Many thanks for your letter just received. No. 1 has escaped Knighthood, and got a Companionship of the Bath instead, a quieter with honour wh. ought not to add to my hotel bills & is particularly pleasant to me because Garnett had it, & I like to follow in his steps.

I am very glad that the Advisory Committee has fixed the American rate & fixed it

at \$8.50. At the present rate of exchange this is low, & as the members from your side have been paying rather high I am glad that they should have the advantage this time. Please remember that they have the same right as British Members to keep on at the old rate & get only the Library & its Supplements to it, if they can't afford the increased subscription. I have been sending the Library to everyone on the list not formally notified as dead or resigned, whether they have paid or not. Among the members who had not paid for 1921 when you sent Sharp your draft were several whose loss

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would be very regrettable, & despite
our rules I have thought it
better to let them have the
Library & Supplements. If any of
them have paid since your draft
I should like to know, & enclose
herewith a list of your members
in the hope that you will return
it with corrections (in case we
reprint) & also with notes of those
who have paid & those in arrears.
As to arrears I can very well think
your people in the aggregate have
paid handsomely & if they are hard

up now or were hard up last
year I want to tide 'em over
these bad times & keep the flock
together. So if any member say
they can't pay \$8.50 extra for
last year further, get them to pay
\$4.25 for this year & ignore the
amount. We continue to get more
new members here than are needed
to balance our losses, & I hope you
will get some also.

My wife has had bronchitis all the
month & goes to Allassio on Feb. 1.
The trains are v. crowded & I fear she
will have a rather dangerous trying
journey, but if she gets to Allassio without
serious harm I have no doubt she will
soon pick up. I hope you & Mrs. Horton
