Donovan, is this: The student may receive full credit for any course in which he is passing if he continues in the University through the sixth week of summer school. The sixth week ends tomorrow.

STUDENTS WHO HAVE had to leave for service already will STUDENTS WHO HAVE had to leave for service already will receive half credit for their courses since they did not complete the required six weeks. Thus far only one such case is known to her registrar's office.

In the event any student is called to service during the regular semester beginning in September, he will receive full credit for all courses in which he is passing if he has completed at least 12 weeks of the semester.

In all cases when the student is called, in order to receive credit for his courses, he will have to submit evidence of his immediate induction to the registrar's office.


