

Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, May 22, 1959.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 9:35 a. m. CST, Friday, May 22, 1959, with the following members present: R. P. Hobson, Chairman; Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Wood Hannah, Sr., and Harper Gatton. Absent, J. Stephen Watkins. President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson met with the Committee.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of February 20, 1959, were approved as published.

B. Cooperstown Representatives Heard.

President Dickey advised members of the Committee that he had been requested by representatives of the Cooperstown Council to appear before the Committee in protest of the rental rates as fixed by the Executive Committee at its meeting February 20, 1959, effective July 1, 1959. The following representatives were invited to appear before the Committee: Mr. Joe Sharp, Mr. Gere Noe and Mr. Paul Throckmorton. These gentlemen explained the difficulty of paying the rentals for apartments in Cooperstown on the income that they had and, at the same time, taking care of their other general expenses. They reported on a survey of rental rates charged by other institutions of the country for family housing of married students attending school. Some of the answers they had received from inquiries revealed that some schools charge less than the rates fixed for Cooperstown and some institutions charge more. It was thought that most of the answers referred to similar conveniences, but this was not definitely established. Members of the Committee discussed quite frankly with these young gentlemen the necessity for the University to be able to meet its obligations to bond holders, maintain the credit of the University, and remain in a position to finance other buildings through borrowed funds for construction, when necessary. Everyone seemed to be of the opinion that the rentals in Cooperstown are less than for comparable facilities in the City of Lexington. They desired to hold the rates as low as possible. The representatives of the Cooperstown Council, having been heard and reporting that they had nothing further to add to their request, were excused.

Members of the Executive Committee discussed the petition of the representatives. The obligation to the general public in the maintaining of University credit and the charge for comparable facilities by private investors determine that the rentals fixed at its meeting on February 20, 1959, effective July 1, 1959, were justified, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee declined to change the action as recorded in the minutes of the Executive Committee of February 20, 1959. They asked the Secretary to write a letter to the representatives, so advising.

C. Financial Report.

Mr. Peterson made financial report for the period July 1, 1958 through April 30, 1959. He indicated that 98.1% of the budget estimate of \$13,180,701.63 for educational and general purposes of the University had been received. The report revealed that 81.5% of the General Fund Appropriations of \$12,862,644.09 had been expended and encumbered during the first 10-months period of the fiscal year. He submitted a balance sheet of General Funds, Loan Funds and Endowment Funds which were examined in detail. A balance sheet for the Plant Funds and Agency Funds was submitted and examined; likewise, a statement of Unrealized Income and Departmental Appropriations was submitted and examined. The members of the Committee having been advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Financial Report was authorized received and filed.

D. Contract with United States Armed Forces Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Contract No. DA-47-943-IE-823, Department of the Army, and explained that it was for correspondence courses in the United States Armed Forces Institute. The contract is a continuation of an existing contract and provides for the payment of fees and charges for correspondence courses available to trainees of Armed Forces through the University's Extended Programs. He recommended approval of the contract, and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was authorized approved and executed on behalf of the University.

E. Contract, Kentucky Department of Economic Development Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the Kentucky Department of Economic Development and the University of Kentucky Bureau of Business Research. He explained that the Department of Economic Development desired that the University make a study of the impact of combined state and local taxes on selected manufacturers in Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee. Certain communities were to be selected by parties to the Agreement. The Department of Economic Development agrees to make available to pay for the cost of the study the sum of \$4,600.00. Mr. Peterson recommended that the contract be approved and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University.

F. Contract with Charles Pfizer & Company, Inc., Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted renewal of Agreement for Cooperative Investigation between the Chas. Pfizer & Company, Inc., and the University of Kentucky whereby a study of the effect of Terramycin in salt on controlled and estrogen treated steers on pasture and the effect of Tran-Q in wintering rations for steers would be made for a period beginning July 15, 1959 to July 15, 1960. The Chas. Pfizer & Company, Inc., agreed to pay \$2,000 toward the cost of making this study. Mr. Peterson recommended that the Agreement be approved and executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed.

G. Agreement between the United States Quartermaster Corps and the University Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Modification No. 2, Supplemental Agreement to QMR&E (NATICK), No. 87, dated May 8, 1959, extending an existing contract for an additional twelve months period to May, 1960. He explained that this contract had to do with radiation of food materials in connection with a research project in horticulture work. Mr. Peterson stated that Dean Welch was sure that this work would be of great benefit to the experimental work of the Station and recommended its approval.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Modification No. 2 to the existing contract was approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University.

H. Contract with the Amoco Chemicals Corporation of Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the University of Kentucky and the Amoco Chemicals Corporation of Chicago, Illinois, whereby the Experiment Station will make tests of certain Amoco Aromatic Solvents for phytotoxicity to tobacco. Mr. Peterson stated that this was a technical experiment and was for the benefit of the general tobacco program. The Amoco Chemicals Corporation will pay the sum of \$1,000 toward the expenses in making the tests and Mr. Peterson recommended that the contract be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed.

I. Contract with Naugatuck Chemical Division of the U. S. Rubber Company Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the Naugatuck Chemical Division of the U. S. Rubber Company, Bethany, Connecticut, and the University whereby the Agricultural Experiment Station will make field tests of maleic hydrazide for use in controlling suckers on burley tobacco. He stated that the Naugatuck Chemical Division will pay \$1,000 for each of the next four years to defray the expenses of this test. He recommended that the Agreement be approved, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed.

J. Agreement with Kentucky Department of Highways Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the Kentucky Department of Highways and the University, extending a former Agreement dated June 21, 1958. He stated this project provides for a study of highway contracts program in its broad sense which will include many phases of

administration, capital budgeting and administrative planning. It carries a budget of \$66,655.00. Mr. Peterson recommended, upon advice of the Committee, that the contract be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

K. Approval of Resolution for Securing Surplus Property.

Mr. Peterson submitted the following Resolution which is asked for by the Disposal Agency of Surplus Property. He recommended that the Donee Resolution, as herein copied, be approved and authorized executed by E. B. Farris, A. P. Nestor, H. D. Pratt, Seth Taylor, George R. Kavanaugh and Frank D. Peterson. He said it might become necessary to call in other University personnel to assist. However, they would do so in connection with one of the above-mentioned staff members:

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Resolution was approved for E. B. Farris, A. P. Nestor, H. D. Pratt, Seth Taylor, George R. Kavanaugh and Frank D. Peterson and authorized executed by the Vice President, Business Administration.

L. Disposition of Surplus Equipment Approved.

Mr. Peterson reported a 1947 Ingram Road Roller, three wheel seven-ton capacity, Serial number 1102-B-1, to be worn out and of little use to the University. He asked permission to dispose of the road roller in whatever manner he can to get the most money for it.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Vice President, Business Administration, was authorized to dispose of the surplus road roller.

M. Injury to Ernest Steilberg.

Mr. Peterson submitted report on an accident to Mr. Ernest Steilberg who, while working for the Experiment Station, re-injured his vertebrae. He stated that Mr. Steilberg had x-rays taken and received treatment at the Good Samaritan Hospital and at the University Health Service, that the amount of insurance received had been applied on the hospital bill and that there remained a charge of \$50.00 for x-rays and professional services. He recommended that the bills be paid, with the understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability incident to the recurrence of an old injury.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the invoices amounting to \$50.00 were authorized paid with the understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability thereby.

N. Injury to Conner Tincher.

Mr. Peterson reported an accident to Mr. Conner Tincher, an employee in the Division of Maintenance and Operations. Mr. Tincher received an injury on January 1, 1959, which resulted in an operation for hernia on February 9, 1959. Mr. Tincher carries hospitalization insurance which covered his hospital bill, with the exception of \$13.50. Dr. Richard R. Crutcher, the surgeon who performed the operation, submitted bill for services rendered in the amount of \$150.00.

Mr. Peterson stated that he had made sufficient investigation as to convince him that the hernia was service connected, and, since Mr. Tincher carries hospitalization insurance and has applied payments received from his insurance on the expenses in so far as it would go, he recommended that the University receive and pay the remaining obligations, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in connection therewith.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, a hospital bill of \$13.50 and a surgeon's bill of \$150.00 were authorized paid, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in paying these invoices.

O. Business Procedure Manual Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted, with the approval of President Dickey, the revised Business Procedure Manual of the University of Kentucky. He stated that, seven days prior to the meeting, a copy had been forwarded to each member of the Executive Committee for review. Comments were made by the Committee concerning the value of the Manual, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Manual was approved as being the business procedure and manner of operation of the University.

P. Approval of Euclid and Harrison Avenues Overhead Pass.

President Dickey and Mr. Peterson submitted a sketch of a proposed overhead pass at the intersection of Euclid and Harrison Avenues. They stated that the overhead pass was to take the place of the underpass previously approved by the Board of Trustees. It was explained that the Dean of Men and Dean of Women and the University Safety Committee, in conference with the Administration, definitely prefer an overhead pass to the underpass across Euclid Avenue. Members were advised that the sketch of the overhead pass was not as esthetic in appearance as we had hoped for, but considering the large peak crowds that the structure must carry during sporting events, concerts, etc., the maximum allowable width of 12 feet seemed to be desirable. It was stated that a daily use that might be made of this structure might not seem to warrant the size but that we were building for the next 50 to 100 years and should attempt to avoid the pitfalls that other institutions have encountered. They were further advised that the ramps in lieu of steps were used for easier approaches and that steps leading to the ramps would be suggested so as to provide alternate access. The ramps have been used to conserve ground space.

Members of the Committee discussed the pedestrian overpass and suggested that the engineers be requested to design a structure with as much esthetic value as possible that would at the same time be able to take care of the large crowds that would at times make use of it.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the pedestrian overhead pass at Euclid and Harrison Avenues was approved and the necessary easement for right-of-way was authorized granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the list of candidates was approved for degrees and President Dickey was authorized to confer upon each, at the May Commencement, the degree to which he is entitled.

S. Dean Frank J. Welch Reports on Experiment Station Projects and Programs.

President Dickey advised that Dr. Frank J. Welch, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Division, was available and desired to report to the Committee concerning the work of the Agricultural Experiment Station's and Agricultural Extension Division's various projects. Dean Welch was invited to meet with the Committee and, after expressing his appreciation for the opportunity, submitted a great deal of information concerning agriculture in the state of Kentucky and the distribution of cash income to the Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Division. He submitted to each member of the Committee tabulated information as to source of funds and their application, showing dollar appropriation and total allocation of land owned by the Experiment Station and Sub-station and indicated the total acreage allocated to the various segments of the agricultural program directly, indirectly and combined. He gave an analysis of the funds received by the various programs from State, Federal and other sources.

Members of the Committee discussed at length the program as outlined by Dean Welch, the allocation of funds to the various functional divisions and the expenditures by objects, and being duly advised and appreciative of a very fine report as made by Dean Welch, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the program as outlined and related and, pursuant to action of the Board of Trustees of April 7, 1959, gave final, unanimous approval to the budget of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension services as submitted originally.

Dean Welch remained for luncheon with the members of the Committee.

T. Change-of-Employment for Leslie K. Adams.

President Dickey reported recommendation for change-of-employment for Leslie K. Adams, Laboratory Supervisor, College of Engineering, Department of Electrical Engineering. Mr. Adams was born April 15, 1889 and reached his 65th birthday on April 15, 1954. He received his first appointment to the University of Kentucky December 1, 1943, and has been continuously in service for fifteen years and seven months. He was recommended for change-of-employment July 1, 1959, at 35½% of his salary at 65, which gives a change-of-employment salary of \$1,341.90, with assignment of duties as

follows: Continue as Trustee, University of Kentucky Amateur Radio Station; assist with inventory records in Electrical Engineering department; assist in Student Branch Society (professional) meetings and in Engineers' Day preparations.

U. Change-of-Employment for Miss Ethel M. Jelley.

Miss Ethel M. Jelley, secretary in the College of Engineering, was born March 27, 1890, receiving her appointment to the University of Kentucky March 1, 1914. She has had 45 years and 4 months of continuous service at the University of Kentucky. She is entitled to 50% of her salary at the age of 65 and was recommended for change-of-employment, effective July 1, 1959, at an annual salary of \$1,596.00. Her assignment of duties under change-of-employment is as follows: Collecting information and keeping file up to date on outstanding achievements of alumni of the College of Engineering, and organizing available material and collecting other data bearing on the history and development of the College of Engineering.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Miss Ethel M. Jelley was authorized given change-of-employment, effective July 1, 1959, at annual salary of \$1,596.00, with the duties assigned.

V. Change-of-Employment for Wallace Jenkins, Fireman's Helper, Central Heating Plant.

## X. Honorary Degrees Conferred.

The Board of Trustees, at its meeting on April 7, 1959, approved the President's recommendation of two people for honorary degrees: Dr. Philip R. Edwards for the degree Doctor of Science and Mr. W. Hugh Peal for the degree Doctor of Laws. It was understood that names of these recipients be withheld from the minutes of the April meeting so that they might be notified and that the President might receive their acceptances before public announcement. He submitted the following information concerning Dr. Philip R. Edwards, bacteriologist, and Mr. W. Hugh Peal, lawyer.

### Philip R. Edwards, Bacteriologist

Born in Owensboro, Kentucky, August 30, 1901. Graduated from Owensboro High School in 1918, from the University of Kentucky in 1922 with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, and from Yale University in 1925 with the degree Doctor of Philosophy.

He served as Bacteriologist in the Department of Animal Pathology at this institution from 1925 to 1948; he was appointed Distinguished Professor in 1948. From 1939 to 1948 he was Director of the National Salmonella Center at Lexington.

Since 1948, Dr. Edwards has been Bacteriologist-in-Charge of the Enteric Bacteriology Laboratory at the Communicable Disease Center of the U. S. Public Health Service at Chamblee, Georgia. He is also Bacteriologist-in-Charge of the International Shigella Center; of the National Reference Laboratory for Enteric Bacteriophage Typing; and of the Main Salmonella Center of the Western Hemisphere.

He served as special consultant to the Pan-American Sanitary Bureau in 1950. He was recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare in 1955, and of the Kimble Methodology Research Award of \$1000 in 1956. Other professional services and memberships include Enterobacteriaceae Subcommittee of the International Association of Microbiologists, and International Committee for Enteric Phage Typing the same Society; Society of American Bacteriologists of which he is President Elect; Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine; American Public Health Association; American Veterinary Medical Association (Honorary Member); American Academy of Microbiology (Fellow) and Sigma Xi. Dr. Edwards is the author or co-author of 240 papers in scientific or professional journals, and of a book entitled, "Identification of Enterobacteriaceae".

Dr. Edwards is recommended for the degree Doctor of Science upon the basis of his productive scholarship and high professional standing.

### W. Hugh Peal, Lawyer

Born in Bandana, Kentucky, March 27, 1898. Graduated from Ballard County High School in 1918; from the University of Kentucky in 1922 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts; studied at Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar

and was awarded the degrees Bachelor of Arts in Jurisprudence and Bachelor of Civil Law.

Mr. Peal was admitted to the bar in New York in 1928. He has attained a position of eminence in his field and is presently identified with the New York firm of Hardy, Peal, Barker and Rawlings. This firm engages in General Practice, Corporation Law, Estates and Trusts, and Labor Law. He is a member of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York; New York and American Bar Associations; American Law Institute; and Phi Beta Kappa. He served on the New York Commission on Uniform State Laws in 1935, and he did legal work for the United States Navy in 1943-44.

Mr. Peal has also established an enviable reputation as a collector of English Literature. He is a profound student of the English Romantics, and his source material in this field is exhaustive. He started his specialization with Charles Lamb but later branched out to include other Literature closely identified with Charles and Mary Lamb. More recently, he has been concerned with the Lake Poets and some of the novelists of that period. His library reveals that Mr. Peal is selective, judicious and perceptive relative to the material he has acquired.

Mr. Peal is recommended for the degree Doctor of Laws upon the basis of his professional success and his scholarly interest in English Literature.

#### Y. Gifted Student Report Received.

President Dickey submitted report of the Sub-Committee on Gifted Students. He stated that the report had been approved by the Committee of 15 and the University Faculty and recommended that it be received and approved and that the Administration be authorized to cooperate in implementing the report as a long-term project.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees thanked the Sub-Committee on Gifted Students, the Committee of 15 and the University Faculty for the very excellent report and approved same. They authorized the Administration to cooperate in implementing the report as a long-term project.

#### Z. University to Contribute to Insurance Premium.

President Dickey submitted a letter from Dr. Ralph R. Pickett, Chairman of the Employees' Insurance Committee, requesting an expression from the Executive Committee as to whether or not the Executive Committee would be favorably disposed to a program that would permit the participants of the group life insurance program to obtain double insurance over what is now being carried. More specifically:

(1) that the present insurance be doubled for each employee. The proposed schedule would have a range from \$1,000 to \$5,000 depending upon the salary bracket of the member.

(2) that the University contribute to the premium an amount equal to that paid by the employee and receive the full amount of the annual dividend refund. Thus the employee would continue to make the same payment but would receive no dividends.

(3) that the agreement of the University to contribute to premium payment be contingent upon the approval of the plan by a substantial majority of employees.

It was later explained that the approval of the plan would be interpreted as complying with legal requirements, which seems to mean 75% of the present membership of the program.

Members of the Committee discussed the proposal with President Dickey and Mr. Peterson, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, directed that the Chairman of the Employees' Insurance Committee be notified that the Committee looked with favor upon their request and would consider contribution to the premium under the program outlined, provided the proposal is approved by the legal number of present members of the program.

#### A-1. Recess for Luncheon.

At 11:55 a. m. CST the meeting was adjourned for luncheon which was served in the Office of the President. At 12:55 p. m. CST the Executive Committee took up again the business on the agenda.

#### B-1. Gifts.

From: American Cyanamid Company--\$1,000. 00.

The President reported that American Cyanamid Company had given to the University their check for \$1,000. 00 for use in field evaluation of anthelmintics in horses, cattle and sheep during the calendar year 1959. He recommended that the grant be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check of the American Cyanamid Company was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the Company.



From: American Steel Foundries Foundation--\$500.00.

The President presented check for \$500.00 from American Steel Foundries Foundation and stated that this was the sixth consecutive year that the Foundation had given a grant to the University. He further stated that this gift is in recognition of the University's work being done in cast metals education. The President recommended that the Committee accept the gift.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation and requested the President to thank officials of the Foundation.

From Ciba Pharmaceutical Products, Inc. --\$5,000.00.

President Dickey presented check in the amount of \$5,000.00 from Ciba Pharmaceutical Products, Inc., Summit, N.J., for use as a grant-in-aid in connection with Serpasil growth studies in cattle. He stated that this is the first gift to the University from this firm and the largest and one of the first made by them for livestock research. He recommended that the grant be accepted and used in support of the project, "The Effect of Feeding Graded Levels of Tranquilizers to Beef Steers Being Fattened on a Ration Containing Stilbestrol".

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President and requested him to thank Ciba Pharmaceutical Products, Inc.

From: Shell Chemical Corporation, New York--\$1,500.00.

President Dickey reported that, for the past several years, the Experiment Station has had an agreement with the Shell Chemical Corporation whereby the Department of Entomology and Botany uses certain applicable chemicals in its research program. To assist with this experimental program, Shell has made available a \$1,500.00 grant-in-aid covering the period January 1 through December 31, 1959. The President presented check for this amount and recommended that it be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the President's recommendation and requested him to thank the Shell Chemical Corporation.

\$300.00.
