

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, February 9, at 4:00 p.m. In the absence of President Donovan Vice President Chamberlain presided. Members absent were Louis Clifton, May K. Duncan, William C. Eaton, W. D. Funkhouser, M. Jongeward, L. E. Meece, E. B. Penrod, Frances Seeds, Earl P. Slone, William S. Taylor, and D. V. Terrell.

The minutes of January 19, were read and approved.

Dean Holmes, Chairman of the Committee on Student Organizations, presented a request from Pi Mu Epsilon to be allowed to increase its minimum standing requirement from 1.7 to 2.0. She reported that the organization had also requested a change in classification from recognition to honor society and that she had asked that additional information be furnished the committee as a basis for recommendation. The University Faculty voted approval of the request of the organization to increase its minimum standing requirement.

Mrs. Holmes also presented requests for two new organizations, the Young Democratic Club of the University of Kentucky, and Tau Kappa, a social fraternity. Action on both requests was postponed to the next meeting.

Dean White presented for the College of Arts and Sciences the following recommendations for new courses and course changes made necessary by the change to the semester system:

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

TO THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY:

The Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences recommends for approval the following:

1. Conversion of courses from the quarter to semester basis.  
Zoology 25, Animal Biology, from 5 qtr. hrs. to 4 sem. crs.  
Zoology 30, Limnology, from 4 qtrs. hrs. to 4 sem. crs.  
Zoology 109, Animal Ecology, from 3 qtr. hrs. to 3 sem. crs.

11. Course Listings.

That the Department of Anthropology be permitted to add Societies Around the World, Sociology and Geography 3a, to their course offering and list it as Anthropology 3a.

That the Department of Anthropology be permitted to offer Anthropology 10a, Field Work in Anthropology, in the spring quarter, 3 qtr. hrs. credit. This course was previously approved as a 3 sem. cr. course.

That the Department of English be permitted to expand English 38 Oral Interpretation (now approved for 5 qtr. hrs. or 3 sem. crs.), to English 33a and 38b, 3 sem. crs. each.

111. Changes in title and number.

Geography 30, Elementary Cartography to Geography 134, Cartography.  
Geography 101, Geography of North America, to Geography 100, Regional Geography of Anglo America.



## IV. New Courses.

History 146, Recent History of the U. S., 1877-1901 (4 qtr. hrs. 3 sem. crs.). A study of the transformation of America from a rural society "isolated" from world affairs into a highly industrialized power. Emphasis placed on the rise and growth of trusts, the development of the American labor movement, the agrarian revolt, and other aspects of the political, social, and intellectual history of the world.  
Prerequisites: History 10a and 10b or equivalent.

Zoology 130, Advanced Limnology (4 sem. crs.)

Detailed analysis of fresh water environments with special emphasis upon biological productivity. 2 hrs. lecture, 4 hrs. field and laboratory.  
Prerequisites: Zoology 1a and 1b.

That the Department of Military Science and Tactics be permitted to offer M. S. 12b and 12c, Administrative Military Management, and 13b and 13c Aircraft Maintenance Engineering, as 4 qtr. hr. or 4 sem. cr. courses, Approval was previously given M. S. 12a and 13a.

## Curricula.

Approval is recommended for the attached curricula of the Departments of Bacteriology and Journalism.

## VI. Miscellaneous.

1. That the Department of Mathematics and Astronomy be permitted to eliminate the comprehensive examination in mathematics for its majors as a requirement for graduation.

2. That the Department of Military Science and Tactics be permitted to require ROTC enrollees to attend Military Science Classes on the following hours:

4:00-5:00 Monday, March 29  
4:00-5:00 Monday, April 5  
4:00-5:00 Monday, April 12  
4:00-5:00 Monday, April 19  
4:00-5:00 Monday, April 26  
4:00-5:00 Monday, May 3  
4:00-5:00 Monday, May 10

Also that no ROTC enrollee be scheduled for any other class at these hours.

3. That the following procedures be adopted for foreign language courses:

- a. The student who presents one unit of high school foreign language will be permitted to enroll in first year work for full credit.
- b. The student who presents two units of high school foreign language will be permitted to enroll in first year work, but will receive credit only if he makes at least a B standing in this course.

The Faculty voted approval of these recommendations.

In the absence of Dean Taylor, Carsie Hammonds presented for the College of Education a request that Education 181, Teaching Vocational Agriculture, be increased from a 12 semester hour course to a 15 semester hour course, effective with the inauguration of the semester system. He stated that this increase in credit was made necessary because of a recent interpretation of the Office of Education in Washington. The University Faculty approved the change.

In the absence of Dean Funkhouser, M. M. White, Chairman of the Committee on Honorary Degrees of the Graduate Faculty, presented the following recommendations of the committee:

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY MARCH 8, 1948

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, March 8, at 4:00 p.m. In the absence of President Donovan, Vice President Chamberlain presided. Members absent were C. A. Anderson, May K. Duncan, William C. Eaton, W. D. Funkhouser, M. Jongeward, Claude Sprowles, and Edward Wiest.

The minutes of February 9 were read and approved.

Dr. Chamberlain announced to the Faculty that President Donovan had arrived safely in Germany.

Dean Holmes, Chairman of the Committee on Student Organizations, presented the following recommendations from the Committee:
