

Kentucky State College
Lexington, Ky. March 18, 1896

At three o'clock in the afternoon, the faculty was called to order by President Patterson to consider some matters that were not definitely settled at the preceding meeting.

Prof. Roark, at the request of the President, stated the subjects to be discussed, viz. - (1) The question relating to entrance examinations (2) That of advertising the College more thoroughly (3) That of determining the eligibility of those students that are candidates for graduation at the close of the present term -

Prof. Miller moved the adoption of the resolution regarding entrance examinations - Prof. White, after seconding the motion, stated his reasons for supporting the resolution - He thought the labor attending these examinations too ^{much} for one person to attend to; hence the necessity of dividing the State into districts and assigning one to each professor to be looked after - Prof. Miller strongly advocated this plan, but Prof. Roark objected to it on the ground that a County Superintendent, or some other person, in correspondence with the various heads of departments might receive answers that, by possibly contradictory statements, might cause confusion rather than enlighten the person seeking information - The subject was discussed at some length by several members of the faculty, the President making very pertinent remarks showing the necessity of increasing the number of students to such a degree that ample return would be given the state for the money spent in maintaining the College - At this juncture, Prof. Nelson offered the following amendment to the resolution under discussion: That the Board of Trustees be requested to appoint an agent who, under the direction of the President,

shall devote his time to the advertising department of the College; and that the President be authorized to call upon the members of the faculty for such assistance in the advertising as he may deem necessary.

After some discussion of the amendment, Prof. Rock moved that the whole subject of advertising be referred to a committee of five, who shall prepare a specific scheme of advertising in conformity with sec. 13 of the resolution, and report same to the faculty at its next regular meeting.

The motion was carried. The President then appointed the Deans of the several departments with the Vice President as this committee.

Candidates
for
Graduation

The subjects of the candidates for graduation was then taken up and contingent upon their completing satisfactorily the final examinations, the following were accounted eligible to graduation:

In Mechanical Engineering, Messrs. McDowell, Lyle, Orman, and Case; in the Scientific Department, Miss Duck and Mr. Tugg; in the Classical Department, Messrs. Alford, Cornahan, Dean, Dunlop, Kerrick, and Woods; the cases of Messrs. Davidson and Henderson were referred to the Special faculty to which each belongs.

On motion of Prof. Shackelford the Deans of the several departments were appointed to examine the record books and decide upon the hours, reporting at the next Faculty meeting.

The meeting then adjourned.
