Text includes: Research Problems in the Manufacture of Nylon, molecular weight and viscosity, A long-chain linear polymer is formed with a molecular weight of 10,000 or higher, the melt is converted to solid chips that are later re-melted and extruded through a spinneret to form filaments at a speed of 2,500 feet a minute. The filaments are then drawn out to about four times their original length in order to develop the desired textile qualities characteristic of nylon. These operations sound simple enough, but some of the problems encountered were extraordinarily difficult. For example, a specially designed grid for melting the polymer was necessary because of the poor thermal conductivity of the polymer; pumps had to operate at 280°C with only polymer as a lubricant; special abrasion-resistant steels that did not soften or warp at 285°C were necessary; the spinning assembling required radically new engineering developments to produce the necessary fiber qualities. All of these chemical, physical and mechanical engineering problems had to be solved and dove-tailed into a unified process before manufacture of nylon could be undertaken. In all, about 230 technical men and eight manufacturing and staff departments share the credit for making nylon the important part of American life it is today.

Joseph A. Fields, Tex., of Danville, has been promoted to first lieutenant while serving in the Special Service section of the United States forces in Austria, according to an Army dispatch from that country. Lieutenant Fields, whose wife, Mrs. Katherine W. Fields, has joined him in Linz, Austria, has been overseas since December, 1945. He is a graduate of Henry Clay high school in Lexington, and attended the University.

Amelia Mason, 46, of Russellville, has been named home demonstration agent for Hickman county and has reported for duty there. Miss Mason has served as assistant home demonstration agent in Christian county since her graduation from the University last June. She holds a home economics degree.

J. Virgil Proctor, 30, of Lexington was awarded the Medal of Freedom by Major General Curtis E. LeMay, Deputy Chief of Air Staff for Research and Development, in a recent ceremony at the Army Air Forces Headquarters. The award was made in recognition of Mr. Proctor's services as a civilian member of the Operation Analysis Section of 20th Air Force headquarters from January to September, 1945, during which time he was stationed in the Marianas Islands. The citation pointed out that Mr. Proctor introduced a mathematical method of determining the optimum combination of high explosive and incendiary bombs for a target. He was also credited with expanding and developing the weapon analysis sub-section of Operations Analysis section and making important critical analyses of the practice bombing missions over Japanese targets in preparation for the atomic bomb attacks. After attending the University, Mr. Proctor conducted his own business, the Proctor-Ingels Engineers in Lexington. He entered the service in December, 1944 at Washington.

John D. Turner, Jr., 29, of Lexington, has been elected president of Beta association of Phi Beta Kappa at a meeting of the alumni group.

Lt. Col. John L. Doctor Niess Writes For French Review

Dr. Robert J. Niess, associate professor of romance languages, is the author of the leading article, "Evolution of An Idea: Julien Benda's La Traison des Clercs," in the current issue of the French Review, organ of the American Association of Teachers of French.

The article traces the development of the idea of insufficiency of the modern intellectuals which is the main theme of the book "La Traison des Clercs," said to be one of the most important contributions to the French literature in the last 25 years. Professor Niess is writing a book about Julien Benda, considered to be one of the greatest living thinkers in France. He is an opponent of the ideas of Bergson, who for many years has dominated French philosophy.

25 To Be Officers After Camp Course

Field Trip Planned By Geology Group
