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Issel, Dickey named in allegation in connection with recruit

Dan Issel, Kentucky's all-time leading basketball scorer, says he talked with a recruit who was visiting his farm but only after they met accidentally, according to a published report yesterday.

The Lexington Herald-Leader said the contact between Issel, who scored 2,138 points for the Wildcats, and Matt Bullard, a recruit who eventually signed with Iowa, came while the player was looking to transfer from Colorado.

Bullard was accompanied by assistant coach James Dickey, the newspaper said.

Issel said he was told by Dickey that "the University could bring a recruit through my farm as long as they didn't call and make any kind of appointment for me to talk to the kid."

Issel said several recruits had visited the farm without ever meeting him.

"I'd never do anything knowingly to hurt UK," he said.

Issel, now an assistant to the president of the Denver Nuggets, acknowledged talk-

ing to the 6-foot-10 Bullard, but said he inadvertently ran into the player and Dickey.

The contact was one of the additional 17 allegations the NCAA levied last week against the school's basketball program. It marks the first time a UK assistant other than Dwane Casey has been publicly linked to the NCAA investigation.

Dickey was the one assistant Eddie Sutton brought with him to Kentucky when he left Arkansas in 1985.

The NCAA's director of enforcement,

David Berst, said Tuesday that the propriety of such a contact between a booster and a recruit did not center on whether it was planned.

"Such contact cannot exceed an exchange of greetings," he said. "In other words, if there's a recruiting conversation, it's improper."

Issel said he told the NCAA in a three-minute telephone conversation this summer that he remembered talking with Bullard and one other recruit who was touring his farm on another occasion.

"Obviously, if I see a recruit, I'd tell him Kentucky is where he ought to go to school," Issel said. "... All I know is what Coach Dickey told me. As long as nothing was prearranged or an appointment was made, he could bring a recruit to the farm."

He and Dickey had long before agreed that recruits could be brought to Courtland Farm, located in Versailles, Issel said. NCAA rules permit such tours as long as

Students hit by car on campus

Two UK students were hit by a car Tuesday afternoon while walking along South Limestone Street. Neither student was seriously injured.

Robert Soroky, an architecture student, was taken to A.B. Chandler Medical Center Tuesday, after injuring his leg. He was listed in satisfactory condition last night.

David Florence also was struck by the car. He was examined at the Medical Center, but was not admitted.

Soroky's roommate, Chris Dianas, said that Soroky was "doing fine and should be out in about a week."

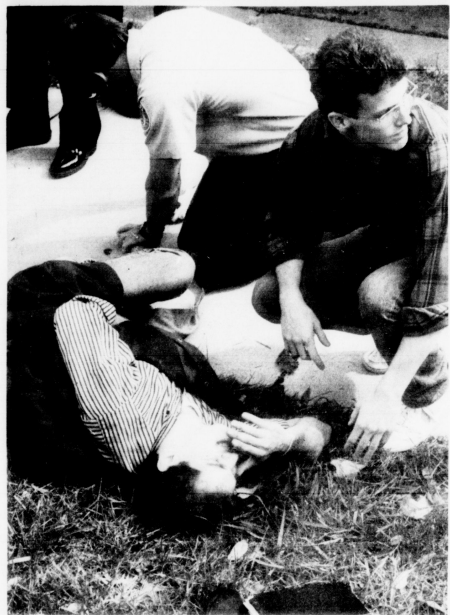
Kevin Dean, 18, of Lexington was the driver of the car. He was headed north on Limestone when he apparently blacked out. He swerved across three lanes and ran up on the sidewalk. He then hit a no parking sign before hitting Soroky and Florence and going back onto the road.

When he finally stopped the car, he was perpendicular to the curve in front of Alalfa's restaurant, police reports said.

Dean could not be reached for comment.

Florence said that the car hit both him and Soroky, and he was thrown forward.

"I was so petrified ... I looked up and saw a car zooming right at us," he said. "We didn't have time to react. As soon as I hit (the ground), I was right back up and went running to Bob."

SGA urges UK handicapped accessibility

The Student Government Association passed a proposal last night that calls for the University to establish a campuswide handicap accessibility policy.

The resolution calls for a policy that would exceed state and federal regulations, making mandatory the installation of automatic handicap entrances in any facility constructed after January 1, 1988.

Handicap accessibility has become an issue at UK since a new building at the Lexington Community College was constructed without automatic doors.

The University later installed the automatic doors.

Michael Kuder, who is in charge of handicap concerns, and Jake Karnes, of handicap services, put together an outline of a

new handicap policy, said SGA president James Rose.

The proposal also calls for placing building room numbers lower on doors and braille lettering on door frames. In addition, SGA's proposal requests that funds be allocated yearly to update buildings.

The proposal also calls for the formation of a committee composed of handicapped students to meet with architects to discuss their concerns, Rose said.

In other business:

- A bill was passed allocating \$115 to survey UK students about the need for a student federal credit union. The credit union would provide savings accounts and loans to student members.

- A bill, proposed by Senators-at-Large Kennedy James and Pat Hart, was passed to send two members of SGA to the regional conference of the National Association

for Campus Activities on Oct. 27-30, in Louisville.

Forty to 50 schools from Ohio, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, West Virginia, Michigan, and Tennessee will be attending, James said.

- A bill was passed allocating \$16,800 for 200 posters to promote voting in America. They are being made for the "Vote America Campaign" to be held at UK Oct. 31-Nov. 7.

- SGA is sponsoring a debate between the UK debate team and a debate team from the Soviet Union on Tuesday in the Student Center Ball Room.

- SGA is sponsoring an AIDS awareness poster contest. The poster must be 15 by 15 inches in two colors. Entries must be submitted to 120 Student Center by Oct. 28. A \$50 cash award will be given to the winner.

Sutton says he's misquoted in magazine

UK basketball coach Eddie Sutton said in a statement released last night that he is misquoted in this week's edition of *Sports Illustrated*.

"Although I have not seen this week's issue of *Sports Illustrated* I apparently have been misquoted in a story about our basketball program," Sutton said.

According to the statement, the article, which will be on sale today, implies that Sutton told a reporter that allegations against the UK program concerning \$1,000 found in a package sent to the father of UK recruit Chris Mills was a setup.

It further implies that Sutton said the setup was connected to officials from the

University of Nevada-Las Vegas and the University of California-Los Angeles.

UK Sports Information Director Chris Cameron said the interview with *Sports Illustrated* writer Bruce Selcraig took place last Thursday at a pork chop dinner held by the basketball program for the media.

"What I told the reporter was that the Emery incident was very bizarre and that one of the theories that has been discussed is that the incident is a setup," Sutton said.

"My intent was never to implicate the coaching staff of UNLV or UCLA or to reflect negatively upon their programs or fans," he said.

Cameron said that Sutton found out about the article through the media last night. The statement said that Sutton

called the coaches from both schools and told them of the statement released.

"I called Jerry Tankanian with whom I have been friends for many years and also Jim Harrick at UCLA to explain that I had been misquoted," Sutton said. "Both accepted my explanations."

The article apparently refers to the first of 18 NCAA allegations against the UK basketball program.

The allegation, which was released in July, says that a package sent by UK assistant basketball coach Dwane Casey to Claud Mills contained 20 \$50 bills.

The package, which contained a video cassette tape, popped open in transit, according to Emery Worldwide Overnight employees.

Alcohol's effect on babies topic of address today

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, a condition found in many children of mothers who drink alcohol during pregnancy, will be the subject of a presentation given by two UK medical students today.

Scott Black and Robert Bratton, both in their third year of medical school, will speak at noon in room 263 of the Chandler Medical Center as part of Alcohol Awareness Week.

Although most children of alcoholic mothers have always suffered from various disorders, it wasn't until the early 1970s that doctors detected specific characteristics they could classify as Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, or FAS.

Three main sets of characteristics are common to children with Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, according to Black. One of these is the malformation of their faces.

They typically are born with small heads, flattened cheekbones, and a flattened nose bridge. The philtrum, the "dent" between the upper lip and the nose, often is missing, and their eyelids droop, giving them a sleepy appearance.

"They have a real characteristic appearance," Black said. "They have that particular face you can picture in your head."

Before the symptoms were classified together, no one had noticed there was a particular pattern to these facial features, according to Dr. Bryan Hall, a professor of pediatrics at the Chandler Medical Center.

But now, he said, a doctor can recognize that pattern in a child and right away know that the mother drank during her pregnancy.

In addition to the facial disfigurements, FAS children suffer nervous system malfunctions ranging from mild cases of irritability or hyperactivity to more severe cases of mental retardation.

Hall said FAS probably ranks in most hospitals' top five causes of mental retardation, and is one of the few preventable causes of retardation.

In case studies reported in a medical journal in 1985, mildly handicapped chil-

dren with FAS had IQ scores in the borderline to dullness range, and showed academic performances below their grade levels. More seriously handicapped children were mildly to moderately retarded and could barely read or write, if at all.

Although many of the patients had relatively normal outgoing personalities, many showed short attention spans, hyperactivity, especially at a young age, and immaturity.

The third main trait seen in FAS is small body size at birth in both size and weight. The case studies showed that as they grow older, their weight may come closer to normal, although the alcohol "has some lasting effect on their growth."

Hall said that alcohol consumption during the first two months of pregnancy is particularly harmful, since the baby's organs are being formed in that period. If there are adverse results on the child's development at that time, even if the mother then stops drinking, the effects are permanent.

After birth, as FAS children grow, new problems may begin to show, Black said, including ear infections or dental problems. Furthermore, the children often suffer from heart defects, such as membranes with holes, and dislocated or malpositioned joints.

Black said the full FAS has never been shown in any mother that doesn't drink excessively. More mild forms of the condition, known collectively as Fetal Alcohol Effects, are classified as any adverse effects that can be related to the mother's drinking, whether it be excessive or not.

These lesser effects, such as hyperactivity, "can be shown in women who just socially drink (during pregnancy)," Black said.

Both Black and Hall emphasized that the effects of the mother's drinking varies among different people, probably due to genetic differences. But because of the uncertainty over the significance of the amount of alcohol consumed, the U.S. Surgeon General and the American Medical Association have recommended that mothers not drink any alcohol during pregnancy.

Effects of drinking, driving seminar topic

The legal and personal effects of drinking and driving were stressed by a variety of speakers in last night's Alcohol Awareness Week Program on Alcohol and the Law.

The program, co-sponsored by the Student Government Association Committee on Alcohol Responsibility and Education (CARE), and the Lexington Fayette Urban County Police, featured a police officer, an attorney, a victim of an alcohol-related accident, and a member of Alcoholics Anonymous.

It also featured a breathalyzer demonstration to illustrate how quickly alcohol can affect the drinker.

The program started with SGA Vice President Leah McCain's consumption of several beers in order for County Police Officer Mitchell Smith to show the use of the breathalyzer test.

After almost two beers McCain had a blood alcohol content of .05, and after almost four beers the test result was .09.

To be considered legally intoxicated, a person's blood alcohol content must be at least .10.

CARE's co-chairman Mark Rucker said that the purpose of McCain's consumption was not merely to watch a fellow student drink.

"The point we want to get across is that it only takes three to four drinks to be legally drunk," Rucker said.

Smith said that the frequency of Driving Under the Influence in Lexington is declining because of the Traffic Alcohol Program and society's growing negative perception of drinking and driving.

"Only recently have we begun to decide that this behavior is not only illegal but socially unacceptable," he said.

Employee says that company did not comply with laws

CINCINNATI — The U.S. Department of Energy did not always require the former operator of the Fernald uranium-processing plant to comply with environmental laws, according to a department employee who worked at the plant.

Malcolm Theisen, a career Energy Department employee who worked at the Cincinnati-area defense plant from 1981 to 1985, said in an affidavit filed in U.S. District Court that the department did not always require National Lead of Ohio Inc. to comply with environmental laws. Theisen said the Energy Department "on occasion instructed NLO to continue operations, despite the fact that violations of these standards might occur."

The 37-year-old Feed Materials Production Center at Fernald processes uranium for the government's production elsewhere of nuclear weapons. The plant and its operators have been heavily criticized since the Energy Department admitted in January 1985 that 200,000 pounds of radioactive uranium oxide dust had been emitted into the atmosphere from the plant during the previous three decades, including 3,000 pounds between 1980 and 1985.

The state of Ohio has a pending lawsuit in U.S. District Court against the Energy Department al-

leging that the plant has polluted the air and water in its environment. Energy Department officials issued a statement Tuesday acknowledging past problems at the plant, but repeating the department's commitment to modernize the facility and clean up radioactive wastes on its 1,650-acre site 18 miles northwest of Cincinnati at the Fernald community.

Gov. Richard Celeste sent a letter Tuesday to President Reagan urging him to close the plant until steps are taken to ensure the safety of plant workers and the area's residents.

Theisen made his statements in an affidavit filed in connection with a \$300 million class-action lawsuit filed on behalf of an estimated 14,000 people living and working within five miles of the Fernald plant. The U.S. District Court lawsuit, which awaits trial, alleges that the plant has polluted the environment with radioactive materials that have posed a health threat, emotional distress and lowered property values for neighbors.

Ronald Cochran, the Energy Department's director of nuclear materials production in Washington, sent a 1983 letter to a concerned citizen, J. Clark Pontius of Oxford, assuring him that environmental protection was a high priority even as the department was refusing to provide NLO with

adequate pollution-control funds, said Stanley Chesley, lawyer for the plant neighbors.

Chesley sent a copy of Cochran's 1983 letter Tuesday to Rep. Thomas Luken, D-Ohio, a persistent critic of the plant's operations. Luken's district includes the plant.

H. Doran Fletcher, an Energy Department official with responsibility for the plant, said in another affidavit filed with the lawsuit that NLO officials often said they would be "incapable of complying with pending federal regulatory standards governing the emission of chemical and radiological wastes."

Pentagon may halt sale of commissary tobacco

WASHINGTON — Despite strong objections by congressional leaders, the Pentagon is considering a plan to stop the sale of tobacco products in military commissaries and to raise the prices of cigarettes and alcohol sold in post exchanges.

According to defense sources, who asked not to be named, Deputy Defense Secretary William H. Taft IV is receptive to the idea and has asked his staff to draft a directive that would implement the changes on Jan. 1.

Taft would normally be the top Pentagon official to deal with such matters. But several congressmen have now asked Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci to intervene, calling the proposal "ill advised and hastily conceived."

"This is a very dangerous precedent for commissary and exchange operation, and it tampers with a very important fringe benefit for servicemen," Rep. Marvin Leath, D-Texas, said in an interview.

"It would really penalize the people assigned overseas."

Leath, the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee's morale, welfare and recreation panel, said the two Democrats and two Republicans who serve on that

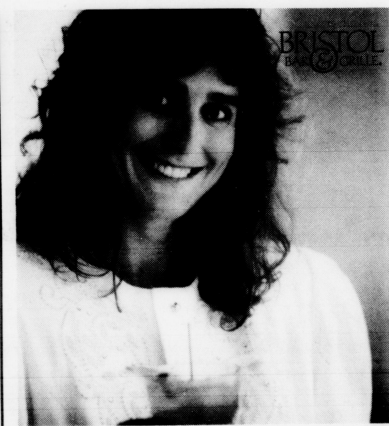
Bullard's eligibility at Iowa would not be affected by the UK allegations, Bersi said.

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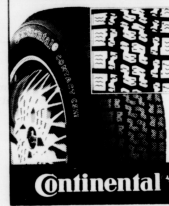

0-6 Tennessee the underdog against lowly Memphis St.

Already halfway through the football season, the Southeastern Conference has produced its share of powerhouse teams, upstart hopefuls and certified duds.

The biggest dud of all has to be Tennessee, which is now 0-6 after an emotional 28-20 loss to Alabama last week.

UT will find itself in another uphill battle this Saturday as the upstart Memphis State Tigers (who upset Florida) get a shot at the Volunteers.

Tennessee's main problem may be underestimating the Tigers — but UT coach Johnny Majors says that absolutely cannot happen.

"With the position we're in we can't afford to take any team for granted," he said. "Memphis will be very emotional and confident when they take the field against us on Saturday."

Sixteenth-ranked Louisiana State, which rebounded from losses to Ohio State and Florida with a win over UK last week, were hoping to find an easy team for their Homecoming Saturday.

But Mike Archer's Bayou Bengals can't afford to look past Ole Miss if they want to stay in the SEC race. The Rebels were rude guests at Alabama's Homecoming two weeks ago, upsetting the Tide 22-12.

Archer said his offense has suffered a confidence lapse. "Our offense has definitely been set back some, but we feel that we'll play better on Saturday," said Archer.



"Injuries to our fullbacks have severely hurt our productivity, and the replacements we've put in are suffering major breakdowns in execution."

Florida joins the Tigers on the All-hand aid team this week, but should regroup thanks to an open dates.

Hall isn't crying over spilled milk after his team lost 24-9 to Vanderbilt, and sees their next opponent, Auburn, as another tough challenge to hurdle over.

"Auburn is the most dominant defensive team in the league, so we'll need to start preparing our offensive schemes for them now," said Hall. "One thing we'll need to have happen during the off week is to get our key people healthy and to stop committing flagrant fouls that are coming at inopportune times."

Vanderbilt, picked as the dark-horse team in the SEC this year, showed why Saturday in Music City by dismantling Florida in front of a sellout crowd and national television audience.

With Eric Jones operating the wishbone to perfection and Brad Cunningham making life tough for Gator runners, Vandy may have come a step closer in becoming a part of the upper echelon of the league.

The win was music to Coach Watson Brown's ears. "I'm really proud of the effort we showed," he said. "I felt that we finally played up to our capability."

The road doesn't get any easier as the invading Bulldogs of Georgia, coached by Vince Dooley, ramble on into Lexington for a nationally televised game Saturday in the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium.

Georgia, which leads the league in wins and possesses a potent rushing attack, is not about to look back.

"Kentucky will be a good test for us as they are the best defensive team we will have played to date," said Dooley. "I'm puzzled with all the close losses. Jerry's team has had, because they're certainly not a 2-4 team."

Cats can't afford to lose to Bulldogs

The UK volleyball team will face an important match en route to their primary goal of repeating as Southeastern Conference champs as they host Mississippi State tonight in Memorial Coliseum.

"One of our first goals this season was to repeat as SEC champion, which no one has done in the last five years," coach Kathy DeBoer said.

"If we would lose an SEC match, it would make that much tougher. That makes this match immediately important and part of our primary scheme."

"It's a conference game, and we want to win our conference," freshman Stephanie Green said. "We are definitely going to come out and play hard."

The ninth-ranked Wildcats, who are 3-0 in the SEC and 17-3 on the season, will not underestimate the Bulldogs, whose conference losses to unbeat conference foes LSU and Florida have dropped them into a tie for last with a 0-2 conference record.

"They've lost a couple of SEC matches so far," DeBoer said. "I think it makes them dangerous. Underdogs play harder at that type of thing. I don't think that they're a team we can take lightly."

UK definitely will face a more improved Bulldog team, which finished the 1987 season 12-25, than they did last year.

Mississippi State, who is coming in with a six-match winning streak and a first-place finish in the Mississippi State Invitational, currently stand at 14-11.

"I know that they would be better this year," DeBoer said. "They

started three or four freshmen last year with a new first year coach."

A feisty Mississippi State team will be led by sophomore Theresa D'Antoni who has 195 kills and 77 blocks and junior Emily Gunn, who was named to the All-Tournament team in the Mississippi Invitational and has 194 kills.

Freshman Shaina Brown leads the Bulldogs in hitting efficiency with a .271.

"Traditionally, they're not a real big team size wise, but just a scrappy type of defense team. They don't let you put the ball down easily," DeBoer said.

UK realizes that the scrappy Bulldogs will be really tough as they take the court at 7 p.m.

"I think that this team has realized that every body has improved, and we have to be ready to compete every time we play," DeBoer said. "We've been tripped up a couple times. We realize that every body who comes in is ready to beat us."

Rogerson earns LPGA card

Rogerson earned the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour card on Friday's fourth and final round of qualifying at the Sweetwater Country Club in Sugarland.

Combs changes story about meeting with basketball player

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The publisher of a UK booster magazine has changed his story regarding a meeting with Columbus Wehrle basketball player Lawrence Funderburke.

Oscar Combs, publisher of The Cats' Pause, was named by the NCAA in one of 17 allegations involving illegal recruiting at Kentucky. Combs was quoted by The Associated Press as saying he was introduced to Funderburke by Kentucky graduate Bill Chupil when

Funderburke, a 6-foot-8 senior at Columbus Wehrle, was "an eighth- or ninth-grader."

In its editions today, The Columbus Dispatch reported that a high school teammate of Funderburke said he visited Kentucky with Fun-

derburke "a year (or) year and a half ago."

Combs told The Dispatch he had been contacted by Chupil on Tuesday and that Chupil told Combs that it was not Funderburke who he met.

"Chupil said this morning 'Fun-

derburke wasn't with him then."

Combs said. "All I remember is Bill saying at the time that this kid who was with him was going to be a great player someday. I remember in my mind thinking that was Funderburke, but Bill said that wasn't him."

Combs said if he had seen Funderburke last week, it would be an interview him for a feature in Combs' did interview Funderburke and if Chupil, who now lives in Columbus, was acting on behalf of the Kentucky basketball program, it would be a violation of NCAA regulations.

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UK should develop a class devoted to the study of peace

Articles in the newspaper this week reported the Israeli army's brutality toward Palestinians along the Gaza Strip, the likely increase of acquisition of chemical weapons around the world, and the estimated death of 260,000 refugees in Sudan this year due to Civil War.

But many people probably skipped over those stories. It's pretty easy to take for granted all the violence in the world these days.

But some UK students and Lexington residents want to make people more aware of the alternatives to violence and the options available to achieve peace.

More than 500 people have signed a petition urging the development of a course at UK in peace studies. The petition asks for a class that "would explore the use of non-violent force — its history, methods, and practitioners — and the promotion of peace."

Although a related course, called "Peace and World Order," was taught last year as part of the honors program, currently UK offers no class in peace studies.

But UK should have such a class. After all, the history and effectiveness of peace movements can be taught just as easily as the history and results of wars. And they certainly are as important.

It may sound idealistic, but the study of peace involves many important concepts and historical lessons, from the formation and work of the United Nations to the teachings and effectiveness of Mahatma Gandhi. Students can learn about options toward conflict resolution and conditions that will prevent war.

Granted, many of these topics are touched upon in various classes in history, political science, sociology and the like. But a comprehensive class incorporating all those ideas would enhance their importance and relevancy to apply to today's world.

Studies in peace is not a radical idea. More than 200 universities in the United States offer such courses, and about 70 have degree programs. UK should join them.

However, supporters of this petition want the class to be available for the next fall semester. To do this, they would have to find a professor and outline the course within the next few months.

But they shouldn't rush the process just for the sake of having a peace class in the schedule books. Instead, they should research other schools' programs and classes for their advantages and disadvantages.

They should get input from professors and take their time figuring out how to incorporate the various disciplines into a unified peace class.

A course in peace studies won't stop all the violence in our world, but at least it can make people aware of the horrible futility of war and prompt them to consider ways to avoid it. And that's enough to make the class worthwhile.

Will it take marches to change attitudes?

There is today a great obstacle in the road to enlightenment and open-mindedness.

As has been addressed by several letters in the Kentucky Kernel, many people perceive gays as a threat to them. Whether it takes the form of fear of AIDS, itself is a great problem, but at its source lies Africans and Haitians, not gays, or just a nebulous fear of the unknown, resentment toward someone merely because of his/her sexual preference does everyone a great disservice.

Too many so-called open-minded people who have cast away their fear of blacks and Jews still see sexual preference as a just cause for discrimination.

Often they justify their prejudice by perceiving homosexuality as a disease or a "phase" and not as inherent to the person as is race or religion.

To think that someone can, merely by proclaiming it so, change his/her sexual preference is as absurd as thinking that someone could by proclamation change their race or religion.

A few days ago, I was sitting in the lobby of my building studying when someone came up to me and asked if I would march for gay rights.

I replied, "Yes, they have as much right to be free from discrimination as anyone else."

The reply was typical. "I think that we should kill all these f---in' gays. I don't wanna get AIDS by going into the bathroom!"

I then launched into a discourse on discrimination, delving into taboo subjects such as anal intercourse, racial prejudice and the Ku Klux Klan, to no avail. I fear that more people would tend to look at the subject with his point of view than mine.

Society should be as concerned about gay rights as it is concerned about women's rights, blacks rights or religious

rights. No one is so different that they should be excluded from enjoying the basic human rights that every other citizen of this country enjoys.

Just as I would be outraged if someone expressed an opinion that he wanted to kill all Jews because they don't get AIDS as much as anyone else, we should all be outraged if someone wants to kill off all gay people for fear of "catching AIDS by going to the bathroom."

The truth is that you cannot catch AIDS except via intimate contact or blood transfusion (the latter having decreased to virtually nil).

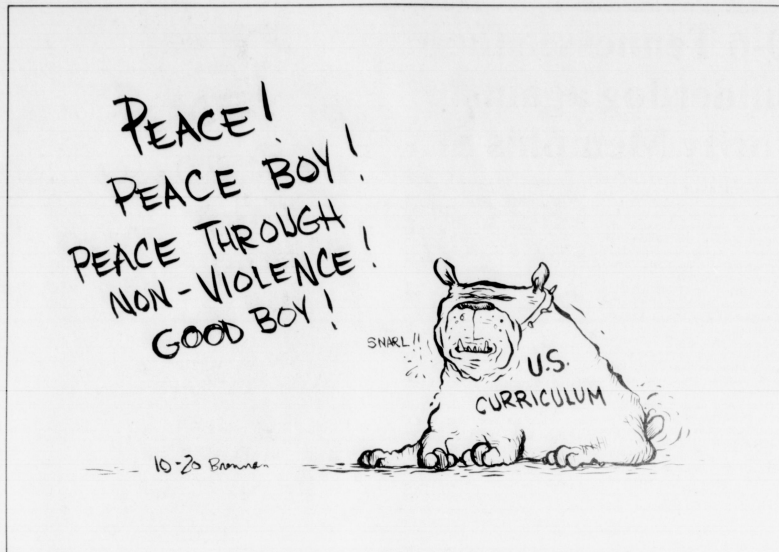
In the 1940s, Jews were blamed for much of society's problems, both in the United States and in Europe. In the 1960s, blacks were often seen as the cause of much of society's woes. In the 1980s, gays are often perceived to be the root behind the AIDS epidemic.

Jews and blacks were eventually seen as equals, at least in name, and gays should be, too. In the 1960s, protests, marches and speeches precipitated the change, and in the 1980s I fear the same methods will be necessary.

College is a forum for learning, and many people need to learn that sexual preference is not an appropriate measure of humanity.

There is a group forming on campus advocating gay rights, called "Solidarity." If you would like to join, or just receive more information, they can be reached by leaving a message at office 5 in 106 Student Center.

these weapon systems, not touch entitlements, cut more taxes for higher-income people and still bring down the deficit? Don't you think this voodoo economics will eventually spell disaster?

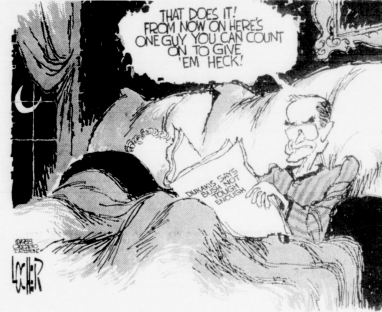
And what about the lack of emphasis over the last eight years with education, the lowering of the importance of environmental protection, the lack of concern for the homeless, the cost of housing, etc.?

Particularly with the loosening of the EPA, won't this spell serious trouble for the earth down the road?

Instead of saying to the Soviet Union, "We're matching your weapons, so you'd better talk peace with us or we're going to blow the loving daylight out of you," why don't we say: "Look, we are all planetary citizens, let's stop threatening each other and wasting so much money that it is depleting our economies, and let's keep a constant dialogue for peace and eventual total disarmament going."

With this clear distinction, the cards are on the table. The fact that the country is favoring Bush — even in spite of his weak choice for a running mate — indicates a general fear with the American people.

After all, isn't conservatism a kind of fear of change? Things are OK now, let's not rock the boat.



Never mind that the policies in place now are gradually devastating effect on world's environment, economic base and even the security of the planet.

Never mind that the decisions of federal agencies at all levels could be affecting our personal and political freedoms for years to come.

In fact, much of the effects of the Reagan legacy will not be felt until long after Mr. Reagan is retired and relaxing in California. But things are OK now, we think.

Dukakis is no ideal candidate, but at least he has the judgement

and vision to know that what is set in motion now can have unwanted effects later.

At least he has the courage to risk change for the higher good of all of us. It is too bad that even after eight years of Reagan, there are still too many that are fearful among us, unwilling to risk having a president who has higher hopes for people of all classes and people of all nations.

Help offered for alcoholism

A distrust of others and self, avoidance of feelings and ignoring one's own needs are some issues faced by many people today. These issues are caused by a common-known disease.

The disease is alcoholism. The victims are not only the alcoholic, but also adult children of alcoholics.

UK's annual Alcohol Awareness Week, held this week, teaches students about the mental, physical and emotional effects of alcohol abuse and drinking and driving. Few of us realize the long-term problems of children raised in an alcoholic household.

Herbert L. Gravitz and Julie D. Bowden are the founding members of the Board of Directors of the National Association for Children of Alcoholics. Together they have co-authored the book, *Recovery: A Guide for Adult Children of Alcoholics*.

The guide describes this group of adults as sharing many similar problems in life. Problems of feeling responsible for other people's emotions and actions, seeing everything as all right or all wrong and having a low self-esteem. Many feel depressed or even anxious when life is stable or uneventful.

The feelings described by ACOAs are also shared with those who grew up in any type of dysfunctional family. The parents may not have had a problem with alcohol, but caused the same personality difficulties in their children.

A family living under unusual stress is a dysfunctional family.

Seeking "control" of one's own life is the constant battle for the ACOA according to the guide. These adults live an all or nothing life: "I don't need anything or anyone" or "I need this person so much that I can't live without him or her."

"Either extreme leaves the individual's needs," explained Gravitz and Bowden.

There is no cure for Adult Children of Alcoholics, but there is recovery. Concentration on building confidence higher and raising self-esteem is the right path to take on the road to recovery.

UK offers the Counseling Center in Frazier Hall and department counseling in education building for more information help through counseling.

Jane Pauley talks about co-host Gumbel, Letterman feud

NEW YORK — Jane Pauley would like to put in her two cents' worth on the continuing feud between her "Today" show co-host Bryant Gumbel and "Late Night" host David Letterman.

The squabbling began three years ago when Letterman shouted out the window of 30 Rockefeller Center with a megaphone, interrupting an interview during a prime-time "Today" special.

Gumbel expressed outrage that Letterman would pull such a stunt. Letterman countered that he was invited to pull such a stunt by the then-executive producer of "Today," Steve Friedman. Letterman made Gumbel the butt of jokes on "Late Night." Gumbel humbly demanded apologies. More jokes. More hurt.

Pauley complains that no one has ever asked her about the incident, when in fact it was she who was interviewing Don Johnson and Philip Michael Thomas of "Miami Vice"

when it occurred. Gumbel wasn't even involved.

"If anybody should have been mad at Letterman, it was ME," she said. "But I always have been — while I am devoted to Steve Friedman, Steve was the one who should have said, 'Hey, it was my idea.' He invited Letterman to do a stunt."

"Bryant understands that I don't have to hate Dave Letterman. He

does. I think that's probably fair to say. I don't know, maybe he doesn't use the word 'hate.' But it's fairly strong whatever he feels. And I'm sure Dave feels it, too. But Bryant does accept the fact that I can continue to like David Letterman, and we're cool."

All right, now that that's settled, back to the original purpose of the interview with Pauley, her 12th an-

niversary this month as co-host of "Today."

Speaking of Gumbel, Pauley spent the summer presuming, along with most everybody else, that her partner of six years was not returning to "Today" after his stint anchoring the prime-time Summer Olympics coverage from Seoul.

Pauley says she was "raised to expect the worst and prepare for

the worst," so she thought Gumbel was gone.

"Nobody came and held my hand and said, 'Jane, it's looking grim for Bryant.' My sources of information were only what I saw and read, and what seemed to be kind of long faces around here when the subject came up. So I went ahead — and I told Bryant this when we were in New Orleans (for the Republican convention) — that I had made peace with the fact that he was gone. I really had. I was really

unhappy with the idea. ... And I was surprised and thrilled when he signed on again."

Gumbel has signed a new three-year contract. Pauley has four years left on her contract, but she isn't thinking of leaving.

"I intend to be here forever," she said. "I have a life-long lease here in this office. I reserve the right to re-evaluate that position on a regular basis, but for now, what would I want to change?"
