Dear Captain Placwell

Thank you for your pleasant letter. I am afraid I have very little in the way of the kind of manuscripts you collect, but you might like the enclosed letter from Ebenezer Elliott, the Lake Poet Rhyme, which seems to refer to an erudite female, even if she is rather after your time. I also enclose a letter by Robert Southey, though I am afraid it is of no great interest.

But perhaps both of them are by

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better known writer than Kelsoall.
Would there be of any interest to you?
I should certainly be glad to have one
more of the Kelsoall letters. I have every
printed book by Beddoes I think and
the MS of his Pygmalion, the only
long MS by him at present known.
I also have Kelsoall's transcripts of
Beddoes which contain some unpub-
lished material and the sketch refer-
red to in your Kelsoall letter.
I also have a shrewd suspicion as to
the house in which the rest of the
Beddoes MSS, if they were not

destroyed - which I doubt - maybe
found. I am making inquiries now.
The Beddoes contributions to newspapers
would take a lot of tracing, but it
might be done.

I fear that you will not do so
well out of the letters I send as you
did with the Pulpinis.
