Friendlier e-mail coming to UK

Technology: New e-mail software will replace POP account service next semester, giving access through any Internet connection

No more disks to check your

e-mail.

UK Informational Systems will replace the existing POP email system, which requires a disk for access to an Internet-based system.

This summer, UK Informa-tion Systems will upgrade and streamline UK e-mail services for

students to offer a number of advantages, including anywhere/anytime access via the Internet.

"In the past, students have expressed desires to be able to access their e-mail without having to download it to a computer disk," said Eugene R. Williams, UK vice president of Information Systems.

Systems.

The new system is called the Novell Internet Messaging Sys-

tem. an Internet-based system that allows users to access e-mail from any location using any browser, such as Netscape or Microsoft Internet Explorer.

Williams said the new system is targeted for activation by the fall 2001 semester.

To keep up with classes and other activities, students will be able to use the new system for time management, a feature that students requested.

"They've noted the usefulness of being able to track assignments, meetings and other activities through an online calendar," With the new system beginning next semester, students do not have to worry about getting a new e-mail account.

"Students will need to create a new password in the fall," Williams said. "But they don't have to worry about contacting friends, family, instructors, employers, etc., with a new e-mail addresses." They can just continue to use their current UK POP e-mail addresses."

Ukraine's parliament ousts leader

Ukraine's parliament ousts leader

KIEV. Ukraine — The Communist-dominated parliament dismissed reform-oriented Prime
Minister Viktor Yushchenko and his government on Thursday, plunging the nation into political chaos. The ouster of the most successful
Cabinet since Ukraine's independence in 1991
was likely to slow reforms in this largely impoverished nation and damage its international
standing. In the final vote on a no-confidence motion, parliament by a 268-69 margin approved a
Communist-sponsored resolution accusing the
government of failing to improve the economy
and leading the country to ruin. The Constitution requires the prime minister to hand in his
resignation, and President Leonid Kuchma is extremely unlikely to reject it. The votes came despite efforts by Yushchenko and Kuchma to
defuse the crisis by holding urgent consultations
with parliamentary leaders. The nation has already been rocked by a months long political crisis sparked by the disappearance of a critical
journalist and allegations of Kuchma's involvement in his killing.

China says Bush made mistakes

China says Bush made mistakes

BELING — China said Thursday that already badly strained relations with Washington were damaged even further by President Bush's blunt warning about America's will to defend Taiwan. "The Chinese government and people are strongly indignant and opposed't to Bush's comments. Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Zhang Qiyue said. She noted that Bush's "mistaken remarks" came on the heels of an American arms package to Taiwan, announced Tuesday, which China strongly opposes. "This shows that it has drifted further on a dangerous road." Zhang said, referring to the United States. In strong remarks aimed at Beijing, Bush told The Associated Press on Wednesday that U.S. military force is "certainly an option" if China acts on its long-standing threats and strikes Taiwan. The two sides split amid civil war in 1949, and China doesn't rule out using force to assert contol over the island it claims as a breakaway province.





Fifteen years after Chernobyl, problems remain

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — Fif-teen years after the Chernobyl disaster sent a radioactive cloud over much of Europe, the infa-mous plant has finally been idled and a beleaguered nation struggles to deal with its deadly leosey.

struggles to deal with its deadly legacy.

The plant — site of the world's worst nuclear accident — continued operation after the April 26, 1966 explosion and fire, amid profound international concern over safely issues. The last reactor was shut down in December and the plant stopped operating for good, the leaky concrete and steel sarcophagus over the ruined reac-

tor—a \$758 million internationally funded project aims to make it environmentally safe.

Now, with promised Western aid in limbo, the economically struggling Ukraine must provide for about 6,000 Chernobly tworkers who depended on the plant to survives the plant to survive to the plant of the social needs and forvide for the social needs and for vide for the social needs and for the social nee

sate for the loss of Chernobyl electricity, in particular to complete two new reactors.

The European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, which guides the aid project, raised new conditions for its loans.

"I consider this as unwillingness to fund construction of the reactors," an angry President Leonid Kuchma said recently, "Why do we go with our hand outstretched, and they always beat us on our hands by various conditions? Didn't we know that it would be so when we were closing down Chernoby!?"

The government faces criticism for not adequately provid-

ing for those who suffered the effects of Chernobyl's fallout, which contains and the summar of the former Soviet republic of Ukraine, Russia and Belarus.

More than 4,000 who took part in the hatty and poorly organized Soviet cleanup effort have died, the government says, and more than 70,000 Ukrains were disabled by the disaster.

About 3.4 million of

About 3.4 million of Ukraine's 50 million people, in-cluding about 1.2s million children, are considered affected by Chernobyl. Of them, 400,000 adults and nearly 1.1 million children are entitled to state aid. About 5.000 Chernobyl victims demonstrated in Kiev over

the weekend, saying many entitled to state aid were not receiving benefits and compensation for living on contaminated land.

Yuriy Andreev, who heads a victims' union, said Chernobyl' victims are now owed \$136 million, and the debt grows by up \$74 million every month.

Post-Soviet economic distress forced Ukraine to steadily underfund Chernobyl-related so-cial programs, though that has changed somewhat. The health of those affected has deteriorated steadily canned the sound of the contamination of the said programs, though that has changed somewhat. 



