Two held in Iowa in student's death

Police in Iowa are holding two Lexington men charged in Kentucky with murdering a 26-year-old UK student whose body was found near an abandoned Fayette County schoolhouse.

The body of Thomas Robinson, a medical technology student whose

roommate reported him missing last Sunday, was found on the grounds of Briar Hill Elementary School Thursday afternoon, said Detective Larry Etherington of the Lexington Police Department.

Earlier Thursday, 21-year-old Richard Clayton Staton and 19-year-old Robert Rankin were arrested in Des Moines, Iowa, on charges involving the use of Robinson's

credit cards, driver's license and car.

Lexington police swore out murder warrants Thursday night against the men, who are being held in the Polk County Jail in Iowa pending extradition.

After learning of Robinson's disappearance, Lexington police began tracking his credit card receipts. The trail led authorities to Des Moines.

Police there were told to be on the lookout for Robinson's 1988 Chevrolet.

Two officers spotted the car at about 2 a.m. CDT Thursday, occupied by five young men.

When officers asked the men for identification, a front-seat passenger handed over Robinson's driver's license and identified himself as Thomas Robinson, police said.

However, an officer noticed that the man's eyes were brown, whereas Robinson's driver's license listed his eye color as blue.

After further questioning, police in Iowa charged Staton and Rankin with false use of financial instruments for allegedly using Robinson's credit cards, with the theft of Robinson's car and with giving false information to police.

The three other occupants of the

car were released after police determined they had no knowledge of incidents in Kentucky, police said.

Police in Lexington said Robinson, of Paducah, apparently was abducted from his apartment near the UK campus.

James Curless, a Lexington detective, said additional charges could be brought once Rankin and Staton are returned to Kentucky.

Audible street signals placed near campus

Visually impaired and blind residents took another step toward total independence with the installation of audible street signals on a busy Lexington street last week.

The devices were placed on the crosswalk signals on both Upper Street and South Limestone Street near UK's main entrance. The devices emit a series of beeps that allow blind or visually impaired individuals to tell when it is safe to cross the street.

The installation also will benefit many students who cross the street every day.

"There have been some close calls with students almost getting hit by cars in the past, but there have been no serious accidents," said Jake Karens, director of the UK Disabilities Resources Center. "I think for the blind and visually impaired students, it gives them the opportunity to be able to cross the street safely."

In the past, Karens said students who had to cross every day usually had to wait for help, but now they will be able to cross on their own.

The signals were dedicated Friday morning with Lexington and state officials, as well as the leaders of the Kentucky department for the Blind and the Blue Grass Council of the Blind, in attendance. The signals, which cost \$500 each, have different sounds for the two streets where the signals were placed. This allows the people who use the system to distinguish the difference between the two streets.

At Friday's dedication, Lexington Mayor Pam Miller praised Jeanne Grow, director of the Blue Grass Council of the Blind, and the state officials who helped bring the signals to Lexington.

"This will mean a tremendous amount to the blind population here in Lexington," Miller said. "Jeanne Grow represents the best of Lexington."

In addition to the signal dedication, Oct. 15 was also proclaimed White Can Day in both Lexington and Kentucky.

The day was named in honor of those who have worked to improve the living conditions for visually impaired and blind residents in the Commonwealth.

"It used to be that the blind community didn't have the opportunities that we have today," Grow said. "We are lucky to have political leaders who are kind to you."

The signals are the second pair installed in Lexington, and there are only 12 statewide. Jefferson County has 10 of the signals now.

Lexington officials are planning to add several more signals in the near future. Although no one was able to give a time frame, officials named possible locations for more signals. Most are near UK's campus as well.

Plans call for signals to be placed at the intersections of Rose Street and Euclid Avenue, South Limestone Street and Euclid Avenue, and Main and Rose streets. In addition, Karens said UK officials hope the signals can be placed somewhere on Rose Street in the middle of campus.

State and city officials spent the past several years determining where the best places were to place the signals. The officials looked not only at pedestrian flow but also the flow of traffic in the area.

Ashland Oil donates \$500,000 for library

The presentation of a gift to the UK library fund on Friday was given all the fanfare of sporting event, but one big hurdle remains before construction begins on the five-story building.

A \$500,000 gift from Ashland Oil broke the goal of \$20 million that had been set when the fundraising drive began in 1991.

The UK Pep Band was even on hand to help announce the \$20,360,372 that has been raised in the past two years.

The focus of UK's fundraising efforts now will go to other projects, but before construction can begin on the new library, the University must get the financial support it needs from the General Assembly, which meets again in January.

"I never had any questions that we would reach the goal," UK President Charles Wethington said.

"In my mind, it was only a question of time."

Wethington said he does not think the University will have a difficult time with its request for funding from the state legislature.

"Governor (Brereton) Jones committed to us two years ago. This is a good project," Wethington said.

UK officials originally planned to ask the General Assembly for \$42 million in support for a bond sale.

"That amount will be smaller by the time the request is submitted, Wethington said.

"I'm sure that it will be a smaller amount, but I'm not sure what that will be," Wethington said.

The \$500,000 gift was presented during the annual meeting of UK's Development Council at Spindletop Hall on Friday.

Paul Chelgren, president and chief operating officer of Ashland Oil and a UK trustee, was on hand to present the donation.

"The University of Kentucky has always had a special place in Ashland Oil's heart and pocketbook,"

Chelgren said.

"Ashland Oil takes pride in its efforts to help provide quality education for all Kentuckians," added Chelgren, who said he hoped the gift would be "significant" to the library drive.

Wethington said receiving the goal-topping donation from Ashland Oil was appropriate.

"It is fitting that Ashland Oil — one of Kentucky's strongest supporters of higher education — provides the gift that has made it possible for us to reach our initial goal," Wethington said.

Wethington said the University now will focus its fundraising efforts elsewhere.

"We can now move onto other things. You will now find us publicly trying to help the campaign for Sanders-Brown Center on Aging and the campaign for (College of Allied Health (Professions), as well as the Community Colleges and the

UK chancellor in search at FSU

A submitted resumé does not necessarily an interested candidate make.

Or at least so says Robert Hemenway, chancellor of the Lexington Campus.

A Florida newspaper reported Saturday that Hemenway is one of 29 in the search for the presidency at Florida State University.

"All that means is someone nominated Hemenway said 'I don't really know anything about' the position or the search process. He also hasn't had a chance to look closely at the Tallahassee school, he said.

Search processes are becoming

nearly an annual event for Hemenway, a UK chancellor since 1989.

In late July 1992, he withdrew his name from a list of four finalists for the new chancellor

at the University of Missouri's Columbia campus.

In 1990, he was one of four finalists for the University of Nebraska's presidential search, from which he also dropped out.

Despite the number of nominations, the Nebraska native said he's not looking to leave Lexington.

"I'm quite happy at UK," said Hemenway, who began his career at the University in 1966.

"I've got an investment of 20 years here. It would have to be just a very good situation for me to want to leave that investment of 20 years."

Also involved in the FSU search is Ronald Kurth, president of Mur-

Nothing Spectacular about weekend rain

Those who were looking forward to the UK Sports Spectacular had wait, as the event was postponed Saturday because of rain.

Basketball courts were wet and slick, making it too dangerous to play, said Melinda Binegar, chairwoman of the event and secretary of the student campaign for the United Way of the Bluegrass.

The Spectacular, which was scheduled for Seaton Field, could not be moved indoors because there was another event inside at that time, said Rob Warrington, co-chairman of the student campaign for the United Way.

The event tentatively has been moved to Nov. 6, coordinators said. The event will be held inside the Seaton Center at 10 a.m.

Binegar said registration for the Spectacular has been re-opened. That means students, faculty, administration and UK employees still

may apply to participate and may pick up forms in the Students Activities Office.

A tentative deadline for completed forms will be Nov. 3.

Even though more people may be able to participate in the Spectacular now that it has been rescheduled, the new date may conflict with schedules of people who have already registered, Binegar said.

Mike Demers, a psychology junior, and the rest of his three-on-three basketball team may not be able to participate because of the new date.

Demers said he was disappointed that Sports Spectacular was postponed and that if the event does take place Nov. 6, he may not play because there is a UK football game at Vanderbilt that day.

So far, there are more than 40 people who will participate in the sporting events, said Kathy Lin, co-chairwoman of the student campaign for the United Way.

Cancer center picked to study drug

UK's Lucille Parker Markey Cancer Center has been selected by the National Cancer Institute to take part in the first major study of a drug that may prevent of prostate cancer.

The drug, finasteride, already has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in patients suffering from enlarged prostates.

Dr. David Wood, assistant professor of surgery, division of urology, and principal investigator of the study, said finasteride reduces the level of dihydrotestosterone (DHT), a male hormone that encourages the growth of prostate cells.

The drug will be evaluated for its ability to prevent prostate cancer in healthy men.

Prostate cancer is the most common form of cancer in men and is the second leading cause of cancer-related death.

Almost 165,000 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in the United States in 1993 and almost 35,000 men will die of the disease.

However, there usually are no symptoms until the disease has spread to other organs, Wood said.

"Typically, we see a middle-aged man come in with a headache after he's played golf over the weekend, and we find that he has bone cancer that has spread from his prostate," he said.

Routine screening for men older

than 50 has increased detection of the disease, and when caught early the five-year survival rate of the disease is around 70 to 80 percent, Wood said.

Treatment usually involves radiation therapy or removal of the prostate.

While all men older than 50 experience enlargement of the prostate because of DHT, men with very high levels of DHT show an increased chance of developing prostate cancer.

Men who do not produce DHT also rarely develop prostate cancer. And finasteride has been shown to inhibit the growth of cancerous prostate cells in laboratory conditions.

UK was chosen by the National

Cancer Institute because of its "dedication to research, excellent track record and our recruitment patterns for patients to take part in the study," Wood said.

In addition to UK, there will be 102 sites participating around the country.

About 18,000 men will be recruited for the study nationwide. Participants must be older than 55 and in good health with no occurrence of prostate cancer.

U.S. pilot held in Somalia returns to Ft. Campbell

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. — Army helicopter pilot Michael Durant was glad to be home yesterday after his return from captivity in Somalia and even had a good word for Army chow.

Despite leg and back injuries, he

could be walking on crutches in days and might be back in the cockpit in a year, a hospital official said.

Durant spoke briefly to television news crews yesterday at Blanchfield Army Community Hospital.

"I would just like to thank all the American people for all their fantastic support," Durant said from his hospital bed. "It's made the difference. I'm glad to be home and

I'm proud to be an American."

His room was decorated only with an American flag and a stack of T-shirts he had received from admirers.

Durant's leg was raised above the bed in traction and he had a low-grade fever. But the hospital's acting commander, Lt. Col. Tom Hardy, said the soldier was in good humor.

"I asked him about the food last night and he said he would never say anything bad about Army food again, after having eaten with the Somalis," Hardy said. "I thought that was a good comment. He enjoyed his spaghetti and meatballs and seemed to be in good spirits."

Durant's wife, Lorie, spent the night at the hospital and Durant's 14-month-old son and parents visited yesterday morning, officials said.

Hardy told reporters it appeared that Durant suffered no significant mental trauma during his 11-day captivity.

"He is not an ordinary soldier," Hardy said. "He comes from a unit trained to cope with this kind of problem."

Durant, 32, is a chief warrant officer with the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment (Airborne), an elite unit that gained fame and the nickname "Night Stalkers" for low-level night-flying operations. Its motto is "Night Stalkers Don't Quit."

Durant was flown back to Fort Campbell on Saturday from a U.S. military hospital in Germany, where he was placed in a back brace to help his broken lower vertebra heal, his broken left cheekbone was set and shrapnel wounds were examined.

Wildcats make their move, drop LSU

Team asserts itself in tough Southeastern Conference

A funny thing happened on the way to the Alabama-Florida rematch in this year's Southeastern Conference Championship game.

UK affirmed its position as a contender by cruising past LSU 35-17 on a wet Saturday night that saw Florida fall to Auburn and Alabama tie Tennessee.

OK, if the season ended today, the Tide still would be facing Florida but the Gators certainly have a pack of Wildcats breathing down their necks in the SEC East.

The Cats are the new kids on the SEC contenders' block, but if the pressure is getting to them, you'd never guess by listening to them talk about it.

"The most fun in all of football is to be in the hunt," UK coach Bill Curry said.

"We feel confident that we're in the race right now," tight end Terry Samuels said. "We have a chance. We have a good chance to have a positive outcome."

"It feels good (to be in the race)," fullback Damon Hood said. "It really feels good with Tennessee tying Alabama. We wish Tennessee would've gotten beat, but with Florida losing, it helps us out a little bit."

"We hold our own destiny, though. We're not worried about anybody else."

UK quarterback Pookie Jones said the fact that skeptics thought the Cats couldn't compete in the SEC only sweetens the deal.

"It feels good because people didn't think we were going to be able to do it," Jones said. "This team is just so much more improved over last year."

"Our attitude is so much different, and we knew what we were capable of doing. I think now we're starting to show it. People are starting to open their eyes up. Kentucky is a real team."

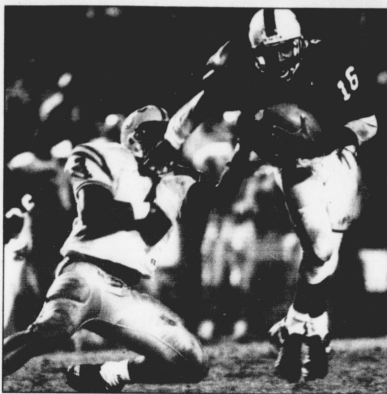
LSU coach Curley Hallman and his team had their eyes opened by a UK offense that pounded out 210 yards rushing (106 of them by true freshman Moe Williams) and a defense that stifled the Tigers, at least until the game was no longer in doubt.

Jones was excellent in his decision-making for the second straight week. His smartest decisions were handoffs to Williams, who was spectacular all night in breaking tackles and blasting through holes en route to his second 100-yard rushing effort of the season.

UK put together two sparkling scoring drives in the second quarter, then scored on two of its first three possessions in the third to go up 28-3 and erase any doubt that the Cats could play when they are actually supposed to win.

The UK team gave the game ball to defensive coordinator Mike Archer. LSU's head coach from 1987 to '90, Curry was pleased with Archer's unit with the exception of two second-half touchdowns after UK took the big lead.

"Our defense performed very well until we had the game in hand," Curry said. "And then we

had one of those lapses, and it started to get close."

That, though, was one negative in a sea of positives from the Cats' performance on Saturday.

Curry had promised all week to get Samuels more involved in the offense, and he did just that. The senior tight end was UK's leading receiver with four catches for 51 yards, including a 19-yard TD catch that gave the Cats a lead they would never relinquish.

The UK offense was more diverse than any game this season. Including Samuels, Jones hit eight different receivers.

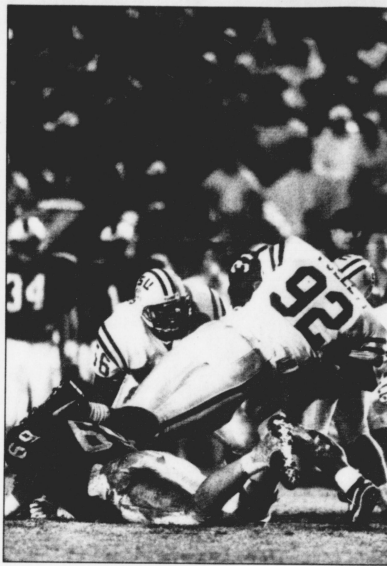
Among those were Randy Wyatt, who didn't see the ball against Ole

Miss, Williams, who caught the first two pass of his UK career, and Tim Calvert, who caught his first pass since the Indiana game and only his fifth of the season.

Hood rushed for 45 yards on 12 carries and scored two touchdowns, his second and third of the season after going his first two seasons without seeing the endzone.

Defensively, strong safety Marcus Jenkins continued his season-long terrorizing of SEC quarterbacks. Jenkins' second-quarter interception was his league-leading sixth of the season, and it also moved him into third place on UK's all-time list.

The Cats are excited about their

Gator hunting, and they can't help but look forward to their game with a group of Bulldogs next weekend in Georgia now that the Tigers are out of the way.

"They look like they've rebounded from a couple of early losses,"

Samuels said. "You can't take them lightly playing down there between the hedges."

"We've just got to take it game by game and play by play," Jones said. "Georgia's going to be ready for us."

Tough UK defense still here

UK's defensive unit was on a mission Saturday night against LSU. The mission was in honor of defensive coordinator Mike Archer.

Saying Saturday was a difficult day for Archer is an understatement. Words cannot adequately describe the range of emotions the UK coach experienced while preparing his defensive squad to stop players he had recruited and coached.

Archer, who coached at LSU from 1987 to 1990, said that while he expected to have mixed emotions, the full impact of the situation did not hit him until gameday.

"All week I blocked it out," Archer said. "But after brunch with the players, I was walking to a meeting and I haven't had that feeling since I've been a head coach."

"I had a funny feeling in my stomach, coaching against players I had recruited and gone into their homes, asking them to come to LSU."

Head coach Bill Curry was well aware of his assistant's predicament. After the triumph, the team honored Archer.

"We gave the game ball to a guy named Archer, and we don't give many game balls here," Curry said.

Williams stars early, often

For a UK football player, celebrity status is not an easy thing to come by. It takes a special something to have your name widely known when you play on a campus where that other sport rules.

But, occasionally a player comes along with explosive talents on the football field and that certain demeanor off of it that inevitably leads to stardom.

It starts with a name. Ask Pookie Jones. Or ask Moe Williams, the newest star in the UK galaxy.

His statistics tell the story. On Saturday night, Moe (does he really need the last name anymore?) rushed for 106 yards, his second game with 100 or more yards in this, his freshman season.

UK head coach Bill Curry has been extremely pleased with the play of the jewel of his heretofore true freshman exactly like Moe Williams, Curry said.

It's not just Curry who's complimenting Williams, though. His

Archer's defense continued its season-long habit of forcing turnovers Saturday night. Marcus Jenkins once again threw a dagger into the opposing offense with a first-half interception. Senior linebacker Duce Williams recovered two second-half fumbles (one forced by Marty Moore, the other by Zane Beehn).

In the first half, Archer's defense denied the big play from the offense. In particular, the UK defense contained freshman Eddie Kennison.

Coming into the game, Kennison was averaging more than 70 receiving yards per game. The Wildcat doctrine of containment limited the young star, who has the skills to one day strike a Heisman pose, to 26 yards on two catches.

Curry, however, was particularly dismayed about one of Kennison's catches, a third-quarter touchdown reception.

"We went into a lapse again and allowed a big play," Curry said. "I thought our defense performed very well until we had the game in hand and then we had one of those strange lapses. You must finish the job."

Kennison's TD catch broke a string of seven consecutive quarters

in which the Wildcat defense had not allowed a touchdown.

This from a group that many critics labeled as Wildcats last year.

What has caused the transformation from middlets to Wildcats? The secret, according to Moore, is Archer's system.

"We're playing with a lot more confidence," the senior linebacker said. "We're using a lot of different schemes to disguise our coverages."

Moore added that "we've always had the talent but now we're playing as a unit."

Benefiting tremendously from Archer's new system is Jenkins, who has recorded an interception in each of the past three games. The senior strong safety currently leads Alabama All-American Antonio Langham for the conference lead in interceptions with six.

Jenkins said the defensive unit realized the game was very important for Archer.

"It was a big game," Jenkins said. "We felt we needed to do a little more for (coach Archer) because he put us in a situation where we can do our thing."

Archer said he is relieved that the game is finally over. Now the man who has been able to invert the orthodox for the Wildcat defense can get back to work with a clear mind.

"I just want to score every time I touch the ball," he said.

Williams is obviously excited to be in the Southeastern Conference race, but more than almost any other, he's excited to be headed to Georgia next week.

Williams played high school football in Georgia, and he was recruited heavily by the Bulldogs.

"I'm really looking forward to it," he said. "I think Georgia's record doesn't really justify what kind of team Georgia is. They just haven't had the breaks, but Georgia's a great team, and I'm really looking forward to them."

Williams had a tough time choosing between the Cats and the Dawgs, but he said he simply followed his heart to the Bluegrass.

"Georgia's recruiters and coaches, the players and the facilities — everything was just great," he said. "But it's just a gut feeling that you have."

"I just knew this was where I wanted to go."

And considering the fact that he's already become a star, Moe Williams isn't looking back.

Representatives from the Citrus, Independence and Sugar bowls were at Commonwealth Stadium

Saturday night.

A scout from the Sugar Bowl?

To simply mention the words UK and Sugar Bowl in the same sentence would have been considered grounds for insanity before this season.

While it probably would be foolish to make reservations in New Orleans for New Year's Day, UK fans should be advised to prepare to go bowling somewhere.

The new bowl alliance basically guarantees bowl bids to the top five finishers in the SEC. Though not set in stone, the basic format of the alliance sends the SEC champ to the Sugar Bowl and the runner-up to the Citrus Bowl.

The third, fourth, and fifth place teams most likely would participate in the Gator, Peach and Sunshine bowls, respectively.

Question: When was the last time a UK squad competed in a bowl other than the Hall of Fame Bowl?

If you answered either 1976 or the Travolta Era, give yourself a point. An estimated 25,000 UK fans made the voyage to the Peach Bowl the way to witness the Wildcats' 21-0 victory over North Carolina.

If any postseason escapade is to be experienced this year, the Cats must not let history repeat itself. After six games last season, the team's record stood at 4-2. The current record is, of course, 4-2.

"It feels good, but I know (UK's) next opponent, Georgia doesn't care too much about that. People say we're a lock for a bowl, but I don't look at it that way," Jenkins said.

"If we beat Georgia, that will be the turning point because we were 4-2 last year and you know what happened."

The dilapidated unit from Baton Rouge continues to conjure up memories of the Bad News Bears. The misery index in Louisiana must be significantly above the national average.

In the process of taming the Tigers, the Wildcats unveiled perhaps their most varied offensive showcase of the season. The rapidly improving shotgun attack coupled with the Stack-I led to 21 points in the first 18 minutes of the second half.

UK coach Bill Curry said the key to Saturday night's performance was the turnover ratio. UK did not commit a turnover while the Tigers threw one interception and lost two fumbles.

Curry, a coach who has known both success and failure, is delighted to be back in the bowl chase.

"The most fun in all of football is to be in the hunt," he said.

And in the hunt they are.

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UK sweeps two SEC matches

Great teams have offenses that do not center on just one or two players.

Great teams are able to win even when they are not playing well.

The 10th-ranked UK volleyball team displayed both of those qualities and showed why it is a great team as UK defeated Mississippi State and Alabama at Memorial Coliseum this weekend.

The Wildcats (20-1 overall, 4-1 Southeastern Conference) started out the weekend struggling offensively Friday night against the Bulldogs. (9-10, 1-3) but still managed to win the match in three games by scores of 15-10, 15-9 and 16-14.

UK's offense did not center on just one player as has been the case earlier this season, as three Wildcats finished the match with double-digit kill totals.

Sophomore outside hitter Molly Dreisbach led the way for the Wildcats with 16 kills. Junior outside hitter Krista Robinson and senior middle blocker each added 14 and 13 kills respectively.

"All year we have had different people step up and play at different times. We have to get everyone

stepping up at the same time, and that is beginning to happen," UK head coach Fran Ralston-Flory said.

Ralston-Flory, who was disappointed with the output against Mississippi State, had to be pleased with the way the Wildcats came back against Alabama (14-13, 1-5) yesterday afternoon.

UK was in firm control of the match from the first serve as the team rolled over the Tide in three games by the scores of 15-4, 15-7 and 15-8.

"We had a good comeback today," said senior setter Jane Belanger, who finished the weekend with 89 assists. "Sure, we won in three on Friday, but it was not a solid three. This was a solid three today, so it feels really good. We ended this weekend on a positive note."

The Wildcats never trailed in either of the first two games of the match, as their solid play allowed them to jump out to huge leads of 13-0 in game one and 6-0 in game two.

Once again a balance offensive attack was the story. With the exception of sophomore Mara Eglitis' scoring on consecutive points early in game one with a powerful kill and a block of Alabama's Mavis Reed, a different Wildcat scored each time throughout the first two

games. "Everyone seems to hit well when it's an on-day. Really, we were trying to concentrate on our middles lately, but if everyone was on so we spread it out more," Belanger said.

The statistics reflected the offense being spread out, as all six Wildcat starters had at least five kills after the first two games. Dreisbach, who finished the match with 12 kills for a total of 28 for the weekend, was the team leader with eight kills after game two.

The Crimson Tide took a brief early lead in game three at 3-2, before UK closed the door with a 7-0 run midway through game three to win it going away 15-8.

Once again no player really stood out for the Wildcats as they scored both from the outside as well as the inside.

Belanger, who mixed up her passes well all afternoon, continued to spread the wealth resulting in open shots for her teammates.

"It was a good weekend. We are building, but we still have a long way to go," Ralston-Flory said.

"We have gotten a lot accomplished and we have gotten better, but I think we are now beginning to see as a team exactly where we need to improve."

Cool Cats split with Tennessee

The intense rivalry between UK and Tennessee in college sports has just gained another chapter.

This weekend, before two packed houses, the UK Cool Cats split a

pair of games with the visiting Volunteers to open their 1993-94 season.

UK won Friday's game 9-7, while UT held off the Cool Cats on Saturday 5-4.

Friday night, UK's Paul Cerabona ignited the crowd of 923 by scoring the first goal of the season on a short-handed breakaway at the 14:23 mark.

The lead was short-lived, however, as a four-minute, double-minor penalty on UK's Pat Fortier cost the Cool Cats dearly.

UT erupted for three goals in 90 seconds to grab a 3-1 lead at the first intermission.

UK tied the score in the second on goals by Klaude Kocan and Bryan Morgenthaler. But UT retook the lead with three goals of its own. A late goal by Art Wickson left the score at 6-4 going into the final period.

That last stanza belonged to the Cool Cats and Chris Boyd, UK's sophomore right wing, Boyd, one of last year's leaders, recorded his first hat trick of the season.

The three goals all came in a five-minute stretch that put UK on top 7-6.

"You don't go out there expecting

to be the hero or score a hat trick, especially in your first game," Boyd said.

"I might have got the three goals, but without the rest of the team they never would have happened."

After another UK goal, scored by Pat Schmidt, UT closed the gap to one, at 8-7, with 6:57 to play. But a final goal by Morgenthaler ended the scoring.

Morgenthaler's goal, his second of the game, came off a penalty shot when he was tripped by the UT goalie on a breakaway. UK's freshman center made the most of the opportunity by faking the goalie out and blasting a shot into the top of the net.

"I was really kind of nervous at the beginning," he said. "But I had watched the goalie all game. He's a butterfly goalie, so I made a move to the right and slid it through the five hole in the middle."

While Boyd and Morgenthaler were the offensive stars Friday night, Saturday belonged to UT's Preston Dickson.

The Volunteers' center had four goals on the evening — two in the first period, one in the second and the game-winner with 10:14 remaining.

UK once again got on the board first as junior right wing Don Kin-drachuk scored a short-handed goal at the 6:25 mark. But then Dickson fired up the UT team with his first two goals to give them a 2-1 lead at the first break.

While the second period only had one goal scored by each team, there was plenty of other action on the ice.

The referee gave his whistle a workout as he called 12 penalties in all, six on each team.

Three players were ejected for fighting during the period, including the Cool Cats' starting goalie Kevin Fraser.

Fraser's backup, freshman Jon Nalli, allowed only two goals in 26 minutes and making several tough saves.

UK tied the score twice in the final period only to see UT retake the lead.

After each of the Cool Cats' goals, the Volunteers came right back with a goal of their own less than a minute later. UK pulled their goalie in the final minute but were unable to tie the score again.

Corporate rock band B-side itself

What? A new Def Leppard album? But it's only been about a year and a half since the last one.

Well, *Retro Active* can't actually be counted as an album, although it does represent the first time these guys haven't taken five or six years to create (and overproduce) a record since way back in the early days of *Pyromania* and *High 'N' Dry*.

This album isn't the regular corporate fodder this British quintet has been feeding MTV and popular radio since *Hysteria* was released in 1987.

Instead, it is a collection of B-sides, rarities and other unreleased material the band has let sit around until it had enough to release as an album to milk even more money from its fans.

Def Leppard once passed for a semi-creative band, each consecutive album evolving to further define the group's sound. Every al-

bum improved on the one before it. The band that recorded 1981's *On Through The Night* was not the band that recorded *Hysteria*.

Adrenalize, however, seemed to put a stop to the somewhat creative juices that once flowed through these guys' shaggy heads. With such mindless tracks as "Make Love Like A Man," *Adrenalize* made a mockery of the band's sound and music.

The album also represented the pinnacle of poppy, bubble-gum rock for the band, with songs such as "Heaven Is" sounding similar to that Canadian loser Bryan Adams.

Retro Active takes a step away from the thin sound presented on *Adrenalize*. It seems the band has tried to stray from the commercial sound of its previous albums, but to say Def Leppard isn't commercial would be an oxymoron, and would totally discredit me as having any intelligence whatsoever (not that I'm claiming to have a lot to begin with).

What this LP does have are a few tracks that the Legs probably should have used on their other CDs. There also are a couple that should have stayed off the final products.

"Desert Song" and "Fractured Love" prove the band has been paying attention to the current popular



music trends, especially the leaning toward heavier rock.

These tracks most likely are precursors to what the next real album might be. (Look for it in 2008.) Actually, these two tracks bring back the energy the band had on *High 'N' Dry* with such songs as "Let It Go" and "Another Hit And Run."

Most of the other cuts were used as B-sides on the singles they've been releasing since *Hysteria*. "I Wanna Be Your Hero" and "Ring Of Fire" come off as pretty strong material.

"From The Inside," which was recorded with members of the Hot-house Flowers, doesn't really fit in anywhere, being an acoustically boring composition in which vocalist Joe Elliot proclaims "I am evil... I'll beat up your wife." Yeah, whatever, Joe.

"She's Too Tough," as Elliot brags in the liner notes, was written in 15 minutes (sounds like it) in 1985. The only thing I can say is that it, well, just sucks.

The album also features two covers. Sweet's "Action" and Mick

Ronson's "Only After Dark." "Ride Into The Sun" is a rerecording of the first Def Leppard song ever put down on vinyl back in 1978 on the *Def Leppard* EP, which was released only in Britain. It features Ian Hunter on piano.

The best unreleased track on the CD is the ballad "Miss You In A Heartbeat." However, there was no need to include three versions of the song.

Neither was there demand for two versions (electric and acoustic) of the cheesy (for lack of a better word) "Two Steps Behind."

Def Leppard's latest probably will be enjoyed by those few who call themselves hardcore fans. Don't expect as much overproduction as the last two albums released by these guys.

Maybe it's good that the band is looking back on *Retro Active*. It leaves the possibility for a better future.

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Failure tries to gain comforting success

With a name like Failure, what can you expect from a new trio of noise makers from Los Angeles?

Expect a lot. *Comfort*, the band's debut effort on Slash Records, was engineered by Steve Albini, the mastermind behind Chicago's legendary guitar maulers Big Black.

Ironically, instead of sounding like Big Black clones, Failure has a sound similar to two Albini worshipping groups he's produced in recent years: Slint and Crain, both from Louisville, Ky.

Without the speed of Crain and the intricacy of Slint, however, Failure has found a dreamlike middle ground.

Guitarist Ken Andrews opts for a lullaby singing style rather than the frequent shouting of Slint and Crain. But while Andrews' singing is on the lighter side, his guitar work is effectively abrasive, creating a hard-edged music whose force speaks for itself.

Drummer Robert Gauss is a student of the heavy hand school of percussion, blasting his snare as if trying to split the head and scrape the bottom. It sounds as if he's never heard the word "cymbal." Greg Edwards completes the rhythm section with ringing bass guitar that stands on its own instead of getting lost in the mix.



"Something," and "Kindred" are the albums best tracks, using the band's masterful gathering of playing styles that complement one another and create a unique sound.

Failure's similarities to Slint and Crain are not disheartening, considering that the brand of music these bands deliver is original and uncharted territory.

With the name of Steve Albini boldly displayed on the cover, you get the feeling that Failure is using the popular "famous producer play" to sell records. You're right.

But when the last off beat drum solo is pounded out and all disharmonious guitar chords evaporate into thin air, Failure stands firmly on its own merits.

Praise or no praise to Albini, *Comfort* will grant Failure success.

Area blessed by Church's paintings

For as long as she can remember, Monica Church has wanted to be an artist.

Art is as important to her existence as food and water, an "essential ingredient in any quality way of life," she says.

Now, UK students can share Church's passion for art. Her stunning acrylic paintings go on exhibit at a local bookstore at the end of the month.

Church, a UK master's of fine arts candidate, formally began exploring the world of art more than 10 years ago at the Rhode Island School of Design, where she studied printmaking. She enrolled in Bennington College in 1987 after realizing that she wanted to focus on the fine arts, rather than commercial art.

"I've always been interested in art," she said. "It makes me happy because it doesn't involve any math."

Church has been a teacher's assistant at UK, helping students in color theory, visual expression and art history classes.

She has participated in several solo and group exhibitions held at illustrious galleries and museums

across the country.

Her work has been shown at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, The Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City, the Cincinnati Art Club, The Krempf Gallery in Iowa and the Kennedy Union Art Gallery in Ohio.

Church works primarily with acrylic paints but also likes to create collages.

"I collect things from the street or from my family — archival things — and make personal collages," she said.

Church has a distinctive abstract style that challenges the viewer to feel the art as well as see it.

"My method is sort of quirky and weird," she said. "When I interpret a landscape, the final picture may not look like a landscape, but it really feels like one."

Church's favorite creation is her "Vermont Walk." Painted during a difficult period of her life, the small picture possesses a calm sense of serene beauty.

"The painting is quiet and cool.

The colors come directly out of the Vermont landscape where I used to go walking," she said.

Greatly influenced by the achievements of Robert Motherwell and Helen Frankenthaler, Church said she feels a special connection with the first abstract expressionists.

"I went to the Frankenthaler Retrospective at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and was just overwhelmed by (Frankenthaler's) work," Church said. "Her paintings had all of the elements that I strive to achieve in mine."

While Church tries to vary the subjects of her creations, each piece retains the mark of her distinctive style.

All of the formal aspects of her work, such as color, texture and surface quality blend together to form a special look that has become her trademark.

"I have a very painterly style," she said.

"I really struggle to get the whole canvas to work together."

When Church feels the urge to

paint or put together a collage, she locks herself in her studio and frantically cleans until inspiration strikes.

"I go into my space and try to connect with my work. It takes a lot of patience to allow that connection to happen," she said.

"I feel this incredible need to paint — it's the way I order my world," she said.

"Good experiences, and even negative emotions, excite me and make me want to paint."

UK students interested in Church's work can see her collages on display at Joseph-Beth Book-sellers on Oct. 31.

These pieces are made up of odds and ends she collected while traveling in Hanoi, Vietnam, in 1987.

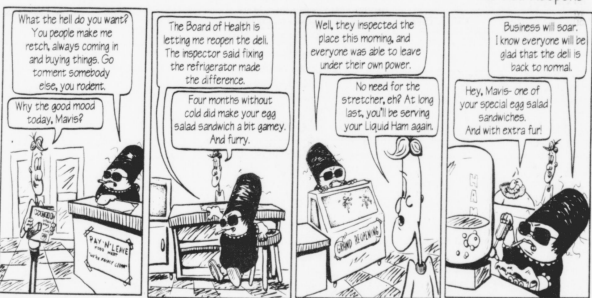
Church also will showcase a huge body of her paintings and collages at the Center for Contemporary Art from Nov. 21 to Dec. 10 as her thesis exhibition.

College of Engineering," Wethington said.

"It will be a quieter campaign for the library from this point forward."

He said UK may try to gain support from the General Assembly during the next session.

The University will do some advertising, but "it won't be a PR campaign," he said.

Officials still aren't sure what the final private funding total will be because they expect several more donations in the near future.

The UK library fund-raising campaign began Oct. 18, 1991, with a \$5 million gift from Lexington businessman W.T. Young. It is the

largest gift ever from an alumnus.

Of the \$20 million goal, UK earmarked \$12 million dollars to be used for construction costs and \$8 million to be used for an endowment to buy books for the new library.

Construction for the library is scheduled to begin in 1994. It should be completed two years later.

NOTES:

UK honored 208 new fellows Friday night during a black-tie dinner on the floor of Rupp Arena.

UK Fellows are alumni and friends who have donated more than \$10,000 to UK.

Since the program began 28 years ago, 3,287 have become UK Fellows. The group's donations and pledges total more than \$79.7 million.

Hemenway came to UK as an associate English professor and later was chairman of the department from 1981 to 1986.

He then left the school to become dean of arts and sciences at the University of Oklahoma but returned to UK in 1989 to replace Art Gallaber as chancellor.

He is responsible for operations of all academic programs on the Lexington Campus.

His salary is \$132,000 a year.
