Only A Chosen Few Remain In War-Time English Schools

The 37,000 men and women who are left in England's eleven universities are either under way for military service, physically unfit, or have been reserved (deferred from National Service and assigned to college) in most cases at government expense.

The only change in the schedule has been that late afternoon classes will have their exams on Saturday afternoon, June 5. The old system for giving exams during a special period has been replaced because many instructors gave the tests before the end of the quarter, and in many cases students were forced to take three or four exams in one day.
