READERS' GUIDE ABSTRACTS

The Reference Department has a six-month trial subscription to Readers' Guide Abstracts in microfiche. Coverage begins with September 1984 and presently goes through December 1986. We should receive, as part of our trial subscription, several of the eight cumulated updates issued per year. The new tool includes the same magazines and indexing as the Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature in the print and online versions, but only the microfiche product contains informative abstracts of articles and summaries of reviews. The annotations appear to be of the usual high quality one expects from the H.W. Wilson Company. We are housing the box containing the 125 pieces of fiche on one of the tables normally reserved for periodical list consultation.
