American infantry troops fought off a desert attack by Iraqis on Tuesday, inflicting heavy casualties in a clash less than 100 miles from Baghdad. British forces battled for control of Basra, a city of 1.8 million souls sliding toward chaos.

Defense officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said between 150 and 500 Iraqis were killed in the battle near An Najar, adding there were no imaghlate reports of American casualties.

Sandstorms — weather in attack on a day of howling sandstorms — weather in some parts of Iraq. U.S.-led warplanes bombed targets in the northern part of the country and briefly knocked government television off the air in the capital. And U.S. troops in control of a vast Iraqi air base sealed 36 bunkers, designated as possible hiding places for Saddam's elusive weapons of mass destruction.

American officials issued fresh cautions, as well, about the possible use of chemical weapons by Iraqi troops, although none has yet been used in the 6-day-old war — or even found by the invading troops.

As the pace of combat quickened, American and British officials sought to prepare the public for something less than a quick campaign, and predicted difficult days to come.

Still, President Bush forecast victory. "The Iraqi regime will be ended... and our world will be more secure and peaceful," he said after receiving a war update at the Pentagon.



Policy restricts freedoms

Monday night, UK students who live on campus were greeted with the news that visitation in university housing will be greatly restricted, effective at 8 a.m. Wednesday Though the on-going war was used to justify these restrictions, it is difficult to interpret this action as anything but arbitrary restrictions on students freedom.

More specifically, the new policy would require students to show a UK ID when entering the building at any time, day or night. Additionally students may only check in visitors who are also UK students or who are immediate family members. Students from other schools or friends who are not students would be unable to enter university housing for visitation at any time. We students have been told to "think of the dorms as our home, but how can our university housing be home-like if we can have the student who can be the students who can be the students and the students bring in outside visitors, there is additional risk of terror attack. But the student who checks in a guest lives in the same dormitory. A student who would willingly invite a terrorist or criminal himself or herself; since guests are willingly checked in, it is ridiculous to eliminate this privilege for all UK students based on that line of thought.

Furthermore, this decision was made entirely without student input. While the university is and should be concerned with the students welfare, he students are ultimately the customers of the university, and to complete ly ignore the opinions of these customers is illogical. We students are rightly insulted when we find that the university does not have the confidence in us to entrust us with making decisions that concern our own well-being.

Now that this policy has been made known, doubtless more rational thinking will prevail, and the policy will be swiftly reversed.

Dorm visitation changes unjustified, impractical

For evidence of effects of the war at home, look no further than UK's residence halls. Today students living in the dorms get a new set of house rules, as UK ratchets up security in response to the war and recommendations from city and campus law enforcement worried about terrorist attacks.

The new rules restrict visitation to those

The new rules restrict visitation to those with valid UK IDs. And students who live in the dorms will have to show the desk clerk or resident adviser their own student ID each time enter the building.

The FBI identified colleges and universities as "soft targets" for terrorist activities. In a let-ter to all campus residents, UK administrators say they choose to "err on the side of caution" when deciding how to implement a recommendations for increased security. The university had

to respond, but the dorm visitation regulations only stifle students' rights, not terrorism.

In a letter to the campus community last Thursday, President Lee Todd wrote that UK's "primary goal is the safety and security of all students, faculty and staff." But how does re-stricting visitation access to only UK students

increase security? Do all the terrorists go to school elsewhere? Sure, students already operat-ed under a visitation and alcohol policy while in the dorms, but barring them from having visi-tors from outside the university is an unaccept-

tors from outside the university is an unacceptable evasion of our civil liberties.

Residence Life and Housing administrators should repeal the policy immediately.

Tonight, you have a chance to tell administrators what you think about the new policy at a forum on the issue from 8-10 p.m. in the small ballroom of the Student Center. Before implementing the changes, housing officers consulted a few student leaders, but the idea for more student input came when a student living in the dent input came when a student living in the residence halls e-mailed President Todd to say he was planning a protest on the president's front lawn. Needless to say, that student, Keith Kurzendoerfer, got a few calls from the dean of student's office. They negotiated tonight's forum instead

instead.

Every student — especially those living in

UK's residence halls — should go to the forum.

This could be the first of many unjustified changes on this campus.

Tempo: Wisconsin wants to limit Cats' scoring opportunities, but won't milk the clock if it makes his team tentative

But Wisconsin coach Bo Ryan objects with critics who lable his Badgers as a shot clock-wasting pogsession baskerball team.

"We have never held the ball yet," said Ryan who coached previously at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville and Wisconsin-Milwaukee before becoming coach of the Wisconsin-Madison Badgers last season. "In the two years here, we have not held the ball, it is just what you need to do to get a good shot.

"When you are playing teams that are bigger then maybe you need to make that extra pass or two to give you what you want. Nobody that knows us and has seen us play said anything about us holding the ball. That is just from people and the said of the Badgers can run, indicative of their 70-plus points per game. But he has also emphasized pace in UK's first two NCAA Tournament games — wins over the more methodical UPUI and Utah —

and he knows Wisconsin will try to prevent UK from pushing the tempo when the two teams meet at 7:10 p.m. Thursday in Minneapolis in the Sweet 16.

"What we always try to do is create tempo and force turnovers. Smith said. "They will push the ball and try to play at their pace. We all want to play at our own pace."

UK's lopsided tournament wins — a 31-point no-contest against IUPUI and 20-point beating of Utah — have not scared fifth-seeded Wisconsin, the Big Ten regular season champs and win-

ners against Weber State 81-74 and Tul-

ners against Weber State 81-74 and russa 61-60.
Senior guard Kirk Penney leads the Badgers in scoring at 161, points per game. He said UK's game film from the Utah game was impressive, but his team will be well prepared.
"They are strong and physical and they played hard. That is what a defensive team does." Penney said.
"They held their intensity level. That is why they have won so many games.
