

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE
April 13, 1931

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, April 13, with President McVey presiding.

The following reports were made by the Chairman of the Library Committee, the Chairman of the Athletics Committee and the Chairman of the Accredited Relations Committee:

1. Library Committee

"This report covers the activities of the Committee during the period since Christmas last.

The Committee had at disposal a special appropriation of \$1000.00 for books for the Graduate School. Departments offering the Ph.D degree were requested to submit statements regarding specific needs. Upon basis of reports received, the sum was apportioned equally to the departments of Commerce, Physics, Mathematics and Chemistry.

The Committee received and acted upon the budget for the forthcoming year. A greatly increased budget was recommended. This budget includes all funds for the maintenance and operation of the library. In the apportionment of the department fund, the Committee considered the question whether departments in the past had wholly or partially used apportioned funds.

The Committee received a statement from the Social Science group of the University faculties urging that a specialist in the field be added to the Library staff who should take immediate and vigorous steps to locate and, in so far as possible, add to the library material of research value to the Social Science group. The Committee offered recommendations to the President. The Committee recommended that a rental collection of more popular books be installed in the new library.

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The Committee took under advisement the assignment of seminar rooms and offices on the third floor of the new library building.

The library of the Department of Art was assigned the south-east room. It will be in charge of a librarian, within the Department of Art.

The Library Committee has taken the position that the new library building should house the University library, and that as a general policy, department libraries should be in the library building.

The Committee has recommended and taken position that no books ^{be} removed from the general library and placed in seminar rooms as permanent collections."

2. Athletic Committee:

"The Athletic Council differs from other Senate committees in that the membership is not limited to faculty members; the Council consists of six faculty members, three business men and two student members. The committee differs also from other Senate committees in that the treasurer is bonded and in that a separate audit is made by public accountants in addition to that made by the Senate Auditing Committee. The audit by Kroehl & Co. for the past year was made a part of the minutes of the last meeting of the Board of Trustees. This committee differs from other committees also in the fact that it is probably subject to more outside criticism than other Senate committees.

The Council did a business last year of about \$150,000. The largest receipts were from football (\$90,000.). The receipts from student fees were \$25,000 which came within \$4000 of paying the salaries of coaches. Basketball about breaks even. All other sports are financed from football profits (about \$25,000.).

The Council last year expended \$14,000 on permanent improvements. This included \$10,000 for seats, \$400 for press box, and \$3,000 for fence, gates, walks and upkeep of grounds. \$2,000 was paid on the basketball building indebtedness.

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The Council has paid \$16,500 for a section of the stadium for which it obligated itself. Of the total cost of the stadium (\$116,000) \$55,000 is still unpaid and the Council will probably have to make up this deficit.

The Council has paid \$12,000 on the basketball building and still owes \$8,000 on its quota (\$20,000) for this building the total cost of which was \$113,600.

The Council received \$4.50 from each student fee which amounts to about thirty-two cents per game. For Southern Conference games we are required to settle on a basis of fifty cents per student ticket which nets us about seven cents a game per student.

In former years the Council has made some profit on the High School basketball but the rule now in effect requires that we keep all teams here during the entire tournament so that this year we will make no profit.

The Council faces serious problems in matters of schedules, broadcasting, complimentary tickets, and illegal sale of student tickets. The schedule for next year will not yield as much money as did last year's schedule but should be greater for the season of 1932."

3. Accredited Relations

"This committee in the last ten or more years has been active in establishing and applying standards for junior colleges and four-year colleges in Kentucky. It has also acted as advisory committee for the Registrar in evaluating credits gained in institutions now defunct, and in the handling of puzzling cases of admission,

When the committee started to work the Southern Association had accepted for membership a few of the Kentucky four-year colleges. The Association of Kentucky Colleges, in its role of a standardizing body included most of the older institutions of the state. But it was absolutely essential that the University be able to speak with accuracy concerning the standing of all the higher institutions of the State, for the administration of our own entrance and advanced standing requirements and to give to the State Department of Education reliable information upon the basis of which teacher's certificates could be issued,

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and to answer justly and intelligently inquiries from other states as to the various colleges.

The committee drew up, first standards for four-year colleges and later, standards for junior colleges. Personal visits were made each year to the colleges already accredited but not meeting the standards fully, and to all colleges applying for University rating. These visits have been very helpful to the University and to the colleges. We have always taken an attitude toward these weaker schools, of friendliness and a desire to help. We have received from them many expressions of appreciation, and we are frequently asked for our advice in matters affecting their development. We believe that much of the present feeling of good will for the University on the part of the colleges of the State is due to the work of this committee.

In the past few years we have undertaken to inspect and rate the negro colleges of the State. Just recently we have been of real service in helping to put the State Industrial College at Frankfort upon the way toward becoming one of the strongest negro colleges of the country. In recent years also we have established standards for Colleges of Music and Colleges for the Training of Teachers of Commercial Subjects. We have worked out bases upon which work from such institutions as the Louisville Normal School and the Baptist Theological Seminary may be transferred.

Our accredited lists have grown so that we now recognize in the State fifteen A-grade four-year colleges and one B-grade four-year college for white students; and one A grade four-year college for negroes. In the junior college field we accredit thirteen A-grade colleges for whites, three B-grade; while in the field of negro education we recognize one A-grade junior college and one B-grade.

In its efforts to stimulate the further development of the colleges of the State, the committee announced last year that after 1932 only colleges that are members of the Southern Association would be given A-rating by us. This has caused a renewed effort on the part of colleges not now members of that association. This year we asked the University Bureau of School Service to make a thorough survey of the junior colleges of the State. This work under the direction of Professor Chamberlin and participated in by a number of graduate students, has been carried out in a very creditable and satisfactory way and will form the basis for our rating of the junior colleges for next year.

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The Senate approved the following recommendation of the Graduate Committee, relative to the organization of a Graduate Council:

"That the University Senate create a Graduate Council to take the place of the present Graduate Committee and that the members of the Council be as follows:

The President of the University, the Registrar of the University, the Dean of the Graduate School and each member of the University Senate during any year in which such member teaches a course numbered 200 or above."

The following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

1. A maximum of 4 credits in Glee Club and of 4 credits in Orchestra may be offered to count toward the A. B. or B. S. degree. Not more than 16 credits in Applied Music may be offered to count toward the A. B. or B. S. degree.

2. Credits in Applied Physical Education may not be offered to count toward the A. B. or B. S. degree.

A recommendation that credit for Psychology 2a be withheld until psychology 2b has been completed was not approved.
