

MINUTES OF THE SENATE OCTOBER 15, 1919

The Senate met in called session Wednesday, October 15, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of the special meeting of the Senate, August 2, and the Council minutes of September 19, 23, 26, October 3 and 10 were read and approved.

The following recommendation from the College of Agriculture was approved:

"The College of Agriculture has reduced the requirements in physical education from two years' work (2 -2/3 credits) to one year's work (1 -1/3 credits) and recommends a reduction in the number of credits required for graduation from 140-2/3 to 139-1/3."

Messrs. Tuttle and Good were selected as Senate representatives to the Council for the coming year.

The following recommendation from the College of Arts and Science, presented by Mr. Boyd, was approved:

"Permission is requested to offer the following course:

✓ Physics 117 - Theory of Heat. For students whose major is physics, elective for others. Prerequisites Physics 2a or 3a. Lecture and recitation three hours per week. First semester.

This course deals with the mathematical deductions growing out of the Kinetic Theory of matter, Elementary Thermodynamics, and the modern theories of Radiation. It is identical with Physics 101, except that no laboratory work is offered. This course is desired in order to accommodate those who are not able to take the laboratory work of Course 101."

✓ English 12 - Advanced Debate

" Intensive work in the preparation and delivery of argumentative speeches. Conferences, round table discussions, and debate practice at hours to be fixed by appointment. Limited to sixteen students selected by competition open to all undergraduates. The representatives of the University in the intercollegiate debates will be chosen from this class. Two hours a week. First Semester."

The President announced the following committee on Tug of War:

Faculty members, Messrs. Tigert, Tucker, Funkhouser, Melcher, Freeman.
Seniors, Garred, Wallingford, Haffler, Frazier, Dabney.
Juniors, to be added.

The President appointed a committee composed of Deans Simrall and Melcher, to recommend a program for Hallowe'en.

Senate adjourned.
