Student survey draws 'miserable' response rate

Only about 14 percent of the seniors and freshmen asked to participate in the National Survey of Student Engagement responded to the 6,000 e-mails sent out late last month, said UK officials.

"We have had a miserable response rate," said Gail Hairston, UK spokeswoman.

The survey is important to students because it rplays a large role in the programs that the university is considering for students in the future," said Roger Sugarman, planning and assessment director in the department of institutional research.

The survey saks students about their participation in class, how often they engage in conversations with students from different backgrounds, the type of coursework they receive, the quality of academic advising and their overall experience at the university, Sugarman said.

The first e-mail, an invitation from President Lee Todd to participate in the survey, was sent out on Jan.
