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Mr. Sheehan And 'Activities'

We hate to keep bringing up the subject of Vincent Sheehan's recent appearance on the campus...

Today's particular Sheehaning has to do with the matter of campus 'activities,' which were touched upon rather forcefully, if briefly, in the last stages of The Kernel's after-speech interview with him the other night...

We think Mr. Sheehan is absolutely correct in his premise, and we believe the present condition of 'activities' on the UK campus will prove his case.

To begin with, it is no secret among those who are currently trying to hold together an apparently decaying system of extracurriculars that the campus is sadly devoid of natural leaders. Presidents of the various honoraries are being heard lamenting the scarcity of potential candidates...

Various reasons are offered for this phenomenon, chief among them being that world conditions have imposed a decided 'don't give a damn' attitude on the minds of most collegians. Another explanation offered is that students today simply are lazier than they used to be...

Without doubt, the support given by the Greeks to extracurricular activities is one of the most important contributions which the fraternity system makes to the American university. Without it, the word 'activities' would be even more deserving of quotation marks than it is at present.

But most fraternities today, in dealing with the matter, are about ten years behind the times.

They assume to begin with that all freshmen are ignorant of the workings of activities, are necessarily backward about entering into them, and therefore should be pushed headfirst into the maelstrom. And, somehow or other, the prevailing philosophy is the more extracurriculars the better...

It is basically fallacious because it is overlooking some very important factors. Most high schools by this time have increased and are increasing their extra-academic programs, so that by the time a student gets to be a college freshman he is pretty well informed as to what this 'activity' business is all about...

Secondly, the practice of 'pushing' freshmen results in the quick (and understandable) acquisition of a distaste for the whole business. The system soon is referred to as activities-with-quotes, and the freshman resolves that as soon as he attains his sophomore ranking he will have done with the whole mess.

Self-choice is the most logical answer to the dilemma. The only way this can possibly be accomplished is to advise and pull strings for those students who as freshmen express interest in special fields, but to refrain from 'pushing' them if they show no particular enthusiasm.

The need for a change is not a mere assumption; it is an accomplished fact—as anyone can testify who has had any dealings with organizations which are stymied because they are knee-deep in indifferent students who are 'only here to get activity points.'

It's a messy design, getting messier each year, and before it turns out to be a system-killing fungus, someone in the proper position should do something to correct it.

Dignity of a university to sanction any move toward the presentation of student talent.

If by reestablishing Strollers the University will effect an annual student musical comedy, then I heartily recommend such action be taken immediately. For reasons, previously mentioned, any movement which furthers the status of the musical comedy is a commendable one.

Question: Do you approve of the allotment of \$1,500 of SGA funds to the Social committee for a Junior Prom and Senior Ball?

Clifford Bailey, Education senior: "No. Fifteen hundred dollars is too much money to spend on social activities. I think the funds in question should be divided, awarding \$750 to a student loan fund and \$750 to the Social Committee."

John McFarland, Arts and Science senior: "Yes. This money can be profitably spent for student dances if not used to the extent of excluding appropriations more beneficial to the student body. If the Student Legislature agrees upon a practical student loan bill, they could give 50 percent of this money to the fund."

Howard Motter, Arts and Science junior: "Yes. The students deserve one good dance each year and the \$1500 appropriated to the Social Committee can be well used in securing one top-notch dance band. The use of SGA funds for student loans or undergraduate scholarships will not benefit enough students to warrant the approval of the Legislature."

Betty Jane Pugh, Arts and Science sophomore: "No. The student body is primarily an educational institution and the money can be better used in assisting worthy students to continue their education."
