London, Dec. 10 (INS)—The French Council of Ministers today decided to inform the League of Nations that France will not make the debt payment due on December 15, it was settled in a Reuters dispatch from Paris.

Diplomats Become Cautious Regarding Balkan Situation

Geneva, Dec. 10 (INS)—Fearing to risk another airing of the Hungarian-Yugoslav dispute in the council of the League of Nations under the present precarious circumstances, diplomats of neutral and semi-neutral states today set the council meeting back several days as they frantically went into little hurriedly to find a satisfactory basis for agreement.

The necessity for quick pacification was suddenly imposed upon the British, French, and Italians by the disconcerting revelations that late Yugoslavia is resolved independently to seek satisfaction from Hungary if the league does not pin responsibility for the Maresilles assassinations onto Hungary.

The minimum that Yugoslavia will be asked to do is to accept the league's declaration by the king denouncing the killing of King Alexander, and blaming Hungary.
