### Kentucky Meets Improved Spartans There Tomorrow

The hard-hitting Kentucky Wildcats meet Michigan State on Saturday afternoon on the Spartan's Macklin Field. Over 27,000 people are expected to witness the sectional battle between the smiling Wildcats, who have won their last four games, and the improving Spartan riders from East Lansing, Mich.

Captain Paul Bryant will probably start the same eleven tomorrow as began the game last Saturday against Vanderbilt. The three "B's"—Blanda, Babb and Bolter—are expected to be pitching plenty of aerials against the green and white clad Northerners, who have allowed just one touchdown through their last three contests.

After losing their opener to mighty Michigan, 38-0, the Spartans have taken three straight victories over better-than-average competition. They upset Mississippi State, 7-0, three weeks ago, then whacked a big Washington State crew, 21-7, and last Saturday MSC whipped stubborn Iowa State in a homecoming game at East Lansing. Now the Michigan Spartans are seeking their fourth straight win of the 1947 grid season.

**Guerrre Big Threat**  
Husky little George Guerre, MSC halfback, is expected to lead the offense for Coach Mumm's team. Guerre ranked 12th in the nation last fall in individual total offense, accounting for over 1,000 yards and 16 games. Last week against Iowa State he scored two touchdowns on runs of 25 to 37 yards and set up the third tally before big Leon Chambliss broke loose for a 38-yard dash into pay dirt.

Other threats in the backfield beside Guerre and Chambliss are fullback Blankhorn, a speedy runner from Saginaw, Mich., and Gene Dick, 196-pound quarterback, who is a passing artist. In the forward line are Captain Bob McCurdy, a 205-pound center from Lewistown, and Edith Warren Head and 26-year-old Ken Balge, all of whom have played outstanding ball in recent games.

This football game will be the fourth in a series that was born in wartime between the two schools. The series started in 1944 on Stoll Field when the Spartans beat the Cats, 2-0; the following year Kentucky again lost in a tight game, 7-6, in a game at East Lansing.

In the third contest of the series, played last year at Stoll Field.

Joe Holland, Jim Lane, and freshman Mike Homa, worked at left forward with Cliff Barker, Jim Jordan, Walter Hirsch and Roger Day in the other forward slot. Alex Gruze and Dutch Campbell moved around in the post position as Beard, Kenny Rollins, Jack Parkinson, Dale Barnstable, Johnny Strough, and Al Cummins roared in for layup shots from the guard positions.

### Wildcats Drop Vandy From Unbeaten, 14-0; Blanda, Sengel Score

A crowd of approximately 20,000 Vanderbilt students and fans turned out last Saturday to put the "Double Whammy" on Kentucky's Wildcats, but the 2,500 Kentucky rooters led by the Best Band in Dixie counteracted with an anti-evil eye powerful enough not only to push the Cats over for two touchdowns, but also to hold the Commodores scoreless with only 36 net yards rushing.

Almost immediately after the opening whistle the Vandy crowd started the evil-eye treatment, but the Kentucky crowd, assuming the role of "Mummy Yokum" soon had everything under control, and after seven minutes of play George Blanda slipped across from his quarterback slot for the first TD.

Then late in the second period, Blanda pitched to Chink Sengel for another TD. Blanda added two additional points with place kicks, but missed an attempted field goal in the second half, and the Kentucky crowd turned off some of the power and let the discouraged Commodores founder around against a far superior Wildcat organization.

Why groups may sell tickets and may not sell student written and published magazines is not understandable. The only difference obvious to the Kernel is that one has more paper in it and was more work. Vague, the literary magazine, lost at least \$50 of needed sales last year because they were not allowed to sell in the Union. Because of this, it will have a needless struggle this year.

The Kernel has heard that this subject was discussed at a recent meeting of the board. However, no one was present to defend and present the problems of such a group.

The Union Board must certainly see that, if it is really to foster and promote student activities, it should not put them on the back by letting them have a room to meet in, and then seal their doom financially. The Union Board must not realize how vital it is in the making and breaking of campus groups.

We can see that the Union might be overloaded with groups applying for sales at one time, but a limit might be set without too much trouble. This would be more agreeable than banning ALL student projects.

An amendment to the constitution should be made, carefully excluding all business and concession interests off-campus, and allowing student organizations dependent upon their projects for existence to sell their work in the student building.
