MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE OCTOBER 8, 1928

The University Senate met in Room 303 of White Hall, Monday, October 8, with President McVey in the chair.

The minutes of May 25 were approved as read.

Professors Roberts and Webb were reelected Senate representatives on the University Council for 1928-29.

The following recommendations of the Committee on Duplication of Courses were approved:

↓ Psychology 102a, Genetic Psychology. Three hours a week. Three credits, first semester.

↓ Psychology 102b, Genetic Psychology. Two hours lecture and two hours laboratory a week. Three credits. Second semester.

Note: Psych. 102a, b are old courses revived.

↓ Psychology 190a,b. Seminar in Psychology. One two-hour discussion a week. One credit per semester.

↓ Sociology 114a and 114b. Special Problems in Sociology. One credit per semester.

↓ Physics 118a and 118b. Advanced Physics. One lecture per week. Laboratory two hours per week. Two credits. Both semesters

↓ Romance Languages 114a and 114b. Independent Work. Three credits per semester.

↓ Ancient Languages 120. Survey of Greek Civilization (All in English.) Three credits. First semester.

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- ↓ Ancient Languages 121. Survey of Roman Civilization (All in English) Three credits. Second semester.
- ↓ German 103. Lyric Poetry, stressing Goethe and Heine Three hours per week. Three credits. First semester.
- ↓ German 104. Modern Prose since the World War. Three hours per week. Three credits. Second semester.
- ↓ German 105a and 105b, Independent Work in German. Three credits per semester.
- ↓ Geology 21 - A Survey of Kentucky Geology. One semester. One credit.
- ↓ Education 90<sup>a-f</sup> - Technique of the Registrar's Office, three credits, changed to Education 190, Technique of the Registrar's Office, two credits.

On recommendation of the College of Arts and Sciences, the required course in Hygiene for Arts and Sciences students was reduced to one semester, two hours a week, carrying 1.3 credits, the change to be effective at once.

The Senate approved a motion to make the above change include also a similar reduction in the required Hygiene in other colleges.

On motion, the Senate withdrew its authorization of Junior Honor Society, "Mystic 13", as provided under Section II of the Special Rules, for repeated violations of the University Rules in its initiations.

The following report of the Honor Board of the University R. O. T. C. was presented and approved as read:

HONOR BOARD (COMMITTEE)  
UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY R. O. T. C.

PURPOSE: To conduct investigations and submit conclusions and recommendations regarding violations of the honor system in the Advanced Course, ROTC, University of Kentucky.

COMPOSITION: From three (3) to five (5) students; in addition, one student as investigator and one student as advisor and assistant to the student whose conduct is in question, but who do not take any part in the conclusions and recommendations of the board. All to be members of the Advanced Course ROTC.

APPOINTMENT: The advisor and assistant, if desired, to be selected by the student under investigation. Members of the board and the investigator will be appointed by the P.M.S. & T. from among those recommended by the Cadet Colonel, ROTC Regiment.

**PROCEDURE:**

The Cadet Colonel of the ROTC Regiment will make such investigations as he desires in cases of honor system violations coming to his attention. If he considers an Honor Board advisable, he will so recommend to the P.M.S. & T., and submit names of ten (10) Advanced Course students available for detail on the honor board. The members and investigator of an honor board will be sworn as follows:

## Members:

"You (\_\_\_\_\_) do swear that you will truly determine according to the evidence the matter now before you, and that you will duly administer justice without partiality, favor or affection, according to the provisions of the Honor System; and if any doubt should arise, not explained by said provisions, then according to your conscience and the best of your understanding; and you do further swear that you will not divulge the conclusions or recommendations of the board until they have been divulged by proper authority, except to the investigator; neither will you disclose or discover the vote or opinion of any particular member of the board upon any action in closed sessions unless required to give evidence thereof as a witness by a court of justice in due course of law, so held you God."

## Investigator and witnesses:

As prescribed for the Trial Judge Advocate and witnesses in Courts-Martial.

Except as covered above, the procedure and record of investigation will follow the provisions of the Manual for Courts-Martial where applicable, and with particular reference to Special Courts-Martial.

A commissioned officer of the Military Department will attend all hearings of the board as an advisor, but will not attempt to influence in any way the action of the board in connection with its conclusions and recommendations.

**CONCLUSIONS:**

As a result of its investigation, the board should reach definite conclusions and make definite recommendations. In general, these will be in the report under separate headings, as:
