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The courses in religious education presented by Dean Taylor were referred to a special committee to be appointed by President McVey.

The request of seniors who complete their work in the summer session to be excused from final examinations this semester was referred to the University Council.

The Registrar asked the question, "Is the regulation regarding admission to the College of Law, passed April 6, to be interpreted that two years of college work means sixty-seven credits?" This question was referred to the Registrar and Dean Turck.

The request of William Hanratty, who has 27 credits in Arts and Sciences, to be transferred to the College of Law was referred to Dean Turck, Professor Scarborough and the Registrar.

The following recommendation from the College of Arts and Sciences was approved:

✓ Romance Languages 6a and 6b. French Novel and Drama. Three credits a semester. This is to replace Romance Languages 101a and 101b, so that the course will not be open to graduate students.

✓ Romance Languages 7a and 7b. Intermediate Spanish. Three credits a semester, to replace Romance Languages 103a and 103h, so that the course will not be open to graduate students.

✓ Hygiene 4. General Hygiene for Engineers. Credit to be increased from .3 to .6, time being increased to two hours a week for one semester.

The Senate voted that the following paragraph from the recommendation of the Rules Committee be mimeographed and sent to members of the faculty so that it might have consideration before the next meeting of the Senate:

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"That the Committee on Scholarship and Attendance be empowered to deduct from a student's semester's total number of credits and points for irregular attendance."

The following paragraph from the recommendation of the Rules Committee was approved:

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"Seniors who expect to graduate in June must file their applications for degrees in the Registrar's office at the end of the first semester. Students who complete their work at the end of summer school must file their applications with the Registrar at the end of the summer school."

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The Committee appointed to make recommendations concerning the organization of the College of Commerce made the following report, which was approved:

1. That a College of Commerce be established and that the work in economics now offered in the Department of Economics and Sociology be transferred to this College.
2. That the work in sociology offered formerly in the Department of Economics and Sociology be transferred to a department of sociology to be established in the College of Arts and Sciences.
3. That the degree of Bachelor of Science in Commerce be conferred upon students majoring in this College who present a total of 127 credits with a standing of "1" and who conform to one of the prescribed curricula of the College
4. Unless two units in the ancient or foreign languages are offered for entrance, one year of language in college is required. It is highly recommended that all commerce students take at least one year of language. Students pursuing the foreign-commerce curriculum are required to take two years of foreign languages.
5. All candidates for the commerce degree are required to take:

- 6 credits in English
- 6 to 8 credits in the natural sciences
- 5.6 credits in Military science (for men)
- 1.4 credits in physical education
- 5 credits in college algebra
- 5 credits in mathematics of finance
- 6 credits in American and European economic history
- 6 credits in principles of economics
- 8 credits in elementary accounting
- 3 credits in statistics
- 12 credits in any one or any combination of the following subjects; history, political science, sociology, philosophy, education and psychology, with the exception of those courses offered in the psychology of advertising and selling and in personnel management.

Curricula leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Commerce will be submitted by the faculty of the College of Commerce."

The special committee appointed to consider questions raised in regard to admission to the College of Law made the following recommendation, which was approved:

"The number of semester credits required for admission. The Committee recommends that sixty semester hours, exclusive of military science and physical education, satisfy in full the requirements for admission to the College of Law beginning with September, 1925."



The following recommendation from the College of Arts and Sciences was approved:

1. H. & P. S. 2a. History of the British people before 1500. Three credits per semester.  
H. & P. S. 2b. History of the British people since 1500. Three credits per semester.  
This provides a two semester course to succeed H & P. S. 2.
2. H. & P. S. 15a & 15b. Problems in Citizenship. An introductory course for freshmen, treating of problems confronting American citizens; ideals of democracy; the press; immigration; the negro problem; labor problems and the government; big business; the woman citizen; international relations; war problems education; health; public opinion, etc. Three credits per semester.
3. H. & P. S. 160a & 160b. American Foreign Service. Two credits per semester.  
This provides a year's course to supplant H. & P. S. 60 and to be open to graduate students.
4. Psychology 112. Personnel Management. The selection training, placement and supervision of employees. Three credits.
5. Psychology 113. Psychology of Learning. An advanced course dealing with fundamental types of learning. Experiments and lectures. Three credits.
6. Hygiene 5. Sanitation. For students of civil engineering. One credit."
- Art 111, Art Structure for Engineers, replaced by Art 16. One credit. This change is desired in order that the course may not be open to graduate students.

The following recommendation from the College of Agriculture was approved:

- H. E. S 11. General Nutrition. Principles of Nutrition as applied to daily living. Proper balancing of diet reference to special diets. This may be offered as a home economics elective toward a degree, but not as a substitute for Home Economics 4. Three credits. -Hopkins,

The following recommendations from the College of Education were approved:

- Education 134 - English in the High School
- Education 135 - The Social Sciences in the High School
- Education 136 - The Biological Sciences in the High School
- Education 137 - The Physical Sciences in the High School
- Education 138 - Latin in the High School
- Education 139 - French in the High School



Practice Teaching a three-credit course, was increased from three credits to five credits.

The following courses recommended by the College of Education were referred to Dean Taylor and Doctor Miner:

- Education 146 - <sup>FOUNDATIONS</sup> ~~The Psychology~~ of Elementary Education (See letter on file)  
Education 147 - <sup>FOUNDATIONS</sup> ~~The Psychology~~ of Secondary Education.

Senate approved the granting of a fellowship to Charles T. Razor.

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE JULY 13, 1925

The Senate met in the Little Theatre Monday, July 13, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of May 28 were read and approved.

X { The recommendation of the Rules Committee, "That the Committee on Scholarship and Attendance be empowered to deduct from a student's semester's total number of credits and points for irregular attendance" was postponed until September.

The report of the special committee on Duplication of Work was called for and President McVey asked if anyone desired to have it read and considered at this time. No motion was made to consider the report and it was postponed to the September meeting.

The following recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

- ✓ English 130a and 130b - Comparative Literature. Survey of masterpieces from Homer to the present day. Lectures, class discussions, assigned readings and written reports. 3 hrs. a week.
- ✓ Psychology 7 - Psychology of the Child. Pre-requisite an introductory course in psychology. 3 credits. Second semester.

- ✓ Sociology 51a-b - changed to 1a-1b.
