officio non-voting members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

Meetings -- The Senate shall hold regular meetings on the second Monday of each month during the academic year except that when the second Monday is during a period when classes are not in session, the Senate Council may decide to eliminate the regular meeting for that month or to call it upon another date. Special meetings shall be held after adequate notice by the secretary of the Senate, on the call of the President, the Senate Council or on the written request of ten (10) elected members. The Senate may adjourn any regular or special meeting to any date that it may set for such adjournment. Seventy-five (75) voting members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. There shall be no voting by proxy. Except where otherwise provided in these Rules, Roberts Rules of Order shall prevail.

Any member of the administrative, instructional or research staff may attend a meeting of the Senate as a visitor and may request the privilege of the floor.

Senate meetings shall be open to the press, except that at any meeting the Senate may declare itself in executive session by a majority vote of the Senators present and thereby exclude all visitors not explicitly designated for attendance by the presiding officer or by

a majority vote of the Senators present.

The Senate Council or a sub-committee established by it shall prepare agenda for regular Senate meetings. These agenda plus all recommendations for Senate action shall be circulated to all members of the University faculty and to administrative offices that are concerned with academic affairs at least ten (10) days prior to Senate meetings. For special meetings, where the ten-day circulation period

is impractical, it shall be waived.

When a document embodying a major policy decision is to be considered by the University Senate, the Senate Council may, whenever feasible, first place the document on the agenda of a meeting "for discussion only" and on the agenda of a subsequent meeting of the Senate "for action". When a document is on the floor of the Senate for discussion only, amendments may be proposed and discussed but not passed. Discussion may be terminated by consent of the body or by postponing temporarily. In addition, amendments may be submitted in writing to the Senate Council by any two members of the Senate for distribution with the agenda of the meeting at which action is to be taken.

Whenever possible, amendments or motions relative to agenda items on the floor of the Senate for action should 3192 Minutes of Special Meeting of University Senate, April 27, 1971 be presented to the presiding officer in writing by the person(s) proposing said amendments or motions prior to the opening of the Senate meeting. Officers -- The following are the officers of the University Senate with descriptions of their functions: (1) Chairman: The President shall be chairman of the Senate and shall be the presiding officer except as he may delegate this function. (2) Secretary: The Dean of Admissions and Registrar shall serve as secretary. (3) Parliamentarian: A member of the voting University faculty, not necessarily a member of the Senate, appointed by the University Senate Council. (4) Sergeant at Arms: A member of the voting University faculty who is not a member of the Senate, appointed by the University Senate Council. Functions of Officers of the Senate: (1) Secretary a. To distribute notices of regular Senate meetings at least ten (10) days prior to meetings with agenda and recommendations for Senate action to the members of the Senate, to all other members of the University faculty and to administrative offices that are concerned with academic affairs, and of special meetings as directed. To keep minutes of the Senate meetings and to circulate the minutes as in item a. To maintain a record of additions to or modifications of the Senate Rules between periodic revisions and distribute copies of the revised Rules to members of the faculty at least annually. To prepare lists of faculty members eligible to vote for membership in the University Senate and in other elections from lists submitted by the chief administrative officers of the academic units represented in the Senate and certified by the Rules Committee. e. To conduct elections as directed by the Senate. f. To maintain an official roll of Senate members. To maintain attendance records of Senate meetings and to notify administrative heads of units when a representative has been absent without explanation from three meetings of the Senate during any one academic year and must be replaced. To maintain a file on the "Rules of the faculty and a descripton of its committee structure" (Governing Regulations, VII, A. 4) as submitted by the colleges.

- (2) <u>Parliamentarian</u>
 To advise the presiding officer on parliamentary procedures.
- (3) Sergeant at Arms

 To separate visitors from voting members of the Senate, control the presence of persons not authorized to attend Senate meetings and to carry out instructions of the Senate or its presiding officer during each meeting.
- 5. Functions of the Senate -- The Governing Regulations specify that the functions of the University Senate shall include the following:
 - (1) to determine the broad academic policies of the University and to make regulations to implement these policies;
 - (2) to approve all new academic programs, curricula and courses;
 - (3) to adopt policies for the University calendar and approve the annual calendar as prepared by the Dean of Admissions and Registrar;
 - (4) to recommend to the President on the establishment, alteration and abolition of educational units in the University;
 - (5) to advise the President or his designated officer on the planning of physical facilities and staff when these may affect the attainment of the educational objectives of the University;
 - (6) to advise the President or his designated officer through appropriate committees on criteria for appointments, promotions, reappointments and granting of tenure;
 - (7) to determine the conditions for admission and for degrees other than honorary degrees;
 - (8) to recommend to the President all candidates for degrees.

Beyond those listed above, the University Senate shall have no management or administrative function either in itself or through the instrumentality of its committees.

The Senate may perform its functions directly, through the Senate Council or through the regular or special committees of the Senate. It may also establish Senate advisory committees and may delegate any of its authority or responsibility to the Graduate School or the Colleges.

The minutes of the University Senate meetings shall be circulated to all members of the University faculty, University Senate and to administrative offices that are concerned with academic affairs by the secretary of the Senate.

C. Councils of the Senate

The University Senate delegates to its Councils and/or its Committees the largest degree of authority in handling recurring and routine matters in order that Senate meetings may be devoted largely to communication and consideration of major matters of educational policy.

1. University Senate Council -- The elected membership of the University Senate Council shall be composed of nine (9) faculty members elected by the faculty of the University Senate during the fall semester of the academic year in groups of three (3) to take office January 1 for terms of three years, and of two (2) student members elected by and from the newly elected student members of the Senate during the second semester to take office July 1 for terms of one year. Members shall serve until the expiration of their terms or until their successors are elected and qualify. Six (6) elected members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The faculty members of the Board of Trustees and the student member, if they are not elected members of the Council, shall serve as ex officio non-voting members of the Council.

a. Faculty Membership

(1) Eligibility for Membership — Any elected member of the Senate (or person appointed to replace an elected member) whose term of office has not expired at the time of the election shall be eligible for election to the Senate Council, except that no more than three of the elected members of the Council shall be from any one college. Council members are not eligible to succeed themselves until a lapse of one year from the expiration of their terms, except that appointed members who have served no more than one year, if otherwise eligible, may be eligible for election. The duration of the term of membership on the Council shall not be affected by the member's term on the Senate.

If at any time during the term of a member of the Council he should become ineligible for membership in the Senate, his position on the Council shall be declared vacant.

(2) Election -- The election of members to the

(2) Election -- The election of members to the Senate Council shall be conducted by mail under the supervision of the secretary of the Senate. On the first ballot, each Senate member shall vote for the number to be elected at that election from the roster of the eligible faculty members as certified by the secretary of the Senate upon the authority of the Rules Committee. Any member receiving a majority of the votes cast on the first ballot shall be declared elected. The remaining vacancies shall be filled by a vote on the names receiving the highest plurality of votes with the number of names remaining on the ballot being twice the numbers of vacancies to be filled. However, not more than twice the number of names from any one college as there are vacancies for that college shall remain on the ballot. Those receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be deemed elected and successive votes

expired term or for the duration of the ineligibility of the elected member. Student Membership

As soon as possible after the election of the student members of the Senate during the second semester, the President of the Student Government shall assemble these persons to elect from their own membership the student members of the Senate Council.

If at any time during the term of a student member of the Senate Council he should become ineligible for membership in the Senate, his position on the Council shall be declared vacant. The President of the Student Government shall then assemble the student members of the Senate to elect his successor.

Officers C.

The officers of the Senate Council shall consist of a chairman, a chairman-elect and a secretary and shall be elected by the Council at its first meeting in January. Their terms shall be for one year or until their replacements are elected. The chairman shall preside at Council meetings and shall be responsible for the operation of the Senate Council office. The chairman-elect shall assume the duties of the chairman in his absence, and shall succeed to the office of chairman at the next regular election, or at any time that office becomes vacant. The secretary shall keep the minutes of the Council meetings, and shall present Council recommendations to the University Senate for action.

d. Purposes and Functions The University Senate Council is charged with providing leadership to enable the Senate to perform effectively its primary role of formulating and implementing educational policies of the University as described in the Governing Regulations. The Senate Council is specifically charged with continuously reviewing the University's academic policies and may call to the attention of the appropriate administrative officer any need for compliance with the Rules of the University Senate.

In accordance herewith, the Senate Council shall serve as executive committee for the University Senate in fulfilling the following functions:

Study and report or recommend to the Senate on 1.

any matter of concern to the Senate.

Receive, consider and recommend action on Senate committee reports and on reports and recommendations from colleges. The Council may recommend approval or disapproval, or may present the matter to the Senate without recommendation.

3. Appoint the standing committees of the Senate, special committees that it finds to be essential for the performance of its functions and other committees as designated by the Senate.

4. Advise with the President on the appointment of the Senate advisory committees; advise with the President on the appointment of search committees for the appointment of deans of colleges.

5. Function, by means of a sub-committe, as a program committee of the Senate or appoint an independent body to serve this function.

6. Act for the Senate on all matters involving academic programs, degrees and curricula changes, subject to the requirements of reporting and the power of the Senate to reverse the Senate Council on these matters.

7. Act on other matters referred to it by the Senate with the responsibility and authority delegated to it by the Senate.

8. Act for the Senate in emergency situations, reporting such actions to the Senate at its next regular meeting.

In addition, the Senate Council will advise with the President on all matters relative to the welfare of the University which he might bring to it or which it might propose for consideration.

D. <u>Committees of the Senate</u> -- The University Senate shall have two types of committees: (1) standing committees responsible only to the Senate, appointed by the Senate Council; and (2) advisory committees, responsible in an advisory capacity to the President and/or other administrative officers or administrative Units and to the Senate for reporting upon issues that bear upon the functions of the Senate, making recommendations for action, and appointed by the President after consultation with the Senate Council.

Except for student members, appointments to the standing committees are for two-year terms, beginning July 1, the committee composition being such that one-half of the membership changes each year.

The Senate Council shall appoint student members to the standing committees and recommend to the President appointment of students to appropriate advisory committees of the Senate after consultation with Student Government and other appropriate student groups. Terms of office for student members shall be set by the Senate Council.

Appointments to fill committee vacancies shall be made in the same manner as appointments for regular terms. Membership on Senate committees shall continue until terms expire or successors are appointed. Each committee is responsible for an annual report which is presented to the Senate Council, circulated to the faculty for presentation to the Senate, with or without the recommendations of the Senate Council. Special reports may be requested by the Senate or the Senate Council.

On behalf of the Senate Council Professor Adams presented a recommendation that the Thomas Hunt Morgan School, a School in the College of Arts and Sciences, be reorganized and have jurisdiction over only the BIO courses and the Departments of Botany, Microbiology and Zoology. This recommendation had been circulated to the faculty under date of April 15, 1971.

Dr. Thomas Olshewsky presented an amendment to strike the words "and have jurisdiction over only the BIO courses and the Departments of Botany, Microbiology and Zoology." and to substitute the following, "and have jurisdiction over all undergraduate programs in liberal arts biology, and those graduate programs of instruction which lead to advanced degrees (M.S., Ph.D.) in Biology, Botany, Microbiology and Zoology." Dr. Olshewsky stated that this amendment came as a recommendation from the Arts and Sciences Council.

Following extensive discussions which resulted in the view that the majority of the faculty did not have background information of the reasons which prompted the introduction of the motion by the Senate Council and therefore did not feel qualified to cast a responsible vote, the Senate voted to table both the motion and the amendment.

On behalf of the Senate Council, Professor Adams presented a recommendation that the following resolution be approved by the University Senate. This resolution had been circulated to the faculty under date of April 21, 1971.

WHEREAS academic vacancies are scarce in many disciplines in ${\tt American}$ colleges and universities, and

WHEREAS there is a surplus of Ph. D.'s in many fields,

BE IT RESOLVED that University departments give every consideration to providing one year appointments for their graduating doctoral candidates who are unable to find appropriate positions in teaching or industry.

Following discussion which tended to discount evidence of any shortage of positions for Ph. D.'s in this area the Senate voted to defeat the resolution.

The Chairman reported that by virtue of the Board of Trustees having acted on the Tripartite Report it would have to be implemented immediately which would mean reducing the Senate elected faculty membership to 160 members. His interpretations of ways to reach the 160 membership were (1) to retain the largest vote getters in the recent election and delete those people who got the lowest number of votes (sending a letter of explanation to these latter persons); and (2) to delete the eight members in the Libraries. He pointed out that the old Rules provided that the Libraries be represented on the University Senate but that under the new Rules of the University

Senate and the Tripartite Report "The elected membership consists of and represents proportionately the members of the full-time teaching and/or research faculty with the rank of assistant professor or higher in the various colleges and the University Libraries.", and the Libraries did not meet this current criteria for eligibility.

Dr. Rovin reported that only one more meeting of the Senate is anticipated this academic year and that according to the enactment of the Board of Trustees the students will be seated as soon as the student senatorial election is completed which will probably mean they will be seated at the last anticipated meeting of the Senate on May 10th. He stated that the Senate needs to consider a means of seating these student senators in ensuing years and he hoped that a recommendation would be forthcoming at the May 10th meeting that student and faculty senators would take their seats simultaneously, but that, currently, this is not possible.

The change in the composition of the Undergraduate Council, which had been circulated to the faculty under date of April 6, 1971, is made a part of these minutes and will be implemented into the Rules of the University Senate immediately, since no objection was raised prior to or on the floor of this Senate meeting. This change occurs on page 9 of the current Rules of the University Senate (Revised October, 1970) and reads as follows:

"...Council members will serve three-year staggered terms expiring on December 30, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves until a lapse of one year, except that where they have served one year or less as a replacement, they shall be eligible to be elected. The Dean of Undergraduate Studies, with the advice and consent of the members of the Undergraduate Council, may appoint up to three (3) faculty members from undergraduate colleges according to the Rules of the University Senate for membership in the Undergraduate Council from areas not presently represented. In addition, there shall be two (2) student members, selected by a method adopted by the Undergraduate Council and endorsed by the Senate Council."

The Senate adjourned at 4:25 p.m.
