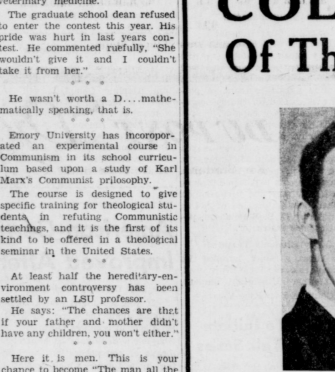

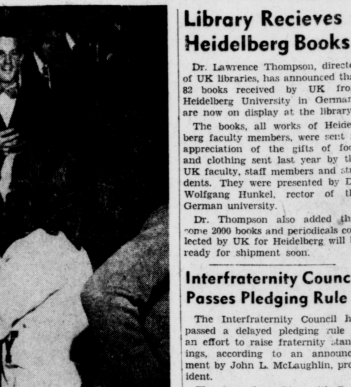

Interfraternity Council Passes Pledging Rule

The Council, working with Dean of Men A. D. Kirwan passed the ruling as a solution to the poor scholastic standing of UK fraternities.

Main points of the ruling to go into effect in September are: (1) No first semester freshman will be eligible for pledging in any fraternity.

(2) No second semester freshman will be eligible for pledging if he failed to make a one point standing his first semester.

(3) No student, regardless of classification, shall be allowed to pledge if he does not have an overall standing of one point.

The Council pointed out that the ruling has advantages for the freshman. No student will be pledged until he has had a chance to look over all the fraternities and thereby, make a better decision.

Groza Scores 37 AS UK Wins Meet; Three Cats Make All-SEC Team

The big Cats of Kentucky went through the Southeastern Conference tournament last week as heroes expected. The Kentucky sharpshooters won their sixth straight SEC crown and the 11th in the conference's 16 years of existence.

In defeating Florida, Auburn, Tennessee and Tulane, in that order, the Wildcats of UK ran up a scoring average for the meet of 73 points-per-performance as against only 43 for the opponents. Also Groza scored 37 points in the final game and 94 points for the tournament—both new SEC records.

Approximately 30,000 people saw the four Kentucky games in Louisville's Armory. The tournament started off Thursday afternoon with LSU leading out Georgia Tech 35-52. Later Tulane beat Alabama 24-42.

Thursday night, Tennessee shipped Mississippi State, 70-46, and UK took Florida 22-36. Friday saw LSU again stage a minor surprise by kicking Vanderbilt 68-56, Tulane whipped Georgia 32-62 in the second session. That evening, Tennessee took Ole Miss in a rough tilt, 74-59 and the Cats scored Auburn 70-39.

Saturday saw Tulane outlast LSU, 72-63, in a wored game, while Kentucky triumphed in its old arch-rival Tennessee, 82-34, to complete the semi-final round.

In the final, Kentucky again played brilliant ball to lace Tulane, 68-52. Saturday night before a jammed house of 12,000 people.

High scorers in the meet were: Groza 94 points, Risner (Tulane) 90; Perkins (Tulane) 85; Payton (Tulane) 82; Riffey (Tulane) 47; Beard 42; Walker (Tenn.) and Murphy (LSU) 41 each; Wark and Meador (LSU) 35 apiece.

Selected on the All-Conference team were Kentucky's Groza, Perkins, Ralph Beard and Wah Jones, Tulane's Virgil Risner and Warren Perkins.

It was the fourth consecutive season that Jones and Beard had been named on this quintet. It was the first for the other three players.

On the second team were UK's Cliff Barker, Vandy's Billy Adeock, UT's Paul Walker, LSU's Gene Murphy and Jim Eflify of Tulane. Kentucky's famous four seniors, Groza, Beard, Barker and Jones, all turned in sterling performances. Other standouts for the Ruppmen in the meet were Dale Barnstable, Walt Hirsch, and Jim Line.

Groza sets record. Groza hit for 22 points in the 12 minutes that he played against Florida in the opener. . . he set a tournament record against Tulane in the finals by flipping in 37 points to surpass the former record of 31 held by Joe Adcock, of LSU. . . Who Jones like last year, went wild against the 17 points. In the 1938 meet, he scored 18 in the UK-UT meeting. . . Walker and Payton scored 17 points each against UK with 14 each. . . Beard turned in a terrific game in the finals as he outscored Risner, 27 to 5. . . Risner had scored 20 against Alabama. . . 18 against LSU and 17 in the Georgia game.

Barnstable continued to shine on defense holding Walker to just two field goals in the semifinals. . . Walt Hirsch hit 10 goals in his first 10 shots (in the Florida and Auburn games). . . 7 of 10 shots being good in the latter tilt. . . The Kentucky team hit 66 free throws in the tournament in 82 attempts. . . and 114 field goals in the 160 minutes of game time.

Football Team Begins Workouts; Dopey Phelps Back; Martin Gone

By Dudley Saunders With more newcomers than veterans in uniforms, spring football practice officially got under way this week at the University. Head Coach Paul Bryant's go ahead signal sent 33 briders onto the practice field adjacent to Stoll field Monday afternoon for the first organized practice of the season.

Biggest contingent of athletes were the 43 sophomores who moved up from last year's freshman eleven, which won one out of three starts. Next highest number were the juniors who numbered 28. Only 12 seniors were listed on the first roster released.

When questioned as to the duration of spring practice, Bryant stated that "we'll practice until it looks like we have a pretty fair ball club," the conclusion of spring practice. The game will be a night affair on Stoll field, open to the public, probably in late April.

Practice sessions on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons will be open to the public. Bleachers are now being erected to accommodate the onlookers on those days.

The varsity squad is composed of 14 ends, 14 tackles, 14 guards, and 14 halfbacks. There are eight centers, eight quarterbacks, and nine fullbacks.

Bryant has more depth in experienced men at the terminals than any other position on the field, and least experience at quarterback.

Only two of the eight quarterbacks, Don Pirel and Paul Jones, have any varsity experience. The starting assignment will either go to one of these men, or more likely to Babe Farrell, sophomore flash from Pennsylvania.

Judging from last year's play, Benny Zaranka is the best early-season bet to start next fall at left end. The fight for the other end position vacated by Wallace Jones will probably be wide open right down to next September.

Six of the 14 guards are experienced men, but here it is expected that the sophomores will fight the veterans until the last minute for September starting berth.

Holway, Wannamaker, James, Conde, Dawson and Porter are the returning guards. Dick Holway and

Genito, prominently mentioned last year as Blanda's successor as Kentucky T-general, left and reportedly will play for Eastern Kentucky at Richmond, next fall.

Another man who has been the big question mark on the Kentucky team since last fall, is Don "Dopey" Phelps, senior halfback from nearby Danville.

Rated the speediest man on the Wildcats squad, Phelps was sensation all during his freshman and sophomore years.

Bryant accepted him back on the conditions that he wouldn't receive his scholarship until he had earned it. Thus Phelps, the nation's leading punt return man three years ago, must work his way up from the bottom, if he regains his starting berth.

Should he stick and return to his old form Kentucky's backfield hopes would definitely soar.

Collier's Magazine announced its first annual All-American basketball team this week and many students were amazed to find that Alex Groza had been omitted from the honored quintet.

This obvious honor by Collier's is comparable to the absurd deal by Sporting News, when it placed Ralph Beard on the All-American third team in a recent issue.

Coach Rupp and Groza flew to Chicago early this week to attend the luncheon of the Chicago Basketball Writers Association which named Alex the outstanding player to appear this season in the Chicago Stadium.

Groza's award, which was made Tuesday, came largely as a result of his scoring 18 points last January against DePaul in addition to playing a fine rebounding game.

Ralph Beard also honored this week as Collier's named him on its All-American team along with Easy Ed Macauley, Vince Boylan, Fred Erickson, Bob McIntyre and Eric Vanderveghe.

One of the possible highlights of the coming tournaments is a second meeting of Groza and Macauley. However, neither of the players which will rate much attention would be a pitting of Wah Jones with Illinois' Eddie Edleman, in the NCAA playoffs.

Jones and Edleman are perhaps America's two greatest all-around athletes now in college. Both UK students are familiar with Wah Wah's accomplishments on the Wildcat basketball, football and baseball teams.

Edleman is a standout for Illinois in football, basketball and track. He was one of the Olympic trackmen last summer, specializing in the hurdles and the high jump.

The Illinois star hails from Centralia, Ill., 6-2 in height, and according to a recent Saturday Evening post article on him, scored 700 points while playing high school basketball at Centralia High, averaging 17.3 points for the 18 games in which he participated. If this be so, he exceeded by 404 points the total racked up by Wah Wah at Harlan High (256).

Both Edleman and Jones are forwards. Should these two be guarding each other in the Eastern finals of the NCAA at Madison Square Garden that alone would be worth the price of admission.

While in football Wah was an end Edleman played at halfback for the Illinois and was one of the top punters in the nation last season for Coach Ray Elio's team. In 1947 he was an outstanding player in the Rose Bowl when the IU eleven waded UCLA. Both are seniors.

Some 5500 Bradley University fans were quite bitter when St. Louis beat the Braves, 66-56, last Saturday night in Peoria. They protested the officiating of the game and the Billiken by tossing cardboard, cartoons and miniature tom-toms on the floor late in the contest, severely hitting the Bill's Coach Ed Becker on his nob. ## Walt Hirsch

The champion Kentucky Wildcats were playing listlessly in their first real test of this year, against DePaul last December 8.

Beard would pass to Barker, Barker to Beard, Beard to Barnstable, Barnstable to Jones, and back again. The Cats couldn't seem to sink their darts in. The score was a microscopic 18-13, with two minutes left in the half when the Man in the Brown Suit sent Walt Hirsch into the dull contest.

Immediately things started happening. Beard bounced the ball to Hirsch who slapped it to Crona who thumped it to Barker. Cliff got off a Barker Special to Big Al who laid the ball up and in. It all happened so quick, few even knew where the ball was. It was Hirsch's spark that fired the Cats.

He opened the second half with six quick points on three consecutive shots and the Wildcats were on their way to another lopsided victory.

**Rupp Takes Chance**

One hot summer afternoon in '47 Coach Rupp motioned him over after an hour workout and said, "Hirsch, I think I'll take a chance on you." He had picked another apple from the Ohio orchard. Already in his basket were such beauties as Alex Groza, Jim Lane, and Dutch Campbell.

The 6'7" boy from Dayton says as little as possible and when asked why he came to UK as a freshman, shrugged, "I was going to the University of Cincinnati. But some bird at Dayton wrote Rupp about me. He told me to come down and work."

"How come you were going to Cincinnati?"

"Had a football scholarship there."

"Football? I didn't even know you played."

"Four years in high school." End.

"Do much?"

"No. Just played."

Hirsch just played baseball five years, football four years, and basketball four years at Dayton's Northside High. He and his brother Bob were placed on the All-State basketball team when their team won the Class B tourney in Walt's sophomore year. Although beaten in the regional the next year, they both made the honor ten again.

**Brother Passed By**

According to Walt, the Wildcats lost something when they didn't go after his older brother. He always led Walt in scoring. Playing with the National Cash Register team in Dayton, Bob garnered 18 and 19 points against the Oilers and Denver Nuggets this year. He was now signed with the Cincinnati Reds as a left-handed gaffler for their Municipal Class B farm club.

Walt Hirsch loves his basketball but figures baseball holds his brightest future for him. As a freshman last year, he played two games in the outfield, one on the mound, and the rest on first base.

His southwest hurling against Georgia's left-handed hitters was one of the highlights of the Wildcat

baseball season. He jammed his right hand playing against Vanderbilt, but volunteered his left arm four days later for the Georgia contest. His glove hand looked like an elephant's leg—the catcher had to roll the ball back to him on the mound—but Hirsch threw a five-hitter, struck out seven, and drove in the winning run with a big double.

Last summer scoups from the Pirates, Cubs, and Reds jumped out of their seats when he got 11 hits in 16 swings to help his team win the National Amateur Baseball Federation Tournament.

**Capable Reserve**

The 18 year old freshman played in only 13 basketball games last year, hitting 29 percent of his shots, but led fellow frosh with 37 points. This season he has played in every game, started three, and is sixth high scorer on the team, hitting 34 percent of his shots.

The 6'7" Ohioan, who never played center before, was moved to the best ball handlers on the squad. He knows where all his teammates are without even looking; he hits the ball rather than passing it. Hirsch was one of the main factors in the tight Bowling Green victory.

Not too big, as present college college players go, Hirsch shines under the backboards. Along with "Grits" Spivey, he'll do most of Kentucky's rebounding next year.

This boy with the stiff-arm push shot should be Rupp's chief candidate for All American honors in '51 if he doesn't sign a professional baseball contract first.

**Season Seeks More Candidates For Track Team**

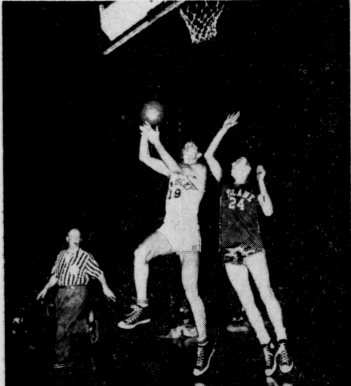
