After the deadline date of December 31, policies which have lapsed more than three months cannot be reinstated without the veteran proving his insurability by a complete physical examination.

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## Great Lakes Game To Mark First UK Post-Season Clash

Kentucky's Wildcats arrived in Cleveland this morning for their scrap with the Villanova Wildcats in the inaugural Great Lakes Bowl tomorrow afternoon. A near capacity crowd — which would be 85,000 fans — is expected to be on hand to witness the C.A.'s first "post-season" clash with the Knights of Columbus.

With their regular season record of seven wins and three losses recorded in the books for two weeks, the Kentuckians will be participating in their first bowl contest in the school's two-year history.

The teams accepted bids to play in the Cleveland event early in November when three games remaining on each schedule. Since then Villanova has rounded out its schedule for its season by dropping all three opponents, while the less fortunate Mountain Wildcats won only two of their battles.

## Kicking Good

Since their 2-2 shading at the hands of Boston College, Villanova has beaten Marquette 25-13, and San Francisco 21-18. Each of the two victories can be credited to the excellent booting from placement of Joe Slano, who also pushed the ball 44-12 against Detroit U. with some perfect kicking.

However, in the kicking department, Kentucky is not being the field. Quarterback George Blandis' kicks are being held by the team's trouble number times during the season, and fans haven't forgotten Slano's kicking in the 1946 season, when he led the team to a 7-7 tie.

## Physical Condition Bad

Coach Paul "Red" Grant, while fairly well pleased with the Kentuckians' record up to the week's end, is not so sure of the team's north-bound train, couldn't help but remark the poor physical condition of his squad. Two of the team's regular first-foot-backs are still on the sick list.

Don "Dopey" Phelps, one of the South's fastest stepping backs, is being hampered by an extremely bad cold. The Kentuckians' two backs are listed as doubtful starters.

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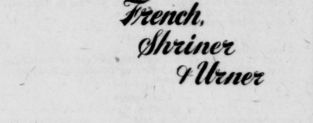

### Two Wildcats In Blue-Gray Annual Game

Coach Paul Bryant and his two All-SEC gridlers, Wash Serini and Jay Rhodemyre, also an all-America selection this year, will make up the Kentucky delegation wearing the Southern colors in the annual Blue-Gray game, Dec. 27 in Montgomery, Ala.

The 1947 renewal of the Gridiron battle of the North and South will mark the third appearance of the venerable Serini in that event, however, it will be the first appearance for both Rhodemyre and Bryant, in any capacity. The event was not inaugurated until after Bryant's graduation from Alabama in 1936.

The entire Southern squad has not yet been named. The remainder of the Gray coaching staff is made up of Jess Neely of Rice, and Allyn McKern, coach of Mississippi State's SEC champs, both of whom have coached the Southern squad previously.

Bryant and Rhodemyre are Southerners, but Serini, a pseudo-Kentuckian, hails from Tuckahoe, New York. Bryant is a native of Purdue, Arkansas, and Rhodemyre comes from Ashland, Kentucky.

Another pseudo-Kentuckian will figure prominently in the direction of the Northern attack. He is Bo McMillan, immortal of Centre College's Fraying Colonels of a few decades back. Other "Yankee" coaches are Ray Marston, Temple, and Bernie Masterson, Nebraska, who, like Bryant, is a newcomer to the affair.

The Southerners were victorious last year, 20-12.

### All-American Honors

Jay Rhodemyre, Kentucky's dynamic center, continuing to win honors had another feather added to his gridiron helmet during the past week, when he was selected to fill the center berth on the Associated Press's All-America third team.

Charles Bednarik of Penn and Dick Scott of Navy, won first and second place honors, respectively. Attesting to the merit of their three selections for center, AP said: "One of the quickest ways to stir up a football argument is to attempt to rate the 1947 centers Bednarik, Scott, Rhodemyre, and two others, John Rapacz of Oklahoma and Vaughn Mancha, Alabama's 1945 All-America. Any could justifiably rate the first team, but Bednarik gets the call on the strength of a consistently brilliant season which drew loud praise even from rival coaches. One of Army's assistants called Bednarik the best center he had ever seen. Ranked with these two is Rhodemyre, strong on both offense and defense."

Wallace Jones, Don Phelps and Wash Serini, all of whom won honorable mention on an earlier All-America team also received honorable mention on the AP squad. Only five Southeastern Conference players were honored on the first three teams, and only one of these won a first string berth, tackle Bob Davis of Georgia Tech, as compared to three on the 1946 AP honor team.

Others honored on the second team were Charles Connerly of Ole Miss, and Harry Glimmer of Alabama. Besides Rhodemyre on the third team is Ole Miss's Barney Poole. All but Tech's Davis played against the Wildcats during the past season. Besides his All-America berth, playday will be a state WAA meet- ing and hockey, volleyball, swimming and bowling tournaments. Independent bowling is under way now and final scores are not yet available.

### Jay Rhodemyre Named All-SEC; Serini Honored

Kentucky's stellar center Jay Rhodemyre was named to the all-Southeastern Conference first team last week. Along with Rhodemyre, Wash Serini got a berth on the SEC second team, and Leo Yarusis was on the third team. Serini placed as tackle while Yarusis received the top as guard.

Rhodemyre, ace center for Kentucky, has been turning in some of the most excellent footballing ever seen at Kentucky this year with his smart defensive work as well as great offensive work. Leo Yarusis, vest-pocket guard from Kentucky, also gained recognition when he was placed as third team guard on the All-SEC team.

"The Little Tiger," as he has been dubbed, has proved to be one of the best and most fiery players that Kentucky has seen in many days. Leo is a pre-med major and a very good student. As a senior, Leo has helped lead his team and played with heart-filled determination to win. Again we say "Hats off" to Leo Yarusis, dynamic filled guard from Kentucky.

Wash Serini, senior tackle on the Kentucky team, also received honors when he was named as tackle on the SEC team. Wash, congenial and big-hearted, has been a campus fixture for the past four years at Kentucky with his "Hi Honey" to every coed and friendly smile to everyone. Wash has played four years at Kentucky, receiving all-SEC honors during the war.

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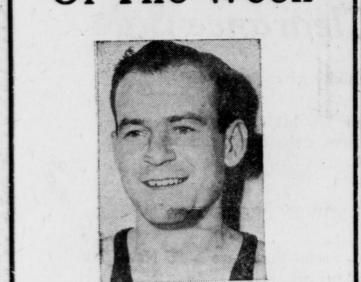


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### COLONEL Of The Week

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### SGA Judiciary Committee To Penalize Law Violators

A plan to give the Student Government authority to enforce its laws was approved at a meeting of the association assembly this week. Claude Sprows, president of SGA, pointed out that the student governing association has no authority to enforce any of its rules, but under the new procedure the judiciary committee will be able to act as judge and levy penalties on persons or organizations violating SGA laws.

**Laws To Be Adopted**  
Laws the organization will be adopted in January. Sprows said, "As things are now, SGA is powerless to enforce its rules. The SGA head said: "As an example, any student reported for violating the SGA no-smoking rule in certain buildings would have us if he contested his case."

"It is to give the organization power to enforce its laws that this policy is being taken," Sprows said. **Organization Necessary**  
He explained the organization had always had the authority to enforce its regulations, but has never set up the organization necessary.

Members of the judiciary committee are Jameson Jones, chairman, and Harry Miller, Law College SGA representative. Non SGA members are Bob Hardin, Rosemary Dummit and James Brackenhorn.

**Public Hearings Possible**  
Sprows said proposed laws would be given wide publicity before being passed by the assembly. He said after a bill was introduced it would be referred to a committee for study and that it is possible the committee might hold public hearings to determine student opinion before the bill is reported to the assembly for final action.

He said the laws would be filed in a bound volume which would give continuity to SGA. "As it is now, our records are very incomplete. We have very little record of what SGA has done with the exception of 1942," he said.

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### Cooperstown Seeks Competent Manager For Grocery Store

Failure to locate a competent manager for the Cooperstown Commissary, low-cost community grocery store for residents of Cooperstown and Shawneetown, is delaying plans to open the store, Edward Johnston, chairman of the organization committee, announced Thursday.

The commissary, which will serve approximately 500 student veterans and faculty families, is completed, except for the installation of shelving, according to Johnston. A surplus Army queue, but has been erected in Cooperstown to house the store and the University has reinforced the floor, lined the walls, and installed light and heat.

The building also is furnished partially with counters, glass display cases, and three electric refrigerator boxes. Equipment has been purchased new and second-hand by the veterans from funds raised by selling "shares" in the enterprise to residents of the town.

If a full-time manager and bookkeeper, who will be the only employees of the self-service store designed to offer groceries at "reasonable" prices, cannot be found, it is planned to open the store late this month or early next year with a part-time staff.

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## The Students' Side

However, it seems to the Kernel that it is unfortunate that the idea of a special had to originate from anger over something which they had little right to become angry about.

Investigation has revealed that through error and changed plans, the football convocation was not well attended. We cannot feel that the students should be, as a body, as blasphemed as they have been by the special edition staff and other newspaper commentators. The blame should fall on the shoulders of those responsible.

NO ONE WILL ATTEND A CONVOCATION WHICH HE DOES NOT KNOW ABOUT. It is supposed to know by intuition that the time and place of the convo were changed? Publicity was issued too soon and contained erroneous information. One can forget much, even if he has the right information, on a rainy cold Tuesday afternoon (after such a big weekend) when he has two term papers and five book reports due before the end of the week and may have a part time job besides.

You may scoff at that. You may say that if Tommy Dorsey came to the campus and gave a free dance, it would be jammed even during examinations. Maybe so, but if NO ONE KNEW HE WAS COMING, OR THE TIME AND PLACE OF HIS ENGAGEMENT WERE CHANGED, he wouldn't expect
