The Registrar asked whether the rule exempting seniors from final examinations would include those students who complete their work for a degree the first semester. Senate voted that the rule was effective either the first or second semester.

The Senate approved the recommendation of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences that the following new courses be added:

- History and Political Science 70 - Political Parties, 3 hrs. a week, first semester
- Ancient Languages 101 a,b,- Survey of Roman Literature, 2 hrs. a week, 2 semesters.

- Hygiene and Public Health
 - 1a- General Hyg. Beginning 1921-22, 2 hrs. a week; 1.3 crs.
 - 1b- General Hyg. 2 hrs. week; 1.3 crs.
 - 2 - First Aid, 2 hrs. week. 2 crs.
 - 3a- General Hyg. 1920-21; 3 hrs. week; 3 crs.
 - 3b- General Hyg. 1920-21 2 hrs. week; 2 crs.
 - 104 - Principles of Phys. Edn.; 2 hrs. a week. (To be accompanied by Phys. Edn.5, 1 cr.)

- Economics and Sociology
 - 109 -Business Law, 3 hrs. a week.
 - 106 a,b Advanced Accounting, 3 hrs. a week (Changed from 106)

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and approved by the Senate. It is as follows:

"In compliance with the rules of the University Senate the President of the University appointed a committee to audit student accounts. Your Committee wishes to make a partial report of accounts audited. We are unable to make a complete report because of the fact that some of the student organizations have failed in some way to comply with the Senate rules in submitting their reports. Your Committee is working on this problem and in the future hopes to make a more satisfactory arrangement for the submitting of these reports. The report is as follows:

(1) Y. M. C. A. Account Y. M. C. A. account was examined and found to be correct. The various disbursements were accompanied with the proper vouchers. The account shows the following:

(2) Little Theatre Account. The Little Theatre account was examined, found correct, and approved by the committee. The account shows the following:

This balance was paid into the University Treasury to cover expenditures made by the University on account of the Little Theatre.

(3) The Kernel. The Kernel account was examined. The accounts of the Kernel were not submitted in such a manner to enable the committee to make a satisfactory audit, inasmuch as the report was not accompanied entirely by vouchers. The accounts were approved as far as the records showed.

The records of the Kernel show that \$207 was paid in commission to students who managed the business of the Kernel.

(4) The Kentuckian The accounts of the Kentuckian were submitted, examined by the committee, and showed the following:

This balance was used as a commission by the managers of the Kentuckian.

(5) Junior Class Account. The Junior class made its financial report showing:

Accounts were submitted in a satisfactory manner and approved by the committee.

The accounts of the Y. W. C. A. have not been audited due to the fact that the Y. W. C. A. Secretary left the University without giving all the information called for and we have been endeavoring to get this information. We hope to make a report in the near future.

No reports were made on the accounts of the various dances that were held because of the fact that the Dean of Men informed us that rendering an account for the past year would be impracticable. He hopes to have these matters conducted in such a way, during the coming year, as will enable a satisfactory report to be made.

Your attention is specifically called to the fact that the report of the Kentuckian indicates that the managers cleared nearly \$300. The University contributed to their fund \$675 through the purchase of 225 annuals at \$3 each.

The committee also was impressed with the apparent lack of system among the various organizations in keeping the accounts. Suggestion will be made by the Business Office especially to the staff of the Kernel, which ought to enable them to keep their accounts in a satis-

factory manner. The accounts of the Y. M. C. A. and Athletic Committee are satisfactorily kept. The accounts of the Y. W. C. A. are satisfactorily kept.

The committee feels that it should make inquiries from other institutions about the business methods used in financing the accounts of student organizations and also the methods of securing reports and auditing these reports. In the near future we shall undertake to secure some information from a few of the leading state universities.

We hope also to have a conference with some of the officers of the student organizations, as soon as some of the organizations start this year, and discuss with them certain points in the method of keeping their accounts and making their reports. In this way we hope gradually to bring about more satisfactory methods of doing business by these organizations.
