

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE  
May 9, 1932

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, May 9, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of April 11 were read and approved.

The Committee on Duplication of courses made the following recommendation:

"The Committee recommends to the Senate that all future recommendations to the Senate regarding courses be made under the following heads:

- I. New Courses
- II. Changes in Courses
  1. Change in the number
  2. Change in the title
  3. Change in the content
  4. Change in the amount of credit

The Senate voted that this recommendation should be mimeographed and sent to members of the Senate.

The Committee presented the following new courses and changes in courses, which were approved:

Arts and Sciences

- History 4a. Modern Europe to 1789. 3 credits
- History 4b. Modern Europe since 1789. 3 credits
- (A restatement of History 4a and 4b.)
- History 116. Senior Seminar. Two credits. (New course)
- History 202. The American Revolution. 3 credits. (Raised from 2 to 3 credits)
- History 206. The Confederation of the U. S. 3 credits (Credits raised from 2 to 3)
- History 226. The Old South. 3 credits. (To replace History 136a and 136b, 2 credits each.)
- History 230. The Populist Movement. 3 credits. (Credits are raised from 2 to 3 credits.)

- ↳ History 236. History of the West. 3 credits. (To replace History 130a and 130b, 2 credits each.)
- ↳ History 231. The British Empire Since 1815. 3 credits. (New course)
- ↳ History 250. The History of Modern Japan. 3 hours a week; 3 credits (New course)
- ↳ History 269. The History of Modern Russia. 3 hours a week; 3 credits. (New course)
- ↳ History 280. European Histeriography. 2 credits (To replace History 180, one credit.)

The above courses in the "200" group are for graduate students only. They are content courses presented by the lecture and discussion method, and as such are distinct in character from the "300" group of courses which are concerned with problems and practice of research.

The History Department also recommends the following:

Courses in the "300" group. Seminars - basically research in character. These are not content courses. They provide laboratory training in historical research (collection and critical analysis of bibliography, note-taking and organization of materials, and the presentation of a properly documented thesis). It is desirable that the student take the Senior Seminar before enrolling in "300" courses. Each course carries two class hours and one conference hour per week. 3 credits.

#### Education

##### Changes in Courses and Course Numbers.

- ✓ Education 125. Supervision of Instruction. 3 credits, be changed to Education 225a, Supervision of Instruction in the Elementary School, 3 semester hours credit and 225b, Supervision of Instruction in the Secondary School, 3 semester hours credit.

Prerequisites

1. For all 200 courses the prerequisite is 12 hours in Education.
2. For Education 302a, b, prerequisite one year graduate work with major in Education, including Education 231.
3. Education 304a, b, prerequisite one year graduate work with major in Education, including Education 225a or Education 225b.
4. Education 307a, b, prerequisite one year of graduate work with major in Education, including Education 232.
5. Education 308a, b, prerequisite one year of graduate work with major in Education, including Education 213 or Education 202a, or Education 202b.
6. Education 309a, b, prerequisite one year graduate work with major in Education, including Education 213 or Education 202a or Education 202b.
7. Education 303a, b, prerequisite one year of graduate work with major in Education, including Education 203.

The following recommendation from the Committee on Study of the Ability and Training of Students was approved:

"It is hereby recommended that the Senate grant specific authority to the Committee on Scholarship and Attendance, to the Deans and to other administrative officers of the University to require such students as they select to attend study periods that may be arranged in cooperation with the Personnel Bureau up to the limit of the facilities the Bureau may be able to provide."

President McVey announced the death of Ellen Churchill Semple and stated that he thought the University's appreciation of Miss Semple's many contributions to education should be expressed in appropriate resolutions. He appointed the following committee to prepare the resolutions; Doctor Tuthill, Chairman, Dean Boyd, Professor Holloway.

President McVey also announced the change in the fees as approved by the Board of Trustees. By this change, the fees for residents of Kentucky will be \$47 per semester in all colleges except Law; \$50 in the College of Law; Non-resident students pay \$13 additional fee per semester. Part-time and special students will pay \$4.00 per credit hour for undergraduate work and \$5.00 per credit hour for graduate work or Law. Non-resident part-time students will pay one dollar per credit hour additional fee.
