This is a meditation, by a monk, on the monastic way of life— that is to say on the life of men who consecrate themselves entirely to God. and when the monks of today are the many spiritual descendants of the Fathers of the Desert, and their horizons are always those of solitude, education, even though they may engage in manufacturing scholarship, are the liturgical apostolate, or scientific agriculture.

Books have been written on the monastic spirit and other books have been written on kingdirkings each monastic order. The unique feature of this homic is that it treats of the monastic spirit in general and then goes on to devote a chapter to each of the great branches of the monastic family: first the combites- Benedictines and Cistercians, and then the hermits, Carthusians and Camaldolese. It is the first book of its kind to have appeared in English, and it will given the median satisfy something of the curiosity of those who have heard the admirable records of the Cregorian chart of the monks of Solesmes and want to know more about the Benedictines. It Tells also of the Primitive Benedictine Observance which is just beginning to exist in America, of the Cistereian ideal, which is that of the Trappists. It indimensional antiquetan gives a detailed account of the spirit of the Carthusian hermits, the most solitary and austore Order in the Church, and finally it militarian brings to light the almost unknown Order of the Camaldolese hermits who have kept alive more perfectly than any other group the spirit and observance of oriental. monasticism in the Western Church.

At a time when the monastic life is maken operioneing manuscrick its most remarkable revival since the Middle Ages, and when the presence of the monk reminds other believers of the loftlness and uncompromising exigencies of the Christian ideal, manuscrick this book will doubtless inspire many with a deeper appreciation of the life of prayer, of charity, of liturgical praise and solitary meditation which should be part not only of the monk's life but also, in some degree, of every Christian's.
