The article on the present basketball seating plan appearing in last week's Kernel hit the nail on the head when it stated that the "early birds" at the Kentucky basketball games definitely haven't been getting the worst.

The seating plan is superior to that of last year as it eliminates confusion and leaves no spots of empty seats scattered here and there throughout the gymnasium. The trouble lies not in the plan itself but in the way in which it is not followed correctly by the men who hand out the seating stubs at the gates.

The seating plan shown here in this column explains the system clearly. The first students arriving at the gym sit in section one, the next arrivals sit in two sections marked two, the next in two sections marked three, the next to last in the three sections marked four and the last arrivals are seated in the two sections designated as five.

This is all well and good but it doesn't work out this way one of the best examples of this is that of the manner in which the students were seated on the east side of the gym at the last student game. At 7:30 p.m. the chattering and two sections were filled and the

The result was that the fans coming in at 7:30 did not find themselves sitting up in the rafters while, much to their chagrin, the students arriving fifteen and twenty minutes later sat in the much to be desired seats down in section three on the right, the section where the earlier arrivals should have been sitting all along.

The athletics department is to be congratulated on the seating plan which they have gone to so much effort to arrange. Careful planning however, must be executed correctly if perfection is to be achieved.

Veterans Delinquent On Submission Of Earnings Report

The Veterans Administration Regional Office reported today that 850 of 2,500 Kentucky veterans who were required to submit earnings reports by January 5, are now delinquent and face suspension of subsistence payments. Further delay in payment can be avoided by turning in the reports immediately, officials said.

Veterans are reminded that Section B of the report form must be completed and signed by the instructor or employer.

The earnings reports are necessary every four months so that adjustments can be calculated when veterans receive subsistence payments in excess of the amount limited by the \$175-\$200 job-training amendment.

For reporting purposes, the 11,000 Kentucky veterans now participating in on-the-job training, cooperative training or institutional farm training are divided into four groups according to the final digit of their claim numbers. Veterans in college under the GI Bill will be called on for reports at a later date.

The first group (claim numbers ending in 0 or 1) must submit the reports in January, May and September; the second group (claim numbers ending in 2 or 3) in February, June and October; the third group (claim numbers ending in 4, 5 or 6) in March, July and November; the fourth group (claim numbers ending in 7, 8 or 9) in April, August and January.

VA form 7-1926, bearing the title "Report of Compensation from Productive Labor" is sent to each of the four groups on a rotating basis. The form must be completed and returned to the VA Regional Office, 1405 West Broadway, not later than the fifth of the month following the month in which it was received.

Veterans must complete the report form, even if they have received no earnings during the reporting period. VA subsistence payments should not be reported as earnings.

Veterans in training or education under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) are not required to submit earnings reports.

UK Grad Addresses Engineers

MIT Department Head Class of '13

Professor E. B. Penrod, head of the department of mechanical engineering, attended the fourth in a series of lectures on heat transfer at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, January 14-15.

Of special interest to UK students and faculty is the fact that the group of lectures this year were presented by Dr. William H. McAdams, head of the department of heat transfer at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. McAdams graduated from the University in 1913. Since that time he has gained the reputation of being one of the world's top living authorities on the science of heat transfer, and has written numerous textbooks, besides being a highly rated consultant. McAdams was originally a resident of Lexington, and the owner of the McAdams-Morford drug stores.

Professor Penrod said that the talks were concerned with new developments and theories in heat transfer, with much research information discussed. Specific fields in which the science of heat transmission is of paramount importance include the design of ovens and furnaces of all sizes, the field of air conditioning, the problem in de-icing and heating or cooling aircraft, and all transmission of heat in fluid flow.

Schools represented in addition to UK, were the University of Illinois, University of Louisville, Case, Michigan State college, Ohio State University, University of Notre Dame, Illinois Institute of Technology, and Northwestern university.

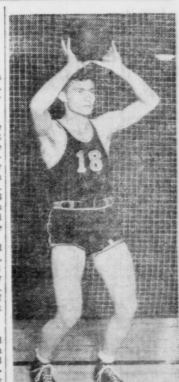

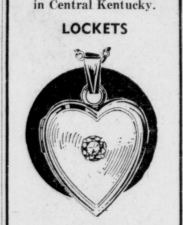
