Better Grades Are Emphasized By New Ruling

The University has taken another step to see that its students get educated or else.

The "or else" refers to the ruling recently issued through the deans of the various colleges that students on probation would not be allowed to participate actively in campus organizations.

For those who have never suffered the ordeal of

probation, it can be explained thus: Any student who didn't make a 1.0 standing for the last semester, or made the 1.0 but didn't pass the required 12


or mate the 10 out doint pass the required 12 hours is on probation.

In the entire University approximately 350 students fell into this category.

These students are not allowed to appear publicly with any University organization, and are not allowed to hold office with any of these groups. The hardest hit groups by volume were the musical organizations. From the seven of them a total of 31 students are on probation. They will be allowed to continue to attend the classes but will be unable to go on the tours or appear in concerts.

Dr. Edwin Stein, head of the Music Department, does not think their absence will deter the efficiency of the groups to any great extent. It will only add greater emphasis on the part of the students to make their grades in order to participate actively in the tours and concerts.

Possibly the enforcement of this ruling may be the answer to many of the University's scholastic

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

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
