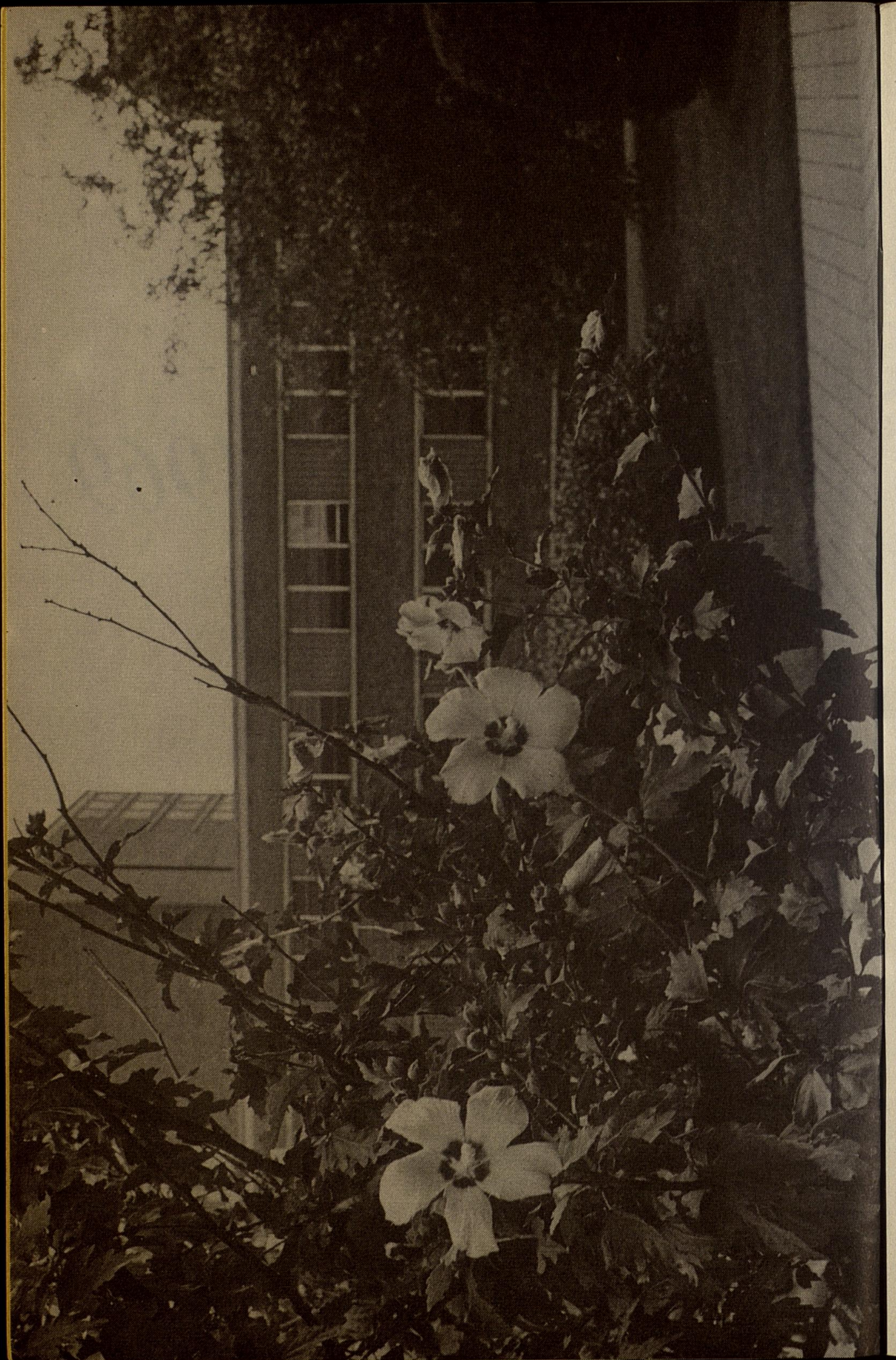

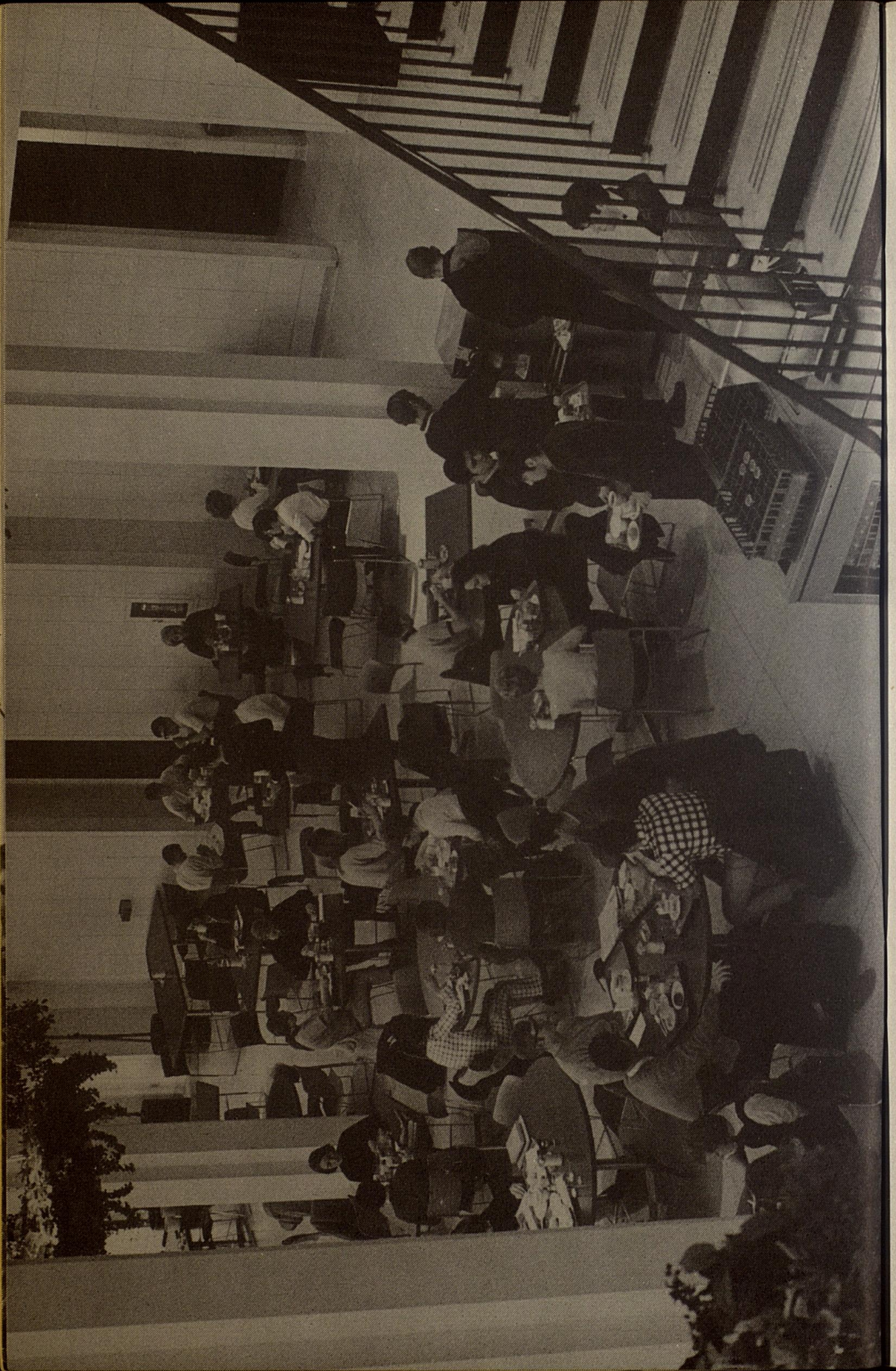


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CHANGES IN THE PRINTED SCHEDULE

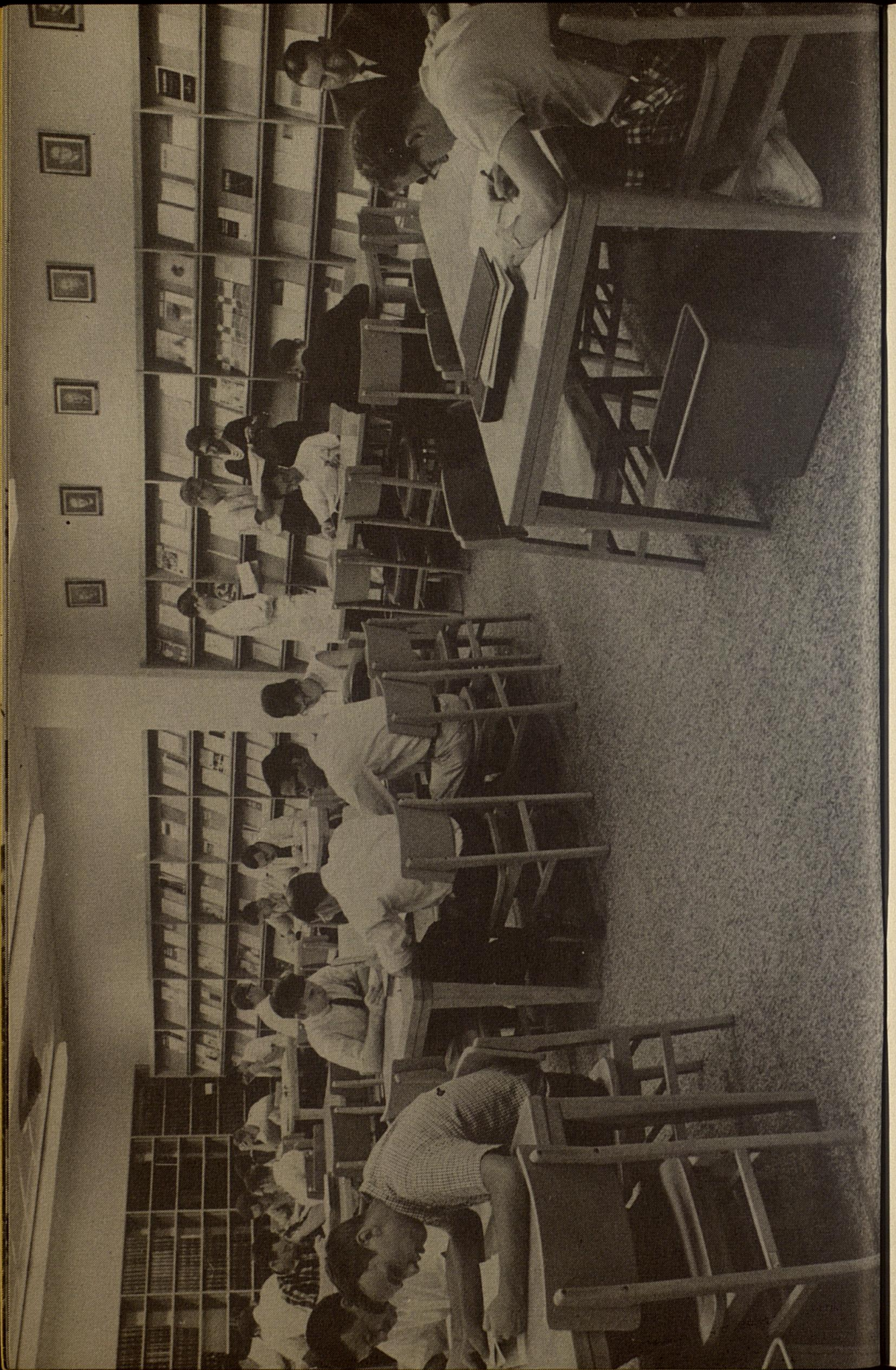

Curricula

The University of Kentucky, a land-grant institution, will offer eight weeks of regular summer session work and post-session courses. Courses will be offered in eleven colleges—Arts and Sciences, Agriculture, Home Economics, Engineering, Law, Education, Business and Economics, Pharmacy, Medicine, Allied Health Professions, Library Science—and in the Graduate School.

Over and above its program of liberal education, the University Summer Session provides numerous opportunities for persons to prepare for specific occupations. The opportunities are in a number of fields such as: Journalism, Pre-Medicine, Pre-Dentistry, Pre-Pharmacy, Music, Library Science, Public Service, Art, Geography, Geology, Microbiology, Psychology, Sociology; Agriculture in its various phases, Pre-Forestry, Pre-Veterinary, Home Economics; Engineering—Agricultural, Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Engineering Mechanics, Mechanical and Metallurgical and Materials Science; Law; Elementary and High School Teaching, Educational Administration and Supervision and Secretarial Work; General Business, Banking and Finance, Personnel Management, Marketing, Accounting, Business Administration and Industrial Administration.

Credit Hours

Nine semester hours are considered the normal load for undergraduates. For graduate students, the normal load is six hours; the maximum is nine. Graduate students who earn six or more graduate credits and who remain in residence throughout the Summer Session are assigned nine weeks of residence.

Fees

For the Summer Session, the full-time fee for all Kentucky students will be \$80. For out-of-state students, the fee will be \$260. The hourly fee for part-time undergraduate students will be \$14 per credit hour for Kentucky residents, and \$44 per credit hour for out-of-state students. The hourly fee for part-time graduate students will be \$17 per credit hour for Kentucky residents, and \$55 per credit hour for out-of-state students. The Summer Term fee for the College of Law will be \$16 per credit hour for Kentucky residents and \$52 per credit hour for out-of-state students.

Admission

Undergraduate applicants for admission should write to the Dean of Admissions for application forms, stating whether they wish admission to the freshman class or advanced standing. Applications and transcripts of credit should be filed 30 days in advance with the Office of the Dean of Admissions. Students entering with advanced standing should present transcripts from each institution they have attended. High school graduates are invited to start their college careers in the Summer Session.

Graduate applicants for admission should write to the Graduate School Office for application forms. Applications and transcripts of credits should be filed 30 days in advance with the Graduate School Office.

Students who were enrolled in day classes on the Lexington campus for the Spring, 1969, Semester and were not dismissed may enroll in the Summer Session without any additional application, unless they plan to begin work in a professional school or the Graduate School. Admission procedures for these schools must be met as specified by the school.

A student who was last enrolled at the University in the Summer Session, 1968, and has not been dismissed, may also register for the 1969 Summer Session without filing an application for admission.

Living Accommodations

Room applications for single men and women should be made to the Housing Office, Room 107, Kinkead Hall. Rental for a room in the residence halls is \$110 for a double room and \$140 for a single room for the summer session, payable at the time application is submitted. Cost of housing during short courses depends on the number of nights in residence. All full-time summer school students will be housed in the new air-conditioned Blanding-Kirwan residence hall complex. A \$25 processing fee will be charged for all cancellations received after May 26, 1969.

Furnished efficiency and one-bedroom family housing units are available in Shawneetown at \$85 and \$100 per month. Applications for family accommodations should be made as early as possible to the Housing Office.

Breakfast and dinner meals are available in the Blanding-Kirwan housing complex cafeteria. The Student Center cafeteria and grill will be open at noon.

Cultural and Recreational Resources

The University of Kentucky is located in the center of the Bluegrass Region, an area of scenic beauty and historic interest. Many of the famous horsefarms, some more than a thousand acres, are in this rich region. During the Summer Session tours are conducted to many of these farms, including Elmen-dorf, Calumet and Castleton. Ashland (home of Henry Clay), General John Hunt Morgan's residence, the home of Mary Todd (wife of Abraham Lincoln), and Keeneland Race Track are points of historic interest which may be visited. Out-of-town trips are often scheduled to view the outdoor dramatic presentations of "Home Is The Hunter" (Harrodsburg, Ky.) and "The Stephen Foster Story" (Bardstown, Ky.). Lectures and concerts by specialists and visiting professors are presented by the various departments within the University Community. The recreational and lounge facilities in the Student center are frequented by all summer students, as well as the planned programs of folk dancing, watermelon feasts, jam sessions and weekly film series.

Health Service

The services of the University Health Service are available to all full-time students who have filed a Health Report Form. Only full-time students may apply for these services by submitting a Health Report form.

High School Junior Summer Program

The High School Junior Summer Program is sponsored by the Summer Session and the Admissions Office during the eight week Summer term at the University of Kentucky. The program is open to all students with a B average or better in their High School academic courses. Applicants are considered for admission as beginning freshmen.

The transcript of High School grades (B or better), results of the American College Test indicating the student's readiness for college, and letters of recommendation from teachers must reach the Admissions Office thirty days before the beginning of the Summer Session.

Colleges are arranged according to order and in general the departments of each College are arranged alphabetically.

Days of recitations are indicated by the initial letters of the days. For example, M-Th indicates the class is offered Monday through Thursday, M-F indicates the class is offered Monday through Friday, etc.

COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

- 011-099 – No credit and/or non-degree courses
- 100-199 – Open to freshmen; gives undergraduate credit only
- 200-299 – Prerequisite sophomore classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 300-399 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 400-499 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit for non-majors
- 500-599 – Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit
- 600-799 – Open only to graduate students
- 800-999 – Open only to professional students in professional colleges except by permission of college dean

1. Freshmen may be admitted to courses numbered between 200 and 499, and sophomores to courses numbered between 300 and 499, upon approval of the instructor and the dean of the student's college. Such approval shall be limited to students who have demonstrated superior ability or preparation.

2. Seniors with superior ability or preparation may be admitted to courses numbered between 600 and 799 upon approval by the instructor, the dean of the student's college and the dean of the graduate school.

3. No students, other than those registered in the professional schools, may be admitted to courses numbered between 800 and 999 except by permission of the Dean of the college.

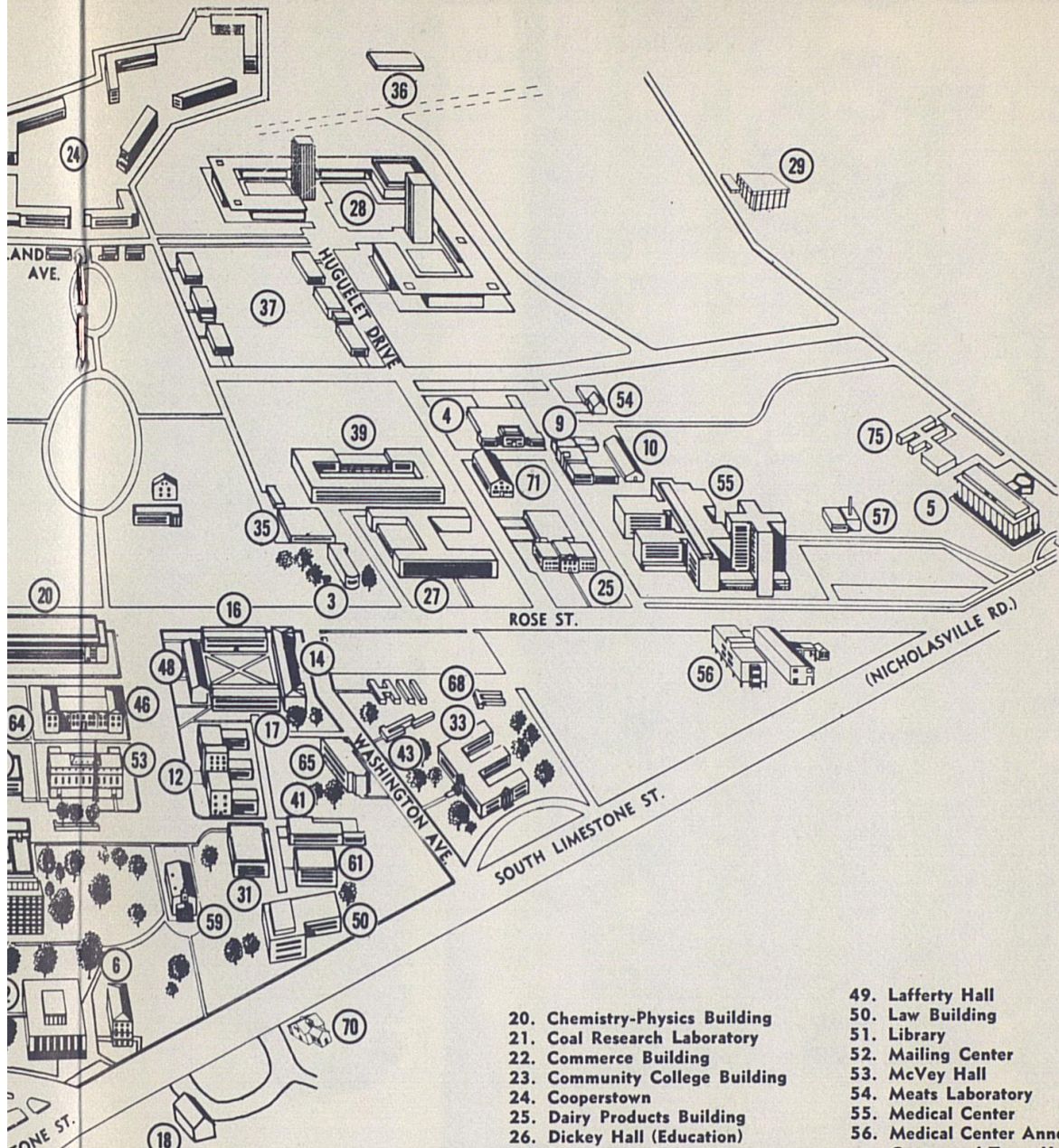

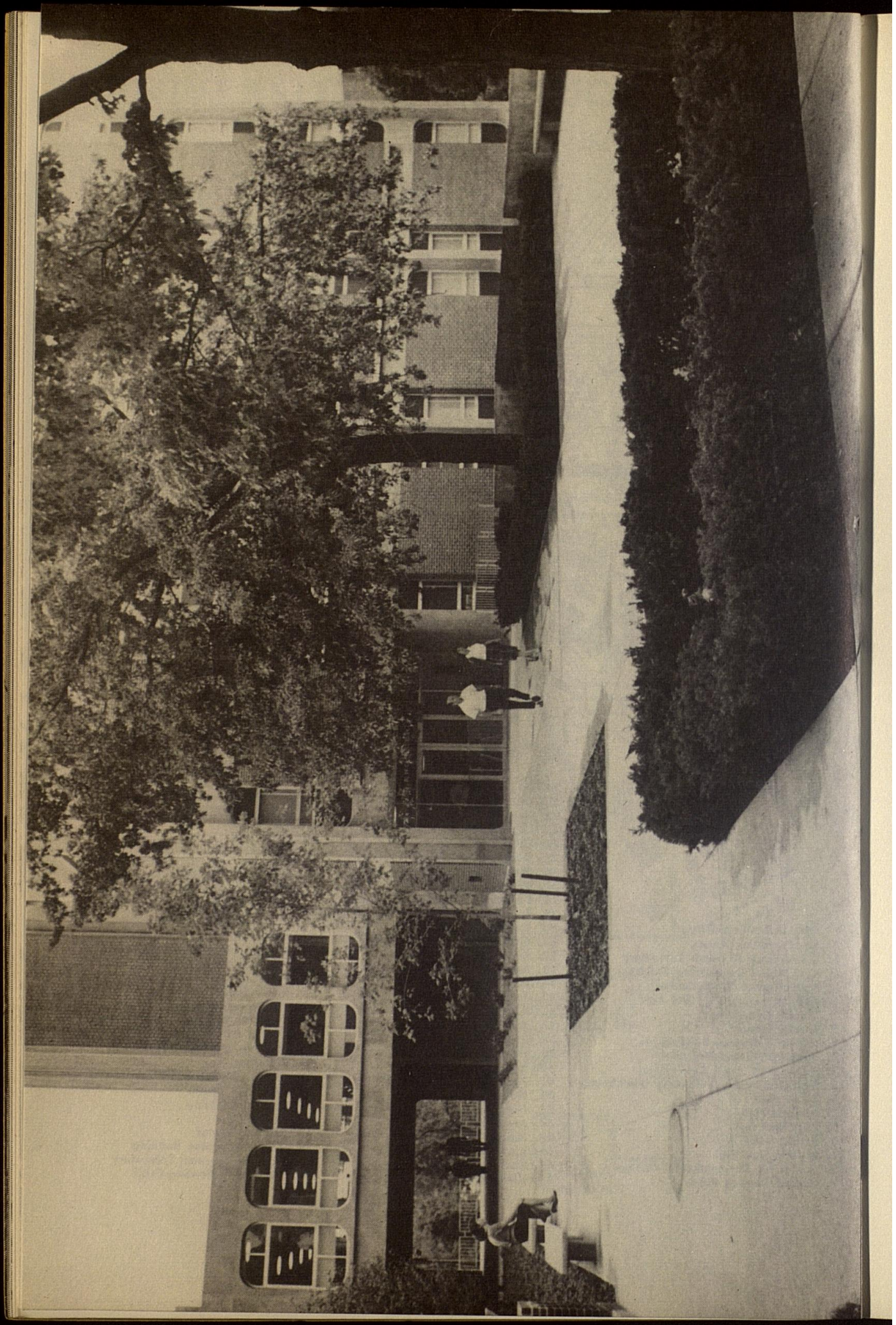

SCHOLASTIC PROBATION, ACADEMIC SUSPENSION AND REINSTATEMENT

Undergraduate Colleges:

1. General regulations for undergraduate students:

- a. The scholastic probation and academic suspension systems are based on quality point deficit. The base for determining the deficit is the number of quality points which would result from multiplying the number of hours attempted by two. Deficit is the difference, if any, between this base and the number of quality points earned.
- b. Courses which have been completed with a grade of "B" or better shall not be repeated for credit hours or quality points, except for those courses for which repeated registration is provided in the official course description.

A student shall have the option to repeat once as many as three different courses which have been completed with a grade of C, D, or E with only the grade, credit hours, and quality points for the second completion used in computing the student's academic standing and credit for graduation. Before enrolling in a class under this option, the student must notify in writing the dean of the college in which he is enrolled and his advisor. If a student officially withdraws from the second attempt, then the grade, credit hours, and quality points for the first completion shall constitute the grade in that course for official purposes, and the second attempt shall constitute exhaustion of one of the three options to repeat a course under this provision unless at the time of withdrawal permission to again attempt the same course shall be granted by the instructor and the dean of the college in which the student is enrolled.

2. Scholastic probation:

- a. The academic record of each freshman student will be reviewed after his first full semester. If a student has a deficit in excess of 5 quality points at the end of his first full semester, the dean shall either place him on scholastic probation or warn him that he is making unsatisfactory progress. If he has demonstrated that he cannot or will not do satisfactory work, he shall be subject to academic suspension from the University, but the dean may place the student on scholastic probation if the individual case justifies it.
- b. The following undergraduate student shall be placed on scholastic probation by the dean of his college:
 - (1) Except for first semester freshmen, a student who, at the end of any semester or session, has a cumulative deficit in excess of 5 quality points.
 - (2) A student who has earned a total of 90 semester hours (senior standing) or more and has a cumulative grade point standing less than 2.0.

3. Removal from probation:

The following undergraduate student shall be removed from probation by the dean of his college:

- a. A student on scholastic probation who has not earned 90 semester hours (senior standing), and who at the end of a semester or session has reduced his cumulative deficit to 5 quality points or less.

- b. A student on scholastic probation who has earned 90 semester hours (senior standing), and who at the end of a semester or session has a cumulative grade point standing of 2.0.
4. Academic suspension:
The following undergraduate student who has not previously been academically suspended shall be subject to academic suspension from the University, but a dean may continue a student on scholastic probation if the individual case justifies it:
 - a. A student who acquires an additional deficit in excess of 5 quality points during any semester or session while on scholastic probation.
 - b. A student who has a cumulative deficit in excess of 15 quality points at the end of any semester or session while on scholastic probation.
 - c. A student who has been on scholastic probation for three consecutive semesters.
 - d. A student who demonstrates that he cannot or will not do satisfactory work.
5. Reinstatement:
After he has remained out of the University for at least a semester and a summer session (a semester for a student academically suspended at the end of a summer session) a student who has been academically suspended may be reinstated by the dean of the college in which he plans to enroll when he presents evidence that he is capable of performing at the level required to prevent being suspended a second time.
6. General rules for reinstated students:
A student who has been academically suspended shall, upon reinstatement, be placed on scholastic probation and be subject to final academic suspension from the University if:
 - a. He acquires any additional deficit during any semester or session while he is on scholastic probation.
 - b. He has not reduced his deficit by 8 quality points or eliminated it by the end of the second semester following his reinstatement.
 - c. He has failed to meet the requirements for removal from scholastic probation by the end of the third semester following his reinstatement.Once a reinstated student has been removed from scholastic probation, he shall be subject to the same conditions for subsequent academic suspension as a student who has not previously been academically suspended.
7. General rules pertaining to students under academic suspension:
 - a. A student who is under academic suspension may not enroll in any courses offered by the University of Kentucky.
 - b. A student who has been academically suspended a second time shall not be readmitted to the University except in unusual circumstances and then only upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which he plans to enroll and approval of the University Senate Council.
 - c. A student who is ineligible to enter or reenter a baccalaureate degree program may be reinstated only for the purpose of enrolling in a terminal associate degree program and shall be declared a "non-degree student" when he presents evidence that he is capable of performing at the level required to complete the program. In no event shall credit be given or transferred for baccalaureate courses taken during such period if the student is later reinstated in the University for the purpose of enrolling in a baccalaureate program.

Professional Colleges:

Pharmacy.

Definition: Pharmacy standing is the over-all grade point average for all professional and non-professional work accomplished subsequent to admission to the Professional Curriculum.

1. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 2.0 at the end of any semester shall be dropped from the University or placed on academic probation.
2. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 1.5 at the end of any semester shall have his record reviewed by the College of Pharmacy faculty and may be dropped from the University without a preliminary probationary semester.
3. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, fails to have achieved a semester standing of 2.0 at the end of this semester shall be dropped from the University.
4. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, achieves a 2.0 standing for that semester but fails to bring his pharmacy standing up to 2.0 will be continued on probation or be dropped from the University.
5. Any student who, at the end of his second consecutive probationary semester, fails to have achieved a 2.0 pharmacy standing shall be dropped from the University.
6. A student who has been dropped for academic deficiency may be re-admitted on probation according to University regulations except that his academic requirements will be those outlined in items 3, 4, and 5 above.
7. Any student who, regardless of pharmacy standing, fails to have achieved a 2.0 standing for two consecutive semesters may be placed on probation.

Law. Students beginning the study of Law must achieve a cumulative numerical grade average of 60 at the end of the first two semesters and must maintain a cumulative average of 60 at the end of each semester thereafter. A student failing to meet this academic requirement will be dropped from the University for poor scholarship. After the first semester and regardless of the cumulative average, any student will be dropped for poor scholarship who fails to achieve a numerical grade average of at least 56 in any particular semester, or who receives a grade of less than 50 in two or more courses in any one semester.

A student who has been dropped from the College will not be recommended by the Dean for readmission to the College of Law until he has remained out of the College for a semester and a Summer Session and has received favorable consideration by the Law Faculty of a written petition stating good reasons why he can do satisfactory academic work.

All Undergraduate and Professional Colleges:

The dean of each college shall submit to the Office of the Registrar a complete list of students placed upon academic probation or dropped from the University within two weeks after the dean has received the grade reports from the Registrar at the close of the semester or term.

A student who is on academic probation may not be employed by any department or college of the University. This shall not prevent any department or college from establishing higher standards for student employment.

A student who is on academic probation shall not be allowed:

1. To serve as an officer or committee member in any campus organization;

2. To participate in any University extra-curricular activity or in the activity of any University organization if the participation involves the expenditure of an appreciable amount of time.

At any time the dean of a college in which a student is enrolled may declare the student ineligible because of failure in current class work; at any time the Dean of Students may declare a student ineligible whose participation in an activity is judged to be detrimental to the student, the organization, or the University.

Students shall be removed from probation only on the basis of residence work at the University of Kentucky. Usually part-time work shall not be considered unless the student has been placed on probation because of unsatisfactory performance as a part-time student.

Readmission of a student who has been dropped from the University shall be upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which the student is to be registered.

A student who has been dropped a second time shall not be readmitted to the University except in unusual circumstances and then only upon recommendation of his dean and the approval of the University Senate Council.

Each student has access to rules dealing with scholastic probation, academic suspension and reinstatement through the printed class schedule and the University catalogue.

The probation rules shall be effective for all students.
