About five years ago, diversity on campus was only thought to encompass blacks, Es-pinosa said.





BAGHDAD — Violence is increasing in Iraq, raising questions about whether the security improvements credited to the increase in U.S. troops may be short-lived.

Car bombs in Baghdad on Monday killed at least 11 people and injured a prominent leader of one of the country's most influential. The Ministry of Electricity announced that power to much of the nation, already anemic, is likely to lag in coming days because insurgents had blown up transmission facilities and natural gas pipelines that fuel generators.

CBS News confirmed that two of its journalists are missing in Basra, in Iraq's south.

A leading parliament member warned that budget disputes have paralyzed the legislature.

Secretary of Defense Robert Gates, finishing a two-day visit to Baghdad, said that he was likely to advocate a pause in troop with-drawals to evaluate the situation after the last of the additional troops sent here under President Bush's so-called surge strategy had left later this year. Femark after meeting for two hours with Gen. David Petraeus, the top U.S. commander in Iraq, Petraeus already has indicated that he wants to slow troop withdrawals to consolidate the past year's security gains.

Gates previously has said that how fast troops are redeployed from Iraq will depend on conditions there. But his statement prompted criticism from Democratic lawmakers. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., House Armed Services Committee Chairman Ike Skelton, D-Mo, and presidential contender Sen. Barack Obama, D-Ill., each issued statements that said delaying further withdrawals would leave the American military over-

stretched.

Other leading presidential contenders made no comment on Cates' remarks. Republican front-runner John McCain has been a leading advocate of the surge.

After months of declining violence, February is certain to be the third straight month to see increases in the numbers of Baghdad residents killed in car bombings and suicide attacks.

According to statistics kept by McClatchy, the low point in such slitlings came in November, when 76 people did. Thanks to a pair of pet market bombings that killed 99 people Feb. 1, February's tal-ly already is 11 months of the president, Pentagon officials said.

Monday, a suicide car bomber drove his car into the Baghdad residence of a prominent leader of the Anbar Salvation Council, a US. - allied milital that's credited with helping to drive al-Qaida in Iraq from that province. Five minutes later, another car bomb exploded at a buy intersection a short distance away.

The blasts killed at least 11 people and injured 30.

Later, Sheki Ali Hathem al-Duelimy, who was injured in the attack, went on Iraqi TV and declared war against his encemies. He said that his militia, many of whose members are paid by the United States, no longer would allow the US, or Iraqi government to interfere with its wook.

His comments came as similar U.S.-allied groups in nearby Diyala province continued to refuse to work with American or Iraqi government forces until the provincial police chief is removed. On Monday, hundreds protested in Diyala to demand the chief's re-

moval.

In an e-mailed statement, the top U.S. military spokesman in Iraq, Rear Adm. Gregory Smith, acknowledged the "frustration on the part of some awakening councils," but said that most remained on the job and committed to defending their neighborhoods.

Iraqi government spokesmen declined comment or couldn't be reached.

"Of the two states, Clinton probably has a better shot in Virginia," said Brad Coker, man-aging director of Mason-Dixon Polling & Re-search.

He cited the working class, largely rural communities in southwest Virginia as potential Clinton country. But about half the state's Democratic vote is expected to come from the eastern side of the state, where Obama has a huge lead.

Clinton's camp tried Monday to convince voters and analysts to look beyond not only Tuesday's contests but also Wisconsin's primary Feb. 19, even though last week's American Research Group poll gave her a 9-point lead there. She and her aides said she'd focus primarily on March 4, when Texas, Ohio, Vermont and Rhode Island vote. A total of 370 delegates will be at stake then.

"You all knew what the likely outcome of those recent contests were," Clinton said. Many of her losses came in caucus states, she said, and "it doesn't surprise me. It doesn't affect me one way or the other."

The University Senate yesterday recommended nominees to receive an honorary degree this spring: former UK basketball coach Tubby Smith. former Gov. Paul Patton, retired UK faculty member Gifford Blyton and former Indian President Avul Pakir Jainulabdeen Abdul Kalam.

The recommendations go to the Board of Trustees for approval during its March 4 meeting. Before leaving for the University of Minsota, Smith won three national coach of the year awards at UK and led the Cats to four Elite Eights, five Southeastern Conference championships and one national title. In his 10 years at UK, Smith's record was 263-883.

Patton, a UK alumnus, served as Kentucky governor from 1995 to 2003, During his time in office, Patton worked to overhaul how higher education was funded and managed. In 2002, Western Kentucky nurse Tina Conner sued Patton and the state in Franklin County Circuit Court, alleging that he directed state officials to shut down bet business after she ended their affair.

Byton, a former UK communications professor, has been the parliamentarian for the University Senate for 35 years.

If approved, Patton, Smith and Blyton would receive their honorary degrees at UK's commencement May 4.



Cutting funding for KEES takes its incentives away

Gov. Steve Beshear seems to have his wires crossed when it comes to making higher education affordable: With tuition on the rise and an ever-increasing demand for financial aid, he has proposed cutting the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship funding by \$13.1 million next year. In difficult budget times, worthwile programs must sometimes be scaled back. But when it comes to making higher education more afordable — and therefore more accession should not be how much to cut, but how much can be added.

As it stands, KEES represents a

to Kentucky students: First, study

well in high school: and second, when
picking a college, look in Kentucky
first. Since KEES awards can, with
few exceptions, only be spert in state,
the program should discourage the
brightest students from going elsewhere for their postsecondary education.

When funding is threatened, the KEES incentives practically vanish. Recent high school graduates who had factored the scholarship into their col-lege planning find themselves looking for a new income source. Others who turn down out-of-state schools for the promise of financial assistance in Kenpromise of manicial assistance in Keri-tucky colleges second-guess their deci-sions. And younger students — the high school freshmen and sophomores — perceive that KEES is more of a

ermment and stop factoring it in to their decision-making.

For KEES to be effective, it must be funded with an unwavering com-mitment. And for it to remain relevant as tuition continues to rise at almost all colleges, the payouts need to start in-creasing, too.

Since its inception in 1998, KEES

Since its inception in 1998, KEES has used the same award structure, with up to \$2,500 each year given to the highest-performing high school students. At the time, the scholarship covered a more significant portion of UK's tutition. Now, a KEES award for many is only enough to cover a year of books with some spending money left-over.




