

March 6, 1914

The faculty of the State University of Kentucky met in regular session in the faculty room in the Gymnasium building, Friday, March 6, 1914, at 3:45 P.M., those present being: Professors Anderson, Boyd, Dantzler, Frankel, Freeman, Garman, Gilbert, Gillis, Good, Gullion, Dean Hamilton, Professors Jones, Kastle, Lafferty, Mathews, Melcher, Miller, Norwood, Peter, Pryor, Rees, G. Terrell, Miss Sweeny, Dr. Tuthill, Prof. Weaver and Prof. Zembrod.

In the absence of President Barker, the meeting was presided over by Dr. Kastle.

The Secretary called the roll and read the minutes of the last meeting, which were approved as read.

The following recommendations from the Committee on Courses of Study were unanimously adopted:

PRE-MEDICAL COURSE.

"Resolved, That action on the granting of an A.B. or a B.S. degree for fourth year's work done elsewhere in a combined A.B.-Medical or B.S.-Medical Course be deferred until after the meeting, in April next, of the Deans of the Colleges of Arts and Science of the North Central Association of Universities and Colleges."

"Resolved, That Dr. Pryor's three years' Pre-Medical Course be approved as satisfactory for the first three years of a combined A.B.-Medical and B.S.-Medical Course."

DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

"The degree of Bachelor of Civil Law (B.C.L.) will be conferred upon such students as may complete four years of work including the law subjects set out in the prescribed law course (exclusive of the non-technical work) and twenty-four credits of work in the course of Arts and Science. Ten of these credits are required as follows: Four in English, one in History, three in Political Economy, Political Science, or Sociology, and two in Forensics. Fourteen may be selected from Latin, Greek, German, French, Philosophy, Logic, Ethics, Psychology, Anatomy and Physiology, Journalism, History, English Literature, Chemistry or Physics. By consent of the Dean, permission may be given to use as credits other subjects not mentioned in the above list of electives."

REORGANIZATION OF COURSE IN PHILOSOPHY.

- "I. (a). First Semester: Logic, Deductive and Inductive.
(b). Second Semester: Introduction to Philosophy.
Required for all Juniors in the College of Arts and Science and elective for all who have completed two years of English.
- II. (a). First Semester: History of Ancient Philosophy.
(b). Second Semester: History of Mediaeval and Modern Philosophy.
- III. (a). First Semester: Ethics.
(b). Second Semester: Aesthetics.

Courses II. and III. are elective for Seniors and Juniors of A Grade pursuing Course I.

Advanced Courses.

- IV. (a). First Semester: Metaphysics.
(b). Second Semester: Epistemology.
- V. (a). First Semester: Experimental Psychology.
(b). Second Semester: Abnormal Psychology, i.e., Occult Science, Hypnotism, Lunacy, etc.

Course V. open to all students who have completed Education II., the Introductory Course in Psychology.

All these courses of study are to be taken three hours a week."

The following resolution, with reference to "hazing", was read by Prof. Miller and put in the form of a motion by him and seconded by Prof. Melcher:

"All forms of interference with a student's personal liberty by other students, such as is commonly classed under "hazing", and complicity in any form of initiation which has incident thereto the exhibition of a student as a public spectacle in a ridiculous light or the treatment of him, publicly or privately, even with his consent, in such a way as to endanger life or limb, are forbidden in this institution."

After a general discussion and several amendments, motion was made, seconded and carried that the question be deferred, pending the arrival of President Barker. The date was fixed for March 20th.

Mr. Brumage submitted a written report calling attention to several seniors who had not completed their Gym. work and asked for instructions. Dr. Kastle, Chairman of the meeting, suggested that these names be referred to their respective deans with instructions that they be required to report to Mr. Brumage for work.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

The meeting was called to order by the President, after the roll-call and reading of the minutes of the last meeting, the subject of having was continued.

President Barker stated that they would consider the motion made by Prof. Miller at the previous meeting of March 21st. After some discussion, Professor Barker made the following motion that a general rule be passed prohibiting smoking in this institution.

The motion was seconded and carried by a majority.

President Barker then read a recommendation from Dr. Hall of the I.S.C.A., with reference to the attendance at chapel services of members of the faculty and the students, as follows:

Inasmuch as attendance at the weekly convocation is not compulsory, and realizing the necessity of retaining all members that prevent voluntary attendance, as the faculty of the University of Kentucky, we hereby resolve

That beginning with Wednesday, March 25, 1915, all recitation rooms, reading rooms, public library, laboratories, drafting rooms and laboratories on the campus shall be closed at students and no meetings called by members of the faculty or students allowed therein, during the weekly convocation extending from 11:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M., each Wednesday.

That no meetings or gatherings of students shall be held in the halls of any building or buildings on the campus during the above hour.

That every professor or instructor shall not be held liable for the above hour in any building or on any of the campus.
