The Campus Parking Situation

The Sunday Lexington Herald-Leader carried

The Sunday Lexington Herald-Leader carried an interesting feature story commending the work of Dean T. T. Jones in building up and maintaining an adequate system of campus parking control. Til Kirskii. Jones in building up and money are not being expended in patrolling as well-nigh descried late-afternon campus. In a survey conducted last October by the most definer student Council, it was found that on Monday's, Wednesday's, and Friday's (business days), parking areas on the west side of the campus were only 20 to 40 percent filled between 1 and 2 p. m., set regulations are enforced until 4 p. m. On the cast side, excepting reserved spaces, areas were barely 70 percent filled during these hours.

As a result of its findings, the Council recommended to Dean Jones that parking be allowed anywhere on the campus after 1 p. m. Insofar as we know, nothing has been done. It is Turk Kirskii's understanding that the parking ruling is made by the Board of. Trustees, and would have to be amended by the Board.

Dean Jones would be serving the interests of cononny and the interests of students and faculty members with cars if he conflucted a more thorough survey through his office. If his findings corroborace the Council report, undoubtedly the Board will make changes.

If the foregoing (lifted from 1917 necaspapers) mokes you laugh, your peace knowledge is as it should be; if it makes you mad, you're on the right track, but need a dose of anti-militaristic pacifism; if it makes you concur, you are sinking rapidly—you require an immediate transfusion of intelligence tempered with history.

The Idea, Too

Should there not be at least one student mem-ber, chosen by students, on the curriculum com-mittee of each college or school in the university? Students would then not only be able to know what is going on in the formulation of educa-tional policy for them (which they have every right to do.) but they would also have some share in that formulation (which would be good for them, and, I think, for the university).

Professor Whitehead has said: "The justifica-tion for a university is that it preserves the con-nection between knowledge and the zest of life, by uniting the young and the old in the imagina-tive consideration of learning." The experience of several colleges, where such "uniting" of fac-ulty and students to consider educational policy is in effect, seems to indicate its value.—Professor W. R. Agard in the Wisconsin Daily Cardinal.
